There'll be a full report on the Crystal Boot Awards in the April edition of *Linedancer*.



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
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romantics like opeful . me need a quick fix sometimes: tender. sentimental slushy lyrics and love songs that are captivating, sophisticated and seductive. Take a 29year-old Canadian with a rich golden voice and the natural ability to pay tribute to music from a bygone age and the quick fix soon becomes a very long lasting addiction. Michael Bublé has just released his long-awaited second album, It's Time. And if you enjoyed the first one and the Line dances like Kim Ray's Fever especially choreographed to it, you'll fall in love all over again second time around.

It's an irresistible nostalgic trip through vintage tunes we all know. In fact, tunes our parents can happily sing along to. Yet the more Michael Bublé begins to sound like Sinatra or Dean the Martin – indeed any of the Rat Pack heroes he has worshipped for so long – the more he begins to sound like himself.

By the age of 17 Bublé had already made a number of independent recordings. Winning the Canadian Youth Talent Search propelled him towards the national and international spotlight. The former Canadian Prime Minister introduced him to Warner Brothers and the rest, as they say, is history. And all that jazz.

From as far back as he can remember, Bublé was absorbing the musical sounds of Ella Fitzgerald, Keely Smith, Sarah Vaughan. He also listened to Stevie Wonder, Elvis and Bobby Darrin. Van Morrison, The Bee Gees and George Michael could also be found amongst his album collection. But it was his grandfather who pulled his ears back one day and made him really listen.

"My grandfather opened me up to a world of music that seemed to have been passed over by my generation," he says. "The first time he played me The Mills Brothers something magical happened. It was like seeing my future before me. I wanted to be a singer. And I knew that this was the music I wanted to sing."

More of the music he wanted to sing is sprawled across his brand new album. And you find yourself not only singing along with him, but dancing too. Tunes that are very familiar indeed. Bublé's version of *Quando*, *Quando*, *Quando* is an elegant and stylish duet with Nelly Furtado with echoes of the Getz/Gilberto classic, *Girl from Ipanema*. And, though slower than Engelbert's version, you can still do a more relaxed and laid back, *Quando*, *When Quando* –Teresa and Vera's first smash-hit Line dance – which beginners are still happily learning.

Home, which is self-penned is surprisingly good — and surprisingly sounding like something Ronan Keating would have slipped in amongst the song sheets. More of that later. But if all you really want to do is dance, try the calypso cha-cha cover version of The Drifters Save The Last Dance For Me. I like this!

Try a Little Tenderness hits all the right romantic smoky places. How Sweet It Is is sweet indeed. West Coast Swing inspirational – or even try a little Kick 'n Rock.

I'm sure that, even as I write, choreographers are tripping over their boots to invent a little something to go with this. *I've Got You Under My Skin* sounds like Sinatra. Buble – like ol'

blue eyes himself – has mastered the art of making the words make perfect sense. *You and I,* the Stevie Wonder hit, features Stevie on harmonica. *Dream a Little Dream,* the Mama and Papas 60s super smash, is great. And although there is already a dance to *Mack the Knife,* just one thought springs to mind when you hear Michael's up-dated version – oh yeah!

Buble's last album sold in record-breaking numbers worldwide. His UK tour last year, including two nights at the Royal Albert Hall was a sell-out. He also managed to squeeze in a visit with Her Majesty at The Royal Variety Performance.





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So much success so young, sometimes swivel-turns the most level of heads. And Bublé's head was no exception to the un-written showbiz rule. It was his tour manager and life-long friend, Chris, who eventually took him aside and whispered a few unpalatable home truths in his ear. Chris told him in no uncertain terms that fame had turned him into a monster.

Michael takes up the story: "We were on a plane and I was being rude to the flight attendant and talking about this girl and that one. For the first time Chris raised his voice to me and said: 'You are being an ass. Which was not what your parents raised you to be'."

Michael's attitude nearly destroyed his relationship with girlfriend of seven years, Debbie Timuss. The song, Home on the latest album was inspired by his love for the 27-year-old singer/actress.

"She supported me, loved me, took care of me," he says. "Then I got famous. I was a total mess. I only worried about myself and my career. Fame is a seductive thing. When thousands call your name and police escort you everywhere it's like a dream.

"The deeper you get into fame, the further away from reality you get. I lost the plot I started to womanise and think, 'I'm so Mr Cool. I'm so famous'. Which just shows my dorkiness really."

His friend's wise words wounded. But they hit home just when and where it was needed.

"When Chris spoke to me like that, I was so shocked," he says. "I went back on the plane and I prayed. And then one morning I went home and made things right. Now I feel lucky to be doing this but also lucky somebody loves me."

Nina Simone's Feeling Good is rumoured to be the first single from the new album. "It's a great song and I loved it," says Bublé. "A song about my life at the moment. This is really going great and it's my time to come out and shine. But it has been pointed out to me that there will be strippers all over the world dancing to it. I'll have to do a stripper re-mix version."

This won't just be a hit with Those strippers. hopeful romantics, still saving the last dance for someone special, will be oh so glad to hear it.

And Catholics in New Jersey are teaching Filipino Americans to Line dance, reports the *Jersey Journal*.

Jamie had failed miserably at a Job Interview for an Events Co-ordinator so business psychologist Dr Rob Yeung has the job of getting his confidence up. He had passed all his previous tasks that day, and tonight was the last one. So in walked a nervous Jamie, only to be told what was expected of him. At first he said: "You're joking. My street cred will suffer". Anyway, we plonked a cowboy hat on him, and I taught him the dance Natural Flow.

Jamie struggled through it, and then came the hard part — to teach him how to count in and all the correct terminology for the steps. This was not an easy task as Jamie, bless him, could not dance let alone speak it through. This was all done without music.

An hour later, my Wednesday night class came in all dressed up in their best



cowboy clothes dug out from six years ago. I had prepped them up so they knew what was happening. I was then sent in to teach them the dance, in 5 minutes flat. Then poor Jamie came in and was subjected to "Yee Ha and whoops". He counted them in with the help of myself and Dr Yeoung, eight tries later he succeeded. He actually did really well, and managed to call the dance four times through without stopping. At the end of the session he got a really good applause. Jamie said I needed a medal and had the patience of a saint to teach him. He now has a different outlook on Line dancing. So a good time was had by all. It will be televised later this month.

I think I did a really good job, considering this boy could not dance a step before and left the hall knowing that he had passed his task, and would be able to go out on another interview full of confidence and knowing that he could talk with shoulders back and a smile on his face approach. We enjoyed it — hope you will enjoy the programme.

Cowboys and Santas in Telford



A new album, a new film and now a new single with a rapper The good times keep rolling for Tim McGraw, says *Lin*

singers ountry renowned for being bighearted and generous when it comes to sharing a stage or microphone, with their fellow artistes. And superstar Tim McGraw - voted the Sexiest Man in Country – is no exception. So when he was asked to record Over and Over with a fellow American who grew up in the Midwest his reaction was: "Sure – why not". But it wasn't your run of the mill pairing. Fabulous and glam wife Faith Hill it wasn't. In fact about as far away as Faith as you could imagine.

Rapper, Nelly, wanted McGraw and no substitutes because "that crooner can sing".

"That's what he said and I had to respect him for that," laughs McGraw. "I love Nelly. The first time I met him was when we played in a basketball game together in Atlanta

a couple of years ago, when I smoked him pretty good. We always enjoyed each other and talked about working together. So he'd written this song and the first thing Nelly did was tell his Manager to call me. If you know Nelly, he's such a great guy. I couldn't wait to work with him,"

Nelly considered the track to be Country. Tim McGraw has no such illusions. "There aint nothing Country about

this song," he says. "But people are really liking it."

The video is on *The Box* already and it's just been added to the Capital FM Playlist. Sales for Tim's own album, *Live Like You Were Dying* continue to shoot skyward like a star-spangled rocking Country rocket. It's a brilliant 16-track cluster of raucous, gutsy, dirty Country and sad story songs with lyrics that are intense and profound. A little dry humour dusted here and there like icing sugar lifts the spirit and prevents it becoming too weighted down with heartbreak and heartache. Listen to *Everybody Hates me* or the jokey *Back When* and you'll see what I mean.

"This record has a really personal feel to it," says McGraw. "It's almost a tapestry of life. Not just for us but in general. And I think a lot of people will be able to relate to it. And will be able to jump into this record, and flow downstream with it.

"Walk Like a Man is a song that probably hits home with a lot of people. It certainly touches on some of my growing up."

McGraw had his share of bad — as well as good — childhood memories, touched by the demons of domestic abuse and poverty, at one time having to live in a barn. "It's a really personal song in a lot of ways. But you can say there's something personal about every song."

None more so perhaps than the emotional title track, *Live Like you Were Dying.* Tim Nichols and Craig Wiseman penned this Grammy-nominated Song of the Year and CMA Award winner, which McGraw dedicated to his late dad, the baseball legend Tug McGraw.

McGraw, who grew up in Start, Louisiana, only found out by accident when he was 11 years old that Tug was his father. Tug's

death last year from a brain tumour originally diagnosed in March 2003 was a bitter blow from which his son is still recovering. After a summer of hope, Tug's condition deteriorated rapidly.

"We were rehearsing when Tug was sick," says Tim. "He died at the beginning of January. We were in the studio at the end of January, and we recorded this song around 11pm or 12pm. Everybody just poured a lot of

heart and soul into it. I think you can hear that on the record."

Tug's boy gave him plenty to be proud of. Since the release of his self-titled debut album in 1989, the hits haven't stopped rolling. His loyal band, The Dancehall Doctors, are still on the road and in the studio with him and their devotion is shared with the seemingly effortlessly beautiful superstar Country singer, Faith Hill, with whom he has three young daughters, proudly referred to as "My girls".

Tim's Spontaneous Combustion tour in 1996 brought about some pretty spontaneous emotional combustion too, for it was here that he met Faith Hill for the first time. They married before the year was out. Individually and together they continue to be two of the most successful artistes — ever. But he's not 'career obsessed' like so many of his contemporaries. His girls always come first. Tours are carefully planned around family





life and school schedules. And the tots are growing up fast.

blessings keep coming. Maybe he's got a guardian angel or two trying to make can catch up with Tim yourself on the big screen, as he will be appearing in his first ever movie, Friday Night Lights, co-starring the legendary Billy Bob Thornton.

But he is a musician first and last. McGraw decided to go back to the future with the Dancehall Doctors re-visiting the mountain top studio in upstate New York where the extraordinarily successful Tim McGraw and the Dancehall Doctors had been recorded. The creative atmosphere was natural. Isolation. Just what the Dancehall Doctor ordered.

"It was like going away to summer camp." Maintains McGraw. "You've got all these guys that are your best friends who you've travelled around with forever and you go to the top of this great mountain, with snow outside and fireplaces inside. We were actually giddy about getting there. We were able to go further. Take the music to another level."

Tim McGraw's choice of songs are personal and sincere. Just like the man himself. What you see - is what you get. You can even dance to some of them like the up-tempo, My Old Friend. I like Open Season on My Heart. Written by the fab and talented Rodney Crowell. And Just Be Your Tear.

Israel is quite a conservative country, with people embarrassed to admit they like things that aren't in the mainstream. Sandy was at first apprehensive that there would be no demand for her American-style dancing, but was overwhelmed by the response.

"I was amazed at how many people came," she says. "In Israel if you do something different, people don't like it. They like their norm, but it's gone uphill all the way and now I've got three evening club nights Herzliya (a town north of Tel Aviv) and do private functions, school fun days, bar- and bat-mitzvahs. I also dance the Simcha - a Jewish word comes from the word happy, a dance you do at a celebration or a party."

Old habits die hard and Sandy, 40, is sometimes asked to make her Line dancing nights "a bit more Jewish" Something she is determined not to give into.

"National folk dancing to Jewish music is very popular but I wanted something completely and utterly different," she says. "Israeli dancing is nothing like what Line dancers are used to. The music is very different and its more ballerina type dancing and you always need partners. Some Israeli clubs have introduced something that they call Line dancing, but it is not what we know as Line dancing — it's dances for couples in a line.

"I have been asked if I would play Hasidic music, very religious Jewish music, but I will not even play Israeli pop music. I steer clear of that — we do Country and Western pop but not Israel music, not even Israeli pop."

Favourites dances at the club at the moment are Puppet On A String and Blame It On the Boogie. The most popular dance in Israel is the Electric Slide, but if you were to ask for it to be played, you'd be met by puzzled faces.

"In Israel the Electric Slide is called "Steps" which is the translation of the original into Hebrew and back again. They put on *Los Latinos* and hordes of people get on the floor and do what people in England would call the Electric Slide."

Sandy recently introduced Tush Push to the club's repertoire and watched it go down a storm.

"It's my all-time favourite dance and I've been dying to work them up to it," she says. "Six months ago I had a knee operation and was unable to do it. But the other week I finally got the OK from my doctor and so have been teaching it with all the jump and turn variations I know — I've been in my element.

"I love it that my dancers are always giving me challenges. Two weeks ago I was asked to find a dance for *Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy* by the Andrews Sisters., last week we danced Chattahoochee to that song - they loved it."

Thankfully the club has never been affected by any of Israel's troubles and Sandy's strict neutrality keeps the world outside the dancefloor at arm's length.

"I don't get myself involved in politics, I don't read the papers and I don't listen to the news. I just get on with my life," she says. "If I started thinking about what could happen to me or my

family then I wouldn't step out of the door. I just dance and teach, and never think about the bad things that can go on here."

One of the ways that people put their worries behind them is in the club, with dressing up, hats and boots still all the rage, Sandy says. "I have lots and lots of boots and all the Country gear. I recently converted one of my husband's dinner suits into

a cowboy suit with lots of tassels, much to his dismay.

"I was in a local market in Tel Aviv and there was a hat stall and, lo and behold, a lovely denim cowboy hat. Anyone would have thought I'd never seen a hat in my life because I pounced on it. When you go to a market you are supposed to haggle and beat people down on prices. I didn't. He wanted 50 shekels and I gave it to him. He was amazed."

Sandy, comes across as a very content, energetic person, someone in love with life and very comfortable in Israel.

"It's a lovely country, very warm," she says. "The children have an outdoor life, and family life is very important. Having said that, I miss England a lot because of Line dancing. My homepage on the computer is *Linedancer* magazine, a reminder of living in England and the Line dancing scene there.

"I wish I would become rich from Line dancing but with the financial struggle here in Israel, it almost probably won't happen. The satisfaction comes from teaching, dancing and when someone

asks me my name— which is not that common here in Israel — and they say 'Ah, you're the Line dance instructor. A little bit of fame goes to my head.

"If I can make someone smile, enjoy themselves, and forget the down side of living in Israel. I feel great."

Unlove Me - Julie Roberts



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

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

the four corners of the globe to the opulence of the Opryland Hotel, Nashville, to take part in the UCWDC **Dance World** Championships XIII. Tim Ruzgar was there as both DJ and Linedancer reporter. He, Alex Boone and Mark Vilensky took the photos





World Championships XIII took place at the opulent Opryland Hotel in Nashville, Tennessee from 11 to 16 January. As ever, this event attracted dancers from countries all over the world including Australia, Finland, Norway, Denmark, Sweden, Holland, Germany, France, UK, Belgium, Malaysia, and more. For the first time there were even competitors from Japan and Brazil. The Opryland Hotel, with its Las Vegas proportions, is a magnificent setting for the event with a few thousand rooms, huge indoor atriums, gardens and waterfalls, and even a riverboat ride through the Delta.

This year there was a change from the past in that only the Delta ballrooms were used, which meant that all the dancing, social, warm ups, and competitions were in rooms adjacent to each other which meant less wandering and rushing around for all. There was also a new format to the schedule with the first two days of competition for Pro-Am, the next two would be Line dance, and the last couple of days for couples. Worlds Director, Tony Lee, and his team had worked tirelessly throughout the year to ensure the smooth running of the event, and with an increase in

dance entries over last year, careful planning and preparation was needed.

On the Monday there were various staff and competitors meetings, registration for all competitors, with no dancing. Tuesday saw the beginning of competition for Pro Am which started with warm ups at 8am and the final competition was from 10pm until midnight.

I was head of Line DJs team: Alex Boone (Holland), James Gregory, Louis St George, and John Lindsay (all USA) who took care of

all the social and competition Line dancers, and BJ Brown was head of the couples DJs: Jill Babinec, Tim Hand, Mona Broussard and Anthony DeRosa. The teams worked hand in hand and helped each other out whenever necessary.

As ever there was the popular Linedance Lobby, mainly hosted by James Gregory of JG2 fame, which had moved up to the concourse outside the Delta ballrooms, and was right next to the Vendors Village. Here social Line dancing began at 10am each day and ran through till around 7pm each evening, when the Delta B ballroom had finished and was then turned over to social

turned over to social Line dancing which went through to after 4am most nights – with the night owl himself Louis St George who just loves to keep the dancers going.

Popular Line dances which could often be heard playing were Where We've Been, Wave on Wave, Lose It, Trust Me, Mariana Mambo, Until the End and several by US choreographers like Guyton Mundy, Scott Blevins, the Amatos, Max Perry, and John Robinson. In the evenings the Delta Practice room became the couples social dancing room, and the Governor's Ballroom was dedicated to the swing dancers.

There were workshops continuously from around 9am until 5pm each day with classes in everything from Line dance to couples, and from technique to styling from some of the biggest names in the dance world. There

was something to suit all levels and styles of dancers. Some workshops were included in the entry price and, as is the norm in the US, some workshops had to be paid for.

The Line dance competition actually began with choreography on the Wednesday afternoon and, although this competition was somewhat down on previous years, there were some excellent dances from choreographers of all levels. Two winning entries 1 particularly liked were Barry Durand's Mocking Bird, and Triple XXX's Jungle Fever.

Wednesday evening also saw the Parade of contestants, a bright, colourful and loud affair, with all the contestants from all over

the World being introduced country by country, and then the large US contingent introduced state by state. As usual the large Dutch contingent seemed to generate the most noise. Thirty seconds of each National anthem followed, and then everyone took their seats for the World Team Match Challenge, a dance off between the USA and the Rest of the world, with great pride at stake. This is the third time this has



taken place and is now the Ryder Cup of dance. There are three Line dances, three couples dances, and then a team cabaret to finish. The first two years were won by the Team USA, but this year they were soundly thrashed by the rest of the World five points to two, The highlights being Gary and Lisa McIntyre's stunning couples routine, and the ROW exciting cabaret at the end.

Thursday was dedicated to Line dance all day, culminating in the exciting Superstars competition in the evening. Competition was fierce this year and on paper,

anyone of a number of the competitors could have won. The Female competition was a tense affair, and there was a reverse on last year's result with England's Jodi Binsteed outgunning Jenny Stephenson to take the ultimate prize in Line dance, which Jodi had won before in Holland, and it now stands at two apiece for the two talented Jodi's dancers. performance was outstanding, and her solo medley was a joy to watch.

The guys were up next and, as newly qualified Raymond Sarlemijn (Holland) had to drop out, it left

just four Male Superstars. Another intense competition followed and Brian Barakauskas (USA) was on the form of his life with a stunning solo medley, which would net him the title, with England's Lee Easton taking second. Roy Hadisubruto (Holland) gave a performance which saw him lose his crown and finish third, with Germany's Joachim Herring in fourth at his first attempt.

Friday was mostly about Line dance again and at the end of the day it was the turn of the "senior Superstars" the Crown division. Following the format of the Superstars, they dance two classic dances and then their own

solo medley. For the guys it was sole competitor Martin Lister (UK) who took the title, and for the ladies it was the USA's Donna Caudill who won the day. Awards for each day's competition took place the following evening at 11.30pm, which many parents with younger children were not too happy about as many had to be up early the next day for competition. The "powers that be" have promised to rectify this at future events.

In fact so smoothly that one does not notice the hard work that goes into these events. Most of these events have used the Prince's Ballroom over the years but recently we have been dancing in the Stardust Cabaret Lounge. Dancing commenced at 7.30pm with the weekend's DJ, Steve Neck. Steve plays a good mixed selection of tracks, takes requests and works hard to please as many of the people, most of the time as he can.

Live music was provided by the inimitable Magill, who have calmed down their act a little, whilst still retaining the old favourites. Each evening we were treated to Instructors' Cabaret, which is always a joy to watch and an excuse to sit down for a little while. The dancing continued with Steve until around 1am, which was quite an early finish, but long enough for most people – five and a half hours is quite a long time.

Thursday morning was workshops with Charlotte and Paul. Charlotte taught The King and I and Trust Me, both easy fun dances which were much danced during the event. Paul instructed an easy Cha Cha, Anywhere, and a dance I really liked, Dipstick, which was choreographed by Judy Macdonald. This dance is to a fiddle track by Natalie MacMaster and it does not move about much – in fact it hardly seems a dance as such – but I still like it a lot and hope that it 'takes off'.

In the afternoon, Rob and Paul were our instructors Pau1 taught Moodswing and Rob taught Cheetah Going All The Way. Cheetah is a good funky dance, but the music, Cheater Michael Jackson, did not do it for me. On the other hand. Vera and Teresa's dance

Going All The Way to the Pussy Cat Dolls track, *We Went As Far As We Felt Like Going*, from the soundtrack of *Shark Tale*, is a good fun cha cha to get the Latin hips going.

Thursday evening's live group were the duo Broadcaster who play good Country music well, mainly for the older dances.

The final day was New Year's Eve and we were all anticipating a great night — but first the workshops. Rachael instructed two very good dances beginning with her own Mars Attack — not about alien invasion, but the chocolate bar which Rachael claims not to like. The music is *Chocolate (Choco Choco)* by Soul Control and is an easy fun dance to feel good music. The other dance from Rachael was Under Your Spell, a lovely waltz to the Ana Victoria track of the same name. Now I know that there are some great waltzes about at the present time but make room in your repertoire for Under Your Spell — you'll be glad you did.

Final Night was New Year's Eve and dancing all night to CDs from Steve. In my opinion I think this worked really well as he played a good mix of tracks, catering for all tastes. We danced all the dances taught during the event, did the silly party dances which are obligatory on New Year's Eve – Crystal Chandeliers, Conga, etc – and were not overloaded by either old or new dances.

The traditional Select Events singing of *We'll Meet Again*, was especially poignant – although we will no doubt meet again, it will not be at a Rob Fowler Select Events gathering. We welcomed the New Year in the normal way and then resumed dancing until the small hours.

In summary, the final Rob Fowler/Select Events event was every bit as good as the first and all the ones in between, and I for one am very pleased to have been able to attend so many over the years.










Album Reviews

roy swiftly follows up last year's *Living In Your World* with this self-titled album. Troy, 31, was born and raised in Arizona. In the '80s he became a fan of Dwight Yoakam and Steve Earle, and their influences can be clearly heard in his music.

The Hand Song (149bpm) is one of eight which Troy co-wrote. This east coast swing is an awesome track with clever lyrics. This has got dance hit written all over it.

She's Gonna Ruin My Bad Reputation (160bpm) is a brilliant and clever track, a mixture of two step and waltz and Tony Wilson from Tucson has written a cool 32-count, two-wall, intermediate dance to it that uses the same step patterns for both dance motions. Check it out.

You're The One (116bpm) is a strong Country cha, great for Cruising etc, but is worthy of a dance in its own right. I'll Sleep When I'm Dead (74bpm) is a nightclub two step but it is a bit of a dirge which may deter dancers.

'59 Cadillac (116bpm) is a good danceable track, perhaps more rock than Country but a good song nonetheless.

Set 'Em Up (119bpm) is pure Country with lots of steel guitar and has great potential as a dance track.

I've Still Got My Truck (160bpm) takes over a minute to get going but is a nice two step.

It's A Long Way Across Texas (164bpm) is an awesome Country rocker and I defy anyone who hears it not to tap their feet. This must surely be a big dance hit.

Somethin' In The Air (127bpm) is another good danceable number, an east coast swing, and another I feel we should be dancing to.


Rock This Honky Tony (88bpm) features Kid Rock and is a cool dance track. So, choreographers, what are you waiting for?

Final cut *The Price I Pay* (98bpm) is a bluesinfused number with a good beat and a great hook. This west coast swing will delight both couples and Line dancers.

This album is superb. It has the potential to be one of the hottest albums of the year. Order you copy now, you won't be disappointed.

atrina Elam is only 20 years old but she began her singing career in her native Oklahoma in a talent contest aged just nine. At 17 she moved to Nashville with a publishing contract already under her belt. She kept her head down and continued honing her song writing skills until Universal South released this debut album.

We kick off with *Strong Anything* (98bpm) a lively cha cha and you are instantly aware that this is a young lady with a big talent. This very danceable song will hopefully inspire someone to write a dance to it.

No End In Sight (110bpm) is the first of nine songs that Katrina either wrote or co-wrote. Another cha cha with more than a flavour of LeAnn Rimes about it, and again it is one that we should be dancing to.

I Want A Cowboy (107bpm) is one of the hot dance prospects on the album. The ladies will love the sentiment of this awesome Country rocker – surely be a big dance hit.

Unbreakable (133bpm) is a good strong uptempo number on which Katrina's voice is strong, mature, and powerful. A cool song that needs a cool dance.

Drop Dead Gorgeous (94/188bpm) is an awesome two step track. It has clever lyrics and a great beat. Definitely the best huge dance hit possibility on the album.

Normal (109bpm) is an upbeat cha cha, a classic Country song with some fantastic fiddle playing and a Celtic flavour. It should be a hit with dancers.

I Won't Say Goodbye (85bpm) slows the pace right down, and it's a gorgeous nightclub two step on which Katrina belts out the words.

The tempo is raised once again for the final track *Prelude To A Kiss* (100bpm) which is also a fine danceable song.

Katrina Elam's debut album is a fine piece of work that she can be really proud of. There are a few good dance tracks and a couple of crackers. I predict big things for this very talented new artist, and I urge you to give this brilliant album a try, I know like me, you will love it.

ast year Kenny Chesney released his smash hit album *When The Sun Goes Down* and he won two CMA Awards. His record company have been quick to cash in on Kenny's success by releasing this album, stressing "this is not the follow up album", but a "lifestyle project".

The opening song Old Blue Chair (66bpm) was also the closing track on Kenny's last album and it tells of his favourite place in the world – an old blue chair somewhere in the Caribbean.

Be As You Are (120bpm) like much of the album has bongo drums and other Caribbean instruments mixed with steel guitar. This could be a surprise dance hit.

Guitars And Tikki Bars (82bpm) is a song about just that. This has a real Caribbean flavour, a reggae feel with steel drums and all. With the right choreography this could be a big summer hit with dancers.

Somewhere In The Sun (70bpm) is another gentle song, a nightclub two step, which Kenny wrote after one of his concerts in Texas was cancelled due to heavy snow!

French Kissing Life (118bpm) is a cool song with a Fleetwood Mac feel to it, and it has great possibilities as a dance track.

Key Lime Pie (116bpm). Now this is more like it, a song about food. This is a great dance track. Country meets reggae.

Sherry's Living In Paradise (70bpm). Kenny's voice is wonderful on this easy, laid back track, whilst Magic (74bpm) has a jazzy feel to it — piano, brushes on the snare, double bass and then... steel drums. I can see max Perry taking a like to this one.

Soul Of A Sailor (74bpm) is a nightclub two step and this poignant song, which I really like, is about life as a sailor.


The closing song is a "bonus" acoustic version of *The Old Blue Chair* (66bpm) and this time you have the sound of waves crashing in the background, and Kenny's voice is distorted somewhat.

The Caribbean Two Step Tango (104bpm) is a real catchy number and with Jo Thompson's 32 counts, four-wall, intermediate dance could be the best hit prospect on the album

If It Looks Like Love (146bpm) is a faster number and it inspired John Robinson to write a 64-count, four-wall, easy/ intermediate dance to it.

Put On Your Dancing Boots (79bpm) gives us a Jo Thompson beginner/intermediate dance of 32 counts, four walls.

Man What A Man (156). Michele "Push" Perron chose this upbeat number to write to and her dance is 32 counts, four walls, and beginner intermediate.

Does Jesus Cross Your Heart (112bpm) for which Doug & Jackie Miranda have written Cross Our Hearts, beginner/intermediate dance. And Peter Metelnick and Alison Biggs have written a nice dance for Spread A Little Love Around (83bpm).

Robbie McGowan Hickie has written a new waltz for the Irving Berlin classic *Always* (94bpm). And *Hey Good Lookin'* (162bpm) is a fast version of the Hank Williams standard and another Peter and Alison have choreographed to.

If I Were Brave (161bpm) closes the album and this tribute to the athletes of the 2004 Olympic games has a dance to it by the Mirandas.

pologising for the fact that your main attraction, top of the bill artist Jamie O'Neal, is too ill to appear on stage is probably not the best way to kick-start an evening, especially when half the audience has been specially invited from the music industry's movers and shakers, to see what's newly on offer from Nashville, at a very special showcase concert. But when the event is being hosted by the Country Music Association in conjunction with Sony Nashville, even without Aussie star Jamie, they proved that we needed to have no worries. You can always count on the Americans, and when faced with a little adversity they will find a way to ensure the show goes on. And what a show it turned out to be.

Stepping onto the stage in the intimate imitation of a midwest cowboy bar came the tremendously talented young singer

songwriter from Jackson, Tennessee – fair of face and immediately likeable – Jessi Alexander.

Jessi's debut album, Honeysuckle Sweet is just about to be released in the UK. Stepping shyly, but determinedly to the microphone, pine coloured acoustic guitar in her hands, mouth organ strapped inelegantly around her neck, she started the way she intended to finish – in up-tempo, toe-tapping, breezy style. Make Me Stay - Or Make Me Go. No one was about to make her go - anywhere - that was for sure! Her strong voice has a range that swivels from the highest to the warmth and depth that is rich as home made honey. Pure. Immediately engaging. She proceeded to lay down sweet southern Country appealingly in layers with flashes and dashes of the blues.

She has been compared with Patsy Cline, Bonnie Raitt, and yearns for one thing – to find a sound that she can call her own. That night at the Borderline all her wishes came true. On the night that Jamie O'Neal lost her voice - Jessi Alexander found hers. Making her debut in the UK when she opened for Rodney Crowell at London's Lock 17 last year brought Jessi to the attention of Country music lovers. This gig at the Borderline was a chance to dance with the best and show the men in suits, along with the fans, that their betting money had been well placed. And with one swish of the singing fairy's wand, Jamie O'Neal being laid-up with a throat infection meant that in an instant Jessi Alexander had become the only female in the entire show. The spotlight fell on young and inexperienced shoulders.

If she was daunted, she wasn't giving anything away. Discarding the unwieldy and unattractive harmonica, and putting down her guitar she told us with the widest of grins how happy she was "To be here."

Picking up the acoustic guitar she once refused to play, because she wanted a bass for Christmas, she slows down the pace with the heart touching, *This World Is Crazy*, a subtle blend of light and shade. *Unfulfilled*, she says, is a song she relates to most — and so could we as she sang of the chains around her heart and yearning to sing and play the blues. Like the best country singers — she has lived it.

Jessi slowed things down even further with the introspective *Canyon Prayer*, a song she tells us she wrote while sitting looking at the Grand Canyon. Finishing the first set with a self-penned song recorded by Patty Loveless she smiles at us as she happily makes her way offstage. To a standing ovation. Taking with her some hearts she has stolen.

Then Jon Randall made his way graciously to centre stag, telling us the missing Jamie O'Neal "is in our prayers and we wish her a speedy recovery." Black traditional cowboy shirt open at the neck, coffee and cream flowers embroidered across his chest. The handsome young singer is easy on the eye, and even easier on the ears. Smiling through a small neat as a new pin beard, small golden ear ring shining brightly. At 20 years of age Randall was a member of the Nash Ramblers, supporting Emmylou Harris. Since then he's toured with Lyle Lovett and worked with some of the best musicians in the business. And it shows. His indoctrination into the Country music university of life has paid dividends. And

Strumming and singing about whisky and women he pays immediate homage to his home state of Texas by singing *Austin*. The Texans surrounding him roar their approval. And it touched me too. Even

though I'm a Londoner and I'm more likely to be found in Debenhams than Dallas.

Jon doesn't just have a backing band. He lives his music and his band members do too. These guys are the consummate best. And - like all the very best people at anything they make it look so effortless. fiddle. Banio. boogie-woogie on the keyboard, a drummer great and a fantastically brilliant lead guitarist. I don't know his name but he was the in blue! Stylishly they swing into My Life. Sad songs

may be his favourite, but boy when this guy wants to rock and roll and jam - he can

The joy on his face tells us how much he's loving it. And so did we. The duelling between Jon and his lead guitarist was electric and spectacular. Absolute skill and mastery. The real deal. OK, I could have danced the night away at that point too, but I did have 4" stilettos which slowed me down just a little.

Beautiful, poignant and profound, the moving Lonely for A While touched my spirit, sending shivers down my spine. It felt like he was singing just to me. And surely there is no truer test for any performer - reaching out and touching a stranger's heart and soul. No clinking beer glasses while he sang to an audience that was with him every strum and every hum. But he wasn't quite finished yet. We were all warmed up and ready to go as Jessi Alexander came back to the join the boys. Bluesy country spun cross the stage and all around the tiny bar. Electric. Exciting.

Before leaving us Jon sang us on our way with the sad and tragic *Whiskey Lullaby*. Written by him, recorded by Brad Paisley and Alison Krauss and recipient of two 2004 CMA Awards.

"I'm from Texas," he told us,



"and you all know that I come from Louisiana, so you probably notice that I have a bit of an accent. Anyway, I love Texas and I love music that comes from there. I'm proud to be a Texan." He told us he wasn't about to leave the stage so we could beg him to come back for an encore: "I'm not going to do all the showbiz stuff. I'm just gonna stay right where I am — and carry on playing."

There were dances that were done in most countries like Wave on Wave and Doctor, Doctor, but there were many that I, and most of the team, had never heard of. However we managed to keep the majority of people satisfied, and as there was social dancing from 10am to around 5am, there was plenty of time for everyone' requests.

Once the Line dance competition started it was time for some long hard days, starting with warm ups at 7am and finishing with awards at 11.30pm. Although the work was hard it was most enjoyable, the atmosphere at the event seemed much relaxed, as did most of the competitors.

Personal highlights for me were meeting Suzy Bogguss and Nancy Hays and having them sit next to me in the DJ booth throughout the variety show asking questions and showing great interest in our pastime. The Superstars competition was brilliant, and the atmosphere during the Team Match Challenge was electric. 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

A few months ago we asked you how Line dancing had changed your life. Your letters are still coming in....

It was 4th April 1997 – it should have been my wedding anniversary the previous day but sadly my wife had passed away a couple of months earlier. After 55 years my world had stopped. I was at a low ebb, on the point of suicide.

I saw an advert in our local shop: Line dancing for beginners. I had never heard of Line dancing before. My wife and I danced a lot so I thought I'd give it a go.

I was the only male there. I felt out of place and it was hard to master the dance with everyone laughing. But our instructor said, "We all start with two left feet", and he gave me confidence and I kept going.

Within a year I was attending classes five times a week at different venues. Our old instructor gave up Line dancing but after a short time, Sue and Lin who had been dancing with us decided to take on the classes and our club is now Hooked on Country.

I still keep in touch with our old instructor and told him in one letter how he and Line dancing had saved my life as I wouldn't be here today.

Learning to count in — at the deep end

Ringing the changes

Give your dancers a change, says *Sho Botham* – try Line dance circuits

I have always encouraged Line dancers to explore the use of a variety of music tracks instead of only dancing one dance to one track. Benefits of this include:

- dancers being able to get up and dance even when the music is unfamiliar – especially useful for dancing to live bands not playing recognised Line dance tracks
- encouraging dancers to really know dances well even without the help of their usual music cues
- dancers being encouraged to explore different moods, tempo and styles of dancing with dances they already know.

A good way of trying this out at class is to have a go at Line dance circuits. The principle is much the same as gym circuits where there are a defined number of stations around the hall and a different task is performed at each of the stations for a period of time, after which everyone moves on to the next station to do the next task. This is repeated until all of the tasks have been completed. In a gym setting, there may be only one person at each station or sometimes two. In Line dancing you can have small groups instead of individuals.

To set up Line dance circuits you need to decide how many dance stations you want to have, this will depend on the size of your hall and number in the class. When deciding the number of stations don't forget to take into account the suitability of dances to be danced at the same time and the tempo of the music that you are going to use. So you might want to start with something fairly easy like a simple Cha cha circuit. Choose a different cha cha for each dance station. If necessary give everyone a quick reminder of the dances or dance a couple of walls of each dance to ensure everyone knows what they have to do. Then allocate a dance to each station and explain how the circuits will work.

Put on your chosen music track and give the agreed signal or count-in for everyone to start. Allow between one and two minutes



at each station before signalling for everyone to move on. This signal may be pausing the music, turning the volume right down, or some other agreed sign so that everyone stops and moves to the next station where the process starts all over again. It is important that everyone is aware of the direction for moving between stations to avoid bumping into other groups. Every group gets to visit each station once but this can be extended to dance additional circuits if required.

The easiest format to begin with is four stations and four small groups of Line dancers. A dance station can be allocated to each of the four corners of the hall. If the room is a funny shape then this can be adjusted accordingly. At first it may take a little time for the changeover between stations but as the groups become more proficient at moving between stations and understand the concept of Line dance circuits generally, the time between stations is usually reduced.

Beginner Line dance circuits work well and can help to build confidence on the dancefloor. With beginners each group may want to have a leader or "feet to follow", initially to help them to remember the dances each time they move stations.

Once dancers are used to doing Line dance circuits then a whole variety of options are

possible. Some suggestions you might want to try:

- repeat a circuit using music of a different tempo or mood
- try Rumba, swing, waltz or any other rhythms and styles that appeal
- \bullet experiment with difficult levels of dances
- try a mixture of dance levels in one circuit only suitable for use when the dancers who are able to dance all the levels included.

Line dance circuits are suitable for most Line dancers and can be lots of fun. Kids enjoy them as do adults of all ages. Let us know if you try Line dance circuits and how you get on.
