

"Westlife have inspired so many choreographers – but what is it about these boys that makes us want to dance? Pamela Edelston delves into their Irish hearts

eyes are

Westlife are four cute guys who sit on bar stools and sing melodic songs — so how does their music bring so many dancers to the floor? Last month *Linedancer* published the popular dance choreographed by Geri Morrison — You Raise Me Up — the single went on to be voted *ITV Record of the Year* shortly after hitting the Number One spot. This reopened the records books making it their thirteenth single to reach the

top of the charts and making them the only band to win *Record of the Year* four times in a row. The band Shane, Nicky, Kian and Mark have already performed to over three million fans, on four sell—out arena tours. They are the biggest selling boyband in the world and their successes to date are unrivalled — having sold 34 million records globally. They have dominated the mainstream music scene for seven years, Shane says: "I think this album

shows that Westlife are back in a big way. It's got the best material we've ever released."

Since their last Number One album *Turnaround* they have lost a member in Brian McFadden and have been criticised for putting out boring, predictable cover versions with no excitement to their music. However, Nicky commented: "At the time *Turnaround* seemed like one of our best albums — and this one (*Face To Face*) feels even better." Their loyal fans would be devastated if the

foursome split. Mark said: "Of course in seven years it's entered into people's minds – we're human. Every time we think of it we think 'no we shouldn't call it a day'. We don't listen to critics which helps us stay together and the fans are very supportive. We love what we do."

The band have released some great singles, original and covers, they recently revealed their personal favourites: "Over the years, in terms of covers, I really enjoyed *Wake Me*

Up Before You Go Go. In terms of Westlife tracks – *World Of Our Own* – as a band we all prefer that as the best live song," said Nicky.

Currently the latest in a long line of Westlife songs is taking to the floor as we dance Always Thinking Of You choreographed by Daniel Whittaker. For this track – When You Tell Me That You Love Me – the group collaborated with Diana Ross: "We worked with Diana for one day, she got to the shoot bright and early. She didn't have any breaks - she was no diva - we must have done twenty ot thirty takes of the song. She was very nice - she looked fantastic. She actually was there in the video. She's just very heavily lit." The new single was beaten to the top spot by the JCB song by Nizlopi and held off by the Christmas Number One released by Louis Walsh's new prodigy Shayne Ward as seen on ITV1's XFactor.

The Westlife boys are not bitter towards the latest winner of the *XFactor* and have been supporting Shayne though out the series. Recently when the boys appeared on GMTV they were asked if they watched the *XFactor*, Shayne said: "Yes we do."

"My favourite is Shayne, though they're all very good and have different styles. Chico is the best entertainment," he added. Rumour has it the band have invited The Conway Sisters to support them during their new tour: "The Conways maybe (supporting us), we're not 100 percent sure when."

There is no denying these boys are gorgeous and it helps that they sing well. When it comes to dancing to their music Line dancers have been loyal from the very beginning. There are 82 different dances on the Linedancer dance database using their music as recommended tracks or alternatives. It helps the band gives choreographers a variety of styles to work with and they include lyrics which are easy to sing along too, Mark said: "All of us love music, it's really what drove us to being in a band. Personally I love chart music, Mariah Carey, Stevie Wonder, I love R&B, hip hop – I love good music whether it's slow or fast, rock or pop." With so many influences a broad appeal is created and it is no wonder they produce music which is so pleasing to Line dancers.

The band have just been taking a four month break – the longest of their entire career. They have lately made a come back and are sounding stronger and fresher than ever. Nicky said: "I think the break did us good. We still look at ourselves as the luckiest band in the world, but when you do something so frequently, you're bound to need time to recharge your batteries. The break made us realise how much we wanted to start work again. At the end of it I couldn't wait to get back into the studio." The Face To Face tour promises: "a musical extravaganza from the Westlife boys. It will be a great night out" – you'll be dancing in the aisles.



In the evening everyone came together for social dancing in a huge ballroom – the atmosphere was electric all weekend and this was added proof of what a friendly international family affair the Line dancing game is – it just makes you so proud to be part of it."

On Friday Vivienne took to the floor teaching Jailhouse Creole, a fun beginner dance written by Double Trouble (who are Ontario instructors), and her own dance Good Times choreographed with Fred Buckley. Next door John Robinson was leading a packed workshop instructing Get It While It's Hot. Nev and Dee both had a full house and introduced Suddenly, Trippin', Waitin, Bring It On, When You're Around and Shake Ya Body. Saturday noon brought Vivienne back on her feet leading One Bad Day (then I'll be ok), Soft and Slow and Josh Turner's Your Man.

Big Dave kept his eye on the dancefloor and spotted some great dances including Michelle Jackson's Have A Ball, Maurice Rowe's After Party, Mark Cosenza's California Bounce, Dan Albro's Backseat Blues, Judy McDonald's Eleven—01 and Roy Verdonk's Hernado's Hideaway. He also had the fortune to teach a dance written especially for this trip by Teresa and Vera—Never Again. Dave added: "I had a great time working along side DJ Louis, helping out at workshops and spinning music for

the social dancers. It was a great experience which I enjoyed tremendously. I had the added bonus of having the best seat in the house which enabled me to spot the popular dances and bring them back to the UK. We also left a UK import from June The Lady In Black - an awesome night club two step named Last Man Standing. It was good to see so many dances travelling the distance with floor fillers like Black Horse, Soluna, Keep It

Burnin', Irish Stew, Betcha Neva, Caught In The Act and Miller Magic."


Strictly Dance Fever is back

aybe I have an unfair advantage because I am a Nashville boy playing Country," says Bobby D Sawyer — that could be true but from what I see he is just a sensational singer that Line dancers love to dance too.

Bobby grew up in Nashville as part of a Southern family, his older and younger brother sing and although his younger sister has a marvellous voice she is a full time nurse: "This will make you laugh but my brother sings in an English folk group, he is in America singing English music and I am here singing American music. My younger brother has been on the road for about six or seven years as part of a gospel quartet. Gospel is where we all began – we belonged to a lively church as far as music went and I suppose you could say that was my primary training ground."

Bobby was brought up surrounded by people who loved music: "My Momma was the church pianist. She taught me a bit but once she told me 'the time will come when you have to choose piano or playing outside with a ball' and I chose the ball. She also loved Swing and encouraged me to appreciate the big band sound. I am very fond of Glenn Miller and that is what led me to play the trombone in High School."

"My dad died when I was nine but at age six he bought me a guitar. He amazed me with that guitar — he read a 'how to' book for five minutes and after studying the diagrams he just played it. The first ever song I played on the guitar was Red River Valley." At this point I find myself listening to my own private live set and his voice is divine — if you haven't seen this guy live yet you need to find yourself a ticket soon.

After his dad died Bobby felt he needed a male influence and he found what he was looking for in his dad's close friend: "There were somethings I couldn't ask my mother so I was lucky to have lots of people help me out. Gerald and Betty were members of our church, Gerald was special to me because he was my dad's best friend in high school. I knew he cared for the family and that he would always give good advice - tell it to me straight. I guess he was the one I always went to because he was so close to my dad. He was also a tremendous singer - I put him up there with Elvis and Dean Martin – I would like to be half as good as he is but I am still trying."

We can thank the US Air Force for bringing Bobby to England and for recognising his talent: "At 18 I came to England I stepped out off the plane at Heathrow, it was April and was beautiful. I immediately loved it — I thought this is gonna be a lot of fun. Sure enough I loved it and I have met all kinds of people. It has broadened me — I saw a different side of life than the American way and I was able to see where things came from. The melodies are the same in Gospel, Bluegrass and old English folk songs, particularly Irish

So what do we love about Bobby: "The first thing I did was get in touch with the Line dance teachers. I wanted the sets I performed to include music which Line dancers like. I feel researching paid off huge dividends because it showed them I care about them. The dancers thought he cares about us and sings songs we like to dance too. Now I sometimes get experimental by looking for new music with a good dance beat — sometimes it works, sometimes it doesn't."

"Everywhere I have gone audiences have given me a fantastic reception. People travel enormous distances to see me and I am really grateful. I

COUNTRY RHODES

Get a group of Line dancers in the Greek sunshine, add the right music, instructors and entertainment and let the party begin. Harry Seddon reports... t the end of the year when the bitter freeze is about to set in we thought why not take the opportunity to get away for a taste of winter sun. The latest Maggie G Experience Roadshow, in conjunction with Club Dance Holidays, was happening on the beautiful Greek Island of Rhodes and so off we went. The historic and picturesque paradise is tucked away just below Turkey and proved to be the ideal setting for a Greek Line dance.

We left from Manchester Airport and after a short sleep and an in-flight meal we arrived in Rhodes around 3am local time. Other flights from various parts of the UK also touched down during the night and by breakfast time everyone was accounted for and the party was ready to rumba.

After a welcome drink of Ouzo (a Greek alcoholic drink) the full team were there to get things started including Anja of Dance Holidays, DJ Tim Ruzgar, Alan Birchall and Maggie Gallagher. Despite the cool weather workshops were held during the week by the pool and although we had to deal with some short rain delays we got a fair amount of sunshine.

Maggie taught a dance especially written for the trip Say That Ya Love Me. It is a 32 count, four wall beginner/intermediate dance to a great track by Cerrito called Say That You Love Me. The dance is easy enough for beginners but with enough in it to inspire all dancers, danced to a feel good track. Maggie also got our toes in a tangle with The World - a 64 count, four wall beginner/easy intermediate, choreographed to a great rocking Country track by Brad Paisley. It's very fast but with simple steps, lots of repetition and some holds. Despite the speed it is great fun to dance. Once Maggie had finished her teach, Alan Birchall stepped up to instruct Universal - a dance with optional arm movements written to a track by Nate James.

In the evenings DJ Tim Ruzgar was spinning the decks and did a marvellous job. Added to the music mix was a live set by 2006 Crystal Boot Nominee's Diamond Jack. Dave and Warren had stepped in at the last moment

and the band endured a 24 hour journey via Athens but nevertheless they were still ready to rock the house on arrival.


Senorita to the Trick Pony song was the next dance on the list — it has a very obvious restart and four count tag. The beauty of this dance is in the hip movement — it gives the dancers a chance to sway their Cuban hips. If you are capable of isolating your hips you will make this dance look very stylish. Meanwhile, Alan dropped his usual style and tried his hand at a slower dance Forgotten You. It is a beginner/intermediate dance written to *I've Forgotten You* by Rhonda Vincent, which incidentally was Tim's chosen song of the holiday.


By Wednesday our memories were beginning to struggle and so we danced Your Love, which most of the group had danced before. It helped to stop our brain from overloading and was a great excuse to do this lovely night club two step again. With our heads well rested Alan was back to his 'fast and furious' self teaching an intermediate, 64 count, two wall dance — Never Again to the Rachel Stevens track *I Said Never Again*.

After Alan's speedy steps we enjoyed a day off from the dancefloor and took to the tourist route hoping to see all the wonderful sights. 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

REAL FINE PLACE

ara Evans' music was first used in Line dancing back in 1999 when her song *Crying Game* was used for a hit dance of the same name. Sara has released some brilliant albums, her exquisite *Born to Fly* was nominated for CMA Album of the Year and her last *Restless* had the dance Suds In The Bucket taken from it. Mother of three – Sara now releases her fifth album.

The opener *Coalmine* (111/222) was co written by Lonestar's Richie McDonald and Roxie Dean – this is a fantastic dance track which could be one of the biggest Country dance hits of the year.

A Real Fine Place To Start (121bpm) is a wonderful cha cha just crying out for a dance to be written to it.

Cheatin' (80bpm) has a more traditional feel to it and I absolutely love it. The irony in the lyrics is brilliant. Danceable? You Bet.

New Hometown (85bpm) is one of six songs on the album where Sara shares song writing credits. This song has a nice beat and it too has possibilities as a dance track.

You'll Always Be My Baby (67bpm) is a gorgeous nightclub two step and it's another one of my favourites. It has some beautiful words along with superb musicianship. All it is lacking is a nice dance — so choreographers it is time to get your thinking caps on.

Supernatural (82bpm) has a Celtic feel with a choral backing and Sara's vocals are superb on this one — another fine dance track.

Roll Me Back In Time (80bpm) Sheryl Crow wrote this nice harmonic song. It is a slower track like Bible song (72bpm) and Tell Me (82bpm) however they are all good songs nonetheless.

The Secrets That We Keep (65bpm) is another of Sara's own songs which is a powerful nightclub two step. Beautiful.

Missing Missouri (85bpm) Sara sings all about her life on the road in her tour bus.

Momma's Night Out (138bpm) is a sassy number, Country blues if you will, and this is a great dance track, which will remind you of the Rolling Stones' Jumping Jack Flash.

"I'm leaving and you're going to do the dishes and put the kids to bed, 'cause its momma's night out".

The final track *These Four Walls* (64bpm) is simply a beautiful song about not being famous but relishing the live you have. This one may be too nice for a dance?



THE ROAD AND THE RADIO

enny Chesney has risen to the very top of his profession. He began his career back in the early nineties and paid his dues in clubs, working his way up to supporting some of the big names in Country. Kenny is now the headliner – a Country superstar – filling stadiums on tour and selling millions of albums.

We kick off with *The Road And The Radio* (77bpm) – Kenny's own composition. This starts gently but builds up into a solid track, – a nightclub two step with attitude.

Living In Fast Forward (117bpm) is a Country rocker a powerful west coast swing and a great dance track.

Who You'd Be Today (72bpm) is a poignant song that we can all relate to about losing a loved one.

You Save Me (120bpm) is a fairly fast paced waltz similar to Where Does It Hurt and I have no doubt that someone will write a Line dance to this gorgeous track.

 $\begin{tabular}{ll} Summertime & (84bpm) is a cool song about how great summer is $-I$ couldn't agree more Kenny. \end{tabular}$

In A Small Town (91bpm) is a lovely cha cha all about life in a small town. If you like Stroll Along Cha Cha you will love this track.

Beer In Mexico (138bpm) is the other of Kenny's own song and is most likely to produce a dance hit from this album. The instrumental towards the latter half of the track is brilliant – it's punchy, it's rocky, and it's brilliant.

Freedom (66bpm) slows down the pace and Kenny sings of places you feel you belong.

Tequila Loves Me (93bpm) is a good cha cha with a Mexican flavour and the percussion and acoustic guitar makes this track a joy to listen and dance too.

Somebody Take Me Home (125bpm) is another rocky song on which the musicians sound like they are really enjoying themselves. This too has dance hit written all over it.

Finally we have *Like Me* (86bpm) it is simply a nice Country track – Kenny's rich vocals entice you to listen to every word.

At first I was a little disappointed when I played this album. I thought his failed marriage may have been a distraction. However after a few plays it really grew on me. I think Kenny has done the Caribbean cowboy bit to death and I am glad he is back on track. This is a fine Country album, with some excellent dance tracks.

elicity Urquhart is a young Australian singer who was influenced by Country music whilst growing up in Tamworth – the Australian Country music capitol. Felicity has won several awards in her home country. This album is not a brand new release, she is currently working on a new one, nevertheless I would like to introduce this charming singer.

You Can't Break My Heart (100bpm) is the opening song and it is in the western swing style. This smooth number should have a dance with Charleston steps in it.

New Shadow (93bpm) is in the Shelby Lynn style with brushes on the snare, upright bass, and tinkling piano. A very danceable track.

Swing Town (102/204bpm) is a two stepper with a beat that makes you want to dance.

I Remember You (120bpm) is a cover of Frank Ifield's classic 1962 song and this stylish remake should tempt a choreographer.

Planet Of Love (86bpm) was a former number one for Felicity in Australia.

Live A Little (90/180bpm) this is Felicity's take on the Mark Chesnutt track that we all know so well from the dance Rumba Ride.

Western Lullaby (102bpm) has a nice beat and Felicity's voice is wonderful on this song

which is one of two that she co-wrote.

Less Of Me More Often (102/204bpm) is a classic two step track ideal for both Line and couples dancers. Isn't it about time we had another Ribbon Of Highway?

Too Many Secrets (94bpm) is one of the best prospects on the album for a dance hit and just needs the right choreography.

In My Dreams (68bpm) this gentle track is another delight — Felicity's soft vocals complimented by a smooth backing — super.

Every Fool Has A Rainbow (78bpm) the traditionalists will love the handling of this Merle Haggard song, Patsy Cline meets Leann Rimes. Felicity excels on this song.

This Is Life (96/192bpm) is the album's final song and the second co—wrote by Felicity. This is also a great two step and Felicity can be really proud of it.

This young Australian seems to have shown those in Nashville how Country should be done. New Shadow is a good introduction to this delightful singer and I eagerly await her new album due for release soon. Whilst this album may not be to everyone's taste, I am confident that many of you will like it and enjoy dancing to it.

ontgomery Gentry came to the forefront in 1999 with their highly acclaimed album *Tattoos and Scars* from which they had big hits with *Daddy Won't Sell The Farm, Tattoos and Scars* and *Hillbilly Shoes*. It was considered they would knock Brooks & Dunn off the top Duo spot, but that never happened. Now after four albums they release a hits package.

We start with *She Don't Tell Me To* (78bpm) a new song which crescendos into a powerful tune with a driving beat.

From their *Do Your Thing* album we have three tracks – *Something To Be Proud Of* (97bpm) – you can see the influence MG have had on Big & Rich's *Muzik Mafia*. Secondly *Gone* (120bpm) is a powerful Country rocker, and it would make an exciting Country dance track. Lastly, *If You Ever Stopped Loving Me* (94bpm) would be at home on a Bon Jovi album. Banjo picking brings a Country feel to this rock number.

There are three tracks from the $My\ Town$ album – $Hell\ Yeah$ (88bpm) shows these guys were doing it before Gretchen Wilson. Speed (88bpm) lightens things up and doesn't follow the usual MG format. This is a nice steady danceable number.

remember their performance of this song.

Didn't I (73bpm) is from the movie When We Were Soldiers – a night-club two step.

From the album *Carrying On* there is only one song *She Couldn't Change Me* (118bpm) which is a cool cha cha and there was a 32 count intermediate dance from 'Calamity' Jane Howard (USA) out to this.

From Tattoos and Scars there are three songs—Daddy Won't Sell The Farm (120bpm) a good west coast swing track which could well do with a dance to it. Lonely And Gone (82bpm) which has become an anthem with MG fans at their concerts. Hillbilly Shoes (116bpm) is undoubtedly their best song and indeed their best known song. Many of you are still dancing Peter Metelnick's international hit Feet Don't Fail Me Now, whilst some still do Rob Fowler's Funkabilly Rap to it. This song is a Country classic.

The last track is a Christmas song *Merry Christmas From The Family* and it is a parody of Christmas. I have to say I have always been disappointed with Montgomery Gentry since their debut. They have failed to deliver in many ways but they are a fantastic live act. This hits album is a good introduction to the band and if you are a fan you will buy it anyway – as a Line dance album – I am not so sure.


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It is the only place in the world where you can wander through Paris, Venice, New York, and the Sahara without having to leave the state of Nevada. Next add the incredible hotels and you soon realise there is so much more than gambling to Las Vegas. What drew me to this colourful city was more exciting than Elton John, Celine Dion or Cirque Du Soleil – it was the Dance Explosion 2005. Word had spread about the enormously successful first year when over six hundred dancers had kicked up their heels in 2004. For 2005 Doug and Jackie Miranda had decided to expand the event to six days to allow dancers more time to enjoy all the things on and off the dancefloor. Over 700 dancers from at least 16 different countries attended each having a terrific time.

Amy Christian's Feels So Good was a big success, no doubt sending many dancers off to check out Tai Chi classes. 

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
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WEDDINGS IN THE COUNTRY

arth Brooks married Trisha Yearwood in Oklahoma with a private ceremony at their home. Brooks said in a statement: "It's the perfect Christmas gift to each other. We could not be happier."

The couple filed for a marriage license in Oklahoma's Rogers Country in Claremore and rumours began to circulate about their impending nuptials.

It was last May when Brooks proposed before 7,000 fans at the unveiling of a bronze statue of himself at Buck Owen's Crystal Palace, a Country music complex in Bakersfield, California.

The statue had an addition to the left hand – a wedding ring – Brooks, 43, pointed at the ring and Yearwood, 41, reacted by saying: "You're not going (to do this) in front of these people?"

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From a Judge's Point of View

Nicola Lafferty is a judge on the Line dance circuit. After dancing for over 20 years, taking part in competitions and demonstrations there is very little she doesn't know about Line dancing. As competition dancers prepare for the Europeans at Brean sands *Linedancer* asked her to give us the judge's side of the story









1) How did you come to be a judge?

I used to compete in Line dance about five or six years ago. I stopped competing around the time that Masters in Line began. They asked if I would like to do judge training in conjunction with them and CWDC (Country Western Dance Council).

2) What advice would you offer to anyone who will be competing for the first time at The Europeans in Brean Sands 2006?

All I can say is go out on the floor and enjoy yourself. Make sure you have learned your dances properly and are well-prepared – then just go for it.

3) What do you consider to be the hardest aspect of judging competitions?

It is very difficult, there are so many factors to take into account – all the competitors have different strengths and weaknesses. One may have fantastic technique, yet not be a strong performer – another may put on a great show, but not have great technique. The judging is about weighing up everything and deciding which competitor gives the best overall performance on the day.



4) You must have favourite dance styles or pieces of music? Is it difficult to be objective?

This isn't really an issue as everyone we judge is competing in the same dance, depending on what level they are in, for example, all advanced competitors will be on the floor doing the same dance. My favourite dances to watch are night-club two steps - I very often cry when I am judging them.

5) What do you consider most rewarding about judging competitions?

It has to be seeing everyone out there on the floor doing their best. So much effort, time and money is put into being a competitor, that I feel very privileged to be a part of it all. I also enjoy it when people ask for advice after they compete — sometimes the next time you see them dance they have really worked on what you have said.

6) What do you consider to be the biggest changes on the competition circuit since you became involved as a judge?

The standard of Line dance competitions has always been good, but now it is amazing. The costumes have also changed and the

committed to their dancing, and two CWDC European Champions (Jodie Binsteed and Danny Last) have gone on to become household names through *Strictly Dance Fever*. Line dance competitors have to excel in so many areas of dance that if they choose to go to dance college or do further training generally people are amazed by their dance ability.

8) For those parents entering their children in The Europeans what advice would you give?

Firstly, keep it fun for the children – encourage them to have good sportsmanship. At the end of the day, it should be about enjoying yourself, and if a child is enjoying dancing, it shows when they are on the dancefloor. I know this is a huge cliché, but it really isn't about winning – its about doing the best you can do, making new friends and having fun.

9) There is a lot of controversy in competitions regarding costumes, movement and music – how do you feel about this?

People will always complain there is not enought Pop or not enough Country. At the moment we have a good mix of music — although in most competitions a certain

costumes on the competition floor. It is understandable since we look to these styles for technique. In my opinion, its great to see people pushing the costume rules and trying to do something different, but ultimately its the dancing that's getting judged.

As the standard in competition rises, people push themselves to do more and more spectacular moves. For me this can work in two ways – if they are technically doing gymnastic moves correctly and to hit a certain phrase/break in the music it can look fantastic. One problem I see is competitors believe they have to be able to do these big moves if they want to win. I often see people doing splits at every opportunity but with bad technique. Although its great that people are always pushing themselves to do harder moves as a judge I would rather see simple and effective steps as opposed to gymnastics executed badly.

10) Is there anything you would like to change about the competition world?

Line dance competition is always evolving, and will continue to do so for the good of the competitor. Organisations such as CWDC and Masters in Line are always working towards improving events, rules, venues. I would like to see Line dance



footwear – with many organisations allowing Latin shoes to be worn, instead of the obligatory cowboy boots.

7) What do you consider to be the most positive outcome for any dancer who competes at the highest level, like The Europeans?

Dancers who compete in the bigger competitions have to be very dedicated and

proportion of the dances have to be done to Country music — which is great. Despite this we also take into account the popularity of other forms of music and pick competition dances that will appeal to all the competitors.

Costumes are always controversial. But as time moves on, so do the costumes. Latin and ballroom have a big influence on the competitions get the same recognition as Latin and Ballroom competitions.

11) How does talent from different countries compare? Are there things competitors from certain countries are good at?

We are lucky in the UK because Line dance competitors are generally of a very high standard. Holland is the same. It's great to see competitors from other countries, such as South Africa, starting to get involved in the competition scene. All competitors from all countries love Line dancing and it seems they just can't wait to be out on the floor. The camaraderie at international competitions is great.

12) In your opinion what makes Line dancers want to win The Europeans?

Usually winners at these events will have had to dance in numerous heats just to get to the final, and to ultimately win a European/World Title is a great achievement. This helps to make all the hard work, effort, training and expense all year worthwhile. Just to compete at a big event like The Europeans or MiL Worlds is rewarding for competitors, they have worked hard to get there, regardless of the results. And to be able to say that they have competed is a great feeling.

13) Can you give general examples of how it feels to be judged on a competition floor compared with being on the other side of the fence and judging the dancers?

advice I can

give to any

your dancing, they only get to watch you for a very short period of time and make a hopefully informed decision. Being a judge is a big responsibility - you always want to make sure the fairest result is given to all the dancers on the floor.

14) How do you research before judging at a competition?

I have to make sure that I know all of the competition dances inside out. The same goes for the rules. Judges generally get asked a lot of questions about dances and rules before the competition or at the competitors meeting, so I have to make sure I am fully up-to-date on all of this.

Entering a competition takes absolute

dedication but with the right attitude

it can be a great experience. There is nothing like dancing for an audience - if you have never tried competing and would like to learn more visit www.ucwdc.com, www.cwdc.co.uk or www.mastersinline.com. competitor is to go out on the floor and enjoy yourself."

I used to get so nervous competing in Line dance - I would be physically sick before I went on the floor, so I can really relate to how nerve-wracking it is to be judged in a competition. As a judge who once competed I appreciate how brave people are to put themselves out there. As a competitor I didn't realise how hard it was being a judge. You don't realise as a competitor that a judge really only gets a snapshot of

The DVD is not new and has been released for almost 12 months so the dances are a little older but nevertheless the instruction is clear and well presented. Some of the music can be hard to get hold of - so it is convient that Tiny Dancer have produced all the tracks together on one CD.

We start with Superlove an intermediate dance which Rob describes as a 'brilliant little dance'. Mood Swing is next choreographed to *Bad Mood* which he describes as 'a moody dance'.

Happy In Line?

Are you having enough fun at your Line dance parties or do you find the dances are far too serious? *Tim Ruzgar* suggests we bring back the fun times.

Whilst DeeJaying at several Christmas parties both in the UK and overseas something struck me after the first couple. There seems to be a distinct lack of fun in the majority of Line dances that we do. Sure there are a few exceptions like Hazel Pace's wonderful Momma Mia, and there are plenty of fun dances on the dancefloor like All Day Long, and Buy Me A Drink. However I believe, in the main, Line dancing has become far too serious.

Part of the problem is that many dancers these days think they are "too cool" to join in and have fun. I have been at a few events where I and/or the instructor has tried to get dancers up to do a fun dance, or to dance Tush Push in a circle, or Black Coffee in Contra Lines, but no matter how hard you try, some dancers are just not interested.

As the styles on the floor change – does the fun disappear? Dances that are night-club in style are usually danced to very heartfelt and moving songs, and as they are gaining in popularity, there will not be much fun when

they are danced. Lots of the funky dances to cool music are taken very seriously by many, so again not much fun to be had. Then of course there are the dances with all the tags and restarts. Is it because dancers have to concentrate so hard to remember where they are that they forget to enjoy themselves?

Could it be because some of the venues are too cool or too hot? Are the dance halls too full and there is not enough room on the dancefloors – I doubt it?

I honestly think the simple truth is that a lot of the fun has gone from Line dancing. I think that too many people are concerned with their own and the general image of Line dancing, instead of going out and having fun. Many of the dances are just too hard and take a lot of learning.

I also believe that there is too much of a rush from choreographers to get dances out which means that dancers have hardly any time to enjoy them.



There are many simple solutions. Firstly for every dancer out there who wants to be "cool", there are dozens who want to have fun when they dance, so choreographers, how about it? Let's have many more fun or at least light hearted dances. Turn your attentions away from the minority to the majority. In reality most dancers (I know not all) love to learn easy dances. Most dancers would love to have the fun put back into their Line dancing, so the club instructors have a big part to play too. Don't give in to the few at your club who tell you that this dance is cool and that dance is being done by such and such so it must be good.

Let's all make a New Year resolution to all try to make an effort to get the fun back into Line dancing, together we can do it, Trust Me!

Stick Wit U from Nev Fitzgerald is to the Pussy Cat Dolls' awesome hit song. This dance is also for the intermediates and is 32 counts and four walls.

Always Thinking Of You is a beautiful new dance from Daniel Whittaker to the Westlife and Diana Ross song *When You Tell Me That You Love Me* and it is 4 walls, 32 counts, and this too is intermediate.



If you go to one class you may find that it's all Country, especially in Country bars and at beginner classes. Then go across town and you'll find instructors who have completely chosen to teach non-Country, although most clubs have a mix of music. I would also point out that the age of the instructor and the age of students tends to be relevant to the music choice. I think generally for many classes in Canada some popular dances are done to Country music and others to non-Country, so the choice of the dance leads to choice of music.



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Sho's DANCE SMART Line Dance Goals

Sho Botham looks closely at how you can take small steps in order to achieve perfect lines

Whether you are an absolute beginner learning your first Line dance basics or an advanced dancer looking for ways to improve your performance or a teacher wanting to motivate your dancers, you can benefit from setting SMART goals. A SMART goal is all of the following:-

S pecific M easurable A chievable R ealistic


T imed

Let's look at each component in more detail.

Specific – a specific goal is easier to reach than a general one. From a beginner's perspective a specific goal might involve mastering a particular step such as a grapevine. A general goal might be to learn how to Line dance but as this is vague it does not help the beginner to know what specifically to work on. Setting a number of specific, interim goals along the way will also help you to reach your bigger, general goal.

Measurable – this is about being able to measure your progress. You want to be able to see or feel that you are improving. The beginner with the goal of mastering how to shuffle can feel when they are getting the hang of it. We all know what it is like to feel that a step or movement is becoming easier to do. Think about a dance or a step that you found challenging when you first attempted it and think how different it felt once you could do it. Recognising each stage of our progress is important because it helps to keep us motivated.

Achievable – an essential ingredient of your identified goal is that it can be achieved. Setting a goal just out of reach encourages us to stretch ourselves. For example, at



beginner level a Line dancer can often learn and remember a 32 count Line dance but could he or she cope with learning and remembering a Line dance of 120 counts? Depending on the level of complexity, it seems reasonable to stretch the beginner by introducing a slightly longer dance of maybe 40 or 48 counts and in this way build up gradually to learning longer dancers. We feel good when we achieve something that we have been trying to do and this is a great motivator. Success helps us to succeed.

Realistic - how realistic is your goal? Is it do-able? It's not about setting easy goals. It's about setting a goal that is real. Although it takes effort to realise the goal, it can be done. It is not about pushing you past the point of no return. What is realistic for some is not realistic for others. A Line dancer who dances several times a week might feel it is realistic to learn and retain two or three new dances. But someone who dances one night a week might feel it is more realistic to learn one dance over a couple of weeks in order to retain it. When Line dancing first exploded onto the social dance scene the fact it was realistic for people of all ages to learn the basic Line dances gave it such a wide appeal.

Timed — this refers to the timeframe or length of time that you allow for the goal to

be reached. This is important because goals without any sort of deadline might just drift on and never become a reality. In Line dancing a teacher may set the timeframe by running an absolute beginner course over a set number of weeks. In setting the number of weeks the teacher has an expectation that participants will reach a specific level or goal by the end of the course. Competitive Line dancers often find the timeframe for performance goals are dictated by competitions dates. You may set your own timeframe for improving an aspect of your Line dancing or learning a new dance.

Mr Outrageous



ach day begins picking up from the one before. If we have an on going project in the studio we just carry on where we left off. Other days we have production meetings to map out the work for the day. Once the studio is running I check emails and deal with any pending admin. I often wake up having only been asleep for a few hours because work has taken us into the early hours the night before.

At Tiny Dancer every day is different – one day we could be recording a *Linedancer* Magazine album – the next working on a score for a stage musical or writing music for drama pieces. I very rarely stop for lunch, in fact I only eat twice a day which surprises some people.

The days I spend in the studio change depending on which side of the glass I am working on. In the live room there are no windows to the outside world – it is built that way so that we can create different moods. It is very easy to get lost in that room – we always lose track of the time. We try to keep going and use coffee to keep us motivated. The theory is by not stopping for a break we are able to keep the creative juices flowing.

I rarely relax – my brain is always churning over new ideas. I have been involved in music production and show business for over 30 years. Initially I intended to be a vocal coach, which I still do part time for some theatre companies. After gaining a degree in music I also studied Psychology and developed an interest in Philosophy. I have qualifications in clinical psychology



and hypnotherapy – the skills these courses taught me I use when coaching or doing performance development work. I hope to explore these areas of the business in the future. My son Aaron is beginning to take an active role in the company which frees me up to look closer into other areas.

When I am out on the road my evenings are very different from those spent at home. If I am doing a show I like to have plenty of time to relax before hand. This sometimes proves difficult because I have long drives to get from venue to venue. Whereas in the studio the evenings tend to merge into the working day. I do like to get away from the music — I try to give my ears a rest by going out to eat at local restaurants.

I condsider myself an extraorinarily lucky man. My son, Aaron, and my wife, Sammy J, both share a love of Line dance and music. Sammy's daughter Lianne, who is almost seven, also seems to have music in her blood. Family nights in are very rare but they are guanteed to be filled with music and dance.

The whole family share the same ambition for Line dance to be more widely accepted as a wonderful source of social activity. Tiny Dancer aims to seek more and more ways of promoting Line dance to all age groups. We always actively support new choreographers and dancers whenever we can.

I have had some special moments over the past year but nothing comes close to being voted Dedicated Dance Act 2005. It was probably the most emotional moment of my career. I'd hoped to do so much more than I have done to live up to the title but there just never seems to be enough time. However, I have got plenty life left in me yet and so you can rest assured that I'll be out there again flying the flag for all of us.

A couple of outrageous things I don't mind revealing are my personalised number plates - 5678 on one car and G11 on another. I also have 11 Irish Hunters (horses) 35 cows, 3 dogs, a rabbit and a cat. At one time I could fly light aircraft but I lost my licence through ill health. We have a strip at Longview with a couple of display planes, but I haven't flown for over 15 years. My first passion these days is the business – I love what I do. Finding the Line dance scene almost 12 years ago was the best thing that has ever happened to me – I love the people and the buzz.

I would reveal all my secrets but there are far too many to list — let's just say they don't call me 'The Outrageous' for nothing.
