MISS INDEPENDENT

28 million people watched Kelly Clarkson on a US reality TV show four years ago she instantly became an Idol – lately she has left her Idol connections behind winning two Grammy's – Pamela Edelston asks can we dance to her music? The hype and hysteria that is American Idol unveiled the vocal talent of Kelly Clarkson. As the original Idol in 2002, Kelly has surpassed other Simon Cowell prodigies by sweeping two Awards at last month's Grammy's. Kelly won Best Female Pop Performance for Since You've Been Gone and Best Pop Vocal Album for Breakaway.

Kelly's success has handed her the opportunity to travel the world over and she maybe about to take over the Line dance scene too. After global success Clarkson is currently touring Europe with the songs from her latest album Breakaway. Tim Ruzgar has often praised the winners of the US TV show, which is now in it's fifth season and is shown on ITV1 every Sunday. Tim recommends Kelly's latest album for dancing too and you may have tried the dance published by *Linedancer* in October it's just one of those moments kind of like Beautiful Disaster.

When a national TV show in America launches your music career you are flung into a new stratosphere: "I was so tired and exhausted because I was working so hard, I remember it didn't set in until I was at the Grammy's."

Her musical ability is very natural but Kelly also has other artistic talents: "Since I was thirteen, I was very much into music. I was a dancer. I was always dancing and doing choreography for people. I remember walking in a hallway in my junior high school and a choir teacher heard me singing. She said you should really get in choir. I remember going home and singing to my mum. I had not sung in front of anybody before but I realised I naturally had this big range. I didn't even

2005. It is choreographed by Peter Metelnick and Alison Biggs called Touch The Sky, which uses the track Because Of You. I am sure choreographers and dancers will have lots of fun with many tracks off this album.

Miss Independent was the first single from the album Breakaway and it spent seven weeks at the top of the US charts – there is a 48 count, intermediate dance by Bob Boesel. Kelly says: "It was pretty much that dream come true single and it just happened to be my first one. I was stoked about it. I was a part of such a great song and it was a nice way to kick off my album and it's a nice way to set up a career, I was really blessed by it."

Beautiful Disaster and Because of You are both heard on the dancefloor, Kelly says: "One reason I put Beautiful Disaster on the record is because it is one of those magical music moments. Because of you is one of my favourite songs on the new album. In the show we're doing it with just a piano and two violins and me and it's such an intense song but it makes it beautiful with the violins and know what a range was. I naturally caught on with music quickly. I have no idea where it came from. The first time I performed I sang Vision Of Love by Mariah Carey and my mum was laughing because she didn't know where the heck this voice came from."

Kelly has a very strong vocal, which is great for singing along to if you are a hair brush diva. Has she ever been criticised for being too over powering? "Yeah, its funny because a lot of times when I was younger people were always like 'hey you need to quiet down and you need to blend in with everyone' and I just wanted to belt it out and get really into it. I grew up listening to people like Annie Lennox, Aerosmith, Janice Joplin and Aretha Franklin and they don't hold back. These are people that are very passionate with their lyrics and their vocals and performance and everything and so that's what I love, that's why I love to perform Since You've Been Gone and Walk Away. All these songs are really passionate and vocally demanding but I love that, its fun for me. A lot of people get annoyed, my mum loves when I sing softer



stuff but she knows that I have so much fun with the rock stuff."

There has definitely been a change in style since Kelly's first album Thankful, how did this come about? "With Thankful I wanted to portray the versatility of me as an artist. We had a lot of R and B, pensive hip hop, pensive Country, rock and a lot of different vibes on the album, even some jazz at points. The point of it was to not stick to one category. I love all different styles of music and I love singing it and I figure if you can, why not. My

fans and my audience expect a lot of different things from me to keep them entertained. Every time I go on tour I don't want to sing the same song sixteen times, that's boring. It was fun, we made an album that was very eclectic in taste, then we already knew when we were making the first album that in the second album we were gonna focus on one style. We didn't know which one yet - we ended up with Breakaway - a more

rock album, but we have very different styles on it some things are more Annie Lennox, Aerosmith. Others are soft rock – we always pretty much have a plan of action but I have no idea what my third album will be like."

Kelly's foundations are in musical theatre, dance and drama but when she turned up to sing on American Idol, she was shocked to learn she had no audience: "I was on the very first American Idol and there wasn't an audience for the first couple of shows. No one knew the show and no one knew it was gonna be that big so there was no one. It was so awkward – you're just performing for cameras and I had grown up doing musical theatre and dancing in front of people. I had always had an audience to work off and so it was kind of weird at first. The show blew up and it was the third show when we were singing live with everyone, I loved it. I absolutely loved getting on that stage.

"It's funny with me, it doesn't matter if I'm singing at a church on stage, if I'm singing with kids, just sitting in a room, American Idol or my own tour, anytime I'm on stage I light up. It's my dream, my goal, my passion. It is almost like I am at home, it sounds corny but it does. I can't describe it but it's just exhilarating."

As a child Kelly had an ambition to become a Marine Biologist but mixed emotions left her wondering if she could be a Hollywood star. Before Idol Kelly had already attempted to hit the big time moving to Hollywood and putting her demo tape around in hope of a record contract. She even had a bit part on an episode of Sabrina The Teenage Witch but failing to get noticed and a fire at her apartment left

her feeling destitute and so she headed home to Texas. A friend persuaded her to go along to the auditions for the Fox TV show. Kelly knew nothing about it, "I went and tried out for fun and here I am!"

Kelly will be touring the UK beginning March: "I'd love to break globally and can't wait to go to England. There is so much ahead of me and I'm really grateful for that. It all seems to be happening so quickly that it's hard to stop and think. For now, I'm just glad to be in this position and to be able to have a job where I use my singing voice every day. I knew when I watched Jaws that marine biology just wasn't for me."

rowing up, my dance teacher always told me to be a dancer requires more strength than any athlete needs. As a dancer you don't tackle a group of muscular men caked in mud or give your opponent a right hook but that doesn't mean there isn't the same amount of strength behind your performance.

Have you seen the latest Nike advertisement on TV? It shows dancers who ask the question do we need to have screaming fans to be called an athlete?. This has inspired me to come out and celebrate the strength of dancers. Have you ever wondered why so few dancers get to see their names in lights? Nine times out of ten the dancers are left in the background. True, we have an article on Michael Flatley this month who is known for being a well paid dancer. However, he is part of an elite few – dancers train equally as hard as any footballer, NBA basketball player, Olympic swimmer or boxer but never get the attention afforded to these sporting celebrities.

If I mention football – people will instantly know their local team. Likewise if I say Alex Ferguson they probably know he is a football manager. I bet even the person who claims In the Line dance community choreographers, teachers and musicians are household names but leave those circles and they are unheard of. The media coverage is that of straw chewing, yeehaw shouting barn dances. The TV coverage constantly feeds the Western stereotype to the outside world. The exception is Jodie Binsteed and Danny Last on the first series of Strictly Dance Fever. Last year Emma Wilkinson appeared on Richard and Judy, which was a great portrayal of Line dance, but may I pose the question should the general public already know Emma? She runs an Award winning club (in 2003 Boot n Blisters won UK Club of the Year) but she is unheard of beyond the Crystal Boot Awards and Linedancer Magazine. Compare recognised sports personalities like Freddy Flintoff or Kelly Holmes - why are they so well known?

I believe the answer can be found on Sky TV. At home, I have Sky TV and can watch a number of sports at the same time if I wish – on an average Sunday my other half would willingly watch three soccer matches followed by two NFL games. I have managed to get him to sit down and watch half an hour of a dance related show. However, firstly you

to be the least bit interested in football can name one footballer – whether it is Beckham, Rooney or Owen. The same goes for most sports baseball, rugby, tennis even curling. Yet mention dance and it is associated with 'my daughter takes ballet classes' or 'my granddad goes Line dancing'. The perception of dance is wrong and it is time to stand up and let people know exactly how much energy, determination and commitment it takes to be a dancer.

To train everyday strengthening, adding flexibility and stamina is extremely difficult yet professional dancers do it just to earn a crust. Hollywood is stacked with wannabe actors living hand to mouth in hope of one day getting their big break. Dancers unlike actors are not living in hope of that million dollar contract from clinching a blockbuster movie role. More realistically they get a part in a chorus line with 25 other identical dancers. The purpose is for dancers to blend into the background and they are almost never afforded the opportunity to shine in the spotlight. have to find it. You are more likely to find the world's strongest man moving logs with his teeth or a 1982 cup final than any reasonable dance show on television.

You and I both know that there are many young people who would love to channel their energy into dance but as long as these stereotypes linger we are fighting a losing battle. It has so many positives – it doesn't happen in a cold, wet field but in nice friendly venues with warm and welcoming people.

Can you imagine what would happen if dance was afforded the same representation by the media as other forms of sport? The professional performance of any dancer is equal, if not better, than any sports person and I feel we need to establish a name for the dancer.

Make yourself heard by encouraging people to watch and appreciate dance on TV. Take your non dance friends to events and lastly, let the TV companies know when you enjoy a show by sending them an email, or letter.

The next time I visited it was framed and in pride of place in the centre of her living room wall and at her Funeral service it was prominently displayed. After the service there was a Line dance party – her son Jack said that was what Peggy had wanted.

Peggy started Line dancing at age 83 and finally had to stop because of a lack of balance 18 months before her death.

Even then she never missed a class as she was determined to keep up with her friends and loved to watch the dancing.

Peggy was one of those individuals who loved life; who was always interested in the world around her. She drew people to her like a magnet and her enthusiam, keen sense of humour and friendly nature warmed their hearts. Peggy was an inspiration to us all.

Here's hoping right now she is dancing her favourite 'Boot Scootin' Boogie' on the clouds above us while at the same keeping an eye on us to make sure we continue to have fun on the dancefloor. Don't worry Peggy, we will – we'll just pretend you're still sitting on your chair, watching and smiling as we dance.


"Our latest social included a competition to make the crown jewels using pipe cleaners and assorted sweets.

Teaching is a daunting task and with so many methods, dances and music choices it appears to be getting harder and harder. *Stan Lytham* makes a suggestion from the dancers point of view any dance styles have ex professionals or certified teachers but in Line dance anyone can hire a hall, play the music and dance. There are many good

and bad elements to this standard, but if you have previously enjoyed dancing with friends and then suddenly you find yourself up on stage in front of 30 people how do you teach them the latest dance?

I have never taught a Line dance in my life but I am always on the floor and for the most part I am shuffling and muddling through, albeit with a forced laugh as if I am only there to clown around.

Line dancing has changed over the last ten years. What was once easy to follow steps and formations has become more and more complicated. I often feel that in my case it causes great stress. I have experienced headaches, twitches, irritability and lack of concentration because of the pressure faced by the prospect of learning yet another dance. I beg some teachers to answer the question – is there nothing we can do to simplify the learning process?

How do you teach Line dancing? The common way I have experienced is by copying and repetition, bite size pieces for those of us who cannot remember things all in one go. Fortunately choreographers present dances in a format of eight count sections relating to eight counts of music. I am sure many teachers take each section and all the information on the script, paying close attention to timing, and the more complicated steps.

A method of teaching I prefer is when the first eight counts are taught then repeated with the second, adding each new section on as the teach progresses. It is a proven fact that it is easy to learn something by repetition. By adding on a little each time


it builds up the dance slowly and makes it easy to retain.

I have known teachers to break up the dance teaching it in several random pieces then fitting it back together at the end. Maybe teaching the tag or a restart at the beginning of the lesson is a way of ensuring they stick in the mind of the dancer.

When the steps are taken care of - next comes the floor pattern - which way do I turn, which wall should I be on now? Dance scripts seldom refer to which direction you should be facing at the end of a wall and it is easy to interpret the script wrongly. The more turns in the dance, the more lost I become. If the room is crowded it can be hard to see the instructor if he/she stays in the one spot. Whenever possible having more established dancers dotted around the room helps, especially after a turn. The worst scenario is when you are caught with your back to the teacher.

The harder dances with

at least 64 counts and four walls are hard to learn and added to that is the originality and variations included by choreographers to make their dance more unique. If I get my head around these dances they are very enjoyable but I am very limited in the number I am capable of learning and the stress it involves. Take the more acrobatic steps – my knees just won't take it – and I am going to have to let them go by. I don't feel like I have to learn every dance and teachers please don't feel under pressure to keep up. Let's just go back to the basics, enjoy the dances, and have a good time. After all it is suppose to be a fun hobby for us dancers on the centre of the floor, lets leave the harder stuff for the more experienced and flexible dancer. You are a pleasure to watch but I am not prepared to feel the stress it takes to try and catch up. I am just here for the enjoyment and with the pieces of eight I will be coming back time and time again.

SOME HEARTS *Carrie Underwood*

arrie Underwood won American Idol 2005. Other winners include Kelly Clarkson and Clay Aiken. Carrie's album has gone double platinum, making her the fastest selling debut solo female

artist in history. *Wasted* (95bpm) sets the tone - it is a smooth cha cha. This track would be ideal for a new beginner dance.

Don't Forget To Remember Me (80bpm) is a lovely new Country song, a night-club two step, and the musical accompaniment richly enhances Carrie's voice. Beautiful.

Some Hearts (114bpm) was one of three songs on the album written by legendary songwriter Dianne Warren best known for her power ballads, but this is a good up tempo number, crying out for a good dance.

Jesus Take The Wheel (76bpm) was Carrie's second single in the US and was another big hit. The Night Before (97bpm) is a cha cha. Carrie sounds like another of my favourite singers, Chalee Tennison, and this too is a fine dance number.

Lessons Learned (97bpm) is the second Dianne Warren song and it highlights the power of Carrie's voice. Another good song.

Before He Cheats (74bpm) is a sassy little number, more contemporary than most, and with some gritty lyrics. I love it and would be

delighted if someone wrote a dance to it.

Starts With Good-bye (75bpm) and *I Just Can't Live A Lie* (78bpm) are both powerful songs, packed with emotion and a strong musical backing.

We're Young And Beautiful (104bpm) livens things up. This rock infused song is another good dance prospect.

That's Where It Is (96bpm) is a contemporary song and could cross into the mainstream. A super song, waiting for a super dance.

Whenever You Remember (60bpm) is the final Dianne Warren song, and is more true to her style – it is a sensational power ballad.

I A'int In Checotah Anymore (80bpm) is the only song on the album that gives us a taste of Carrie's writing. It is a great dance track, powerful with a good beat, and very deserving of some choreography.

Bonus track *Inside Your Heaven* (68bpm) closes the album and this was the massive number one hit single released right after Carrie won American Idol. I can't stop playing this. Simply an awesome song.

If Carrie Underwood is as successful as Kelly Clarkson, she will have a great career. Carrie has the advantage of being a Country singer so she has the backing of that market as well as the main stream. This is a superb debut album which I highly recommend to you.

R549 have been around since the early nineties and they sprang to fame from their residency at Roberts Bar on Broadway in Nashville. Some of you may remember them from CMT Europe, and many of you will have danced to their big hit Cherokee Boogie.

Poison (123bpm) is the opener and was, like most of the songs on the album, written by lead singer/guitarist Chuck Mead. It is a real upbeat number, best described as mountain music and would be ideal for Applejacks.

After The Hurricane (114bpm) is a cha cha, that epitomises the unique BR549 sound.

Lower Broad Street Blues (113bpm) as the title suggests is a Country blues song with lots of strumming and some raw fiddle playing. You will either love or hate it.

Leave It Alone (154bpm) is more like it! It is a rockabilly style song and choreographers could have a lot of fun writing to this track.

Bottom Of Priority (125bpm) sounds like it could have come from a Rodney Crowell album, and it continues the band's affinity with Red Indians. Danceable? You bet!

The Devil In Me (98/196bpm) features the Jordanaires. It is a cracking two step and a hot dance prospect.

I'm Going Down (73bpm) or *OH Brother Where Art Thou* revisited. Not my cup of tea, but hey, one man's meat and all that.

You Are The Queen (94bpm) I love this track. It is difficult to describe but you will just have to trust me.

Cajun Persuasion (92bpm) is in the Cherokee Boogie mould. It's got a good beat – why are you waiting?

A1 On The Jukebox (159bpm) is one of the best dance prospect on the album. It is a Dave Edmunds song and for those familiar with his work, will know how he fuses rock 'n' roll to other styles so well. If this track had the right dance choreographed to it, it has the potential to be a huge hit, Trust Me!

We close the album with *Let Jesus Make Me Breakfast* (116bpm) now there's a song title. It is traditional Texas swing in style, and once again it just needs a good dance writing to it. I believe it could be a surprise hit.

BR549 have been missing from the Line dance scene, after line up and label changes they seemed settled at Dualtone. This is the band's best work for some time, there are some interesting dance tracks, so why don't you give it a try?

ountry music legend Dolly Parton is without doubt the undisputed Queen of Country, with a career spanning five decades. Over the years, Dolly has been involved in numerous collaborations, most notably with Kenny Rogers for Islands in the Stream. Dolly's latest project is collaborations on songs from the 50's, 60's, and 70's.

Title track *Those Were The Days* (92bpm) opens the album, Dolly is joined by original singer Mary Hopkins, also George Jones, Porter Wagoner, and Brenda Lee.

Bob Dylan's *Blowin' In The Wind* (84bpm) was a massive hit back in 1963 – Dolly covers the song with hot group Nickel Creek. This is a beautiful rendition and it could tempt someone to write a dance to it.

Where Have All The Flowers Gone (80bpm) sees Dolly joined by Norah Jones and Lee Ann Womack. Beautiful harmonies are the order of the day on this sweet rendition.

Twelfth Of Never (122bpm) Keith Urban joins Dolly for this superb Country version, which is an absolute gem of a dance track. Maggie Gallagher has written a nice beginner dance to it. *Where Do The Children Play* (68bpm) is a duet with Yusef Islam (Cat

orty Five South will be a new name to most of you. The five very talented musicians/singers/songwriters are Justin Tapely, Phillip Lemmings, Jonathan King, Seth Gordon, and lead singer Ashley Bowers who co-wrote all but one of the songs on the album.

First cut *I'm Gonna Move On* (109bpm) is a brilliant way to start and it's a great dance track too. This west coast swing simply needs to excite a choreographer.

The Stuff That I Grew Up On (9132bpm) a big title and a big track. This east coast swing has some good strong harmonies, some great musicianship from the band, and Ashley's strong vocals. Dance away.

Heaven Only Knows (132bpm) is a good fast number, this time a polka and it would also make another good dance track. We are only three songs in and already I'm hooked.

I've Been There Too (74bpm) is the first slow number – it is a gorgeous nightclub two step. *L'il Red Riding Hood* (156bpm) is the song with the fastest beat on the album. The backing is simply awesome. The rhythm and tempo make this track very interesting for choreography.

A MIle Away (88/140bpm) is an unusual song with a mixed tempo. It begins at a steady pace, then with each chorus it speeds

Me And Bobby McGee (85bpm) Kris Kristofferson joins Dolly for a superb remake. It has gorgeous harmonica playing and a good beat – all the makings of a good dance track.

There are a couple of slower songs *Crimson And Clover* (85bpm) and *The Cruel War* (70bpm) with Alison Krauss and Dan Tyminsky. *Turn, Turn, Turn* (126bpm) lead singer of The Byrds Roger McGuinn adds a 12 string guitar and vocals to this 1965 hit. Although staying fairly true to the original, this is a lovely Country, almost bluegrass version and is an ideal dance track.

If I Were A Carpenter (85/170 bpm) sees Joe Nicholls taking the male vocal – it is a fine version of the song – it could be a big hit.

Both Sides Now (126bpm) was a 1968 hit for Judy Collins. Judy and Rhonda Vincent, joins Dolly for the bluegrass interpretation.


Finally we have Lennon's *Imagine* (75bpm) with David Foster. This cover has a orchestral and choral backing and it is stunning!

right up. Not sure of the merits of this one as a dance track, but it may tempt someone.

My Way (74bpm) is not Frank Sinatra's great song, it is though an awesome, powerful Country song, and I absolutely love this nightclub two step.

Second Hand Life (85bpm) has a nice steady beat whilst Taste Of Class (148bpm) raises the tempo, as an east coast swing, it is one of the hottest dance tracks on the album.

Smoke If You Got 'Em (98bpm) is a powerful Country rocker, think Big & Rich meets Montgomery Gentry and add a touch of class. This too was made for dancing.

Seems Like Yesterday (94bpm) I love this type of songs which just floats along, with some nice banjo and mandolin playing.

All too soon we come to the final song, the title track *We're Country So We Can* (104bpm) which sums up this band nicely and it closes an extremely enjoyable album.

Bands like Big & Rich and Montgomery Gentry were introduced amid a blaze of publicity, with all the power behind major labels. We don't have that razzmatazz with Forty Five South, they let their music do the talking, and boy does it talk, loud and clear! This is a great Country band, you would be wise to buy this album, Trust Me!

Lord of the Dance Michael Flatley is taking to the stage again – this time with a personal dance – revealing the hardships suffered by the migrating Irish Americans, *Linda Willis* reports he unrivalled Lord of the Dance Michael Flatley is back with a vengeance. At almost fifty he has broken his own Guinness World Record by achieving a staggering 35 taps per second. He is the highest paid dancer earning \$1,600,000 per week and his legs are insured for \$40,000,000. In the latest production *Celtic Tiger*, Flatley uses the art form of dance to challenge preconceived ideas and prejudices.

Flatley was told at age 11 he was too old to attend dance classes. At 17 he became the first American World Irish Dance Champion. Dancing with The Chieftains at night-clubs, made his day job as a labourer on a construction site bearable. But in April 1994 Michael danced for probably the most important seven minutes of his whole life. Riverdance created by him, televised to millions as an interval feature for the Eurovision Song Contest in Dublin. Michael Flately was about to kiss good-bye to the building site - forever. Starring in the West End in Riverdance the show, led to the phenomenal, almost hysterical global success of Lord of The Dance. When the going gets good the good get even better - Feet of Flames premiered at the Route of Kings in Hyde Park - the largest and most extravagant dance show ever produced.

Celtic Tiger is bold, dramatic and daring, everything you would expect from a dancer who works tirelessly to promote his craft, pushing the boundaries to the extreme, fusing the spirit of Ireland with dance and music: "The show itself is a 90 minute spectacular. It is very fast moving, powerful and hard-hitting and I think that is something that you have never seen before," says Michael.

"There are many reasons why *Celtic Tiger* came into being," explains the Chicago

native. "Not the least of which was the fact that I had nurtured doing something like this for as far back as my *Riverdance* days."

"My parents moved out to America in 1947 from Sligo and Carlow with their arms wide open and somehow managed to forge out a living and a life for their family. Names in a sea of millions who did the same thing.

"America gave them everything, and yes, the idea that this show is a 'thank you' to that wonderful country did sit on my shoulder as I put it all together. *Celtic Tiger* is a celebration of Ireland and its heroes, but also a celebration of the Irish Americans and their ancestors."

Celtic Tiger premiered in Budapest. Michael flew his whole family there for the opening night without telling them anything: "They didn't even know the name of the show. They had no idea. And afterwards they spent the evening crying because it brought back so many memories. It unlocked the emotions that I believe are inside every Irish person. The greatest thing for me as an artiste is to help let some of that steam out."

Tapping his way to a \$500 million fortune makes his move back to centre stage a personal odyssey and test of stamina rather than a need to stash some much needed cash. Questions of longevity and fancy footwork will soon be answered: "Well, I'm almost 50 and that's a fact nobody can ignore. I was asked in an interview the other day if I could still cut it and I said that with this new cane I can double the taps," he laughs.

"No, I'm not the same man I was 10 years ago, or even five years ago for that matter. What I do have however is a lot more wisdom and determination. It was always going to be







a tough call doing something like this, but remember that this is not just about Michael Flatley.

"There's a whole troupe of amazing dancers working on Celtic Tiger and so I have the benefit of youth to back me up. We have a wonderful lady, for instance Niamh O'Brien from Dublin, who has been with me since *Riverdance*. An incredible artiste who's been down the same road. In that regard, *Celtic Tiger* is another link in the chain of my life."

He smiles at the memories of a Chicago kid with big ambitions arriving fresh and green to Ireland: "I remember going over there in the early eighties and people commenting, 'who is this guy – what's with the hair, the jeans, the cowboy boots?"

"To be different was not good. That's an attitude that's changing and no bad thing. There is a wider world out there and Ireland is part of it - for good or ill. The economic boom, the Celtic Tiger, is only part of what's happened to the Irish as I see it. The real difference is something way deeper within. It's about a pride, a spirit, a confidence that's coming out like it never did before. For the first time in history, the average Irish person earns more than his English counterpart. The wheel has turned full circle."

Ideas are never in short supply when Flatley's around: "I always have a hundred ideas going through my head," he admits. "But maybe 10 of them get to the bottom line where decisions are made to go ahead or not. There is always a fine line between what I love to do, and what I think should be done. Example. I've signed a contract with a group of people to build an Irish casino in Las Vegas. Now, I don't want to run a casino or even be necessarily in that business at all. But I believe that this is something that must be done. I've also begun negotiations to try to start up the first Irish television station in America. Again – it's not an area I could describe as my forte. But does it need to be done? No question. Otherwise, how will America ever be fully educated about what's really happening over there?"

On a personal note after a period apart, he talks briefly on the subject of his relationship with Lisa Murphy: "Am I happy with Lisa? That's a no-brainer," he smiles broadly.

"Lisa is an incredibly supportive woman and someone who is kind and caring above all else. She does have the misfortune to be with someone like me, however, and must endure all the attention and misconceptions that might be forced upon her because of that."

He is reflective. "We've been through a lot together, and there's a bond between us that goes back quite a ways now. I care for her deeply. I could bore you silly about the wonderful things we have together. Suffice to say - life couldn't really be any better. That says it all really."

The DVD of Celtic Tiger is to be released on April 3, 2006 by Universal Pictures.



Country goes to HollyWOOd

Have you noticed how much Country music is heard on the big screen, But why the sudden shift to Nashville by the Hollywood Film producers?



'all - we are going to Hollywood. Some of Country's most famous names have been mixing with the Hollywood elite on the Red Carpet at the Oscars, Golden Globes and the Baftas. It appears the barroom banter and front porch story swapping of Country music has found a new home in Los Angeles. You may have noticed that Nashville born music is being heard in award winning films like Brokeback Mountain, Transamerica, and Walk The Line. Big Country stars like Dolly Parton, Willie Nelson and Emmylou Harris are part of the migration of Country sounds onto film soundtracks. Until recently less than five percent of soundtrack music in movies was Country. It is still not as popular as rock, pop or jazz, however recent soundtrack cuts show promise for the future.

The typical Country image of cowboys in stetsons and boots has been revamped. The newer Country stars like CMA Entertainer of the Year, Keith Urban and CMA Vocalist of the Year, Gretchen Wilson have helped to change the image of Country. These Country artists are known widely on the main stream market and have opened avenues for Country music to branch out. In turn these changes have forced the film industry to take a serious look at music coming out of Nashville.

I first noticed this trend in 2005 when The Charlie Daniels Band, Montgomery Gentry and Willie Nelson were all featured on the soundtrack for The Dukes of Hazzard. The film was a feature length version of the old TV series and was centred around Country themes. In this case to meet the demands of Hollywood and Pop, the music industry resorted to a typical Country formula. In the Jessica Simpson video for These Boots Are Made For Walking you see muscles in big hats, starched boot cut Wranglers and choreographed sexy moves. This Country cliché was appropriate for the wild redneck movie but I have since learned Hollywood can use Country music for films that are not all yeehaw, gingham and straw bales.

Country music has roots in gospel and folk – it tends to be founded in Christian values – glorifying the home and family. The values are derived from the Southern way of life and the Dixie flag appears in many Country music videos and on CD sleeves. The Dixie symbolism has often been associated with intolerence in films like Mississippi Burning and Easy Rider. Today, the mainstream is beginning to embrace Country music with other influences and artists arriving in Nashville from around the world.

At one time the film industry would not connect Country except to Southern movies like, Sweet Home Alabama and O' Brother, Where Art Thou? The stereotypes are still around in movies but in a ninety degree turn around some hit movies have traded in the conservative Country connections. These sounds have delved into other themes and genres in Hollywood, the most obvious being gay and transsexual themes. Country's first lady - Dolly Parton - received an Oscar nomination for Travelin' Thru. The song is on the soundtrack for the movie Transamerica. The film stars Desperate Housewives actress Felicity Huffman as a transsexual, who meets and travels across America with her long lost male prostitute son. None of these taboo

subjects are usually related with a hillbilly sound but on this film Country music is heard throughout.

Country music brings to life the story of Johnny Cash and his love affair with June Carter Cash. Johnny Cash is played by Joaquin Phoenix and he stars alongside actress, Reese Witherspoon. Witherspoon is a Nashville native who has been nominated and won several Hollywood awards. Taking you back to 1955, the film explores the life of a skinny guitar player from the moment he walked into the Sun Studios in Memphis to the days of self destruction. The movie follows his rough and tumble journey of music and love, as he lives life on a knife edge.

This year's biggest blockbuster, Award winning, Brokeback Mountain tells the powerful story of a Wyoming ranch hand and a rodeo cowboy. The two men meet in the summer of 1963 and unexpectedly forge a life long connection. The movie also has Country dancers in a couple of the scenes. Gary and Lisa McIntyre are well known UCWDC Masters Dance Champions, they have both choreographed and danced in the movie.

The Country legend, Willie Nelson sings He Was A Friend Of Mine on the movie soundtrack, while EmmyLou Harris performs A Love That Will Never Grow Old by Gustavo Santaolalla and Bernie Taupin. Nelson said: "(the song has) been in the closet for 20 years. The timing's right for it to come out. I'm just opening the door."

Willie maybe right, Country appears to have stepped into a whole new world – leaving the musical market place wide open for Country artists – who knows what the future holds.

Dolly's night at the Oscars



"I told him I didn't think I'd have time because I was right in the middle of a tour, and I was promoting my new CD, Those Were the Days.

"I only had one day to go in the studio to record it. We were in Kentucky at that particular time. So we went to Nashville and recorded it."

The movie's issues are usually not associated with Country music, she says: "Somethings are strange to me and some things are odd. But I don't condemn. If you can accept me then I can accept you."

It is the second time Dolly has experienced the glittering Awards, she was nominated in 1980 for Nine To Five. Dolly said: "I don't really remember much about the last time. The only stars I remember are my co stars Lily Tomlin and Jane Fonda. This year the guy who's done my clothes is Robert Behar. He's from Paris, and he does all my stage clothes. He's a true designer. This has been his dream ever since he was young, to be able to design something for the Oscars."

Doctor of Doctor

Recently Engelbert Humperdinck was in Leicester to receive a special honour. *Janet Slattery* chatted to him about finding love on the dancefloor

suppose you think Elvis was the founder of sideburns and flamboyant leather jump-suits? In fact it was his close friend, Leicester native, Engelbert Humperdinck – he still jokes about how Elvis stole his image. His talents have been enjoyed and appreciated on the dancefloor as many choreographers, including Kate Sala, Gary Lafferty and David Sinfield have found inspiration in Engelbert's music. A current floor filler, that is in the Top 20 Line dance chart, is No Place To Go choreographed by Ann Wood to Radio Dancing.

During his glittering career he has sold a staggering 130 million records worldwide many of which we have heard on the dancefloor. Remember – Les Bicyclettes De Belsize, The Last Waltz and Spanish Eyes? Teresa and Vera's dance Ouando When Ouando was a floor filler, staying in the Line dance Top Ten for over a year. Engelbert was surprised to hear his music is popular with Line dancers: "Patricia and I met at a dance and dancing is something we do quite a lot of when she joins me in America. It's a wonderful social outlet and keeps us both fit and active."

On and off the dancefloor he has equalled the success of other performers like Tom Jones, Cliff Richard, Elton John and Mick Jagger. After 70 Gold albums and 23 Platinum albums, Humperdinck hopes his new album of Jazz tinged songs Engelbert Goes Jazz will put him back in the charts. Unlike other musicians of his generation Humperdinck has yet to be knighted by the Queen. Recently the citizens of Leicester felt he was long overdue some recognition and he received an honorary degree. Humperdinck was named a Doctor of Music at the University of Leicester. Accepting the award, he said: "I have performed on this stage many times in the past but today is a very proud moment in my life. It gives me a great thrill as an entertainer to be honoured in my home town.



My fans around the world will be delighted to learn I am receiving this prestigious honour."

Born Arnold George Dorsey in India, Engelbert is one of ten children. He discovered an appreciation of music at age 11 by playing saxophone. In the beginning his singing career centred around impersonations. He became known as Gerry Dorsey due to his impression of Jerry Lee Lewis, who he still includes in his current act. Engelbert's first manager, Gordon Mills, suggested a change of name – which is when Engelbert Humperdinck's career took off. The name Engelbert Humperdinck came from the Austrian Composer responsible for Hansel and Gretel.

Early in his career Engelbert contracted Tuberculosis which silenced him for six months. It is hard to believe he is now approaching 70 and still works a full schedule: "I do 140 concerts around the world each year so I lead quite a hectic life. In 2006 I am only doing 70 gigs and the next year after that about 50. I don't think I will totally give up because show business is in my blood."

He has literally taken his foot off the gas. Last summer he auctioned his precious Harley Davidson on eBay, giving the money to charity. He also finds enjoyment in vast open spaces: "I am an outdoor type of person and one of my passions is golf. After a round of golf at my local club I enjoy a chat and friendly game of darts with the members."

Back in the sixties, with the help of the headline slot at Sunday Night At The London Palladium, Humperdinck's Country single Release Me kept the Beatles off the number one spot. Penny Lane had to settle for second place as Release Me sold 80,000 copies a day and spent 56 weeks in the charts. With a move to America, new friends in Bing Crosby, Dean Martin and Bob Hope Humperdinck's success continued. In 1988 he won a Golden Globe for Entertainer of the Year and a year later he got a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame: "I don't get much opportunity to go to the theatre, but I like this art form, especially musicals. At home the television's on guite a lot. My favourite programmes are the old movies, perhaps because I know most of the stars in them."



We then had to halt preparations while the Granada TV crew moved in to shoot some live footage for the



early evening news. All too soon it is time to open the doors and the weekend began. Everything ran like clockwork on Friday evening and during the daytime on Saturday, with the workshops. In the late afternoon it was time to get busy again as the new stage set was installed and the tables prepared for the gala evening. Rehearsing with guest presenters, Charlotte Macari and Frankie Cull was time consuming as it was vital to get the sound just right. Again it all came together and when the doors are opened the Norcalympia looked magnificent. The success of the event is down to many people behind the scenes, as well as those out front. The companies I have mentioned previously work hard, as do all the team at Linedancer magazine, many of who work long hard hours, not only throughout the weekend, but throughout the year too. Of course it is all held together by one lady, Betty Drummond, who got one of the biggest surprises of the weekend when she was inducted her into the Linedancer Hall of Fame. 





Round and round you turn but do you ever get caught in a spin? Sho Botham gives you the spinning formula

One of the key elements that Line dancers need to master is turning. A beginner learns to make the basic guarter turn required to move from one wall to the next. Progress usually includes mastering half turns, threequarter turns, full turns before possibly attempting turns that involve more than one complete revolution.

Line dance choreography incorporates more turns and more variety of turns in the dances that are created today in comparison with dances of even a couple of years ago. So a good turning technique is a very useful skill for Line dancers to develop. Some of the challenges of turning can be overcome by breaking the components down into manageable chunks which the dancer can build into the complete movement. Other challenges might require some degree of adaptation. For instance, where a dancer has difficulties turning due to existing health or medical conditions then it is often possible to limit, adapt or even remove turns within dances.

Learning to turn

Line dancers start to learn about turning early on when they are initiated into the concept of dancing facing different walls. A beginner dance that includes moving from one wall to the next introduces the basic process of turning. These quarter turns helps the dancer to become familiar with starting facing one direction and finishing facing another. In order to successfully achieve the guarter turn he or she needs to know where to face at the start of the turn and also the end of it. It is a bit like travelling by train with departure and arrival stations. Usually before you step on a train you know which station you want to end up at. And just like the traveller, once you arrive at your destination you need to find your way around.

Line dancers, especially in the early learning stages, often find that they can do a dance facing one wall but everything seems different when they turn to the face the next wall. This is partly because the bearings they had changed when they turned to a new wall and they can no longer rely on them for guidance. They need to find new bearings for the next wall and the next and so on. There are other ways that can help dancers to develop a sense of where they are in relation to the room and I will look at some of them in a future article.

Half turns are often the next turn for line dancers to master. This may involve turning on one leg to face the opposite direction when dancing, for example, a hitch with half a turn or it may involve a transfer of weight as in a half turn pivot. Again a key element is ensuring that the dancer knows where to start and where to finish. Another aspect that will help the dancer achieve a good solid turn is to identify what is happening between the start and the finish during the actual turn itself. Breaking the turn down to identify its beginning, middle and end clarifies for the dancer what they need to aim for at each part of the turn. Preparation is key to producing a good turn.

Interestingly, for many line dancers learning to do a full turn is not where the main challenges lie. Unless a line dancer has a condition which impacts on their ability to dance single turns, most dancers find single turns easier to master than three-quarter turns. This has something to do with the challenge of being able to successfully find the finishing wall of any three-quarter turn. Introducing the use of the head or 'spotting' when dancing a single (or more than one) turn helps the dancer to avoid getting dizzy and makes it clear where the dancer is aiming to finish. 'Spotting' involves the dancer focusing on a spot in front of them for as long as possible during the turn before quickly turning the head to catch up with the body and find the original spot again to focus on. With three-quarter turns the difficulty arises because the dancer needs to find a new spot to focus on at the threequarter turn rather than find the same spot used at the start. Developing threequarter turn abilities can take time but it is not impossible even for those who find it initially very challenging. Watch for more tips on turning coming soon.

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A DAY IN THE LIFE OF DAVE BAYCROFT


Addicted to Line dance Dave Baycroft won the CBA Rising Star – one thing is certain though – he is not domesticated and you'll never catch him gardening or cooking
