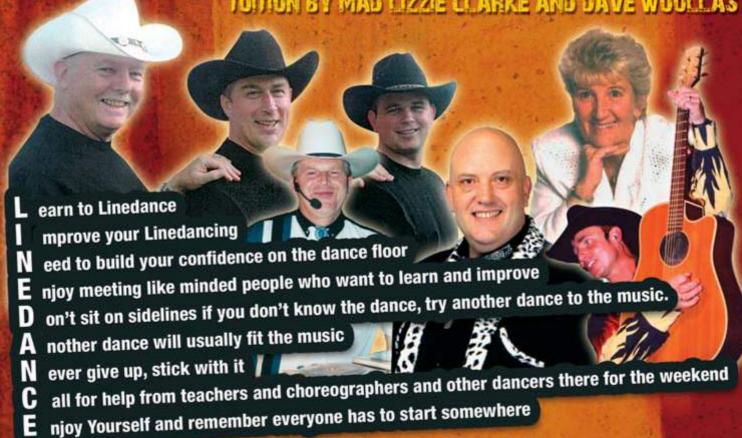




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Dear Dancers

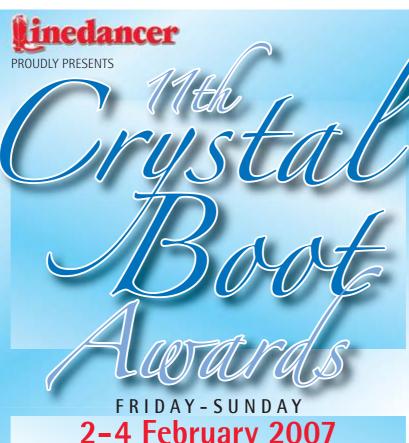

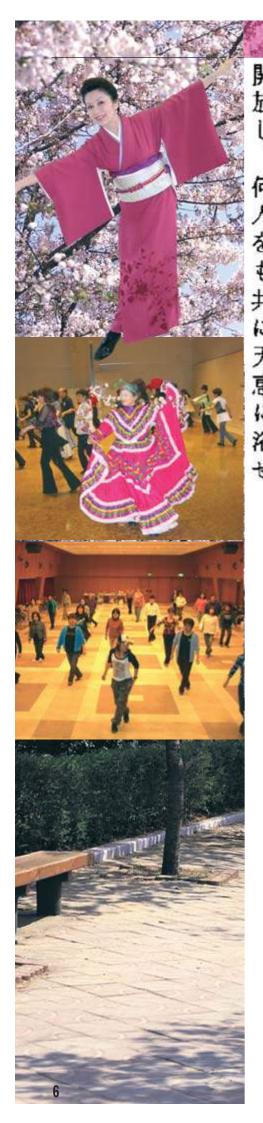

Hanami Dancing

Japan challenges the West in technology, business and since the Fifa World Cup in 2002 sport, but how are the Line dancers competing with the rest of the world? *Lillian Lo* reports from amongst the clouds of the Sakura

A beautiful scene is set in Tokyo towards the end of March as the cherry blossoms, or sakura as they are called by the Japanese, begin to bloom. Traditionally, the Hanami (flower viewing) takes place as locals picnic under the trees. In this picturesque setting the Line dance group Country Drive celebrated their ninth anniversary at the Ikegami Kaikan, a convention centre located in the south west of Tokyo, next to a tranquil temple Honmonji. To enhance a wonderful setting, the temple has a sizeable and wellgroomed Japanese garden. The surroundings were perfect for a Line dance celebration and as the event got underway the occasional breeze carried down sakura petals like pink floral snow - what a delightful sight.

Firstly, let me introduce the Country Drive group. They started as a small group of avid dancers who gathered to review the latest dances. As time passed and interest grew they elected Mr. Shin-ichiro Baba, a lecturer at the Nippon Sports Science University, to lead the group. They like to learn from international professionals, so brought in Scott Belvins from the USA. This year, two new instructors were invited and I was lucky enough to be one of them, along with Ms. Toshiko Kawamoto. We were fresh faces but Country Drive instructor, Baba also taught his own dance, You're Beautiful and demonstrated, You Raise Me Up.

At the evening party, the dance fanatics would not let their weary feet rest but filled the floor in their East meets West outfits of

blond wigs, cowboy boots, kimonos and getas (Japanese costumes and wooden clogs). It was a great fanfare with dancers rocking away to the rhythms of Geek In The Pink, With These Eyes, Crabbuckit, What It Is, Drivin' Me Crazy, Quand'05, The Reel Thing, Replay, Feel So Good, The Last Samba, Busted, Home.

The Country Drive dancers meet twice weekly, five instructors teach them all the current, popular and well choreographed dances. On top of that, they emphasise one Line dance rhythm each month and work on perfecting their dance technique and styling. Doug and Jackie Miranda who have worked with them created a dance that exemplifies their vitality. The dance is called Country Drive.

A dancer who is capable of scooping up a new dance in less than twenty minutes should be thrilled to be in Ms. Iizuka Setsuko and Mr. Kazuhiro Iguchi's advance classes. At each two hour class, they review a couple of dances and introduce some new ones. Setsuko together with her group of instructors run a busy schedule of dance classes of various levels in Tokyo. The popular Iguchi works on a similar timetable.

At a moderate pace, Ms. Yoko Ichikawa's students enjoy both the Country and non-Country Line dances. Recently, in front of 230 Line dancers at Yokosuka Naval Base, Ichikawa, a winner of Australian L/D Championship performed with her group



Cherry Blossoms. Their dance Bicycle Waltz came first at the Japan Country Dance Championship, 2005.

In Nagoya, a flourishing city to the south of Tokyo, the sakura captivated the viewers while Country western dance fans Nagoya Crazy Feet had its monthly meeting. This club, one of the oldest in Japan, has been running for twelve years. Each year, the club puts on a weekend event with various big name instructors. Last year, they had Rachael McEnaney and Paul McAdam. For 2006, they have lined up Barry and Dari Anne Amato. They only meet once a month because their fifty members live all over the Nagoya area. Their twelve instructors meet regularly to vote on the ones they want to introduce. As most dance groups do, they welcome visitors. They might even let foreign visitors try on exquisite kimonos. It is an unusual venture to dance in a heavy multilayered formal kimono which has a half foot wide stiff waist belt that props you up to a perfect posture.

About 15 minutes drive from Nagoya is Tajimi, the town where Martha Ogasawara lives. Martha, an American lady who has lived in Japan for thirty years enjoys linking up Japanese dancers, who do not always speak a lot of English – although they "speak" Line dance, and the rest of the Line dance world. Ten years ago, she started the Monday Babbas class where local dancers gathered to review dances.

In early April, the inaugural workshop of JLDA draws a large crowd. The JLDA (Japan Line Dance Association) is a national organisation for both dancers and instructors who are mostly from the Tokyo area. Until recently, it was called the Japan Country Western Dance Instructors Council and served as a common ground for instructors to exchange information. It organises quarterly dance workshops, instructors training seminars and

will be starting an instructor accreditation program. Its goal is to create cohesiveness in the Line dance community and to foster the growth of this activity in Japan. The association's website www.jcwdic.2.pro.tok2.com provides links to its members' class details.

Alot of Japanese dancers are delighted because they will be able to meet with their much revered Michael Barr and Michelle Burton. Michelle choreographed the exuberant dance America Pop to commemorate her experience at the monthly dance event American Pop Night held at Omori, Tokyo. Mr. Hiro Suzuki of Crazy Feet Tokyo, a veteran in bringing into Japan overseas instructors, will host the workshop of MB2, as they are nicknamed in this country. A few Japanese instructors will also be teaching at the event. They include Ms. Yukiko Ohashi, a multiple winner of the Asian Pacific Dance Championship.

As the weather warms down and the sakura season phases out, Line dance continues in Japan. Aside from Tokyo and Nagoya, it is running strong in some other cities like Sapporo, Sendai, Yusawa and Osaka to name a few.

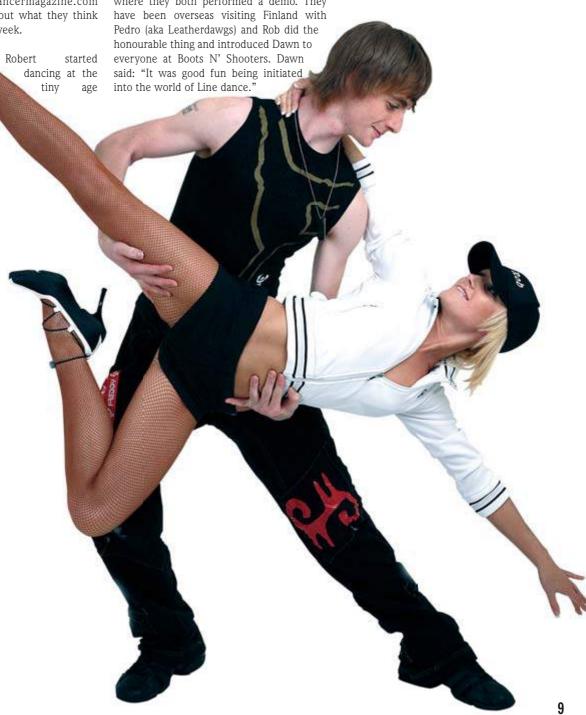

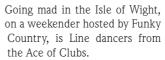




Dancing the April Fool were all those at the Copthorne weekend from Beavercreek Line dance, Horley.

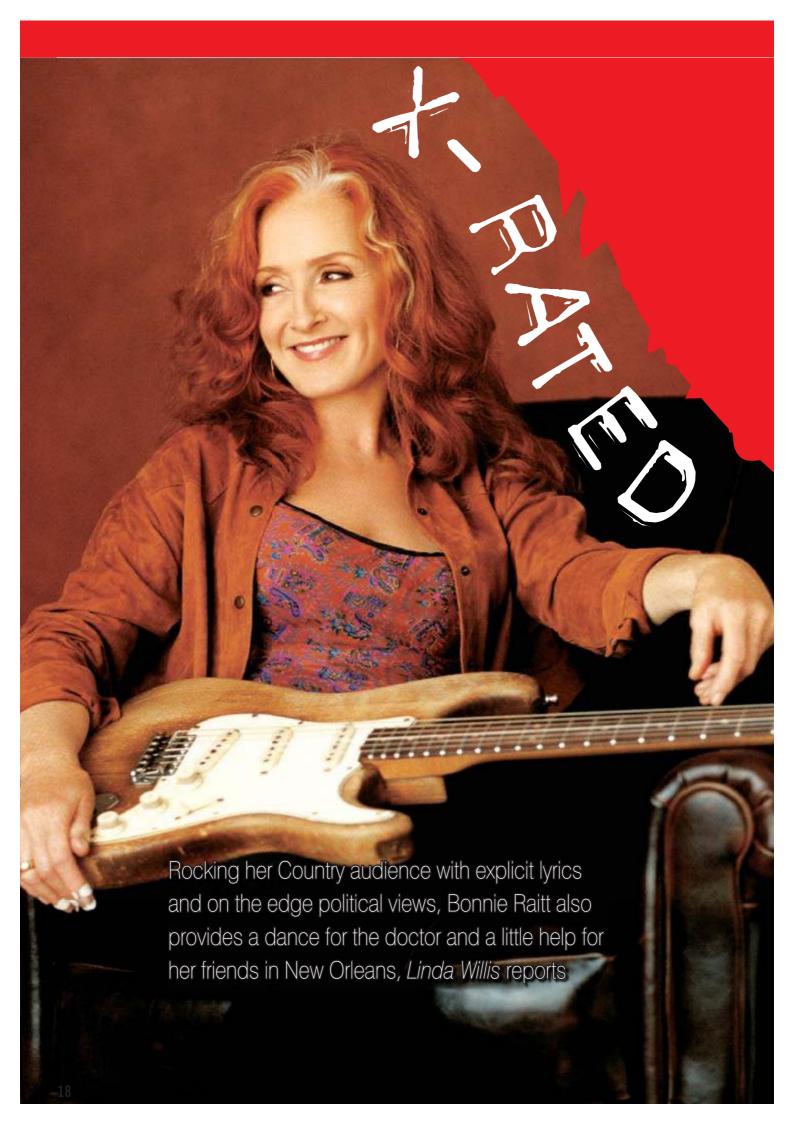

"You gotta do stuff that stretches you," declares Bonnie Raitt. "I'd hang up my spurs if I didn't have something new to play." Something new to play she has indeed. Proof came on Good Friday as the nine-times Grammy Award winner spun a very special spell. Bewitching fans at the Hammersmith Apollo, Bonnie was singing and playing her unique blend of Country, blues and rock 'n roll with soul, accompanied as ever by the brilliant Bonnie Raitt Band.

Flame-haired Bonnie has inspired nearly every female Country artiste I have talked to. Her 18th album, *Souls Alike* has just been released and Bonnie has hit the road to promote it. The album is produced by Bonnie and like her, it grabs you, shakes you down and makes you listen – time and time again.

As far as American music goes, Bonnie is simply an institution. Music runs as naturally as the blood through Bonnie's veins. Daughter of celebrated Broadway singer John Raitt (Carousel, Oklahoma, The Pyjama Game), who passed away in 2005 and singer/pianist Marge Goddard, who died unexpectedly after complications from Alzheimers, she dedicates her music to her parents memory and the extraordinary gifts with which she has been blessed.

Raised in Los Angeles, it was a Christmas gift that sowed the seed for what would become her passion. The gift was a Stella guitar. Her passion – music. In the late '60s she moved East to Cambridge, Massachusetts. As a Harvard/Radcliffe student she attended classes by day, while immersing herself in the City's turbulent cultural and political activities by night.

No surprise really when Bonnie Raitt decided to pack her bags, forsake College life, and commit herself full-time to music, opening for Blues greats like Fred McDowell, Sippie Wallace, Muddy Waters and John Lee Hooker, learning first hand lessons of life and how to put on a show.

And what a show she put on for us. The crowds were cheering before she had even made her way to the mike, pausing momentarily, and waving to an audience she couldn't see yet. "It's dark!" she called. Then, enveloped in brightness, there she stood.

Holding her sapphire blue guitar like a Queen of Rock chic. Big guitar, big hair — big voice. She's a woman with the right amount of attitude. She knows who she is and where she's been and where she's headed.

"Do you like the new album?" she asks. A few random cries of "yes." "Ah — about three of you have heard it," she laughs back. She sits on her stool, starts singing the Cajun shuffle *Two Lights in the Night Time*. "This is my favourite song on the album," she tells us.

I have to admit that I Will Not Be Broken is the one that works for me. Singing it live just reinforced those powerful lyrics with the intensity it deserves. This song has become my mantra.

"It's Good Friday," she smiles. "Thank you for coming out and sharing Easter with us. It's been like Springtime at last today, with the blossom and flowers and the sunshine outside. When I first arrived here about four weeks ago – it was freezing cold."

There is nothing cold about the reception tonight though. Bonnie and her Band had us eating out of their hands. And talking of hands – praise and acclaim must be given to Bonnie's keyboard player whose magic fingers provided some of the best boogie woogie and blues I've ever heard.

Flicking back her hair, she pauses to reflect on the plight of the people of Mississippi, still suffering the effects of Hurricane Katrina. "They need our help all those folks – and enough just isn't being done."

Bonnie changes back to her acoustic guitar, changing pace she is captivating with the gorgeous, jazzy *The Bed I Made*. It's almost painful listening to lyrics that are so heartbreakingly real.

She disappears offstage – but we're having none of that – we are up on our feet. We jump, cheering, clapping, yelling out her name and begging her to come back. Which a few moments later she obligingly does.

"That last song was so sad, it's made me feel sad — and we're not leaving like that," she smiles, dedicating the next song, I'm a Roadrunner Baby to Paul Carrick and his

wife sitting a few rows away from me in the Stalls. It's upbeat and hooky and some of the audience approached the stage wanting to dance in the aisles, but health and safety conscious ushers forced them to boogie in their seats. Even I had trouble sitting down as she belted out her next number — Doctor, Doctor — Give me the news — I've Got a Bad Case of Loving You. Line dancer friendly or what? I was doing it the night before last.

Future plans include, "Just continuing with the tour, TV and guest appearances, and the Grammys, for which I've been nominated. After the Spring tour, we play throughout the summer in the States. Then we may head back to Europe and are planning a New Zealand/Australia tour in winter of '07.

"I'll be continuing my political activism, fundraising to help groups, especially since the devastation of Hurricane Katrina, to deal with the aftermath of flood and earthquakes around the world. We're giving some of our tour proceeds to help with those efforts. We're out promoting alternative energy and independence as well, and running our buses and trucks on bio-diesel fuel. That's keeping us pretty busy."

Unfulfilled ambitions are something that Bonnie says she is, "Working on all the time. To keep striving to live a balanced life, and to have more time truly off — and go deep."

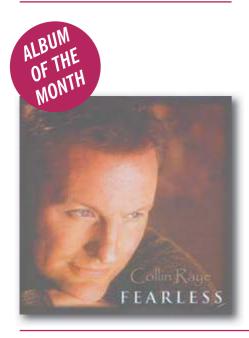

FEARLESS

Collin Raye

ollin Raye is one of my favourite artists and we dance to his music for many years, most notably his song Completely. Rob Fowler wrote a stunning waltz to this track which is still widely danced today. Like many artists Collin has been caught up in the merry go round of label changes in Nashville and this album is released on the independent BSW Records.

The opener *Just Because* (96bpm) is a beautiful cha cha which showcases Collin's wonderful voice. I believe Kate Sala is writing a dance to this track. You've Heard That One Before (132bpm) is one of three songs that Collin co-wrote. This east coast swing is a neat little dance track and it should inspire someone to choreograph a dance to it.

Fearless (74bpm) is the title track and this superb night-club two step will surely have a dance written to it soon. Collin Raye at his best

Young As We're Ever Going To Be (147bpm) is the most up tempo number on the album and is another Collin's own compositions. This will remind you so much of Springsteen's classic track Born To Run. This could be a massive dance hit.

Lady (120bpm) is a fast paced waltz track just like Sundown In Nashville but with a much gentler feel to it, and it is just waiting to tempt you to dance to it.

Makin' Up Time (70bpm) this subtle track starts with gentle piano playing and then a

driving drum beat kicks in. It is another fabulous song and another good danceable track.

To Hot To Sleep (136bpm) kicks off with some awesome guitar picking the crescendos into a cracking Country rocker. Glorious.

Falling In Love Again (90bpm) you will melt away as you listen to this stunning song, a nice paced Country cha cha which is crying out for a good dance.

Something To Say (112bpm) even has a little Country rap on it. This is simply awesome and it will surely have a dance to it soon?

Forever Starts Right Now (70bpm) is another superb night-club two step and Collin's vocals are outstanding on this powerful track. I love this one

My Way (95bpm) yes it is that song, but like you have never heard it before. It is a rumba. Maggie Gallagher has written a brilliant dance to this awesome rendition of Frank Sinatra's classic signature song, and I am sure you will love Collin's version.

The closer *House Of The Rising Sun* (127bpm) is a surprise from Collin and he belts it out in fine style and everything but the kitchen sink is thrown into this track. As it is in time you may find yourself waltzing around the floor.

Collin Raye has delivered a superb album, this could well be a contender for Album of the Year. Don't miss out on it, you won't regret the purchase, Trust me!

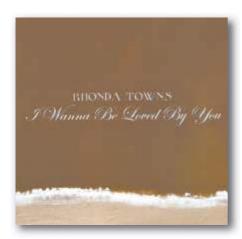

would like to introduce you to Rhonda Towns who has worked hard in recent years to establish her career. She began singing in church at an early age but Rhoda and her family wanted her to get an education before trying her luck as a singer. Her influences include Patsy Cline, Reba, Loretta Lynn, Charley Pride and Vince Gill. This lovely lady has been causing quite a stir in Country music and now Rhonda releases her debut album.

We begin with *Somethin' Better* (70bpm) and Rhonda's beautiful voice is instantly apparent on this gorgeous night-club two step. With the right choreography this could well, be a dance hit.

I Wanna Be Loved By You (120bpm) is an upbeat number, a Country cha cha, which reminds me a little of Jo Dee Messina's Heads Carolina and this one just needs someone to be tempted into writing a dance to it.

Those Were The Nights (89bpm) this is a nice gentle song, in the Ann Murray mould, and if nothing else it would be lovely for the Sway.

The Lords Prayer is just that and Rhonda takes you away to a Gospel church in the Deep South as she sings it.

Storm Before The Calm (133bpm) cool title and cool song! This has a good beat to it along with some nice musical breaks, and this catchy tune is another destined for the dancefloor.

Waiting For You (65bpm) is a nice track, however it is too bouncy for a night-club two step, yet too slow for almost anything else. Never mind you could always just listen to it.

Plenty More Love (149bpm) was written by Karen Staley who used to write for, and be part of, Faith Hill's band. This has a strong Country flavour with the fiddle being very prominent, and it will take you back to those Cajun dances we once did.

I've Heard The Wind Blow Before (96bpm) is a waltz track at an almost perfect pace. It is traditional in style and it is ripe for having a dance written to it.

Go On With Yourself (127bpm) clips along at a nice pace and again, and this has a more traditional feel to it. It would make for a nice beginner dance perhaps?

We end with *Slow Rain* (98bpm) and this is probably my favourite track on the album. Written by Dobie *Drift Away* Gray, this is a good cha cha and would be ideal for classic dances like Stroll Along and Cruising, although it is worthy of its own dance.

This is simply a nice Country album. It is not a classic and it is not filled with rip roaring dance tracks, however, there are some good songs that you can dance to and believe me, if you get a copy of this album, you will be playing long after some of the albums from some of the big names in Country.

ascal Flatts burst on to the Country scene in 2000 with a fine self titled album that spawned a few hits in the US not least the beautiful waltz *I'm Movin' On*, and whilst many thought they were just another flash in the pan, a Country boy band, they have confounded their critics with their success. They now release their fourth album on Lyric Street who have always kept the faith.

Stand (bpm) opens the album and although it starts slowly it soon kicks into a powerful beat and becomes a super dance track. The right way to start.

What Hurts The Most (68bpm) is a stunning night-club two step with powerful vocals and a powerful musical backing that will inspire you to dance with passion to it.

Backwards (122bpm) was co-written by Marcel, a Country star in his own right. This track, a polka, is a mickey take on the mickey take about what you get when you play a Country song backwards. This brilliant take is one of those that could put some fun back into your dancing.

I Feel Bad (66bpm) you know from the first few bars of the piano playing that you are in for something special. This is another awesome night-club two step and it simply must have a dance to it.

My Wish (68bpm) is also a beautiful song at slower paces whilst Pieces (86bpm) is

somewhat livelier and is the only track on the album that the entire band wrote. Both are great tracks.

Yes I Do (82bpm) is a cool contemporary Country song which has a Reggae beat to it and that makes this a wonderful dance prospect.

To Make Her Love Me (62bpm) again slows the tempo and Ellsworth (67bpm) is another that falls into the same category, however as they are both night-club two-steps they will interest those of you who like the slower ones.

Words I Couldn't Say (74bpm) is another strong song both vocally and musically and it would be good as a dance track.

Me And My Gang (108bpm) opens in Peter Frampton style with voice pipe, and this cool Country rocker is probably the hottest dance track on the album.

Cool Things (97bpm) is a nice cha cha at a steady pace with smooth vocals and some strong harmonies and I can no reason why we should not be dancing to this fine track soon.

He Ain't The Leavin' Kind (90bpm) is the final cut and this steady number has good strong dance beat and completes a fine album.

Rascal Flatts have delivered the goods again with *Me And My Gang*. This album sold over 1 million copies in the first week and topped both mainstream and Country charts. Those staggering figures tell you just how good this superb album is and you should grab yourselves a copy now.

hen I received the new album from British Country group Left Hand Drive I knew I would have no hesitation in reviewing the album as their last one was superb. Sadly since the last album drummer Colin Bruton passed away. Colin had managed to lay down all the drum tracks and his family asked the band to finish the album in his memory.

The opening track *Somethin' Happenin' Out There* (120bpm) was like all the tracks written by singer Steve Bidder. This is a good cha cha with a good beat just waiting for a dance.

Goodnight Kiss (94bpm) has a similar beat to Bad Moon on the Rise so it could make a good alternative for Alison Biggs' Bad Moon Rising.

Cuba (120bpm) is a cool track with influences of Mark Knopfler and Brooks and Dunn and with its Cuban rhythm it is sure to be a hit with dancers.

Life's A Peach (108bpm) has some smooth harmonies and clever lyrics with a good hook, all the right ingredients for a good dance track.

Cowboy Movies (96/192bpm) don't we just love those? This is one of the strongest tracks musically, there is some great steel guitar playing on this classy two step.

Paper And A Vow (115bpm) its back to the cha cha beat for another good danceable track on which Steve's vocals are excellent.

 $\it Stranger~(102/204bpm)$ is also a two step albeit much faster than the other one. Once

Blue Bell Blue (120bpm) also has a beat which you know from the opening few bars will be a good dance track.

Big Light (86bpm) made me think of Peter Kay. Steve's harmonica playing enriches this superb track and once again it is a damn fine dance track.

When He Drives That Car (122bpm) with the staccato beat, the vocal delivery, and the haunting guitar, this one would be right at home on a Dire Straits album.

Wishin' (118bpm) this track is awash with acoustic guitars and is quite different from all the other tracks showing the great diversity of the band and I love it.

The closing track *Trust Me, I'm A Drummer* (120bpm) is rather poignant as the late Colin Bruton not only does a great job playing drums but he sings a mean vocal too. With its title it can't fail, Trust Me, I'm a DJ!

It is rare to get a British Country band that writes all their own material and therefore you have to applaud Left Hand Drive. Whilst this is a really good album, if the band had been shipped of to Nashville and had the likes of Dan Huff producing them, this album would be as good as most of the stuff coming out from big names in the business. Enjoy Learning to

With a group of people who had never tried it

just how much fun Line dance can be

before, Sho Botham showed some true beginners

he weekend at The Earnley Concourse, Chichester certainly lived up to the course name 'Enjoy Learning to Line Dance'. Aimed at absolute beginners and improvers wanting to review the basics, we had a lovely group of 20 ladies from as far afield as Lincolnshire all keen to enjoy learning to Line dance. Most of the group were absolute beginners, starting from scratch.

My husband, Josh and I had not been to Earnley before but the brochure promised all sorts. There was everything from languages and arts to bird watching and digital imaging. We were, of course, happy to share our Line dance knowledge.

We met many people who returned year after year and they all spoke highly of the courses, ambiance and the quality of the food. All meals and refreshments at tea breaks are included in the cost. It would be very easy to go home several pounds heavier than you arrived - thank goodness for the Line dancing

Apart from the enjoyment factor, the aim of our course was to provide a good foundation of basic movements, steps, terminology, rhythms and some beginner Having a whole weekend meant time was on our side. It was possible to teach the various aspects separately giving the group the opportunity to deal with each skill individually and build up the skills gradually. I choreographed four Line dances for the course with the purpose of introducing specific elements and skills in a structured manner.

On Friday evening, we met the participants and introduced them to the course. Each

person filled in a short health questionnaire. The first movement session began on Saturday. We warmed up the mind and the body by introducing basic Line dance moves and Line dance terminology. Getting to know what the movements and steps are called right from the start helps to build confidence and understanding in a newcomer. Remember how it felt when you seemed like the only one who didn't know a weave from a jazz box? Here, everyone was able to practise and become familiar with dancing individual steps and then with linking a couple of steps together to music.

The second session explored some of the popular rhythms used in Line dancing. As with the steps and movements earlier, we were able to introduce the rhythms separately. We had fun exploring Waltz, Cha Cha, Rumba and Mambo rhythms. By the end of the session everyone was ready to tackle some starter Line dances.

That afternoon, building on their newly acquired skills, we did a short warm up before introducing some beginner dances. As expected, the group picked up the dances quickly because they were already familiar with the steps and movements. They had the building blocks and so, all they needed to do was put them together—hey presto — they had a dance.

We taught Waltz One, a 24 count, four wall dance that introduces Line dance beginners to basic waltzing action and the concept of moving on to the next wall. Cha Cha One a 32 count, two wall dance, introduced the basics of a half turn pivot and the group tackled this really well. A simplified version



of Symphony Shuffle was taught as a two wall dance and then as a contra Line for those wanting an extra bit of fun or a challenge. The ladies danced in contra lines as if they were seasoned performers and we were all very impressed. The variety of dances helped everyone to remember which dance was which and we danced each of them a few times.

As with any new physical activity it is likely that muscles will be used in different ways and can result in post exercise stiffness. So to avoid exercise overload the second session of the afternoon was a titled the 'Relax and Refresh' hour. We explored some simple techniques for easing out the muscles of the feet and legs after dancing. We found the spikey balls, foot rollers and massaging toys encouraged laughter and smiles around the room.

After a break for dinner, we headed back to the studio for an hour to chat about the day and to try out the dances learned. Following a brief warm up and recap of the dances the ladies were able to get right back into gear dancing to different tracks and tempo. It was clear that everyone had progressed and achieved a lot in one day. Josh and I got roped into demonstrating a couple of Line dances just before finishing for the day.

Sunday's first session warmed everyone up and then covered a few more basic Line dance steps before getting down to learning some more dances. Everyone laughed when I told them about the little rhyme I say at the end of The Freeze for doing the rocks and the turn 'will we, won't we, yes we will'. Soon we were all chanting it each time we got

to the rocks and turn. Earnley Rumba a 32 count, one wall dance, slowed the tempo and encouraged the dancers to think about the quality of movement and how to make the most of the slow and quick counts. Mambo Shuffle a 32 count, one wall dance, upped the tempo again and got everyone moving and clapping. We even managed to add some fun alternatives for the clapping for anyone who wanted to try a bit of variety and saw some fab shimmies and wiggles being done.

The second session on Sunday gave us the chance to update Symphony Shuffle to the full version before giving everyone the opportunity to listen to tracks and to try and decide which dance to do. Encouraging dancers to develop this skill helps them when they are playing music at home and want to practise Line dancing. We encouraged a couple of floor split dances to help the dancers get used to having more than one dance on the floor at one time and they coped with this extremely well.

After another lovely lunch the final session of the weekend was spent dancing all the dances through to various tracks and the spare few minutes towards the end of the session was spent learning - what else - Electric Slide. A couple of people interested in attending a future course came in to watch for a few minutes and were amazed how much everyone had achieved in a short space of time. Josh and I demonstrated another couple of dances and then it was time to say our goodbyes. With the number of requests to do a followup course and to repeat this one I suspect like so many others who visit Earnley, we too will be returning.

all began

ick and Geneva Matteis introduced Line dance to the UK and Europe many years ago. They had an advantage because they had been through all the growing pains of this dance form in the US. Back in January 1997 Linedancer published a teacher feature 'Q&A with D&G'. We thought we would put them back in the hot seat to see what has changed in the past ten years.

Geneva said: "We are proud to have been an influence on so many people who have made dance into a career – among whom are Rob Fowler, Roy Hadisubroto and Liz Clarke. We remember telling our students in the UK years ago that now we have shown you this, when we come back we want you to show us. And they have.

"As long as we are physically able we will still enjoy dancing. Life without dance would be very empty, whether participating or just watching," she adds.

Back in the late nineties Dick and Geneva taught at The Rhinestone Cowboy in Hayes, Virginia, Dick says: "Like most clubs it has gone. When club owners think more money can be made in other ways they move on to something else. It is presently a jazz club. We were given a memento from the club when it changed — a long horn steer head decked out with neon lights. It hangs in our entertainment room. We live in Orlando, Florida now and enjoy dancing at a real honest to goodness Country Western honky tonk called The Barn in the town of Sanford."

What key moments stick in your memory from the past 10 years?

- 1. Getting to teach and lead our dance, Horsin' Around, on stage with the band Confederate Railroad in person as they played their song, Trashy Women.
- 2. The British Line dancers at their first World Championships sweeping the awards.

Have you got a best moment?

Getting married at Eastnor Castle in Herefordshire with over 100 dancer from around the UK and Europe in attendance. We had a Country DJ, band and, yes, we had a Country western dance at the castle.



When you first started introducing Line dance to the UK it was an underground scene - lately we have seen Line dancers in lots of TV shows and the media coverage is growing. It seems Line dancing is everywhere - did you know what you were starting?

Many years ago we tried time and time again to get media coverage for Line dancing, having contacted Simon Betts, producer of Come Dancing, but to no avail. He did at one point come to Barton Hall to our dance event to watch the competition. It just wasn't the right time but it did set the stage for what is happening now.

We didn't live in the UK so we started the D&G school—it was a way to keep the dancing alive and going when we were not there. We tried to give the instructors a good foundation to work with, which we could not have done without the help of some exceptional people. The current directors, Brian and Anne Bambury, are examples of that process, that has evolved and surpassed our wildest dreams. We are extremely pleased.

Are you sad that Line dancing has moved away from the Country and Western style? Are you fond of the dances that use other genres of music?

Yes and no. Using music outside Country has brought in the younger dancers, but



sometimes the music choices go a little too far. Country music goes in cycles and sometimes it is more danceable than others. We think that dance events organisers should be aware of the balance of music choices used so as to appeal to all dancers.

Your first teach was at Hemsby in 1984 and the dance was The Freeze. Have you been back to Hemsby since and do you still teach the The Freeze?

We certainly remember teaching The Freeze. We taught at Hemsby for many years since 1984 and always included The Freeze, which was an easy dance for absolute beginners. Some of the D&G instructors still teach at Hemsby. In the summer we travel to various camping resorts to DJ and teach Line dance and many times we will teach The Freeze.

What changes do you see in the dances over the past ten years? Are the steps more complicated, dances longer or presented differently?

Yes, yes and yes. Dances are presenting more challenges. However, many classes are losing students because they find the steps too complicated and the body movements too difficult. Most students just want an enjoyable social evening out.

In 1996, hardly anyone had access to the internet. It is now a essential part of every household – how great has this tool been for Line dance?

We think the internet is wonderful. We remember how difficult it was to find dance

steps. We relied many times on word of mouth and like the old game, "Gossip", by the time we heard it the steps were changed. The internet keeps everyone up to date in the dance world at a moment's notice.

Favourite dances in 1997

Geneva – Swamp Thing and Hip Hop Dick – Horsin' Around

Favourite dances in 2006

Geneva – I don't have any single favourites right now. I just like to get up and dance whatever is being done.

Dick – Loves Horsin' Around and an absolute beginner dance, Fuzzy Duck, which he teaches at the camping resorts.

ine dancers have always enjoyed live music. Back in 1996 Dave Sheriff was one of the most popular acts on the circuit. Today, Dave still enjoys the classics: "I still include Playa Silencio (for Stroll Along or County Line) and Strut Your Stuff (for Cowboy Strut) and many songs from the Love to Line Dance album including Matador, Cruisin and Oasis (for Black Coffee).

Dave writes original material that appeals to the dancer: "When I started writing music

"I think my music would have gone a lot further if we still had CMT. I actually had three videos playing on CMT when it finished. When you go to Fanfare in Nashville and see all the youngsters singing along with all the new songs, it can only be due to the music being played on the media, which we are not allowed in the UK."

It was unfortunate that CMT left the European screen – could that have made more UK Country stars?

for Line dancing it was because there was difficulty obtaining some of the music from the USA. I began by writing alternative music for the dances using a dance script. This meant I was able to make the dance more interesting, by phrasing it to the dance.

"When I write a song now, it's usually from a line that someone has said or something that most people can associate with that I can build a story around like *Overworked and Underpaid*, my new album which I recorded in Nashville in February."

"Back in 1996 Line Dancing artistes were frowned upon. Country bands would say stuff like 'Line dancers don't listen to the words' and 'Line dancers don't appreciate the music, they would dance to a drum machine'. I think the success that I had in the early years proved that this wasn't the case. My music was emerging as the original music for the dances that were being choreographed, and other acts quickly started to write original material, so I suppose I was a bit of a pioneer"

Dave appreciates his audience: "I have a lot to thank Line dancers for - they realised what I was trying to achieve - and gave me a lot of support. When I sponsored the first Dave Sheriff Choreography Competition with Linedancer Magazine we had tremendous reaction. I had this idea of promoting my music and at the same time encouraging talented choreographers to come forward. I put up £1000 prize money for the top dance - this was where Red Hot Salsa came from. Christina Browne entered her dance choreographed to my song When You Move That Way. The new song and the dance have become classics - I have just licensed the track for a compilation in Singapore - so it's still doing the rounds!"

With a jam packed career the past decade has left some cherished memories with Dave: "My gigs are full of happy memories, when I see the floor full of dancers all doing the same dance to music that I have created – that gives me a real buzz but I think the great atmosphere at the Choreography Competitions at the Floral Hall, Joe Thompson presenting me with the



Dave was always known for getting up on the dancefloor but more recently he has branched out: "Since spending more time in Spain (not permanent), Chris and I have been learning Ballroom and Latin dancing which we both enjoy. I have actually made two CDs for sequence dancing. I have always tried to learn a few dances to give me a better insight into writing the music."

"I like to think $\it Line dancer$ and Dave Sheriff grew up together – I remember doing the gig

"The music has changed drastically – it seems Line dancing as I knew it 10 years ago has almost gone 'underground' – with a few exceptions of course!

"I'd like to pay tribute to Betty, Steve and all the team for all the hard work they've put in catering for all the varying styles of dance and music – fair play to you! – it's a job that I couldn't have done – Happy Birthday *Linedancer*!"

Our firs June 1996 Linedancer is launched – a 28 page

magazine dedicated to Line dancing - priced at £1.50.

The first ever Stepping off the Page included The Boogie Bop, The Texas Twist, Country Boy II and Nightlife Slide.

August 1996

The first ever well known Line dancer to appear on the front cover was Rob Fowler with his wife Michelle.

Ten years ago when the Magazine began it was a gamble but it has definitely paid off. Being the first colour magazine for Line dancing it made good sense to look there for knowledge and use it as a way to advertise events. I met Betty when I was awarded UK Instructor of the Year at the first Crystal Boot Awards. The same year Helen O'Mally won Dance of the Year with Black Coffee and Max Perry won International Instructor. The Awards have become a major part of the Line dance calendar and I am privileged to have won ten.

Elsewhere, we have seen the attitude of those involved with competitions change, bringing them from a street sport to a level unsurpassed by any other. We are losing the 'hay bale' image and becoming recognised in a way Line dance deserves. The magazine has been the back bone of this transition. Through the revolution and amalgamation of dance styles Betty has kept an open mind, she has been a friend and has helped to promote Masters in Line to make it the biggest Line dance organisation in the world. September 1996

By issue four, the magazine had grown and was printed with 36 pages. That issue featured Dance teacher Liz Clarke – Liz was in the kitchen and talked about her job in a funeral parlour!

All aboard

Are we still taking a Busman's holiday to Tenerife?

Line dance lessons in the sun is a regular occurrence these days, but back when the magazine started who was our first overseas encounter with?

A Line dance holiday then was taken on the island of Tenerife, where Steven and Julie introduced holiday makers to the Tush Push and "easy, fun" dances like Strokin and Four Wheel Drive. In 1996, their regular spot was at the Acapulco, so where can we find them today?

"We've been at the Hyde Park Corner bar for a year and a half. We don't have classes, but get Line dancers in most nights. Our favourites at the moment are Speak To The Sky, Mister Mom and Remember When," says Julie.

"People come out here with their own music from the different clubs around the UK but, the old classics always stick, like Fly Like A Bird, Black Coffee, Cruisin'.

"A lot has changed in the last ten years. Most people nowadays are aware of Line dancing. In 1996, it was all very new to people. It attracted a lot of curiosity and everyone wanted to give it a try. Most of our visitors went home from their holidays and joined classes. Nowadays, non-line dancers are more reluctant to get up and give it a try as things have got more complicated."

What is the biggest changes to the scene in Tenerife?

"People just seem to do their own thing. There doesn't seem any need to teach any more. I think in the olden days our teaching was aimed at trying to get everyone involved. Today, Line dancers have huge repertoires, it used to be that you only had to remember a few steps and it was a lot easier."

"We used to dress up in all the gear every night, string ties, collar tips, fringed shirts etc. Back then, people used to enjoy dressing



up and it was part of the scene. Nowadays people dance to all types of music so the western gear doesn't really fit the part any more."

One thing that has always remained are the friendships: "A lot of the people who come to the bar meet up every year and dance together most of the night," says Julie.

So if you are going to Tenerife for a Line dance what can you expect to find at Hyde Park Corner?

"We have to cater for everyone in the bar. We try to create an atmosphere where Line dancers are very welcome and non Line dancers can sit back and enjoy the live music.

"Steven learns all the popular songs . At the moment he is busy organising the forthcoming UK tour. (see website www.steven-towers.de for details). During the tour we meet up with people we've met from the past 20 years in Tenerife. Its great, many of them tell us that if it hadn't have been for their holiday with us they would never had got into Line dancing."



eadliners, Steve and Yvonne Dunn, are household names on the competition scene. During the past ten years they have helped to begin a revolution in the standard of Line dance, ProAm and Couples. Yvonne said: "The main change has to be the fact that when it started the competitions were all about raw talent. There was no mention of trained dancers but now people are very technical and versatile."

Headliners have trained many World Champions and are proud to have made their mark on the competition floor: Steve said: "Our very first student was Jenny Stephenson (World Champion 2006), we are pleased to have been so involved in helping the Europeans compete and even surpass the Americans. It is a great feeling to compete against exceptional dancers like Robert Royston. Line dance tends to feed the ProAm division and we have experienced more and more people seeing what else they can do and then wanting to train hard to take part."

The Dunns started in Ballroom and brought technical ability to the Line dance floor: "It is a must now for competitors to have private lessons. The standard has got so high you have to put much more effort into training. The judges are looking for performance, technical ability, entertainment and many other qualities," adds Yvonne.

Daughter Siobhan was once the youngest British competitor to win at Worlds. She still dances, saying: "I am always dancing in the shops when I hear music I just can't stop myself."

"I think for me the biggest change has to be the outfits. We use to wear the hats and boots, although we still wear them there is much more variety today." With a dance studio in her back garden, Siobhan was intially trained in Wirral by her mum and dad. These days she is not restricted to dancing in the UK: "Travel has become much cheaper. I travel to Holland once a fortnight to train with Louis van Haltem and I compete once a month."

Siobhan danced at the World CDF European Championships at the end of April and won. This win means that Siobhan now qualifies as the newest/youngest Rising Star.

The whole family are dancing superstars and have many precious moments from the past ten years. For Siobhan her best achievement so far was winning Worlds 2006, she was placed first in the Line Showcase Teen Division.

For the Dunn family the tradition doesn't end there... Meet Zara. She is the four year old who hasn't yet stepped onto the competition floor but she showed me her moves. Zara already knows one dance and has the outfit, she loves dressing up and wants to be like her big sister. I think we can be sure she has a very promsing future

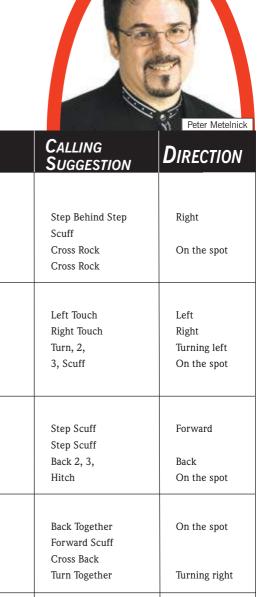

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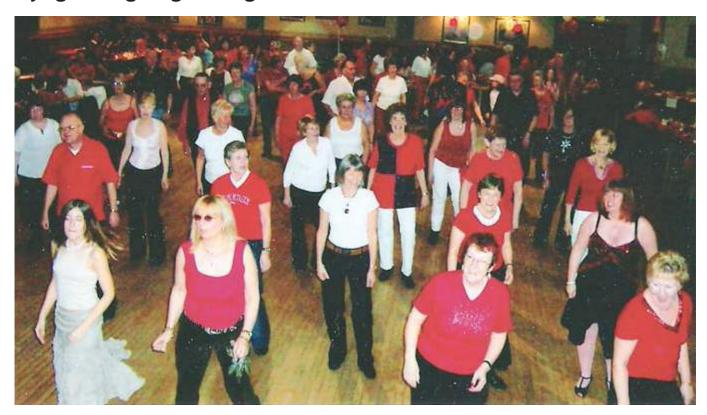
Elderly care

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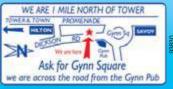

Appropriate dance endings

I agree strongly with most the points made by Tim Ruzgar about dance scripts (May Linedancer), specifically that scripts should be carefully and accurately written.

However, I disagree on one point. I like an appropriate ending to a dance so that it finishes neatly, ideally facing the front wall. Usually, endings are simple but improve the feel of the dance — a good ending is nearly as important as a good beginning — what do others think?

Am I unusual in the way I learn new dances? I like to count, not just from 1 to 8, but from 1 to 32 or 1 to 64 or whatever. This helps me remember what comes after what, it helps me keep on the correct beat, especially beneficial for "off beat" dances. It

also helps me to learn reasonably quickly (the only downside of learning quickly is that it is just as easy to forget quickly)

Finally, but linking with the first point about dance scripts: At socials it is so much nicer if dances (or at least the music) are introduced ideally with the start called (5,6,7,8) In this area we seem to have the best and the worst, ranging from excellent introductions (including the singer's name, for example) to socials where the music starts without any introduction whatsoever (leading often, of course, to a chaotic start)

As in life, standards in line dancing vary rather too much.

Sho's DANCE Rhythm Clinic Rhythm in Line



Sho Botham looks back at one of the greatest dancers of all time to find an internal rhythm we can use in Line

I love the quotation by Gene Kelly, one of the world's greatest dancers. It says so much about the rhythm and dance that is within all of us.

In Line dancing we move to the rhythms of the music rather than our own internal The speed, mood and rhythm rhvthms. of the music influences both the creative content and the performance. Music is a very powerful medium. It can make us feel happy or sad, energised or worn out. It can lift our spirits after a long hard day. Add this to the feel good factor that we can get from dancing and you really have the makings of the wow factor.

Our internal rhythms are based on the regular repetition of the heartbeat. The speed of the gentle lub dub lub dub action of the heart pumping blood around our body can be calculated at various pulse points in beats per minute (bpm). Similarly, the music we dance to can be counted in bpm. Knowing the bpm tells us the tempo or speed of the dance even where we have not heard the piece of music. This is also helpful when we are looking for a suitable, alternative music track for a dance. Basically, the more beats per minute, the faster the music.

Knowing the tempo that the music is played at does not tell us the specific rhythm of the dance such as Cha Cha Cha, Rumba or Waltz. We can recognise rhythms by listening to the music although some are easier to identify than others. The three beats to the bar (3/4)of Waltz music makes it easier to identify than some of the other rhythms, especially if the first count of the bar is strongly accented.



"Long before the dawn of history, long before he could sing or even speak, man danced. Moving to his own internal rhythms, the pounding of his heart, the beating of his pulse, primitive man discovered dance. It is within us, always."

Dances to 4/4 or music with four beats in the bar may not be absolutely clear as to what the rhythm is. Dances such as Cha Cha Cha and Rumba, for example, are both danced to 4/4 music. In Line dancing it is perfectly possible to see a Cha Cha and a Rumba danced to the same track of music especially where the Latin American style of Cha Cha Cha rhythm is not being followed.

If we take a moment to think about how Cha Cha rhythm is used in Line dancing we find that there are two distinct ways of counting. There is the on-beat method where the chacha cha occurs on 3and4 in dances such as Stroll Along Cha Cha and Lady Cha. In this method a Cha Cha basic would be counted as 1 2 3and4. The other type of Cha Cha accentuates the offbeat as we see in the Latin American style Cha Cha Cha. Instead of the cha cha basic being counted as above, it becomes 2 3 4and1. So the Cha Cha Cha action is danced on 4and1 and not 3and4 as before. Probably the most well known Line dance cha cha that uses this offbeat rhythm is Islands in the Stream.

Many dancers and instructors found the shift from on to offbeat very challenging at first and this led to some interesting scenarios on many dancefloors. Some Line dances mix on and offbeat rhythms in the same dance. La Tenga is one that comes to mind with the Cha Cha rhythm in the first half being danced onbeat and in the second, offbeat.

Examining the step sheet can also help us to know more about the rhythm of a dance. It may be as obvious as reading the name of the dance, for example, Rumba Heat or Brokeback Waltz. Or we may need to look closely at the counting to identify the patterns and accents such as what counts the Cha Cha actions are danced on. Understanding more about the rhythms of Line dances that we learn can often help us to make better sense of the trickier steps and dance sections.

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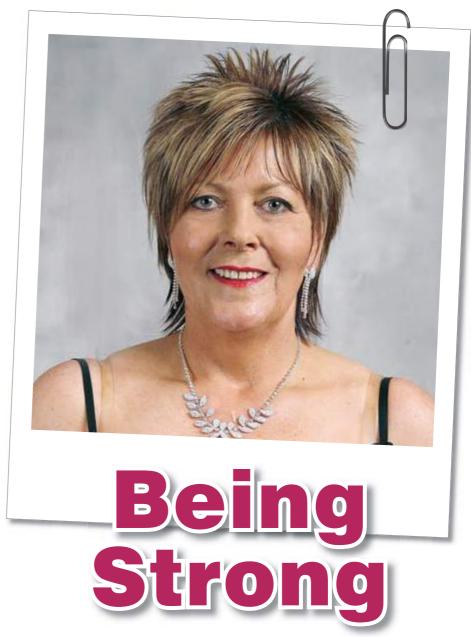
A DAY IN THE LIFE OF AUDREY WATSON
