

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
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Standing on stage is a musical life filled with treasure – **Dolly Parton** is a country legend. Richard Lackey tells Linedancer what it is like to hear the songs of this sweet girl from the Tennessee mountains.

t is a rare treat to find yourself in the company of a truly unique talent. And that is what Dolly Parton is – a bona fide megastar, with big hair, bigger breasts, and an even bigger heart.

The Country legend came to Manchester as part of her European 2007 tour, and shared with the audience almost two hours of songs from her glittering career.

And considering this was her first world tour in many years, visiting a staggering 17 cities in 21 dates, for a 61-year-old, she puts most pensioners to shame.

As soon as some pumped-up, dance mixes of Dolly's hits kicked in, the audience went absolutely ecstatic – but it was only a taster for what was to come.

The moment the award winning superstar popped up from beneath the stage, wearing a little, sparkling white number, the sold-out arena erupted in rapturous applause, and this was before she had even sung a single note.

All the hits were present and more, including Jolene, Here You Come Again and Baby, I'm Burning, and with them came the inevitable glitz, glam, and razzmatazz you would expect from a Dolly Parton concert.

But, I have to admit, there were far less costume changes than I had anticipated from such a flamboyant star.

Tonight was less about the physical attributes of the performer, (although she did look fabulous in her two dazzling outfits), and more about Dolly Parton the musician, the songwriter and the storyteller. And boy, does she tell some stories.

In between songs Dolly shared jokes, blissful memories of her childhood in Tennessee, being the fourth of twelve siblings, and spoke of the dear love she holds for her mother and father, before dedicating Coat of Many Colours and My Tennessee Mountain Home to them respectively.

The stories, however, didn't stop there, and almost all of her songs performed tonight told a fable of some sort or another. In particular,

These Old Bones, about a fortune-teller reunited with her child who was taken away from her because the locals thought she was an unfit mother, sticks in the memory and didn't fail to plant a little smile on the face.

Tune after tune, some I had never had the pleasure of hearing before, were rich in melody, and lyrically enlightening.

More surprisingly was her voice, which was powerful and sincere, particularly on the stripped down versions of The Grass Is Blue and Little Sparrow. For someone so tiny, this girl has one set of lungs on her!

And I never realised just how many instruments she could play, mastering the piano, the recorder, the harmonica, and the fiddle – at times all in the one song.

The hits kept on coming, with Islands In The Stream (a duet with one of her musicians) proving to be the most popular with the audience. Sitting a few seats away, Betty Drummond couldn't contain herself when she heard the opening chords of the song. At the Crystal Boot Awards last month Betty presented the highest honour in the line dance world when 'Islands' won Dance of the Decade. Betty later said, "Seeing Dolly perform this song live was beyond a dream come true, I felt very honoured to be in the audience. This song and dance has been a major influence and a source of untold joy for dancers all over the world." I Dreamed About Elvis (with an Elvis impersonator), 9 To 5 and I Will Always Love You inevitably drew further cheers from the crowd and were performed with energy and passion.

At the beginning of the show Dolly encouraged everyone to sing along, to clap and to enjoy themselves. "I want you to have a good time," she said. "I know how much those tickets cost and believe me, I appreciate every dime," she added with a cheeky smile. "Lord knows, I really need the money" she giggled. Then, stepping back and gesturing to her fantastic look she teased the audience, "You know it costs a lot of money to make someone look this cheap," and this, along with her many references to the cosmetic work she has had over the years, set the tone for the whole evening.



Tonight was about fun and having a good time, but with a tongue always in the cheek.

However, behind the campery and the wigs lies a genuinely warm-hearted person, who is in touch with her audience and despite all her successes, displays not an ounce of arrogance.

Dolly Parton is almost not a real person. She is more like a great imaginary figure, like a Disney character, or a beautiful princess from a fairy story.

To have her right in front of your eyes was somewhat surreal, but amazing all the same. You just wanted to run on stage and give her a great big hug.


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Stars and their


Dance, relating to all forms of dancing from Salsa to Tap. So naturally Line dance had to

Looking back, who could have predicted that a six week trial session would lead to this. Ten blissful years later and forty years of marriage – well done guys.







a corner. And with red lettering full of swirling effects, it must have looked like fireworks on the newsagent shop shelf.

The first volume of "Stepping Off The Page" was introduced by Betty in Dear Dancers and contained 36 dances from June to December 1996. Linedancer Awards for 1997 are also alluded to and the voting that was soon to follow.

Three busy Grapevine and Charity pages that month and Luke Towers features on page four doing a Tush Push. Not so extraordinary until you realise he is three weeks old. The Towers lived in Tenerife and maybe Luke is still line dancing? As for Charity, it is still worthy of note that in Dublin on 12th April 1997, Helen O Malley organised a marathon event that raked in \pounds 49.000 in just one day. A lot of money now and a huge amount then.

The fascination with everything US carried on page 15 with "Letter from America" and this half page travelogue gave some good dancing spot hints at different places namely Washington and Disneyland to name but two.

The Bellamy Brothers give us a short interview on page 19 with news of an imminent tour of the UK. They acknowledge their debt

of gratitude to line dance and talk about their favourite album and influences.

Then and now at the Southport Floral Hall on page 27 compare dancers of the 1930's and of the late Nineties. This was done on the back of an event Linedancer Magazine hosted with Scooter Lee. The article looked at Scooter's enduring charm and ability of filling a dance floor much as big band did 40 years before her.

We meet more young dancers in Youth zone on page 29 and I am always wondering "Where are they now?" so Georgina , Ronnie, Katherine, Sheena, Zoe, Andrew, Alison, Samantha, Clair, if you read this today get in touch and tell us what you are up to, it would be nice

AND THEN on page 32-33 Record breaking news! A huge crowd of 4500 line dancers met in Warrington to attempt the first original record breaker line dance numbers in the world. Seemed they managed it. Cheryl Baker from the BBC Record Breakers was apparently astounded at the popularity of line dance.

Alan was looking for issue one, two and three in BTL on page 44, wondering if he got lucky?

Ten dances published that month and amongst them you could learn Smokin' Cowboy by Rodeo Ruth, All Shook Up by Naomi Fleetwood, Summertime Cha Cha by Max Perry and Merry Go Round by Joanne Brady.

Six pages of Stomping Ground chock-a-block with places where you could go dancing all over UK closed a particularily colourful and vibrant edition of the Linedancer Magazine for May 1997.

Chasing Rainbows on the Costa Blanca



We were all practising line dancers, choreographers, instructors, judges and now event directors. We teamed up with likeminded teachers and organisations around the world to push and promote line dancing, always putting it first.

We are now confident that we have achieved all our original objectives. The next question has to be "Where do we go from here"?

The future has to be the development of line dance to all areas of the world, working a lot closer to other organisations whom we are in talks with to avoid any conflicts for the benefits of the dancers overall, we are very excited about this.

This expansion will be implemented in many forms such as education, employment, early learning with promotion in schools beginning with the UK but soon to spread worldwide, our website management and online facilities will be growing considerably to deal with our new objectives and demands.

Due to our planned expansion one of the first things you may notice is a growth in the Masters in Line team in General, we feel its time to implement our top Line dancers into the team, giving them the opportunity to learn the ropes and educate them, using our own experience. This will begin this year with the noticeable addition of Gareth Mole, Sydney Smyth and Carly Haworth (last years Invitational and All Stars winners), they will join us at some of our events and we will let them do what they do best, dance.

Our aim is to further their education, aid them in setting their own goals and ambitions while keeping our strong values, approachability, professionalism, remaining friendly and fun.

Another way forward will be education, as early as April we will embark on a ten year plan of education, so that parents, students, instructors, judges and more, all develop a better understanding of each other and everyone is able to dance from the same script.

A massive problem in line dance is we lose some of our most talented dancers because of outside work demands.

Another problem is instructors and students from all corners of the world crying out for top quality instructors and competition trainers to help them complete.

Our aim is to introduce an education system that will combat this.

Any dancer or parent of any age will be able to learn our new syllabus which is fully comprehensive and will introduce set levels of dance that all will be encouraged to attain.

Pre Bronze, Bronze, Silver, Gold – these levels you will have seen elsewhere, such as in ballroom, ballet and sometimes in social line dance where a dancer would simply do their required dance steps not really understanding what they are doing.

can bring the right people together to form solutions to existing problems.

We are very active in a new project to bring line dancing into schools using the training Anyone needing top quality instructors, dancers or judges will be able to check our website and find the right person they are looking for.

We will also be adding:

A ranking system for all competitors with a top prize given at Worlds.

A dance loyalty scheme for all dancers, similar to an air miles system, where dancers who attend our events get the opportunity to earn extra privileges.

A new travel company which can arrange travel to and from any Masters event will also be set up making, joining the Masters anywhere in the world much easier.

The Ten Year Plan is already in action and we are all very excited for the future and looking forward to the next ten years, meanwhile we hope you enjoy the ride.

MASTERS IN LINE

This has never been done on a worldwide scale in depth and now each level will have five modules showing different styles of dance, Smooth, Lilt, Funky, Cuban, Rise & Fall. Each dancer has to take the module, gain an achievement certificate and only then be entered for that level of dance exam.

When a dancer has reached Gold Level, they can decide if they wish to continue their training and if they so wish, learn to be an instructor or a judge.

The Instructor Exam will be in two levels:
As an instructor they will be able to teach in public with knowledge of dance using technical equipment, amp, microphones, mixers, lighting etc.

Also if they wish to take the advanced instructor level that they will be offered, they will have to attain skills that they can choreograph, teach students how to break down their technique and also teach confidently to different audiences.

A dancer who has achieved instructor level will also be able to take the judges exams. Once the first exam has been passed the dancer will be known as a Master Judge. They will be able to judge any Masters In Line competition in the World.

The highest level that can be attained is "Masters Head Judge", this will be recognised all over the world as the highest accolade in the Masters competition circuit.

At Masters In Line, we would like to think that if a competitor looks at the judges they will totally respect them and their unbiased opinion and feel more encouraged to dance well.

This is something we have believed from the start and will continue to strive for in the future.

We are also embarking on an employment scheme that qualified dancers can go to work around the world in their communities teaching line dances will a full curriculum. We feel with our contacts and our understanding of the business as such, we

He once went to Georgia with the Devil, but Raymond Sarlemijn is back with 18 World titles to boot. He talks to *Pamela Edelston* about his dog, Kenzo, his travelling shows and his Latin Lines

A guy with so much talent, every shoulder is shimmied with pizazz, as his hips are shaking, rattling and rolling. It is a fact, World Champion many times over Raymond Sarlemijn is mind blowing on the dance floor. Starting out with Hip Hop, street dance, Latin and Ballroom Raymond found Line at a local club in Amsterdam. He comments: "There is only one thing other than dancing that I like to do and that is spent time with girlfriend. course, I like to go to the movies, or go out to eat but if you ask do you want to dance or see a movie then I always want to dance."

Not long after his

Line dance discovery
Raymond watched Roy
Verdonk on television and, like many of
us, he failed but to be impressed. He signed
up to dance with Roy and Tom Mickers in the
theatre show The Devil Went To Georgia.

Following that he began touring around Europe, with Country Dynamics, and getting more involved with shows and workshops.

Last year, Raymond added some more award winning dances to his already long list at the debut World Country Dance Federation, including You're So Cool, La Cumbia and Bella Bella. At that same competition Raymond notched up another World Title in the Line Classic Jewel category, he says: "I have entered so many competitions, I have lost count how many in total. I won the World champion tittle 18 times, from those 18 World tittles I won 15 for my original choreography.

"I also won the Dutch Championship, German, Swedish, Norwegian, Belgium, French, Danish and Swiss Championship – of course this happened some years ago. I compete in the highest level – in the Superstar or Megastar division."

Where did your passion for Line dance derive from?

At first, I was not interested in Line dance, I thought it was only steps that didn't use the upper part of the body or arms. I also thought it was all on Country music (not that I don't like Country music). A friend of mine was Line dancing and he knew that I could dance so he asked me to come along to look at what



Line dance is actually like. I went to his class and he was dancing the Beast choreographed by Rob Fowler. When I witnessed that dance my opinion changed. I thought wow that is more than only steps, I can incorporate hip hop into Line dance and use some arms.

Have you always danced Latin and the many other styles?

Since I was a kid I have always danced. I danced on the streets of Amsterdam for money doing electric boogie, hip hop and street dance, when I was 18 or so I started with Latin.

How did you end up choreographing dances?

It was years ago when the new Line dance style wasn't appreciated in the Netherlands. A lot of people said Line dancers didn't want to dance to a smoother style, which meant I had to learn lots of stiff dances with rigid moves – I hoped to change that. In my opinion, we could do so much more with other styles, steps and moves. At that point, I was also dancing in the Roy Verdonk team and we needed a fresh style. Because of my dance exerience Roy and I started to make new shows.

What has been your favourite or most successful dances?

I don't have a single favourite dance - I like several like Billy Jean, Blame It On The Boogie, La Cumbia, Mala Mujer, Straight Up, Radar Love and Missing You.

As 15 time World Champion I have lots of successful dances but I guess Mala Mujer, Straight Up, Billy Jean, Blame It On The

Boogie, Me Against The Music and Bella Bella have been a few which have achieve their goals.

Have you always had an eye for technique?

At first I just wanted to dance and have fun, but once I started to compete I really needed to develop my technique, especially since I wanted to win.

Technique is something all dancers need. At first my legs and knees would hurt after I danced, but when I learned the correct stance (using the balls of my feet and how to use my body while I was dancing) all the pain that I had suffered went away. After that the technique became a obsession for me, everything that I did on the dance floor had to be perfect.

Who taught you to dance with such energy and precision?

I have three teachers but Roy Verdonk was my first teacher in Line dance. Anthony van Echtmond, who teaches Latin and Ballroom, has been my teacher for the last seven years he lives in Holland.

Since I moved to Norway I have two other teachers — Johan Eftedall, (who won the British open Professional Latin Championship, U.K. Professional Latin Championship, Twice European Latin Champions, U.S. Open Professional Latin Champions and many more) and Svein Røthvold, who judges at the World Championship Professionals Latin. I have also been taking lessons from Neil Smith who is from England.

Palm Springs



Bill Bader and friends struck gold in the State of California... here is the report from the Palm Springs event, organised by *Russ* and *Gloria Gunn*

Gloria was a student in my Line dance and couples classes. We started dating and decided three weeks later we were getting married. We celebrated our 13th anniversary this March. Ben Green, a Palm Springs senior centre administrator, asked us to do a senior olympics line dance event in conjunction with all of his other senior olympics programs.

In the beginning organising this event was a long involved process taking about four months to get ready. The last two weeks before an event is very intense with scheduling, step sheet books, name tags and shopping. Friday morning (the first day) is so hectic with set up and registration. We try to use a mix of local West Coast instructors and travelling event teachers. We go to other events to see instructors or get recommendations from people we trust. We have an established staff and we bring in new people periodically but rotate our instructor staff in and out, year by year, because we cannot use every one of our instructors in any one event.

This year on Saturday night the dance party theme was an Old Fashioned Hoe Down. We have a very large 18,000+ square foot ballroom dance floor with a large stage for the main hall. We have one class at a time with each instructor getting 40 minutes to teach with 10-minute breaks in between every two or three classes. We have a smaller EX intermediate hall across the park. 30 intermediate/advanced dances were taught in the main hall and 12 EX intermediate dances were taught in the smaller hall.

We have done this event for 12 years. Three years ago we started an EX intermediate class in another hall with KC Douglas hosting it

and it has been tremendously successful selling out the last two years. So we are looking for a larger venue for this program. Just this year we added an announcer, Bill Bader, and he was outstanding in this new job. Bringing in CJ Jones as videographer was also a great move. He captures the spirit of our event...friendly and warm, like a true Line dance family.

Two things come to my mind: First it was incredibly grand having my wife Gloria Gunn back on her feet and well. Last year she spent many months with injuries and illnesses. And was very ill during the event. Secondly, at the EX intermediate class just prior to the Saturday evening party KC Douglas and her crew dressed up in inflatable horse costumes and did a hilarious circle Electric Slide, neighing and yelling with spectators dancing along. What a blast!


Your questions have brought back so many memories of the years and people that have been involved and instrumental to our event and the direction it has gone. So many have been very much responsible for our success.



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
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DOLLY MANIA!

Just ahead of a sell-out UK tour Dolly Parton, the undisputed Queen of Country, has a plethora of albums released from Sony BMG.

First up is a double release of two albums from the 70's, never before available on CD, All I Can Do/New Harvest ... First Gathering. There are several highlights from this set that

would be ideal for Line dancing; All I Can Do (130bpm) a solid up tempo number; When The Sun Goes Tomorrow (102/204bpm) a cracking two step and Hey Lucky Lady (101bpm) another with a good beat. Add to these the Gospel infused Holding On To You (84bpm); Getting In My Way (109bpm) a bouncy song and a fantastic version of Jackie Wilson's Higher And Higher (124bpm) for me the best track on the set and it must have a dance written to it.

Another first on CD set is Great Balls Of Fire/Dolly Dolly Dolly from 1979/80. Notable dance tracks are Star Of The Show (128bpm) a classic Country pop song; Down (110bpm) a sassy

west coast swinger; Help! (130bpm) a fantastic Country version of the Beatles song, done as a polka; Sweet Summer Lovin' (123bpm) which clips along at a good pace; a fun version of Great Balls Of Fire (146bpm) which could bring a lot of fun to the dance floor and a stunning waltz Sandy's Song (90bpm) which alone is worth buying the album for. Others to consider here include Starting Over Again (64bpm) a lovely nightclub two step; Same Old Fool (132bpm) a sort of Motown meets Country track; You're The Only One (125bpm) a great east coast swing; Fool For Your Love (133bpm) where Dolly sings soul. And the funky Sweet Agony (90bpm) on which Dolly does disco.

The last of the "2 on 1" sets is Burlap & Satin Wood/Real Love from the mid 80's. The main tracks interest to us here include Ooo Ee (126bpm) a poppy number with lots of sax; Potential New Boyfriend (111bpm) a cool west coast swing; Calm On The Water (80/160bpm) a gospel style two step; Tie Our Love (86bpm) which has an eighties chart feel to it; We Got Too Much (94bpm) on which Dolly does reggae; Real Love (100bpm) a nice cha cha which is a duet with Kenny Rogers; I Can't Be True (160bpm) a rock 'n' roller; and Come Back To Me (78bpm) which would have been at home on the Grease soundtrack.

The Very Best Of Dolly Parton is another new release, 20 tracks in all, and it is a real gem. All the classics are here; 9 To 5 (107bpm); I Will Always Love You (69bpm); Islands In The Stream (102bpm) with Kenny; Jolene (110bpm); Baby I'm Burnin' (134bpm); and Romeo (116bpm) now who remembers the dance to this one?

Three other albums reissued with bonus tracks are My Tennessee Mountain Home, Jolene, and Coat Of Many Colours.

There has never been a better time to invest in some Dolly Parton music, there is a great selection available. With so many good danceable tracks there is something for all tastes and styles among these so go ahead and dip your bread in Dolly!

WAKING UP LAUGHING

Martina McBride RCA RECORDS

Martina McBride has risen from humble beginnings selling t-shirts at Garth Brooks concerts to become an international Country superstar. Her music has been used in Line dancing over the years but not for some time.

First up *If I Had Your Name* (145bpm) is a fast paced waltz – a wonderful track with excellent musical backing.

Cry Cry (Til The Sun Shines) (110bpm) shows Martina still retains her powerful vocal ability on this great Country cha cha. Be inspired and get choreographing.

Tryin' To Find A Reason (62bpm) sees Keith Urban singing with Martina on this stunning nightclub.

For These Times (117bpm) is a nice track with an easy beat. Martina has produced one of those songs that aims to prick your conscience for some social awareness.

Anyway (68bpm) – a nightclub two step – is Martina's current top ten single in the US, which she co wrote. Three quarters of the way through Martina hits some huge notes, right on the money. Martina McBride at her very best.

How I Feel (101bpm) is described as being "Beatlesque" and Martina co-wrote this one with The Warren Brothers. The Nashville String Machine enriches this cracking cha cha and it is another you could well be dancing to soon.

I'll Still Be Me (67bpm) another beautiful ballad nightclub two step with a softer approach.

Beautiful Again (126bpm) written with the Warren Brothers. It is a cha cha with some delightful harmonies.

Everybody Does (98bpm) has a good strong beat and it is simply a great new Country song.

House Of A Thousand Dreams (120bpm) is a wonderful story song about a poor family getting by on their dreams.

The final track **Love Land** (76bpm) lets you know from the outset that it is going to be a great song. It is a poignant number about a young couple who go to Vegas to get married because the girl is pregnant, they lose the baby, and then have another beautiful little boy, all in *Love Land*.

Martina McBride has released eight albums over the years and she solo produced her last album of Country classics named Timeless. Now she produces the new album and if Martina ever tires of singing she will make a wonderful producer.

Waking Up Laughing is not a classic Line dance album, although there are some strong dance tracks, but it is a very classy new Country album from a very classy lady.

Now and again an album lands on my desk and my anticipation level shoots up just by looking at the cover. This album provoked such a reaction when I read the subtitle Classic Country Hits Remade For The Dancefloor.

First cut *Rhinestone Cowboy* (134bpm) by James Reay. This is absolutely brilliant. Ideal for Black Coffee.

Stand By Your Man (135bpm) from Klub Kidz is also a very upbeat version of Tammy Wynette's signature song this should certainly have a dance written to it.

Forever & Ever Amen (136bpm) by Julian Marsh gets the dance beat treatment. Not sure what Randy Travis would make of it, but Line dancers should love it although at seven minutes long it needs fading.

Nine To Five (Kuta Club Mix) (130bpm) is from New Emotion ft Sally Jaxx. This is one of my all time favourite songs and this remake is simply fantastic. Fun and funky.

Islands In The Stream (125bpm) by Laura Harding and Jason Prince may get a few purists hot under the collar. I don't think you can dance Karen Jones classic dance to it, but you could have a lot of fun trying.

Live Like You Were Dying (135bpm) sang by Ernest Kohl. He gives Tim McGraw's song a new NRG feel to it.

From This Moment On (140bpm) by Klub Kidz is Shania's song revisited with a high energy feel to it and may be too fast for the original dance.

Rose Garden (Country Club Mix) (132bpm) from Donna Reid has been covered by many artists, but never like this. If you skip two minutes of the intro you'll find yourself immersed in Euro pop. Please write a dance to it.

Wicked Mountain (128bpm) from the Midnight Cowboys is a medley of "Wicked Game" and "Brokeback Mountain". It is eight minutes long, but is a brilliant mix.

We Shall Be Free (Julian Marsh Club Mix) (124bpm) by Jajucha is a fantastic version of Garth Brooks' song.

Jolene (Nashville Mix) (126bpm) from Cowgirls in the Sand – a great prospect – Maggie G is already writing to it. Final track **Johnny Remember Me** (Camp Cowboy

Dance Mix) (79bpm) by Johnny Westwood won't make a Line dance track but it is a lot of fun.

With this set you have many of your favourite Country tracks given a dance beat and it is a must for club instructors and Deejays to help keep the fun in Line dancing. The big bonus is you also get a second album that has all the songs remixed in club style. We need more albums like this.

The Jive Aces

The Jive Aces are a six piece group from London, described as one of the hardest working bands in the business. Their music is Hot Jive — a fusion of Rock 'n' Roll with the fun and rhythm of big band swing all rolled into one.

The album's opener is *Jive, Jive, Jive Aces* (88bpm) which sets the tone for the album. This lively track was, like most of the album, written by the band. It would be ideal as a Line dance.

Start, Change And Stop (95bpm) got Pat Stott's attention and she has written a 64 count, four wall, beginner/improver dance to this awesome track.

I've Got Affinity For You (116bpm) is a Sinatra-esque big band number that would have been right at home in Vegas. This classy number is another with great potential.

Singing In The Rain (139bpm) is an up tempo version of the song made famous by Gene Kelly and what a great job the guys make of it. I love it.

Second Chance To Fly (97bpm) reminds me of those great movies from the fifties. It is another powerful dance track – dig out those bobby socks!

Long Distance Love Affair (116bpm) has a Cuban feel. With a great vocal and some excellent drumming, this too could become a dance floor hit.

High Energy Jive (88bpm) Well then – the title says it all. A high energy Jive track – perfect for dancing.

Only Mugs Takes Drugs (103bpm) has a powerful message to it and the clever lyrics certainly would make you think. This just shows how you can get a real message across in a fun dance style. Another superb dance track.

Clear Body, Clear Mind (120bpm) is a classic rock 'n' roller, think Elvis – Heartbreak Hotel. Brilliant.

White Cliffs Of Dover (98bpm) you will never have heard this classic done in this style, it's awesome.

Three Cats Called Louis (90bpm) has a jazzy feel to it, and the band's rendition of Sweet Georgia Brown (136bpm) is at break neck speed.

What A Wonderful World (98bpm) the band do a wonderful job with Louis Armstrong's song – a fine waltz.

The album closes with *Life Is A Game* (96bpm) a powerful number.

This superb album from The Jive Aces has 14 tracks and you could dance to them all. There are many styles of music used for Line dancing and I don't see why we could not use more like this. For more info visit www.jiveaces.com

Exactly as the title implies, this 32 count 4 wall lower intermediate dance is a combination of samba and cha cha and is one of my personal favourites. The first 16 counts will please any Latin American dancers who will be able to perform the voltas and boto fogos with the correct action. Non-Latin people can manage a more sedate version and are able to enjoy the cool timing and steps in the second half. A great track, and a really superb Latin addition to our repertoire.

A Nightclub Two 32 count 2 wall intermediate number with some unusual diagonal patterns to set it apart from other slow dances. The timing took a bit of getting used to, but once the class got to grips with the 'quick, quick, slows,' it fell into place. The full turn cross unwind is managed after a little practice, and care in not turning too fast into the sweep. Another great dance.



From a DIY shop
to a seat on

asks Geoff Langford
where his Morris
Minor comes into
his Line dancing
classes?

ow many people do you know who are so committed to Line dancing they gave up their seat on the Council because it interfered with classes? Geoff Langford was elected on the Wrexham Maelor Borough Council and the Community Council but found himself spread so thin he decided he needed to focus: "In 1993 I was elected on the council. We lost a lot of our dancing time and a year later I got into teaching, quite by accident. My wife and I did a fund raiser for a local hospital, we danced the same dance two or three times that night and I was asked to go and teach it a few weeks later. It was really strange to be in a club in Chirk, just three weeks later, teaching One Step Forward.

"A year later, I was running three clubs (one in St Martins and one in Acrefair). I lost the

WMBC Council election and a year later I resigned from the Community Council because meetings where interfering with my Line dance nights."

For Geoff and Carol their Line dancing roots began after a stint in a DIY shop: "In 1981, we opened a DIY shop in Cefnmawr and things were going along nicely. It must have been in about 1987 or 88 when Carol mentioned she was going to a Line dancing class with her friend at the local community centre. It was about three or four weeks later that I decided to go along and have a look. I went and it looked so funny with everyone dressed in Western gear but Carol loved it. At first, I admit, I took the mickey out of it but then Peter Jones (the Line dance teacher) taught Shilton. I think the track was by the Desert Rose Band called Ashes of Love, I

know it was the track that got me to take Line dance seriously and I am grateful to Peter and the band." and Alison Biggs. Bringing these people to Wrexham to teach means our class members are over the moon.

If being a Councillor was not interesting enough this Line dance instructor also worked for many years as a joiner by day and an entertainer by night: "I have been involved in the building industry for 30 years but again I decided to leave that behind and get into Line dance full time. Carol and I have been dancing for 20 years and I have been teaching for over 11. We met in 1969 when I was singing in a club in Rhyl. Back in my younger days I entertained in pubs and clubs all over North Wales."

What makes Eazystompers the place to dance? "One of the most important things is to try and teach the dances which are being done around other clubs. When my students go to socials I like to think they will be able to get up and dance, instead of just looking on. With so many dances around it is not an easy task. After I have spent hours hunting for a great dance it is all worthwhile when I see the look on their faces.

"I have also had the pleasure of bringing many stars to our club including Liz Clark, Dynamite Dot, Maggie G, Peter Metelnick "The Internet is a fantastic tool – we have a club website – we advertise our socials, teachers, class times etc... In the beginning *Linedancer* Magazine was a godsend because there was no where else to find the step sheets. We recently celebrated ten years and presented flowers to Pat Gair for being the longest member and Noreen Wood for being the most dedicated dancer.

So where does the van come into your Line dance life? "I've always wanted an old car. I was looking around for a van and spotted this 1971 morris minor on ebay. Carol and I drove over to North Yorkshire to pick it up and I've been working on it ever since. I have fitted new brakes, tyres, buffed the paint work and added the club name to the side. One or two think I have gone around the bend but most think it is wonderful.

"My all time favourite dance is The Real World – I think it fits to the music like a glove. I also like Into The Arena, Eight At The Bar and Mack The Knife – if you like any of these check on the floor at the next event I might be dancing along side you."







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The lady with the sparkling blue eyes Martina McBride tells

Linda Willis what she expects from a

By anyone's standards Martina McBride is an artiste who has gone the distance and then some, like the finest of marathon runners, who leave us gasping at the sheer strength and ability to squeeze out even more of the good since 1993. Serving up an ocean of passionate classics like, Wild Angels, A Broken Wing, This Ones for the Girls, and, of course the groundbreaking and brave Independence Day.

Album sales of 16 million, 22 top 10 singles, you might be forgiven for thinking that this hardworking gal would take time out to smell the Rose Garden she has created with husband John and their daughters Delaney and Emma. But no - hot on the heels of the outstanding platinum-selling Timeless classic Country tribute album, which she produced, she headed straight back to the recording studios taking the reins one more time for her ninth album. Her latest offering, Waking Up Laughing is about to hit your local record store any moment now. It is filled with brilliance including the life-affirming ballad, Anyway, the debut single currently rising faster than any other McBride single so far. And deservedly so: "I'm just the instrument of the song to do whatever it's supposed to do - heal, inspire or encourage." She says simply. "I'm just the lucky girl who gets to sing these songs."

Singing songs has been part of Martina's life for as far back as she can remember. Born Martina Schiff, she was brought up surrounded by music on a farm in a tiny town called Sharon, Kansas. Just like Dorothy in The Wizard of Oz one of her all time favourite movies, she still fervently believes, "there's no place like home!" Dad Daryl had a band that used the family house each week for rehearsals. When she was just seven years old she and baby brother Marty, aged 5 joined the group.

"There wasn't much to do growing up on a farm," she says. "We had three channels on the TV, one of which was fuzzy. Marty and I would come home from school and we were kind of isolated. There



was no neighbourhood kids. There was no convenience store. No video games. But we always had musical instruments. Our play time was sitting around and making music and singing together. We played wedding dances, VFW halls, American Legion posts and things like that. My mom ran the soundboard. I played keyboards and sang. My brother played guitar and steel. My dad led the band, played guitar and sang. I did that every Saturday night until I graduated from High School." Marty has remained a guitarist in his big sister's band ever since.

John and Martina McBride got married in 1988, moving to Nashville two years later. They made a demo which they posted off to RCA in a purple envelope with "Requested Material" written on it, which somehow managed to find it's way onto the right desk, landing Martina a longed-for audition with the label who were to sign her up to a major recording contract.

The McBride marriage is, to date, one of the more successful music-business partnerships. He has been mixing the sound at her concerts from day one, as well as working on Martina, and engineering Timeless. "I can't be the big star in the family," she confesses. "We have a family, and we are all equal." Waking Up Laughing is probably one way to describe how she feels right now. She has every reason to. The country charts have consistently featured Martina's music since 1992 and she has so far notched up six number one singles. By the time you read this, Anyway could have made it lucky number seven.

Like Shania she's also enjoyed crossover success to pop and contemporary genres. On the new album she's credited with being Producer, artiste and writer, including as it does three songs which she co-wrote with the Warren Brothers and other top songwriters, How I Feel with a nod and a wink to the Beatles, and the gorgeous Beautiful Again co-written with Bret and Brad Warren and Nick Trevisick. But aside from the aforementioned, Anyway, which I just can't stop playing - very loudly - especially with the windows open driving round London Colney car park - the track that made me sit up and listen was Tryin' To Find a Reason, penned by Tommy Lee James and Jeremy Stover. There's something familiar about this sound, I thought. And too right! It was the Urban monkey himself to be sure, to be sure. Keith Urban on harmony vocals and guitar solo. Less than two weeks after leaving re-hab he sang and played guitar for her. "This is the first thing he's done since he's been out," she says. "I saved this song for him. His was the only voice for it."

She's not a dancer. Like most singers she feels the music with her voice instead. But she was delighted to appear on Dancing With The Stars in the autumn singing I Never Promised You a Rose Garden. (we've all danced to that Jo Thompson classic) and This One's For the Girls. Most of her songs are. "I am happy that women can relate to my songs. And hopefully men can to," she adds diplomatically. "Staying true to yourself is so important. Women have to remember – you are beautiful – just the way you are. It's so important to be able to put the past



behind you. Feeling OK with yourself. Finding somebody who is OK with it - and loves you for who you are."

Springtime kicks off her US tour in Kansas City in April with guest artistes Little Big Town and Rodney Atkins: "As exciting as it is to create a new album, there's nothing quite as thrilling as getting the immediate feedback from a live crowd," she insists. "I'm especially happy about being joined by Little Big Town and Rodney Atkins. We put a lot of thought into which artistes to include on this tour and I really feel like this show is going to be a great one for my fans from beginning to end. I can't wait to get out there on the road. Sometimes I sing a song and I go on the road and sing for six months. The song becomes part of you. It becomes more soulful. I can work out what delivery I want, the nuances. That's really helpful to know what I want to do with the song."

Country music has always been the love of her life. Simple as that: "Every time I hear this music, it feels like coming home," she said of the classic Country cuts on

Timeless. "What I love about these songs is that they are like conversations. These lyrics are so simple, yet so eloquent. It's just honest. I have a comfort level with this music and a respect for it that is deep. I love Country music. I don't ever feel restricted by the genre. I've been able to have a solid career that we've built one step at a time, and a family. I know that I'm in a good place."

You could forgive someone like Martina for being a little complacent – but she doesn't

appear to be so. Matchless talent is matched by intrinsic unpretentious shyness: "I definitely feel a difference about my place in the industry. I feel like I have some longevity now," she says. "I feel it's important to use this gift God gave me, my life and my career to do something to make the world a better place. It's an easy thing for me to do."

She has a deep interest in the downtrodden manifested by the lyrics of most of her hits. "It's just a compassion for human beings," she says. "I am constantly overwhelmed by the unfairness of how people treat each other that way. Especially the helplessness of children. So this career has given me an amazing opportunity to try to use my life to make the world a better place."

The stirring emotional intensity of her powerful voice is something we'll never tire of listening to. Or being affected and moved by. It does make a difference. "What I would like my legacy to be is that of a person who took good care of her family and sang some songs that made a difference in some way. I hope I'll be remembered as somebody who was always down to earth and who handled her career and other people with honesty, integrity,

Linedancer wants to keep you in the know..

Brad Paisley, Miranda Lambert and Billy Currington have been added to the list of artists performing at the CMA Music Festival taking place June 7-10 in downtown Nashville. Paisley is scheduled to close the festival with the final performance at LP Field, home of the Tennessee Titans. Performers previously announced for the festival include Dierks Bentley, Big and Rich, Vince Gill, Alan Jackson, Little Big Town, Martina McBride, Reba McEntire, LeAnn Rimes, Sugarland, Carrie Underwood, Gretchen Wilson and the Wreckers.

Theft charges have been dropped against two people who gained possession of a notebook containing lyrics to 17 unrecorded songs written by **Hank Williams**. The charges were filed against memorabilia collector Stephen M. Shutts and janitor Francine Boykin after Boykin said she found the notebook in a box of rubbish taken from Sony/ATV Music Publishing's office in Nashville. She and her husband sold the box to Shutts for \$1,500 in 2006. The value of the notebook has been estimated to be as much as \$250,000.

Rascal Flatts cancelled its Wednesday, March 14 performance at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo because of lead vocalist Gary LeVox's "severe bronchitis," according to a press release issued by rodeo organisers.

Willie Nelson will launch his own record label, Pedernales Records, with 40 Points - a band fronted by sons Lukas and Micah Nelson - as the first artist signing. The first album by 40 Points, featuring a guest appearance by Willie Nelson, will be released in the US this summer.

It was announced today that after 14 years together and over 11 million albums sold, the multi-award winning band **Lonestar** will be making some changes at the end of this year. With their commitment to RCA Label Group fulfilled, the band has the opportunity to pursue other endeavors. Lead singer Richie McDonald has decided to leave the group to embark on a solo career while Dean Sams, Michael Britt, and Keech Rainwater are eager to announce their new lead singer and record label as they will continue to tour and produce music as Lonestar.

Hank Williams, Jr. was honored at the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame annual banquet at the Nashville Convention Center in mid-February. Unfortunately, Hank Jr. was unable to attend the event and sent a letter of acceptance and regret for his absence.

Randy Travis to play Europe for the first time in 18 years. He will headline this year's 19th Gstaad Festival, Switzerland, September 21 and 22. Joining him will be Julie Roberts, Rhonda Vincent and Riders In The Sky.



It's All About The Music

We are already well into the new dance year and there are several trends and issues developing. Firstly there is growing concern over differing versions of certain music tracks. Peter Metelnick and Alison Biggs wrote a dance Alone Together to the Girls Aloud song I Think We're Alone Now and after releasing the dance with the details on the step sheet of the song, artists, and music it came to light that there were different versions of the song, even on some copies of the right album. There is nothing you can do once you have bought the album or bought the download of the song. Max Perry's So Fine Cha was another dance with different versions of the song, as was Simon Ward's Rock This Party. The only thing choreographers can do is give the music details on the step sheets, however it seems that these days we all need to research the music tracks more in-depth before purchasing music.

Whilst on the subject of music it seems that the Country or non Country debate still rages after all these years. I personally love Country music but I have varied tastes in music and have a huge collection that includes everything from opera and classical to rock, from Disco to Euro Pop, and 60s, 70s, and 80s. I have just about all that was ever recorded by Elvis, Queen, Bryan Ferry and Roxy Music, Meatloaf, and Michael Jackson.

Originally, I became interested in Line dancing because of the Country music, on my first visit to the States in 1992 I became hooked on this music style. My wife had gone to a class with her aunt and convinced me to go as the music was great even if I didn't want to dance. She was right about the music and I got into Line dancing — to the point of being obsessed. Had it not been for the Country music, there is absolutely no way I would have gone.

I believe that there are people who have only been into Line dancing for a few years with the thoughts that if it was all Country music there is no way they would have gone, and I respect that. What I will say though is that Line dancing is a Country based dance form. It may have been hijacked by other dance styles and music but all the basic steps were recognised as being part of a true dance form known as Country and Western dance which began in America long before Line dancing came to the fore in the UK. So why try to deny this fact? Why not embrace it? I accept that Line dancing like everything else has evolved, but I don't accept that people should be embarrassed by the very origins of the dance form. Fortunately there are very many people who do love Country music and that still recognise where the roots of Line dancing came from, and that is good to know Trust Me!

Stop And Start is a great new dance from Pat Stott to a fabulous piece of music Start, Change, and Stop. This beginner/improver swing style dance is 64 counts with four walls.

More To Follow is a 32 count, four walls, beginner dance by Alan Haywood to the song The Best Is Yet To Come by Peter Grant. We need more beginner dances.

Black Is Black from Bos and Roy Verdonk is a lovely new dance to the Los Lobos classic track. This intermediate dance is one wall and phrased.

No Good Reason was written Chris Cleevely to Hal Ketchum's Gonna Start Livin' Again. Chris's dance is 32 counts, four walls, and is for beginner/improvers.

Simply Mambo is a brilliant beginner dance from Val Myers. Danced to Tequila by the Champs this dance is 32 counts, and four walls.

Angel Lies is the latest dance from Australia's Jan Wylie and was written to You Are no Angel by Brendan Shine or Mervyn J. Futter. Jan's dance is described as "upper beginner" and is 32 counts and four walls.

Dance Sumpthin was choreographed by Kathy Brown and it is to Nelly Furtado's Say It Right and has 32 counts is four walls and it is for intermediates.

Takeaway from Dave Morgan is a cool dance to Jae Milz's I Like That You Can' Take That Away From Me. Dave's intermediate dance is four walls, and it has 32 counts

Someone Should Tell You is a super dance from Andrew, Simon, and Sheila to the Lemar song of the same name. This dance is 32 counts, four walls, and is easy intermediate.

Love Hurts from Scotland's Lorraine Brown is a nice little 32 count, four wall, beginner/improver dance and you can do it to various versions of the song.

I agree with Stephanie

My name is Jan Wyllie and I am from Australia. I have been teaching Line dancing for 14 years and writing dances for 12 years. I would like to comment on the issue raised by Stephanie Lindley, an instructor for 1st Steps Linedance, which was in the April edition.

Stephanie's point is a very valid one. The grading of Line dances has become ridiculous. Maybe it's time we established a criteria of steps that denote the level of a dance. For instance, in my mind, a beginner dance should teach basic steps such as vines, walks, side steps and struts with an emphasis on getting from one wall to another without too much confusion. There are many dances around that fit that criteria and I have personally written around 200!

Once a dancer is confident with the basic steps, including shuffles, the next level is Easy Intermediate (Beginner/Intermediate). This level is where all the other steps should

be introduced and dancers usually remain at this level for at least 12 months. After this, the sky is the limit... go for it. Many dancers choose to remain at the second level because they use Line dancing as a form of exercise and social interaction and are not really interested in giving their brain a more severe workout.... and I think that is fair enough.

Choreographers are free to grade their dances as they like, there is no rule governing this. If the choreographer is not also an instructor who teaches beginner classes, then they may have forgotten what it felt like when they first started dancing. I guess that puts the onus on the instructor to pick and choose the dances that they teach to their class. With the plethora of dances available today, that is no mean feat. It's hard enough wading through the available dances without having the added dilemma of deciding if the dance is truly graded correctly.

However, in my opinion, if a dance is graded as Beginner/Intermediate, I would consider it to be an Easy Intermediate level dance and would expect it to have more steps than a Beginner dance, including the steps Stephanie described in her article. I believe that Stephanie's confusion came about because of the word 'Beginner' in the classification, so I guess the problem could be solved by changing the classification to Easy Intermediate level rather than Beginner/ Intermediate. Food for thought....

However, if you are a choreographer I would still make this plea to you. PLEASE think about the level of dancer you are writing your dance for as this consideration would make the life of the average Line dance instructor much much easier – not to mention their dancers.

I try not to be a pain but teachers need to be very selective in their choice of dances for each class and I think the classifications are becoming a little misleading. We need all the help we can get.

Believe the glass is half full — Sho Botham picks up where she left off with more ideas on dealing with anxiety

MorePreparationforPerformance

Last month I introduced some ideas about Preparation for Performance skills for anxiety. This month I am staying with the Preparation for Performance theme. I want to share some useful ways of improving Line dance performance by improving self-confidence through positive thinking and self-talk.

Dance learning and performance is not just affected by physical ability. Our mental thoughts and how we think affect the way we learn and perform too. When we believe in ourselves and our abilities, we can perform better.

Are you an optimist - someone who usually sees your glass as `half full'? Do you like to `have a go' believing that you can do what you set out to do? Or are you more pessimistic and see you glass as `half empty'? How do you approach your Line dancing? Do you doubt your ability to learn new steps and dances? Are you a competitive dancer worrying about your performance? Negative thinking can hinder our learning and performance because it reduces our self-confidence. In contrast, thinking positively helps us to achieve more because it improves our self-confidence.

Positive thinking can help Line dancers at all stages of learning and performing from the absolute beginner to the experienced competitor. Thinking `I can't do this' or `this

is too difficult' when learning grapevines for the first time is using negative thinking. It is like putting a barrier up that makes it harder to learn. In comparison, thinking, `this might be tricky but I will get it' or I know I can do it', is using positive thinking. Believing that we can master something keeps the learning routes open. A dance teacher or coach can encourage positive thinking by acknowledging effort as well as achievement. For example, `well done that was a good effort' or `good, it is getting there'. This type of positive statement is not to be mixed up with the sort of meaningless repetitions of `well done' that some teachers might say regardless of effort and performance.

In addition to receiving positive statements from teachers or coaches we can also practise positive self-talk. You will no doubt have seen sportspeople use this form of motivational tool to boost their confidence during a match or a game. Top tennis players are a good example. They often use positive self-talk out loud or silently between shots. Saying positive things helps to reduce negative thoughts and loss of confidence. Below are a few examples of positive self-talk that Line dancers might use with possible negative equivalents in brackets:-

- I know I can dance this dance (I can't do this dance)
- I can do this step (I am not sure if I can do this step)



 I've trained well and am looking forward to dancing in the competition (I'm not sure if I have done enough training for the competition)

You can practice using positive self-talk to help you when you Line dance. If you recognise a negative thought coming into your head before you dance then practise changing it to a positive statement. For example try changing, `I can't do that step' into something along the lines of `if I take it slowly I will master the step'. Recognising the negative thoughts that appear in your head can take a bit of time and practise but it well worth the effort. As you get better at identifying the negative thoughts you can practise replacing them with positive ones. The more you practise self-talk the easier it becomes. So what are you waiting for? Repeat after me - I can do it, I can do it, I can do it.
