What's happening to our beloved past time?

From Linedancer Magazine's vantage point we see more of the scene than the individuals taking part in it and recently we've seen signs that concern us greatly. For instance, one of our most talented and dedicated DJ's has had to find additional employment and a number of top choreographers are struggling to meet living expenses.

We also saw the utter financial failure of a fabulous Line dance event, which left hundreds of people out of pocket and the organiser totally bankrupt. Also, another of our music retailers

has been forced to close his doors and many, many instructors report a reduction in class numbers. And those are just a few examples.

So what is happening to our beloved past time? Has the bubble burst, are we in danger of falling apart or, is this just the normal lifecycle of a hobby?

From a publisher's view it is quite clear that Line dance related businesses are no longer able to keep their heads above water (chances are Linedancer Magazine will be included in this too). Sadly the loss of these good people and what they did for Line dancing will have a serious impact unless we can reverse the trend.

We cannot deny that dancers' needs have changed. Many of you no longer purchase whole albums choosing instead to buy your music from the web and by the individual track. And, who can blame you for that. The once compulsive desire to attend every event has waned and we now choose more carefully where we go and with whom. We've changed our dress style in favour of high street fashions and, sadly for Linedancer we no longer need to wait a month for the latest dance information because most of it is available 24/7 on our web site. This may be progress but the impact is affecting the scene and the finances of lots of people.

I have never been a doom and gloom merchant but I am a realist and right now I think we need to find ways of keeping our hobby alive and well and at all levels and for all ages and tastes. Perhaps we've just hit a summer hiatus in UK and the growing interest we see from foreign markets is an indication that we still have a long-term future – I certainly hope so.

But I sincerely recommend that we go on a recruitment campaign. Remember bringing beginners into Line dance also bring the kiss of life. By all means look after the dancers we already have, keep them happy and keep them coming but let's not forget to cater for the beginners. Be patient with them, remember how difficult it was to dance a grapevine for the first time and give encouragement and support whenever you can.

And, if you're enjoying this magazine why not recommend to a friend?

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5th Gear is the new album from Brad Paisley. *Linda Willis* finds out why it turned out to be such a fun disc to make and listen to....



th Gear is something you reach when you're on a long good stretch and you're really

claims Brad Paisley. And he rolling" should know. Since his 1999 Platinum debut album, Who Needs Pictures, he has had more platinum sellers and US chart-toppers. Part II, Mud On The Tires and Time Well Wasted Brad Paisley's Christmas. This one in particular went Gold and set straight in as number one on the US country charts and third in the US 200. For most musicians you'd say, in the words of one of the songs on the album, it doesn't get better than this! But it has. On 22nd February this year he and actress wife Kimberly Williams welcomed their first child - a baby boy, William Huckleberry Paisley, named after Mark Twain's hero.

When Brad first appeared on the scene he was hailed as being 'someone you won't forget in a hurry.'

As a matter of fact despite the CMA awards, the Grammy's, the ACM's and the music successes, his attitude hasn't changed. He's still happy, charismatic and filled with self-effacing engaging charm. He was voted one of People 100 Most Magazine's Beautiful People in May 2007 but still doesn't take it too seriously. His priority remains his music. "When I sit down with a guitar (his is a custom-made Crook Telecaster) to write a song, or when going into a recording studio, my focus is really on one thing." he says. "How will this song work on stage night after night? I think about that every time I write something and every time I sing the song."

5th Gear is Paisley's piece de resistance with a musical and lyrical content that leaves you, quite frankly, flabbergasted. And you can dance to it too. All I wanted Was a Car and I'm Still a Guy find him at his hilarious best, laughing at the ludicrousness of life and this theme continues in Bigger Fish to Fry (a fun West Coaster) with the New King Pau Buckaroos, alias Little Jimmy Dickens, Whisperin' Bill Anderson – and Vince Gill. Paisley is one of the few Country artists who only venture into the Studio to record with his own Band, along with Producer Frank Rogers. Work on 5th Gear commenced a week after winning Album of the Year at the CMA's. He took the award with him into the Studio, displaying it for all to see. "We gave each other a round of applause, and I told everybody – congratulations! This is yours. Now, let's do even better. That's the mind-set we had. We wanted to aim at pushing ourselves."


Now if anyone else asked me if they could check me for ticks, I would tell them very swiftly to buzz off. However, if Brad Paisley offered to do so, I guess I would say yes. The second track on the album is as comical a come-on that a girls' ever going to get. "If you think the song is gross, you're missing the point!" laughs Paisley. "It's not about blood sucking bugs, it's about a guy flirting with a



girl, and in trying to tell her he's interested in her, he's using a term that's about as country as can be!"

Home to Brad these days is over 100 acres of farmland in Williamson County just outside of Franklin, Tennessee, so the boy born on October 28^{th} 1972 in the tiny Ohio River town of Glen Dale, West Virginia should know what he's talking about.

"Working out here on the farm, I literally have to check for ticks every time I come in from the woods or the fields." He confides. "Now, if a young guy who lives in the country were to take a girl into the woods for a reason, it would totally cross his mind that she's going to have to check for ticks when they come back out." He admits that drawing the line came close, very close. "It was a hard song to write because if you go too far it's not funny any more." Online is another



funny mickey-take of My Space addicts everywhere. "But, if you stay with just the right amount of innuendo and leave the rest to the imagination

then it works."

Carrie Underwood shares a duet with the brilliant Brad. Oh Love is a beautiful

ballad featuring her soaring vocals. "Carrie and I had a great tour together." he says. "And we became friends. She sang Whiskey Lullaby with me in every show so it seemed natural to record a duet with her. It was just a matter of finding the right song."

Touring is a major part of any successful country musician's life, and after an incredibly successful tour in 2006 playing to over 750,000 fans, Paisley decided to

go for the burn launching his biggest and best yet – 2007 Bonfires and Amplifiers Tour. "With each song I choose I have to visualize the people in the front rows of my shows. If I can see them singing along, smiling and laughing, then the song is a keeper." he confides.

Paisley is his own hardest task-master when it comes to raising the level. "I want to be sure each song is different from the others on the album, and each one a potential hit. I don't want to feel anything is weaker than what is next to it. I never want to think – man I wish I could've found something a little better, and I'm proud to say with this album I don't feel that way about anything on it!" The song that says the most to me is the stunning ballad, With You, Without You, with lyrics which are blindingly brilliant. Throttleneck is Paisley at his fast and fabulous instrumental guitar blazing best. How does he do it?

The little boy whose earliest memory is of "running down the road to my grandfather's house. He was a railroad worker who worked the night shift so he'd be at home all afternoon playing guitar." has come a long, long way. "I'd spend all the day watching him play." admits Paisley. His first guitar - a Sears Danelectro Silvertone with an amp in the case was a gift from his granddad, and by the age of 10 Paisley was humming and strumming well enough to sing and play in Church, Civic Meetings and the Fraternal Order of Elks. He formed his own band, Brad Paisley and the C-Notes and at the tender age of 12 scribbled down his first song, Born On Christmas Day.

It seems that Brad's musical successes have been echoed by a good personal life too. He fell in love with actress Kimberley

Williams and married her on March $15^{\rm th}$ 2003. They share a home in Malibu along with the aforementioned farm in Tennessee. Brad also loves flying and has a private Lear 45 Jet.

However, as you would expect the arrival of baby William has changed a lot of things in Paisley's life and his new album reflects that. Brad says "People might be surprised at how little influence our son's birth had on this album. Interestingly, the song that most directly speaks about birth – It did – I didn't write! But I think where it manifests itself is how youthful the album is in its feel and themes so I think Williams birth influenced the album in a less direct way!" 5th Gear is all that and then some. Vibrant and fun, meaningful and clever, tender and gentle. Just like a Dad should be.



Grapevine got very colourful with red grapes and green vines borders on the pages (no kidding) and amongst its snippets, we advertised a position for "feature writer" for our magazine which was fast getting popular and a top seller. Single Line dancers were catered for in Brighton by the Bootscooters Friendship Network who wanted shy and single people to join them.

On page 16 and 17, Anne and Steve from Heroes & Villains explained why they wanted to hold a special event for Childline. The double page explains how anyone could "Turn up and dance for Childline". Anne and Steve said "We knew we just had to help".

Page 23 sees the national institution that is The Archers taking up Line dancing. We followed the progress that Jolene Rodgers was making with her classes at the Ambridge Village Hall.

The new British movie Among Giants from Kudos Films was the subject of page 29 as we followed the film shoot of some Country and Western scenes. The Phoenix Western dancers from Sheffield and Doncaster-based CMT's Big Sky had been chosen to appear and we followed their progress on the set.

Richard and Cheryl Humphreys get married on page 41 and thanks to Rob Fowler who was guest of honour at their special Western themed Line dance wedding many guests left vowing to look for their nearest club.

We met Paula Bilby on page 47 in our Teacher feature and she told us how she got to become a devoted teacher. She then said "Line dancing has not only become a full time job, it's now a way of life!" Words that still ring true to many today.

You could book your spot for the Linedancer Awards (not yet Crystal Boots) held at the Norbreck Castle Hotel in Blackpool on pages 50 and 51.

The incredibly talented Bobbie Matthews gave us some tips on how she designs her now celebrated T shirts and fashion clothes. Then as now, Bobbie is a master of hand painted garments and exclusive designs and it is fascinating to read how she gets her inspiration.

Line dancing may have exploded recently in France in a big way but on page 63 Sylvie Fournier told us already about the Craponne Country Festival, one of the biggest of its kind still held in July in this little French town.

Between The Lines on pages 71 to 73 raised many questions, comments and praises and Tom Carscadden from Ilford asked if anyone had ever danced in Florida as he and his wife had often done. Though he loved our US cousins he missed the "oomph and vigour you see on British dance floors". Well, we've all been to some of them...

This was the first issue with a full 14 dances being published and Skinny Dippin', Sweet Maria, The Last Time Slide, Dancing On The Boulevard, Cannibal Stomp, New Jack Swing were amongst that particular bunch of dances.

Seven pages devoted to Stompin' Ground closed a heavy bumper issue which was getting to look decidedly more sophisticated as each month passed.

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
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The Real Power Of Line Dance





Viv Bishop is a very well known instructor in the area of Hertfordshire and Middlesex. *Laurent Saletto* finds out about a club with a huge heart.

Viv Bishop has been Line dancing for some 15 years now and has taught many people, social dancers and local instructors alike. She has seven classes a week (sometimes more!) and is in great demand. Her husband Eric sorts music and setting up equipment as well as being Viv's rock.

She also runs subsidised classes for the local Council as part of their Active Over Fifty courses and works tirelessly with MIND the leading Mental Health charity. Workers at the charity have often commented about the positive impact Line dancing has had on people who have attended her classes and how much improvement in coordination, confidence and well being they have seen.

But what sets Viv apart is the way she manages to link Line dance with people's needs, making it not only a hobby but something that has helped them to gain a better life.

Take Judy, for instance. Judy used to be a gualified dancer and dancing was her life. Out of the blues, she was diagnosed with a cancerous brain tumour. Although it was eventually successfully removed, Judy felt she had lost all her coordination and therefore her confidence. Faced with a void that seemed insurmountable, she asked a close friend, Lyn, to check Line dancing out and looked at Viv's website (www.waveliners.co.uk). Judy thought it looked like fun and gave it a try. She soon realised the class was just as friendly as the website had said. So as to

encourage someone Viv recognised as very unsure of herself on the dance floor, she modified some of the steps and soon Judy was able to join in with the class. Viv tells me "An example of the changing steps was that on some of the more difficult full turns, jazz boxes and grapevines difficult I simply replaced them with others like a rocking chair or side shuffles depending on the dance."

Viv is used to tailor her teaches to what people can do comfortably and adds :" I also give people one to one sessions whilst others are doing dances they know. Judy found counting easier to follow than steps as she had difficulty with left & right. She started on 16 count dances and has now moved on to 64 count." Judy has now been with Waveliners for less than a year and doing better each week that goes by.

Viv is really proud of Judy. As she tells me: "Judy has said she feels more confident in herself and her coordination has improved. She puts this down to Line dancing classes and told me that dancing was her life and I have given her life back to her."

In another of Viv's class, a young lady named Sam attends with her care worker. Sam's life journey has somewhat been eased thanks to Viv and her wonderful class members. Sam's learning difficulties meant she had no confidence to go out and so sat indoors in her flat, making no friends, no contact with outside. Her careworker wanted her to exercise regularly and again through the website made contact with Viv. Sam not only did eventually join in but gave the class a real go. Viv says: "Sam's care worker said she has lost weight, her fitness Viv with Henry Smith

has improved

and her confidence

has grown all thanks to the Line dance classes. Sam loves coming to the class as she is made feel welcome and nobody treats her differently to anyone else, giving this young lady a sense of normality she craved for." But the story goes a little further. Viv has arranged for a public demonstration to be soon held at the local Harlequin Centre allowing even the beginners to take part. Not only is Sam excited about the demo but she is over the moon at possibly having her picture published in Linedancer.

And what about Gwen? Gwen had a stroke and at the time felt unable to carry on with Line dancing, though she loved it. At first, simple everyday things like writing, brushing her teeth proved impossible for her but eventually her sister in law Lyn managed to convince her to come back. When she did it was after a five year break. Again she had lost all her confidence. Viv says: "Because of the stroke, Gwen has forgotten all the dances that she knew and has to learn everything from scratch. So when the class revisits one of the old classics it's like a new dance to her. She sometimes knows the tune but can't remember the steps." Gwen says: "Line dancing not only helped my concentration but also made me more mobile and boosted my confidence as well as my ability to socialise again."

And again, because of the warm welcome and the members matter of fact attitude in accepting her like anyone else, her old self is slowly coming back and she is doing better than ever. She says: "I am almost back to where I was before the stroke."

Viv & Judy

Viv has always been an instructor who cares. She remembers: "About ten or eleven years ago I was running a class when a lady approached me and said her son had been watching the class and thought it looked fun. She told me he suffered from Down's syndrome and wondered if he would be able to do it. I told her to bring him along and see how he got on. I had to go over the steps slowly with him and modify some of them. He managed to learn a few dances and really enjoyed himself. The rest of the class took to him and he was a very popular lad with the other dancers."

I ask Viv what she is most proud of so far in her Line dance achievements and she thinks aloud: "I am a fully qualified preschool teacher and have done a number of demonstrations for schools and charities. My class were the backing dancers for Shamrock at the Rainbow festival in Watford in front of thousands of people. I have also done a dance routine with Johnny Two Steps in Blackpool. I did a demonstration in the Harlequin Shopping Centre in Watford with Three Counties Radio and Hertfordshire Gwen & Lyn

council to promote fitness. I have been asked to do another demonstration in the Harlequin on the 1st September 2007 to promote line dancing as a good form of exercise for mind and body. We had a visit from some Watford footballers before the play off match in 2005." Phew!

I finally ask Viv why she thinks as a Line dance instructor she has this rate of success with people who feel life is just too hard or has become too much of a challenge. She simply says: "I always encourage my dancers to go to other classes and try different types of dance. I believe that dance is one of the best forms of exercise that's why my clubs slogan is Get Fit The Fun Way. Line dancing is good exercise for mind and body. I would rather people do any form of dance than stop all together and I have had a number of people return after going off to do Salsa and other forms of dancing. I always welcome them back."

She adds laughing "Many tell me they have two left feet before they start with me, I tell them to hang on and have fun. So far, I have never met one who did not turn out to be a dancer!"

Saturday

Wolvestock 13 weekend was held at East Park, Hickman Avenue, Wolverhampton. The journey to Wolverhampton from Stroud was a bit eventful as we passed a load of abandoned cars on the M5 due to flooding the previous day.

Having got there safely, my friend Susanne and I set out our chairs. Even though it rained part of the day, we only had to dance in the poor weather for an hour at the most. Unfortunately, this was in the middle of Gaye Teather teaching her second dance, which had loads of claps - not easy whilst holding an umbrella. Gaye was magnificent, coping with it all with such good grace. I loved the dances she taught, especially Chirpy Charleston. As a matter of fact, I found that through its repeated sequence of steps, it was quite easy on my poor old brain.

I didn't get over in time for Rob Fowler's teach on Saturday but I did manage to hear him from where I was. I realised I knew both the dances he was demonstrating but a very healthy number of dancers braved the mud and were having a go. Rob was brilliant and even taught slower to allow time for slipping.

The bands and acts were something else, let me tell you. What a line up we saw on the day:

Dave Whitmore played a fantastically solid set and his gorgeous bright red jacket made us forget the lack of sunshine.

Michael James, who is from the USA, was impressed that no-one seemed worried by the rain. Michael has a super repertoire and played extremely well.

Dave Sheriff was wonderful as always and played a nice mixture of old and new tracks. I particularly liked Dance Like There's No-One Watching which he suggested to try to Heart Of An Angel. This went really well, so well in fact that I simply had to buy the album to use as an alternative track.

Alan Gregory, who is one of my favourites of all time (I love his sense of humour and his music), struck a great rapport with the audience. He played the tracks for two of my favourite dances, Crazy 4 Leaving and Devil's Shadow so I was even more impressed.

What I particularly liked about those acts was the fact that we did not hear the same music all the time and were able to dance some old favourites as well as new ones. The dance floor (tarmac) was never empty and most bands gave dance suggestions which added to the pleasure.

I felt story for the traders. Many of us tried to support them as it must have been pretty miserable setting up in the rain and watching the drizzle keep people away. However, I was impressed how many other intrepid dancers had made it through the floods to support this wonderful free event.



Sunday

Luckily Sunday turned out to be a beautiful day. The numbers attending had trebled as many travelled for the day. I also spoke to several people who had camped the night before and said that conditions weren't too bad. Some of the traders told me they took as much in an hour as the whole of the previous day. So their efforts weren't wasted after all.

The music again was sensational.

Johnny Holland played top notch country music and I especially liked The Trail done to It's Alright To Be A Redneck.

A newcomer, Tim McKay, was an absolute sensation. As I walked around I suddenly heard this incredible deep voice singing a Dwight Yoakam track. I was completely bowled over. I really think Tim has a huge future ahead of him. And he is just 17 years old. I wasn't the only convert as he sold loads of his CDs at the end of his set. There was quite a queue waiting for his autograph aswell. An already great mature talent.

Mel Paul and Mary Lacey were up next and had the floor full again throughout their sets and an audience that seemed to lap them up. They are not afraid to have a laugh and are very proud of their Irish heritage.

Marisa D'Amato from Malta has the loveliest voice and she too gave dance suggestions so the floor stayed full throughout her set.

As Paul Bailey came on we felt the pressure to remember the dance Gaye had taught as Paul sang Baby Jane. Luckily, I could see Gaye and managed to do a passable impression of pretending I knew the dance.

Henry Smith's Country Dreams was superb and I particularly love the way he has fun with the dancers as well as playing for the listeners.

Our last treat was Magill, a band at its very best, entertaining the whole crowd, dancers, listeners and passers by.

I must say that DJ Alan Perkins did really a good job playing tracks in between the bands and kept us really well entertained.

In guise of a conclusion, here is what Stumblin' Steve said, and his words echo my thoughts completely.

'My lasting impression of Wolvestock is that it demonstrates that Country Music and Linedance are

(thankfully) inextricably linked. The attendance on Saturday, in spite of the rain, was very high and on Sunday a lot more were there. Country Music, of course, is the reason for the event and I doubt if the same enthusiasm from listeners, dancers, instructors and artistes would be evident with any other Line dance genres."

Music Matters



Giving you all the gossip from the music scene. *Linedancer* wants to keep you in the know.

The lead singer of **Heartland** has given birth to a little girl. Jason Albert and his wife Kelly welcomed Kelson Noël on Tuesday Aug. 14 in Hunstville, Alabama. The baby weighed 7 pounds, 6 ounces. Recently, the band has been in the studio recording with Big & Rich's John Rich and has just released a new single, "Once a Woman (Gets a Hold of Your Heart)," for Country Thunder Records.

Dierks Bentley is joining forces with CMT Loaded for country music's first user-created music video. Using pre-taped performance footage in front of a green screen, contestants will be able to submit their own version of "Free and Easy (Down the Road I Go)". Edited portions of the green screen music video will be made available for download through November 5th. Viewers will be able to add their own original background footage, animation and special effects.

Toby Keith is planning the release of A Classic Christmas, a two-CD set featuring new recordings of traditional holiday songs. A Classic Christmas will be divided between secular and religious songs. "There's a reason people gravitate to these songs year after year, and I'm no exception," Keith says. He and Randy Scruggs co-produced the CD for release on Keith's Show Dog Nashville label.

Willie Nelson and Asleep at the Wheel were among the performers who gathered Friday 10th August in Austin, Texas, for Austin Freedom Fest, a benefit concert for four promarijuana groups... The event at the Backyard music venue was hosted by Mark Stepnoski, a former lineman for the Dallas Cowboys. In an interview, Nelson said, "We would like to see [marijuana] put in the same category as cigarettes and alcohol ... where we can take it out of the hands of the illegal drug dealers... The law needs to be changed."

Garth Brooks new CD/DVD boxed set will be released in November in USA, according to Billboard. The Ultimate Garth Brooks will feature 34 tracks, including four new ones, on two CDs along with a DVD of music videos. It is expected that the new boxed set will be priced about the same as a new onedisc release by most major artists. In addition to the boxed set, Brooks plans to reissue individual CDs that were originally released by Capitol Records. Brooks, who owns and controls his recordings, exited Capitol in 2005. Plans for the UK are not known as yet.

Rascal Flatts will donate the proceeds from their 21st of September concert in Nashville to the Monroe Carell Junior Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt. In the past two years, the band's Nashville concerts have raised \$1.4 million for the hospital. "We can't think of a better way to give back to our community than to help the children and their families who are helped by Children's Hospital," says Jay DeMarcus of Rascal Flatts.


Montgomery Gentry, the Allman Brothers Band and Counting Crows have joined the lineup for the Farm Aid concert, on Randall's Island in New York City. As previously announced, headliners include Dave Matthews, John Mellencamp, Willie Nelson and Neil Young. Other performers added to the bill include the Derek Trucks Band, Guster, Matisyahu, the Ditty Bops, the Supersuckers and Warren Haynes. Farm Aid supports family farmers in crisis and promotes organic food.

Carrie Underwood's music video for "Before He Cheats" has resulted in her nomination in the best new artist category of the 2007 MTV Video Music Awards. Others in the new artist category include Amy Winehouse, Gym Class Heroes, Lily Allen and the trio of Peter Bjorn and John. Also, Underwood's new release, "So Small," has become the highest-debuting single by any country female artist in the history of Nielsen BDS, the company that tracks radio airplay. The single is already being played on 128 reporting stations and enters the Billboard country airplay chart at Number 20. She co-wrote the song with Luke Laird and Hillary Lindsey. Carrie will release a new album in October.

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Various Artists EVAN ALMIGHTY SOUNDTRACK

CURB RECORDS

Here we have a soundtrack album from the summer blockbuster Evan Almighty that features some top country artists as well as a few classics from days gone by.

LeAnn Rimes sets the ball rolling with *Ready For A Miracle* (109/218bpm) which is a barnstormer of an all singing all dancing track with full gospel choir. Maggie Gallagher is releasing a dance to this glorious track.

One Love (114bpm) is the Bob Marley classic but covered here by Jo Dee Messina who makes a superb job of it. This track has "hit dance" written all over it.

Have You Ever Seen The Rain (115bpm & 75bpm) appears twice on the album, first as a new version from the former lead singer of Creedence Clearwater Revival and second as the original version. The former is much more upbeat and would make for a great country cha cha style dance.

*Spirit In The Sk*y (127bpm) is a version by "Plumb with Mikeschair" who appears to be a female singer.

This is a cool version of this much covered song. *The Power Of One* (92bpm) is from Bomshel of Bomshel Stomp fame, and a much softer track.

Be The Miracle (147bpm) from Room For Two is a brilliant Gospel infused number which makes for another wonderful dance opportunity.

God Makes Stars (97bpm) is from Hal Ketchum and was originally on his "King Of Love" album a few years back. This is lovely country rumba.

This Land Is Your Land (106bpm) by the Mike Curb Congregation is a powerful choral number with a good strong beat and could be a big hit with Line dancers.

Never Give Up (69bpm) from Tracy Edmond continues the Gospel theme and has a powerful beat that could just inspire someone to write a dance to it.

Revolution (118bpm) this Beatles anthem is another that appears twice, firstly as a country track by Blue County and secondly as a rock track by the Stone Temple Pilots, so take your choice!

Sharp Dressed Man (125bpm) is another doubled up track, once by Jo Dee Messina proving she can rock with the best of 'em, and then the original by ZZ Top.

Gonna Make You Sweat (Everybody dance now) (120bpm) many of you will have heard samples of this song whilst dancing Rock This Party. However this is the original from C&C Music Factory and I don't believe there has been a dance written to it yet.

Whether you are a big fan of new country, rock, or Gospel, you will find plenty of tracks to dance to from some of the biggest names in the business. I particularly like LeAnn Rimes' song as well as Jo Dee Messina's contributions and I am sure that you will find your own favourites. This is simply a wonderful collection of music that is a "must have".

I WANNA BE RICH

Lucie Diamond BIG FEAT RECORDS – BIG 597602

It is not often I get excited about British country music artists but when I heard this album my faith was restored.

Don't Even Think About It (162bpm) is a fast paced rocker that would make a superb dance track.

Read My Lips (137bpm) is one of several tracks that Lucie co-wrote. It is a super east coast swing.

I Wanna Be Rich (90bpm) is another cool country track and Lucie reminds me of country legend Bobbie Gentry so very much on this song. Praise indeed.

My Ex True Love (75bpm) a change of mood and not one of my favourites as it is not country enough for me.

Let Me Be Me (62bpm) is a beautiful nightclub two step, and Lucie shows off her wonderful country voice.

Did He Mention My Name (130bpm) is back to the up tempo style again. Lucie sounds like a young Tanya Tucker. This would make for a great dance track.

Closed Curtain (80bpm) is a duet with Delbert McClinton and Lucie sounds very much like soul diva Beverly Knight. This is one of my absolute favourites on the album.

Don't Mess Me Up (136bpm) is for me Lucie's best effort at song writing. This powerful track is more acoustic than the rest. Lucie reminds me of Joss Stone on this one.

I Wish I Could Re-Write The Ending (92bpm) is another awesome track although this is more for listening than dancing to. Think Lucy Silvas and you will get the idea about this song.

Take It Or Leave It (126bpm) this song is more country flavoured than some as it features pedal steel guitar, fiddle, mandolin and Dobro and this has Lucie sounding more of a country diva then a soul singer.

I Wanna Love You Wild Sometimes (102bpm) features Albert Lee on guitar. A superb country track that is one of the best dance prospects on the album. I just love it.

Final song *God's Working Overtime* (64bpm) is not really a dance track as Lucie is accompanied only by a piano but you will enjoy just sitting back and listening to this though provoking, powerful number. A fine end to a fine album.

It looks like Britain finally has someone who can claim to be a real country singer. Lucie Diamond has a superb voice and this is a great album. Treat yourself today!



TRANSLATED FROM LOVE Kelly Willis RYKO DISC - RCD10886

Kelly Willis has been around the country music scene for many years and has her own unique style of edgy country music.

Nobody Wants To Go The Moon Anymore (138bpm)is a polka in style that moves along at great pace.

Sweet Little One (86/172bpm) is one of several tracks that Kelly co-wrote. As this is a two step, I see no reason why it will not have a dance written to it.

Don't Know Why (120bpm) this reminds me of late Sixties music and I really like this track.

Teddy Boys (133bpm) is a great rock 'n' roller with a classic Chuck Berry style riff as the opening. If someone writes a dance to this it will be a big hit.

Losing You (80bpm) so far is the most country sounding cut, it has some gentle banjo picking and some wonderful steel guitar playing both from Greg Leisz.

Too Much To Lose (62bpm) takes us down to nightclub two step pace and this is a dreamy yet powerful song perfect to dance to.

The More That I'm Around You (128bpm) is a cha cha with a good strong beat and some excellent vocal harmonies. A fine dance prospect.

Sweet Sundown (142bpm) this bright and breezy track is another of the album's delights and now I am getting spoiled for choice.

Success (118bpm) a surprise with an Iggy Pop and David Bowie song. This sassy number has a very contemporary sound to it.

Stone's Throw Away (112bpm) a gorgeous waltz that I have played over and over and as there are not too many waltz dances around at the moment, this could prove to be just the track to remedy that.

I Must Be Lucky (108bpm) Kelly transforms into "rock chick" mode. Just think Sheryl Crow meets Natasha Bedingfield and you will know exactly what I mean.

To close this wonderful album we have *Translated From Love* (62bpm) which is another nightclub two step on which you can fully experience Kelly's beautiful and rich voice.

I have to admit that I was not expecting too much from this album however I was totally blown away by it! There are lots of tracks that you could dance to and I can highly recommend it.



THE VERY BEST OF VOL. 2 Dolly Parton SONY BMG

After her highly successful tour, Dolly's record company releases this compilation album from "the first lady of country".

Dolly gets the ball rolling with *Joshua* (108bpm) and this could be a good fun Line dance.

The Seeker (81bpm) although a little dated this gospel flavoured "feel good" song is classic Dolly.

Harper Valley PTA (122bpm) was a worldwide hit for Jeannie C Riley and Dolly gives a fine rendition here.

Heartbreaker (67bpm) is a nightclub two step, a beautiful song that is worthy having a dance written to it.

Two Doors Down (97bpm) is a bouncy little number with an infectious beat.

Boulder To Birmingham (58bpm) is a slow, harmonious song which highlights Dolly's wonderful voice.

Put It Off Until Tomorrow (83bpm) is a powerful, steadily paced waltz.

All I Can Do (130bpm) Dolly sure delivers a mean polka and this track is no exception.

Your Love Has Lifted Me Higher (124bpm) is an amazing rendition of the Jackie Wilson classic.

Rockin Years (80bpm) is another slow paced waltz, whilst *In The Ghetto* (80bpm) is Dolly's take on my favourite Elvis song.

Just Because I'm A Woman (105bpm) also sounds a little dated, but reminds me of the late great Tammy Wynette.

Yellow Roses (114bpm) is a nice steady cha cha, and **I Really Don't Want To Know** (68bpm) is a beautiful song which is a nightclub two step on which Willie Nelson duets.

Eagle When She Flies (77bpm) will give you goose bumps and as it is a waltz it too deserves to have a dance to it.

Please Don't Stop Loving Me (112bpm) is a lively song with a nice beat. Dolly's vocal delivery is a joy.

Down From Dover (136bpm) is one of Dolly's wonderful "story songs".

Where Beauty Lives In Memory (66bpm) Dolly almost whispers this song in parts, to put just the right emphasis on it.

The curtain closer is Dolly's classic *To Daddy* (84bpm) simply a beautiful song.

Another Dolly Parton compilation, another wonderful album, and another that must be added to your collection.

This is a super country track and the well choreographed dance fits the music perfectly. The repetition of the 'step, touch, back shuffle, turn' sequence is a good help in the learning stages. We need more dances like this one.

Head Over Heels Andrew, Simon and Sheila Head Over Heels - Abba

I was taught this dance in Benidorm back in January and thought then that it would be a hit and a terrific dance to teach to the class. Tags and restarts are no problem. They make the dance more interesting.

Come Tomorrow Michele Perron Come Tomorrow - B. Streisand and B. Gibb

A clever dance and one easy one to remember as well with some unusual steps at the beginning. The dance flows absolutely beautifully to the music and the restart and tags have never been difficult for the class to spot.

Everybody's Someone Maggie Gallagher

Everybody's Someone - L. Rimes & B.McFadden

What can I say about this one? A firm favourite with the class, it reflects the mood of the music brilliantly and I think this dance will stay around for some time.

One Of Those Things Alan Spence One Of Those Things - Hal Ketchum.

Really easy Beginner dance that was taught in 10 mins. Another good dance to begin or end the class with. The track is taken from the same CD as Maggie G`s One More Midnight, so it`s a lovely country track for all you country lovers out there. We need more dances like this.

Smokey Places Michele Perron Smokey Places - Scooter Lee.

Storms Never Last Geoff Langford Storms Never Last -Dr Hook

Wonderful little dance which seems a bit tricky when first done until you master the right turn. My classes love this one and request it again and again. The track is a little short so I play it twice. The singing from the class gets louder the second time around.

Don't Despair Gary And Marie Lafferty

What Becomes Of The Broken Hearted - Blue Lagoon I think this one will be a big hit. With its jazzed up version of an old favourite it is simply a fantastic dance which is a very easy intermediate dance to teach. You'll find yourself bouncing with the music and everyone remembers the hip bumps in the choreography. One of those that will last.

The fantastic Latin music encourages my Beginners to lose their inhibitions as they wiggle their hips and get ready to yell "Tequila" on three occasions during the track. A winner.

Alfie

Cato Larsen Alfie - Lily Allen

Forget Cilla Black letting rip with "What's it all about Alfieeeee"! This is a very contemporary song by Lily Allen with great lyrics and a good fun beat. (Instructors: make sure you obtain the clean version!) The dance is easy enough to please most Beginners, whilst containing some syncopated cross mambo rock steps which will definitely keep them focussed.

I Just Want to Dance

Charlotte Williams

I Just Want To Dance With You - George Strait

This lovely dance will give experienced Beginners & Improvers something to challenge them. It's a well-crafted routine with quite a few turns, but those become the highlight of the dance, once mastered. The song has never seemed to lose its appeal, even though it seems to have been around since the dawn of line dance! Your dancers may need a few weeks of practice, but if they are anything like mine, they will persevere because it's unthinkable to sit this one out.

The Areach Conection

Greg and Josie Pickles lived in Bolton and had been Line dancing for years. In September 2005, they decided to live in France. *Laurent Saletto* spoke to them to find out how they introduced Line dance to Brittany...

Greg and Josie Pickles lived in Bolton and worked for 30 years in the Police force. They discovered Line dance some ten years ago and used to have a class at the Astley Bridge Conservative Club. After retiring, they decided on a total change of environment and lifestyle. Greg says: "We wanted to go somewhere where the way of life would appreciate the "old values" and so our research took us to Brittany." They picked a small farming village called Lanrelas which was close to the ideology they wanted and they purchased a neo-Breton house in 2005.

Line dancing was part of their plan though as Greg explains: "We were always going to teach line dance in France. We thought it would be a good way to meet people and make friends and very naively we decided to teach in English. We reasoned that if you wanted to learn ballet, you would do it in French and that seemed a valid argument at the time."

However they soon realised, that as sound a logic as it may have seemed at first, they would have to master French to be understood. With their strong Bolton accents in a French local area known for its own strong local twang, it was never going to be easy.

Things did start happening when in November 2006, Josie and Greg were invited to teach a class at a nearby Salle Des Fêtes (Village Hall). The couple soon learnt that "Breton Dance" (literally Dance from Brittany) was a popular pastime in the area and also realised that in general French people love dancing. The invitation meant that interest in Line dancing was gathering and Josie and Greg started to make enquiries. In a short time they booked the Salle Des Fêtes and Mairie (Town Hall) for Thursday evenings and met with the Sports and Leisure Association who became sold on their idea and offered to cooperate with Josie and Greg, thus making things a lot easier. They continued using the name of their old UK club, Mis Amigos, but focused more on the Western connection as both English and French communities understand it and love it. Greg says: "It

speaks of the sense of friendship we have developed now. It just works."

The next culture shock for our couple and the local dancers was the question of a small fee to attend the classes. Normally in France, clubs are paid for up front and cover users for the whole season. Greg explains: "We wanted to give something back to the Association and people thought that we had lost our minds. Probably like most other line dance teachers in England, we never made much money but we liked the idea of giving something back to the community who were making us so welcome."

So, everything was put in place and flyers were placed in every window they could find for kilometres around.



Josie picks up the story: "The first night arrived and we had advertised it as a "demonstration" which was the advice we had been given. Loads of British ex-pats turned up and four curious French people! We had maybe thirty to thirty five people all told. All in all, the night seemed to go down well, but we steeled ourselves for being there on our own the week after. Most of the Brits who had turned up had pretty much said that it was literally a matter of support and Line dance was not for them."

Sure enough, as the weeks passed, some Brits did drop off but surprisingly they got replaced by more and more locals. Josie adds: "Our class is now about 75% French and we have made some excellent friends. From both nationalities! But what else would you expect from Line dancing?" Indeed.

Greg says: "The first night we tried to teach in English it soon became obvious we had made a mistake. We quickly made the transition into our lame French and called with as much confidence as we could muster, only to be met with blank expressions. "What the heck was that all about?" they seemed to say. The dances were another thing altogether. Nobody had seen anything like the simple steps we were showing them and as far as everyone was concerned, we were setting off on the wrong foot. All Breton dances start with the left foot. Starting with the right was not possible! And as for the beat? What beat?"

However, word soon spread about the non English teaching club and Josie and Greg were now being invited to several adjacent towns and villages to put on various displays and teaches. They both say "We have become quite famous, starring in several newspaper articles and our local village magazine. In fact, we were even mentioned in our Lady Mayor's annual address to the village, a big honour for us." Another accolade for the couple was an invitation to organize a "bal country" (a country dance) to display all the dances they had taught. At the end of the night, the association committee presented Josie and Greg with an all inclusive weekend away in a hotel. Josie says: "We never expected anything like this. The friendship we had received over the preceding seven months was enough for us, but it is in keeping with the generosity of the French people."

Greg tells me a little about the style of dance you can expect to find there and he says "When we first saw the French Line dance scene it was like a time warp for us, going back about ten or eleven years. Everybody loves to dress in western gear and the dances are from that same period. An adventurous dance is Grundy Gallop. Tush Push is new to many and anything to a Gwen Steffani track is waiting to happen several years down the line. The most modern dance I have been able to find is Beer For Horses, but many people still do not know that. We have had several invitations to teach Black Coffee, which as far as we know has yet to hit Brittany."

Steps are done in a mix of languages (a sort of Franglais) but once the basic steps have been described, they revert to teaching on the count. There are no "rhymes" called as such. Once you have been taken through one wall to the count, you are straight into the dance, there is no walk through of the four walls and then joining several walls together. Greg wonders if this is one of the reasons why the dancing is progressing at a slightly more leisurely pace than he remembers it doing in the U.K. Well, that and the holiday season (July and August see France more or less shut down!).

The village is now fully behind Greg and Josie and the Lady mayor Madame Amice always makes a point of stopping her car to catch up with them if shee sees them around. She thinks that Line dancing has brought the British ex pats living there and the French community closer together. As for the lingo, well, both sides use a pidgin language which is certainly very useful although Greg says: "I am supposed to be the French speaker and yet Josie knows more about what went on after a night's conversation. When I ask her how she does it, she shrugs "We just understand each other! Women are definitely much better communicators".

Today, if you ask Greg and Josie, whether they regret moving to Brittany they both say "No way, Other than missing our son Matthew, family and friends, it is the best decision we have ever made!" Both are quick to point out that if you are within striking distance of Lanrelas (near Broons – about 45 mins drive from the ferries at St Malo) and want a relaxed Thursday evening (starting from 6 September) you must drop in on them, they would be glad to see you.

Dance till you drop

Carol Craven went to one of the most popular event in the USA, The JG2 Line Dance Marathon organised by James Gregory and Jean Garr (JG2)....Here is her report about this US annual "must" held in June



The Marathon was just that, so many lessons - so little time. This event was a joy to attend. Everything was well organised and the staff worked tirelessly to make everything seem effortless. From the moment you walked in the door, the theme for the year was evident. Knights, dragons, maidens and everything Medieval! Guyton Mundy did all the large banners that were auctioned off on Saturday night so each classroom had artwork to maintain the feeling of being in a different era. Balloons adorned every column and room. The hotel is perfect for this event with lots of large ballrooms for the classes. There are usually five lessons every hour with open dancing all day long. They have DJs in the open dance room all day and classes for all levels as well as dance previews each morning at 9 am.

One of the reasons this event has got better and better over the many years it has been going is because they actually read and incorporate the guests suggestions. There is a bar and restaurant in the Sheraton Imperial Hotel. I like the lobby of this hotel because it's such a great place to meet before and after classes. Everyone walks through it going to and from their rooms so you have time to meet new people and talk with old friends.

There were over 700 people here this year and lots of new faces that I hadn't seen before. I noticed there were many more young people and many, many people from Europe and Asia.

Julie Harris and Neville Fitzgerald flew back to Tampa and I loved having them at my house before the event. It was great to dance with them all weekend. There were lots of people wearing "The Neville Made Me Dance It" shirts to greet them when they arrived.

All the lessons started at 2 pm on Thursday. This day is reserved for people to teach popular dances that are not their own but are being done and popular around the world. The Thursday night party was huge, as it always is at this event, and with a 4100 square feet dance floor in the main ballroom there is plenty of room to dance. All day each day there is a separate room for all the open dancing you could want with DJs playing your requests. We would go in and if an instructor was there we would get them to do a quick wall so we could dance what we had learned. All the schedules for each day are on large boards in the hallways so you don't have to be fumbling through your things to find the schedule and I don't have to put on my glasses to read it. Friday was more classes and that night we had the Who's Turning 50 Party. There was a huge fun cake and black balloons and everyone who is or was turning 50 this year was cheered. Want to know who is turning 50? Well, amongst many names it seems, they were James and Max Perry, Nancy Morgan and Johnny 2-Step. Turning 40 was John Robinson; Turning 70 was Jeff Bartholomew and Turning 80 was Ed Cagley. The Line Dance Party started at 8 pm and when I went to bed at around 2:30 am there



were still lots of people there. Louie was the evening DJ and he played until the last person said ENOUGH! We did all kinds of dances from really old to really new.

Saturday was more lessons all day leading up to the Show and Parade on Saturday night at midnight. The show was just the right length with lots of variety. Pepper Siguieros did a great job as Emcee and talking to Relic, the puppet, that Guyton made and raffled off after the show. She also performed her competition routine flawlessly. Lillian Lo from Hong Kong did a Chinese ribbon dance in a beautiful costume. The highlight of the show for me was Gerard, Junior, John Robinson, James Gregory and Kathy Hunyadi dancing Supermodelz. 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USE IT OR LOSE IT

Sometimes science tells you what you kinda thought already. Well, now it's official, Line dance is good for you. Here's how....

According to information published in Scooter Lee's Dancing the Dream brochure, mature people who Line dance the night away, play bridge or a musical instrument may be doing more than just having fun. A new study suggests that active seniors may be warding off the risk of developing dementia, including Alzheimer's.

The study in the New England Journal of Medicine adds to the scientific evidence suggesting that mentally challenging activities may offer massive protection against Alzheimer's.

Joe Verhese and his colleagues at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine in the Bronx studied 469 people aged 75 and older that did not have any signs of forgetfulness at the study's start. The researchers asked the recruits how often they participated in leisure activities such as chess, crossword puzzles or dancing. They also kept track of the people who developed mild forgetfulness or full-blown dementia during the study.

The team discovered that the most active people overall had a 63% lower risk of developing dementia compared with people who said they hardly ever played cards, line danced or did other such activities.

Older people can greatly reduce the risk of dementia by engaging in various activities several times a week

Given examples of reduced risk included

Compared with people who rarely participate

in these activities, people who played the hardest gained the most. For example, older people who did crossword puzzles for four days a week had a 47% lower risk of dementia than those who did the puzzles once a week. Line dancing also offered a hedge against dementia although, in general, physical activity did not.

"Any mentally challenging activity, like learning a new line dance step might spur the brain to establish new connections or perhaps to grow new brain cells," says Gary Small at the University of California – Los Angeles. "The extra brainpower may

compensate for any loss of brain cells because of a disease process such as Alzheimer's."

"The use it or lose it theory of successful ageing has yet to be proven scientifically" say Bill Thies of the Alzheimer's Association in Chicago. Still this is one time the experts aren't waiting for proof: Thies, Small and Verghese all recommend building fun, mentally challenging activities into daily life. And we say what better way to do that than line dancing.

"Having fun won't hurt and it might ultimately offer a hedge against Alzheimer's" Small says. "Keep your brain active and you may protect yourself against future memory loss."

And now..... the line dancers' lament, how does it start?

DUDLEY NEWLINE PROJECT

When you are young, it is only too easy to have preconceived ideas and attitude about Line dancing. *Laurent Saletto* meets one young man who is making a big difference in his community by discovering tomorrow's talent.

he Line dance community never ceases to amaze me. I don't think there is another quite like it. When I meet a club, or a group of dancers they always seem to be doing something for someone or a charity, organising outings for people perhaps less privileged, less lucky than they are. But nothing to me is more commendable than when the very young try to make a difference for people around them, in other words, do their bit.

A young man who is certainly doing that is Ryan Hunt. Ryan is 15 years old, from Dudley, West Midlands and by his own actions is changing a small part of his community for the better. Before you can understand the reason for the Dudley Newline Project he started earlier on this year, you have to understand that dancing to this lad is everything.

Ryan started Line dancing at the tender age of seven and was immediately hooked. He began competing in February 2001 and since then has managed to get quite a few recognitions along the way, not least getting a second place in his first ever Regional Competition, first place in Masters In Line British Champion, second place in the CWDC European Championships and third place in the Masters In Line Junior World Championships. He has taken to more styles of dancing and has been winning medals (Gold, Silver and Bronze) in styles as diverse as Merengue, Mambo, Cumbia and Rock'n Roll.

He admits: "I am a Line dance addict!" Now, for most people that would be enough, but not for Ryan. He says: "I get a great buzz from dancing and feel that other young people should have the opportunity to try it for themselves at least once." His reasoning is sound. "Line dancing is a good form of exercise, social interaction and works the brain, all criteria of activity that the government are aiming to promote in the campaign against child obesity. I thought to myself that young people were either going to dislike it or take to it and become addicts too."

He looked at some options on how to engage young people in Dudley and decided to organise a one off "taster" evening to be held at his local youth centre. Ryan applied for funding in February 2007 to the YOF (Youth Opportunities Fund) of Dudley council for a sum of money to fund the event and all of the costs he would encounter. "My bid was accepted and the minute it arrived the project began."



Ryan wanted his event to be held in April 2007 so not a lot of time to waste. Decorations, refreshments, raffle prizes, time arrangements had to be organised as well as quite a few people such as DJ's, caterers, cleaners and two very special guests Darren and Lana from Strictly Come Dancing fame who agreed to come down on the night and do some brilliant demos.

Ryan explains what happened next: "The result of those efforts was a Special Evening held on Thursday 5th April 2007. The room looked great with its Newline colours balloons, pens, banners and a shoe display with some Linedancer Magazines. We started the event with 21 students, and around half of those had brought an adult to be with them. Slowly but surely more people kept arriving at different stages of the night, which was very rewarding for me. Darren and Lana did spectacularly well with a Latin Street Dance and a Freestyle Cha. They taught a new funky dance called I Don't Need A Man which they had just released. What amazed me was how the students picked it up as it was fast and fairly tricky in places. I also instructed at the event a funky improver dance called You Don't Know Me. A combination of demonstrations of classic dances and present line dances from The Dudley Newline Team really appealed to the students. When the evening was over, people were buzzing with excitement. It had all seemed a worthwhile effort.

This could have been a one off, something to look back on and be able to say "I did this". But it was not enough for Ryan. Wanting to build on the showcase he had created, he followed up those who had come and has now 10 fully committed students every week. He says:

"My group keeps coming back to learn more and more dances and I see this as probably my best achievement. The students (whose ages range from 10 to 15 and both male and female in equal numbers) are really enjoying learning the latest chart topping dances typical of the modern line dance scene. They often come to me and say can we do a dance to such and such track so I go and find one, and if I can't find one I put one together myself!" As the suitably impressed Youth Centre still provides funds for refreshments and snacks for the group on a weekly basis, the project is able to continue. All of this is free for the young students as well as entry to the classes. Ryan feels this is his "bit for my community" as he puts it.

The future for the project looks quite rosy with the members now all good close friends and encouraging more of their peer group to ditch their preconceived ideas and see for themselves what Line dance today is really all about.

Ryan asked me to make sure that the following people would get a mention. He says "Christine Nash, Joyce Brotherton, Mick Aston, Beryl Aston, Paula Round and Janet Pittaway... Thanks a lot. Could not have done this without you."

Clearly, Ryan Hunt is someone with drive and passion. He is also someone who is not afraid to invest in tomorrow's Line dance, in our future dancers, in the up and coming stars. So, when one day, you see a fabulous new dance and think "Wow..How great is that!" it may come from one of Ryan's young protégés and thanks to the sense of vision of a young man of 15 years of age in 2007, the world may continue to Line dance for ever more. "I get a great buzz from dancing and feel that other young people should have the opportunity to try it for themselves at least once."

A NEW COURTRY NAME

At just 16, Kay'D is a UK country singer who is gaining notoriety. *Laurent Saletto* finds out about a unique fresh talent.



or those of you lucky enough to have heard this new singer live, you will not need me to tell you what a surprise she turns out to be. She is one of a few new home grown Country acts who seem to be thriving recently. Assured and at ease on stage, she has a presence that belies her young age and I predict her a glittering career in the future.

Kay'D (Kayleigh Larter) has been singing for as long as she can remember although surprisingly Country Music is a relatively recent discovery for her. She came to it by accident in 2003 by watching The Judds movie "Love Can Build A Bridge" and was so bowled over that she became instantly obsessed with Country Music gaining knowledge by mixing with people who loved Country and could help her with the zillion questions she had for them. She says "Next thing I knew all of my previous CD collection was gathering dust at the back of the shelf and was replaced with country artists. I could think of nothing else than to be in country music."

Kay'D by then had had quite a few years of performing in public at karaoke nights and in theatre school. In 2004, she was singing at a charity event in Sandringham. Her now manager, Tony, approached her and asked her to think seriously about what she wanted to do in life. She says : "It did take me a year or so to work out how I wanted things to go. But I finally told Tony that I wanted to break into the country scene slowly due to my education which I didn't want interrupted. He agreed to represent me and began to slowly promote my name on the circuit." Lady Luck gave her a little push too as a really good break came Kay'D's way when she was asked to cover for an unwell artist at Stradsett CMF in 2006. She says : "From the festival, bookings started and people began to know my name. I continued to perform as many showcase spots as possible to keep raising my experience and profile. These festivals then began to rebook me for 2007 and further events and things started to look very promising."

So what next? Celebrity status? Money? Kay'D tells me: "I have always said that fame and fortune are just a bonus. It's hard to explain. They would be nice but they are not my aim. Ultimately my goal is to earn enough money to live and sing as often as possible, hopefully entertaining fans and doing my part to help country music thrive. Sharing what I love the most is more precious than anything with other performers and fans alike."

I feel slightly humbled by this young lady. She certainly knows what she wants and is not afraid of making some valid points. Although she has now got a band called Kay'D And The Redneck Rodeos, she goes on to say : "You know, one thing does get to me. There seems to be a shared opinion that if you're a solo artist you're just a karaoke singer because you use backing tracks. I don't think that's very fair because, okay, it might not the "Full live sound", but a solo artist sings live and so that's what counts." She adds: "You often find that people will tell you "You really should have a band", but the problem then is, you can't get any work because no one can afford to pay five people. Band members have to live too and sometimes it seems to be a lose lose situation."

Although Kay'D writes some of her own songs she, as yet, has to unveil any of them. However she hopes that with her band she will be able to stretch herself further soon. She says: "I tend to write songs spontaneously. We'll be in the van driving somewhere and I'll say to Tony "Quick give me a piece of paper and pen!" because I will have spotted something that will be the inspiration for a few lyrics. Song writing is very strange like that. I think it's always easier though, to write about something that you can relate to, as you seem to include more passion."

She surprises me by telling me she has four CD's available and hearing some of the songs she has recorded over the years remind me what a truly talented singer this young girl really is.

Some sounds are just born, they can't be made. In time, they get a polish and a maturity that is not always apparent but I don't quite see what Kay'D could do to improve her rich, pitch perfect voice, even at 16. Her performances are ones of a much older, more seasoned singer. I wonder how she got this special quality and she acknowledges the help of her family all through the years. Especially her beloved Grandad who died in 2005. Kay'D says: "He had endless faith in me and would bore the rest of the household to tears by repeatedly playing tapes of me



that I would record for him." His faith and the family's have shaped her into the fine young woman she is today.

Grounded, with an undeniable talent that you must seek out soon and gifted with a great sound, Kay'D's passion for UK Country is unremitting. She just loves it. She points out: "I'm loving so many artists on the country scene of today. The UK is awesome. There is a fantastic range of artists and there always seems to be something different that you haven't seen before. That's great." She goes on to pay tribute to Henry Smith in particular who has been a great support to her.

I guess we haven't seen the last of this young artist and I for one can't wait to see her develop into the great singer she is destined to become. Don't forget you heard it in Linedancer first!



Tim Ruzgar looks to the days of yore with nostalgia when Live was best and pleads for its survival.

Slow Demise of Live

The immense changes in today's Line dancing are not only seen in the actual dances but also very much in the music and because of that there has been a massive decline in live music at Line dance events. When we first started Line dancing back in 1995 there were no socials or weekend events that did not have live music. It was as much an attraction as the dancing itself back then. In Doncaster we used to attend monthly socials at the Earl of Doncaster Hotel where the resident band was Big Sky Country. These three lads provided some great country music and I remember the first social we went to when we only knew a handful of dances like Tush Push, Cowgirls Twist and Cowboy Strut. We made the dances fit to just about any of the tracks that the band played !

We also danced to live music provided by our Line dance instructors at Skytrax, Sue and Alan Cole, who often sang at their socials. Then we were introduced to Dave Sheriff who was the first to cater specifically for Line dancers and we used to dance our socks off at any social he was at. Scooter Lee soon followed and we had some fantastic nights dancing to her brilliant music.

The floodgates were then opened for many pub, club singers and bands to jump on the Line dance bandwagon as the demand for live country music grew by the week. It has to be said that some of the acts were pretty dire. As we had CMT Europe at the time, they paled by comparison to the Nashville acts. However some good bands did appear like the Dean Brothers who grew to be not only one of the top Line dance bands, but also promoters too. Their award winning "Chance to Dance" festivals in Harrogate were just about the best weekend events and they are still much talked about today.

I remember Magill making their debut there. Many others were afforded a chance to show what they could do thanks to John Dean. I also remember the Deans paying a lot of money to have the Bellamy Brothers there who I found extremely disappointing. One slight downside at the "Chance to Dance" festivals was that there could be ten bands on in one day and they would often all have a similar play list.

Other great quality acts included Circuit Judge, Nadine Summers, Vaquero, and Gary Perkins and the Breeze.

Nowadays there only seems to be a hand full of live singers and bands left on the circuit as many Line dancers prefer to dance to original tracks as the range of music today is so diverse. Artists like Calico and the brilliant Glenn Rogers are two of the more successful acts on the circuit, probably because they can deliver a lot of the music that is current on today's scene.

I do remember that there was always at great atmosphere at those early live music events and it will be great pity if we lose them altogether, Trust Me! tim's**tasty**tips

Free & Easy is a nice dance from Jeanette Robson to Dirks Bentley's "Free & Easy Down the Road I Go2". Jeanette's dance is for beginner/improvers and is 32 counts, and 4 walls.

Tell on You from Gary Lafferty is a good beginner/ improver dance to country music; Leann rimes version of "Your Cheatin' Heart". We always need nice easy 32 count, 4 wall dances like Gary's!

Don't Look Back is a new dance from Carol Patterson & Kumari Tugnait and it was written to Lucie Silvas' "Don't Look Back". This 2 wall intermediate dance is phrased ABC but it well worth the effort.

Next Stop was choreographed by Robert Lindsay to another Brushwood track "Next stop". Robert's dance is 32 counts, 4 walls and is intermediate.

Dead Tired is a nice dance that was written by Gaye Teather to "I Can Sleep When I'm Dead" by Jason Michael Carroll. This super little dance is intermediate level and is 64 counts, and 4 walls.

Whole Lot of Leavin' is the latest dance from Alan Birchall and was choreographed to the brilliant Bon Jovi track of the same name. This intermediate/advanced dance is 48 counts and 4 walls. Cool music, cool dance!

We Ain't Strangers from Stephen Rutter is a another from the Bon Jovi country album Lost Highway and is a duet with Leann Rimes. Stephen's dance is 44 counts, 4 walls and is classed as intermediate.

Had it and Lost it is another good country dance from Mark Furnell and it was written to Alan Jackson's "A Woman's Love". Classed as intermediate/advanced, Mark's dance is 32 counts and 4 walls.

Love Ain't Easy was choreographed by Dave Morgan & Debbie Graham to the beautiful song "Broken hearted" by Aussie country artist Gina Jeffries Gary. This beautiful dance is 64 counts, 4 walls, and improver/intermediate. I love this dance!

Barking up the Wrong Tree from Rep Ghazali is to the Don Woody song of that name. Rep's dance is an excellent beginner dance and is 32 counts, and 4 walls.

Born in a one stop light town

Newcomer to the Country scene Sherry Lynn always wanted to sing on the Grand Ole Opry "just like Loretta". *Laurent Saletto* chats to her and discovers her amazing life story and passionate drive.





It does not take me long to realise that Sherry Lynn is a very honest and open person. Her answers to my questions are straight and to the point. She tells things as they are and her strength and determination shine through. Sherry's story though sad at times is ultimately one full of hope and meaning.

"I was born in a one stop light town, a little dot with nothing but a supermarket and a gas station and where the local hang out was Nick's Pizzeria" Sherry tells me. And Clayton, NJ was a town she never thought she would ever get out of for many years of her life.

When Sherry was just two, her father was murdered and her mother had to raise three children on her own, two girls and a boy. "It was tough at times because my Mom worked two jobs to support us, my sister who is six years older than me was the one who looked out for us in those days."

When everyday life is difficult, fantasies become important to a young girl. Sherry Lynn grew up dreaming of being like her idol Loretta Lynn. She says: "I used to stand in front of the mirror holding a hair brush and sing Coal's Miner Daughter." But reality soon bit and at 16, she started waitressing, at 17 she had her first child and dropped out of school, by 19 she was married and by 23 had had four children. Her marriage was not going very well and soon she found herself alone with her children. Sherry's life looked as though it was going to be mapped out forever. Clayton certainly seemed to be her one last stop town.

But determination and spirit do get you places and it was not too long before Sherry met a special someone who would become her anchor and give her children and herself support with a decent life style. He enabled her to go back to the drawing board and rekindle her old dreams.

Sherry started small. Very small in fact with just karaoke nights at her local bar and after a few times, realised the old fever had not left her. "Once you get through the first song, it calms your nerves a bit" she says with a laugh. People would always tell her to follow the dream and she started to research the music industry, organise a few demos learning how the recording process worked. It was through those early contacts she met Ted Hewitt who had just scored a Gold seller album with "If You're Going Through Hell" by Rodney Atkins. The rest as they say is history.

"Being in a studio with Ted was so different to anything I have ever done before". Sherry pays respect to the man who guided her first hesitant steps. "Ted is straightforward, down to earth and I love working with him. He makes me feel at ease singing so I was able to go and start putting my own spin on things an create my own sound". So what is Sherry's sound?

It is definitely a today sound but it does have some traditional roots in it and it is not afraid to have its own identity. Her voice is strong, and sometimes fragile in its intensity, yet raucous and clear. Above all, it is uncompromising and Sherry's delivery makes you listen to what she has to say. It is a sound all of her own.

One way to judge it is to listen to her new album It's A Woman Thing. The title refers to the pride she has of being a woman Country singer. It is a great collection of songs, and they all touch upon Sherry's inspirations. I ask her the reasons why she chose certain songs. She confides "Scarecrow Dance (her single) for instance touched me because it talks about faith and belief from a little girl point of view. I still am that little girl". Is There Still Time talks about her own life. Sherry wrote it herself and it is about dreams that some time women feel have to be forgotten because of children and husbands. Way Past Over is about women doing it on their own and not needing guys. And Simple Things is about the little silly things that all too often she says "we all

take for granted and think have no meaning until they are gone".

Sherry is a beautiful talented woman but she is no diva. Her head is firmly planted on her shoulders and she knows that her life is not just about being a Country singer.

Her five children who range from 17 all the way down to four years old keep her in a daily reality check. She says : "I personally find it to be a huge undertaking to be a Mom and a country singer but I wouldn't trade the experience. At first it was difficult because my kids weren't into it but now they think it is great so that is a huge help. My family is a huge support system for me and they make it possible for me to balance my career as well as my home life. If it weren't for them a music career wouldn't be an option."

She also adds: "When I'm not on the road I always make sure that I am at school functions, sporting events as well as taking the time to make sure everyone has what they need. These are things that I have always enjoyed and having a career will never change that."

I certainly did not expect any less grounding from someone who clearly has had her fair share of upheavals and sadness in her life. But what is likeable about Sherry is her drive and enthusiasm. When asked about what she wants to do now, she says with candour: "One of my life's goal has already happened when I got fortunate enough to be able to sing the National Anthem at a Philadelphia Phillies (baseball) game in front of a sold out crowd (40,000 + fans). That was the realisation of one of my dreams for many years." Of course, she still has to achieve the main one. Singing on The Grand Ole Opry, just like Loretta. But I feel sure she will get there. And I also think the world will hear much more about this new rising star very soon.

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

Secret Applejacking

Recent online discussions about whether or not dancers can do Applejacks made me think back to the days when we had dancers challenging each other to do the best Applejacks. We had so much fun teaching them and I can't think of any other step in Line dancing that got so many people working so hard to achieve it. I do remember some of our dancers coming back to class after being at events and telling us that they were asked if they went to `Sho Botham'. Apparently our dancers had got a reputation for being good Applejackers. So for all of you out there who want to learn to or improve your Applejacking I will share the secret of achieving good Applejacks with you. But before I do, I want to just remind you that Applejacking is not suitable for every Line dancer. Good Applejack technique is vital to prevent knee aches. If you have knee problems already then I would suggest giving Applejacks a miss.

The first thing you need to think about is where the Applejack movement begins. Often the focus is all in the feet because it's the flashy movements of the feet that are observed but actually it all starts in the hip joint. Your legs turn in and out at the hip joint and when turnout happens in the hip the rest of the leg including the knee will turn out too. However, if you only try to turn out the feet or knees without using the hip joint the knee ends up taking the strain. So before starting to learn Applejacks think about your toe and heel fans technique. Focus on instigating the movement from the hip rather than the foot or knee. As with all new movement patterns it takes a bit of practise to achieve it. I should just mention here that when you do a toe or heel fans make sure that you `lift and lay' the toes or heels to avoid putting pressure on the knee caused by dragging the foot against the floor. Once you have mastered the art of this you are ready to give Applejacks a try.

Break the Applejack into individual moves for example, a right Applejack can be broken down into:-

Start with feet parallel – a bit less than a hip width apart $% \left({{{\mathbf{x}}_{i}}} \right)$

1 Toe fan action right (finish right leg and foot turned out)

2 Heel fan action left moving left heel towards right heel (finish with heels together, legs and feet turned out

3 Heel fan action left returning to parallel 4 Toe fan action right returning to parallel

Tip: aim for freedom in the hip joint and return to your parallel starting base each time.

Practice the above then progress to counting it as 1&2&. You are speeding

up the action but still doing four separate moves. As you become more proficient at it you can progress to doing the first two moves together with a rest between and then finally doing a right Applejack without the rests, for example:-

1 Toe fan right and heel fan left - both moves danced at the same time & Rest

2 Heel fan left and toe fan right - returning to parallel and both moves danced at the same time & Rest

And then:-

1 oe fan right and heel fan left – both moves danced at the same time $% \left(f_{1}, f_{2}, f_{3}, f_$

& Heel fan left and toe fan right - returning to parallel and both moves danced at the same time

Reverse all of this to practise left Applejacks. And once you have mastered right and left Applejacks you can try different sequences such as:-


1 & Right Applejack
 2 & Left Applejack
 3 & 4 & Right Applejack x 2

Then you are ready to impress everyone with your flashy Applejacking.

Blades Of Glory

With Will Ferrell and Jon Heder



Blades Of Glory is one of those glorious comedies which have that many laugh out loud moments you will have to watch it again and again to get all the jokes. It is a sensational send up of the world of professional figure skating and it is truly hilarious. The premise, as in many good comedies, is simple enough. When rival figure skaters Chazz Michael Michaels (Will Ferrell) and Jimmy MacElroy (Jon Heder) go ballistic in an embarrassing, no-holds-barred fight

at the World Championships (wonderful), they are stripped of their gold medals and banned from the sport for life. Now, three-and-a-half years on, they've found a loophole that will allow them to compete. If they can put aside their differences, they can skate together – in pairs figure skating!

The laughs come fast and furious with Ferrell at his skin crawling macho best and Heder as the campest dancing star you will ever watch on ice or anywhere else. But the real bonus in all this is the veritable treasure trove of extras the DVD offers. Featurettes such as "Return to Glory: The Making of Blades", "Celebrities on Thin Ice", "Cooler Than Ice: The Super-Sexy Costumes of Skating", "Arnett & Poehler: A Family Affair", "20 Questions with Scott Hamilton", "Hector: Portrait of a Psychofan" as well as deleted scenes, a gag reel, alternative takes, a music video and more, making this DVD a true collector's item.

DVD reviews

Dixie Chicks Shut up and Sing

This fantastic film should be seen by everyone, whether they like the Dixie Chicks or not. It is much much more than just a "rockumentary" and touches upon everybody's right of speech as well as redefining our opinions of some of the USA's ways. It follows the band after the famous (or rather infamous) throwaway comment made by lead singer Natalie Maines in a 2003 London concert. "Just so you know, we're ashamed the President of the United States is from Texas."

At a time when the US was poised to go to war in Iraq, Natalie's comment was seen as deeply unpatriotic by many and resulted in a general boycott of their music as well as public binning of their discs by right leaning fans and even death threats. During that time they had to continue with their lives in difficult circumstances.



Shut Up And Sing is a no holds barred documentary by Oscar winning Barbara Kopple. She was allowed unprecedented access backstage during the controversial period where the Dixie Chicks had to rebuild bridges and stop their career reaching freefall. The film picks up two years later and shows the band writing and recording the album Taking The Long Way. Of course, by then, public opinion had changed somewhat about the US government and the band remained unrepentant with the defiant single Not Ready To Make Nice and singer Martie Maguire commenting "I learned I was ready to put myself on the line…Nothing is as important as standing up for what you believe in". Taking The Long Way went on to earn the girls five Grammy Awards including Album Of The Year.

What the film offers apart from being a riveting documentary of one of today's best bands is an indictment on America's highly selective take on what is actually the notion of "free speech".

It is truly a fascinating, intelligent and thought provoking film.

I have been teaching Line dance for the last 10 years, and two years ago, I decided to start my own dance studio and teach full time. I instruct all kinds of classes, from beginners to competitors every day of the week, except Friday and Saturday, where I usually go to different Line dance events, do my own events and workshops, or go out and teach at birthday parties, weddings, etc.

On a normal day, my wife Lykke and our nine month old daughter Lea usually wake up before me. I like to start the day a little later with some yoghurt or cereal, and quickly go through the newspaper. Then I check my e-mails to see if there is anything urgent that needs my attention right away. After that, I do some household chores, and if it's the beginning of the week, go out shopping for all the essentials.

Then it's back to work on the computer. I try to update my website (www.bennyray.dk) as often as possible. There are flyers and posters for upcoming events to be made, ads for the local newspaper at the start of each season, and dance lists to be updated. I also have several sites that I visit every day for new dances, and about once a week I check out CMT's website for all the new country music. I compete at WCDF events on the intermediate level, and I also enter with my own choreography. If it's close to a competition, I go to my studio and practise my dances for a few hours in the middle of the day three to four times a week.

When it comes to learning new dances from step sheets, I also go to the studio in the middle of the day.

My classes start at 6 pm on most days. Tuesdays and Wednesdays I have classes for kids aged 13-15 starting at 4.30 pm. I finish teaching at 10.00 pm. The first class of the day is normally beginners, then it's improvers, with about 20 students in each class. I teach dances like Live, Laugh, Love, Coastin', Bosa Nova and Got You Too - all the essential classics plus some of the new favourites. At 8.00 pm the competition class starts. We practise all the WCDF newcomer and novice dances, and sometimes we do some of the intermediate dances as well. The last class is the "hotshots", where I teach all the new intermediate dances like A Perfect View, Say Hey and Feels So Good just to name a few.

I arrive home at about 10.30 pm. Before I go to bed, I like to watch some TV. I prefer to watch some Discovery Channel or National Geographic, or maybe I'll put on a movie from my DVD collection.

Benny Ray

How did you discover line dancing?

Back in 1996, I was living and working in London. One night, I noticed a club that had a sign outside mentioning country music. Being a country music fan, I went inside, and discovered that they had much more than country music on offer. People were dancing in lines! I tried it out right away, and got hooked immediately. The music was great, and the people were really friendly. Quickly, I was dancing several nights a week in different clubs around the London area; Camden Roadhouse, City Slickers, Big Country, Outlaws & Sinners and Break For The Border. In 1997 I moved back to my hometown of Randers, Denmark, and started my own small line dance club called "Cowboys & Angels", with classes every Sunday afternoon at a local dance studio.

What kind of hobbies do you enjoy?

I like music and movies, especially horror and science fiction, and I have a huge CD and DVD collection. But my main hobby is pro wrestling. I watch it on TV whenever possible, but I am also an active performer. I used to train quite a bit some years ago, and do matches at both big and small shows. These days, I don't get in the ring that often, but focus more on organizing the events, script writing and backstage work, which I enjoy just as much as the in ring work.

If you couldn't make a living of dancing, what would you be doing?

I would probably work in the music industry. I have worked in a store selling CD's and videos, and I have worked at a record company as well. I have also made my own DVD, The Line Dance Way, which was published in 2005. So I have kind of seen the business from all sides.

Where do you find inspiration to make new dances?

When I choreograph new dances, I find that the ones that become the most popular are the ones that just come to me literally out of nowhere, and to music that I have been listening to for a long time and know inside out. The track Neon Moon by Brooks & Dunn has always been a favourite of mine. One day when I was trying out new dances, the steps suddenly came to me. My advice to other choreographers would be to stick with music that means something, just write down what comes first to mind, and keep it simple.

Who inspires you on the dance floor?

In 2001 I witnessed the Superstars of line dance in action for the very first time. Right then and there, I knew in what direction I wanted to take my dancing. People like Roy Verdonk, Raymond Sarlemijn and Roy Hadisubroto have been very inspirational for me. Besides being great dancers, they also have great personalities, and I have had the pleasure of meeting all of them.

What would you like to achieve in your life you have not as yet done?

My ultimate dream is to become Intermediate World Champion. It is a dream that I have been chasing for the last five years, and I do not plan on letting it go anytime soon.
