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Dear Dancers



LOVING THE LABEL

Are you a Gucci woman? Are you a Ted Baker bloke? Do you buy Baby Dior (don't laugh, it exists) and does your dog wear Prada (that exists too!). Do you think youth is always reckless and that being old equals being

wise? If you say yes you could be a label victim. Judging a book by its cover is a dangerous thing and in truth, very few of us admit we do. We all like to think that we are open minded and tolerant of most things

Attaching labels to things makes it easy doesn't it? At least you know where you're going. You know there won't be any surprises in the long run. You know what you are getting.

And yet labels divide. They limit the mind and the expectation. And I ask today, why are they so prevalent within our pastime?

Most of the dancers I know, dance because they love to dance. They love gathering each week and being together, they love a good choreography and they know a good piece of music when they hear it. But what they feel uncomfortable with, what drives them away from the dance floor is the label attached to a dance club or an event.

And today, I am wondering whether we need all those subdivisions in our midst. Can't we just be Line dancers? Do we have to wear a particular tag or think of new labels yet to be devised? If we get up when Belle Perez sings Amame, do we run the risk of being dragged out of the hall, and getting tarred and feathered because "it ain't Country". And if we like the funky stuff but don't always get it right, are we gonna run the risk of being laughed at for being so "uncool".

By keeping these divisions we limit the appeal of dance to a few when we could explode it so much further by joining forces. Imagine you are a newcomer and join an exclusively funky class. You also happen to like pop and a bit of modern style country. But the chance of discovering everything Line dance has to offer is fairly remote. Sure, you will know every hip hop song you can set a step to, but what about other stuff? Who's gonna show you the whole picture?

Isn't it time to just be a Line dancer? Would it not be great to be able to go to a social or an event that plays it all, that showcases it all and shows no malice to anyone. Isn't it time to remember that Line dancing is a social occasion and not just a dancing one. Isn't that our strength? Our real culture? Don't we all know that the Line dance community is the best and most generous of supportive systems and that by putting up walls we are limiting the very appeal we love.

So my advice for what it's worth is to finally break the barriers down and when asked what dances and music you prefer, just say "I love Line dance, I love music." Because that is your right as an individual. You can be funky, country, old time, nostalgic, mad as a hatter, whatever you want to be. You can do it all, achieve it all. Ultimately, you are just a dancer, a Line dancer.


"The hard part was fitting the seamless element into the story" explains Joe, adding"

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Though it has been ten years since Dusty Springfield died, her legacy is as strong as ever. And with the release of "Just Dusty" a CD collection of her greatest hits, Linedancer magazine looks back on an amazingly talented artist.





ary Isabel Catherine O'Brien was born in 1939 in Hampstead, London. The little girl who one day would become Dusty

Springfield had a music loving dad who encouraged her from early on. Dusty once said that she fell in love with Peggy Lee's voice when young and there are certain similarities in the clear, yet husky tones and delivery of the two singers.

When she was ten years old, Mary announced to the Nuns in her school that she wanted to be a singer and indeed, in 1958 she joined The Lana Sisters who were looking for a new member. From there, she would form The Springfields with brother Dion and Tim Field and started to know some success.

All her life, it was reported that Dusty was very insecure and that she loathed her own image. The huge 'Dusty' transformation started right there with The Springfields with her trademark bouffant hair. It would be followed in years to come with black eye make up (panda look) and her ubiquitous blonde beehive.

In the early 60's, the band visited Nashville and Dusty discovered Black soul music. This visit would become the catalyst for the style that was to become hers. Because The

Springfields music was at best folksy and at worse old fashioned, it was a matter of time before the band broke up in 1963.

When Dusty Springfield started a solo career, it was obvious very early on that her star was going to be a bright one. Between 1963 and 1969 Dusty would have 17 UK chart entries and of those ten were in the top ten. You Don't Have To Say You Love Me stayed number one for 13 weeks and the singer won numerous accolades and awards.

At the start of the Seventies and as sales started to plummet in the UK, Dusty went to the USA. A long and difficult period of her life started. She acquired a reputation for being a difficult artist to control and her albums did not sell as well as before, each one seemingly bringing a change of contract and management and further chaos .

A long absence from the scene and a couple of album comeback flops meant that Dusty would become all but forgotten until 1986. The Pet Shop Boys, then at the top of their popularity, asked her to record 'What Have I Done To Deserve This' with them and it became a huge hit. In 1990, the album 'Reputation' and her contributions to the soundtrack of the UK hit film 'Scandal' did extremely well for the singer who was now enjoying a true comeback to a generation who did not know much about her.

She wanted to return to Nashville and that is where she recorded what would be her last album 'A Very Fine Love'. Towards the end of its recording she was found with breast cancer and the disc was not released until 1995 when Dusty got the all clear, but the cancer returned and Dusty died on the 2 March 1999. This was the day she was to be honoured with the Order of the British Empire. Her manager gave her the award in hospital and she passed away a few hours later.

Though her career was an erratic one, what remains today when you listen to Dusty Springfield is a poignancy and a longing that resonates with you long after the song has ended

Very few artists have as many standards associated with them. I Only Want To Be With You, I Just Don't Know What To Do With Myself, In The Middle Of Nowehere, Little By Little, You Don't Have To Say You Love Me, Son Of A Preacher Man, Nothing Has Been Proved and The Look Of Love are a few of the tracks forever known as Dusty songs.

Neil Tennant from The Pet Shop Boys once said "Dusty has an incredible vulnerability in her voice, she turns every song into a Dusty Springfield record." The release of 'Just Dusty' showcases 25 of her most famous tracks and this collection is an amazing and fantastic tribute to the lady once described as the White Queen Of Soul

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MEET THE GIRLS Emily, Jasmine, Olivia, Victoria...

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Regalos is a name that most Line dancers will recognise. They have served the Line dance community for years and their success is undeniable. Here's their story....

Just as Margaret Thatcher got into number Ten and the price of milk shot up to 15 pence a pint, Regalos in Blackpool started life a jewellery store owned and run by Phil and Tina Womersley.

The couple loved America and travelled there often. So it was not surprising they would eventually add some Native American jewellery to their range. This proved a success and it was then that Country and Western fans began to fall in love with the store. More related ranges such as Western Buckles, Bolo and Gamblers Ties, were also imported and Regalos popularity really took off. As word of mouth brought more customers to the store than ever before, the choice of items kept expanding. Soon, Regalos Jewellery Store became Regalos Country and Western Store.

Line dancing was just starting to take off in the UK and the store started getting a reputation with dancers. The next expansion was into cowboy boots, western clothing and hats. Phil says it was about this time that a small specialist magazine appeared. Adverts were taken out in "Linedancer Magazine" and have appeared regularly ever since, helping the store's continuing success.

Business was booming and it soon became obvious that there was too much work for two people alone. Phil and Tina's son Jon was roped in one busy weekend to help out and never left. Today, he owns the business alongside his wife, Emma. Additions like a well designed website which has become immensely popular as well as western replica

and blank-firing guns too along with leather holsters and everything else associated with the Wild West have kept the store successful and relevant.

Jon says that at the beginning, when Line dance first started, it was all "Cowboy Hats and Boots, everyone looked like a Cowboy or Cowgirl. But over the years it's been interesting watching the changing fashions." He remembers when "Dance floors were a sea of fringes, gingham and cowboy hats." And adds "Nowadays the floors are full of black tops covered in diamante. Recently though more traditional designs have been making a comeback which is really nice to see".

In 2006 Emma's sister, Amy joined the team. Both Amy and Emma are keen dancers themselves which gives Regalos a unique insight as to what dancers really like. Emma is also a qualified Line dance teacher specializing in Beginners and has always offered the same piece of advice to customers, "All you need is the correct footwear, everything else is just an accessory."

Blackpool is of course a busy place and holidaymakers who Line dance always pop in to visit the store and say hello as well as take a look around. The town is also a popular venue for people like Kingshill holidays and teachers who arrange group dancing weekends at various venues. For instance, the Savoy hotel is becoming really popular due to its great dance floor and of course Regalos is just across the road. Jon says: "We also get raided once a year by those attending





the fabulous, annual Crystal Boot Awards. Line dance continues to be very popular."

Regalos strength has always been to keep in touch with new trends and true to form, they are bringing you the latest craze just in from the USA... the all new "Laser Laces". Staying ahead of the competition as always, they have even created a special website www.laserlaces.co.uk).

Last April, Canadian dancers were treated to a terrific event in Ontario and *Vivienne Scott*, one of its organisers, sent us this report.

Canging agross the pond

As soon as we started advertising the workshop, it was quite clear that we would have record numbers attending and in February the event was sold out. Everyone was eager to meet Andrew Palmer and Sheila Cox, the famous choreographers from the UK, and, of course, the one and only Lizzie Clark from Scotland of whom they had heard so much. Even the bitterly cold and snowy Canadian winter didn't subdue dancers anticipation.

This was the third year that Fred, Eddie Buckley and I had mounted a Spring Workshop/Dance to introduce dancers in Ontario to famous Line dance names from across the pond. I first met Andrew and Sheila ten years ago when I returned to the UK for a year to spend time with my ailing father and Andrew, perfectionist that he is, tracked me down to double check the step sheet for my dance 'Jungle Rhythm'. There was some disagreement in

his area and he was determined to make sure everyone danced it the correct way. We became firm friends and subsequently got together on my annual visits. It was Andrew and Sheila's first trip to Canada and I very much wanted it to be a good experience.

Our other guest had visited Toronto once before many years ago and it was the memory of that visit that had inspired me to ask her to fly over the pond to teach at our workshop. Lizzie's contagious enthusiasm, her humorous and fun approach had stayed with me. We were fortunate indeed that she agreed to come and her husband, Roger, reckoned he would keep her company and check out the great white north as well.

So the stage was set. As all our guests arrived safely, we could not wait for the event to begin and on Saturday morning

we headed to the venue. We had already decorated the two halls the day before. Of course, something always has to go wrong. This time a fuse blew and the sound system in one of the rooms ground to a halt. Someone was for sure looking over us as it turned out that Roger was an electrician in the navy and before you could say 'maple leaf', to our immense relief he had everything back in working order.

A&S and Lizzie moved smoothly from room to room, teaching the identical dances in each so everyone would have same experience. The dancers were honoured that A&S had written two new dances for our event and they both went over exceedingly well, 'Rock n Roll' and 'Time To Swing'. At the same time, a few of the dancers had already heard of 'In Control' and were thrilled to learn it from the choreographers. Andrew taught with precision, patience and a gentle sense of





humour which we all enjoyed. Lizzie always chooses good dances to teach, when she was over before she brought 'Shakatak' to Toronto and it remains one of my all-time favourites. This year she taught 'Mojo Rhythm' by Rob Fowler, 'No More Cloudy Days' by Alan Birchall and 'Love Me Tomorrow' by Peter and Alison. Gales of laughter would waft from the room she was teaching in as she would interrupt her instruction to recount a hilarious story or joke. "She should be a comedienne', reckoned one of the dancers as she wiped tears from her eyes.

A&S, Lizzie, Fred and I had written a dance 'Do That Again?' especially for the Workshop to a new track by Trace Adkins called 'Let's Do That Again'. I gathered that Fred and Andrew had a swell time teaching together in the Tulip room and Sheila and I had fun together with Lizzie on the side lines in the Daffodil room. At least everyone seemed to get the steps.

A break for dinner and then back for the evening dance. Firstly the presentation. We had to make sure our guests had enough Canadian souvenirs to ensure they wouldn't forget us!

Then the dancing started in earnest and Fred did a great job of keeping the floor full. We virtually had to chase everyone out at the end of the evening; they didn't seem to want to go, even those who had a long drive ahead of them. What a terrific job our guests had done. Excellent instruction combined with laughter, warmth and friendliness made the ideal combination to win Canadian fans for life.

However, that wasn't the end of the excitement. The next day brought a trip to visit with the Chinese Line dance community north of the city. The very popular Emily Woo, an instructor of infectious enthusiasm and inexhaustible energy, was hosting a party for us and 300 eager dancers were waiting in a Chinese restaurant with a large dance floor. In between courses of a delicious meal, we taught and/or reviewed 'Forever Dancefloor', 'Do That Again?', 'Far Away' (written by Emily and myself), 'Cry Baby', 'For Love', 'Mojo Rhythm' and 'La Fiesta". Lizzie had a surprise when instructor/DJ Lewis Lee came up with a Chinese song for 'Scotia Samba', it went very well. What an evening, Emily and her charming helpers know how to throw a lively party for sure.

Rather tired but in good spirits, the next day we headed down to Niagara Falls despite the sleet and snow. With Lizzie in her poncho with little red maple leaves all over and Andrew with his Toronto baseball cap, they looked the part as we snapped our photos by this spectacular sight.

Then it was time to say our fond goodbyes to Lizzie and Roger. However, Andrew and Sheila had a couple of days left and came out to Fred's class on the Tuesday evening to the delight of the dancers. On Wednesday we went to West 7, a huge country bar just outside of the city. I taught that evening in the instructor's absence and included 'Do That Again?' with A& S up on stage with me. A large crowd packed the floor and was most impressed with their presence.

So, what a week! Our guests had charmed the Canadian dancers, taught excellent dances that have already started hitting our dance floors and have left memories that will bring smiles to dancers' faces and warmth to their hearts for a very long time to come.

won the couples title as well as several Line dance divisions in the Worlds VII event in Texas. They both agreed that one of the best things about their dancing career was: "We go all over the world and meet new friends."

On page 10 Linedancer showed that number one of the Top Ten dances for the first six months of 1999 was Whisperin', choreographed by Chris and Richard Hodgson with 15 top ten appearances, followed closely by Quando When Quando, Heartbreak Express and Red Hot Salsa, all sharing 12 appearances.

Crazy Little Thing Called Love by Dwight Yoakam accompanied the Gap advert on television during 1999. On pages 12 and 13 Linedancer reported that it caused quite a stir on both sides of the Atlantic and showed that Line dancing could be cool and fun. The Line dance of the same name which was choreographed by Chris Hodgson was one of the hottest dances on the floor that Summer.

Dogs have long been regarded as man's best friend, now they are partnering him on the dance floor. On pages 20 and 21, dog trainer Angela Horsley, told us: "I incorporated basic training steps to Line dancing music and put in some slides and kicks. They love it, I think it's the rhythm. Some dogs are more musical

than others."

Among the Album Review pages was Dwight Yoakam's Greatest Hits From The 90's. Described as, the ideal collection of your dance floor material from the past ten years.

Music Matters reported that Bob Dylan and Paul Simon were to tour America together. What a great duo. Among the duets to be included in their show were I Walk The Line by Johnny Cash and Bill Monroe's Blue Moon Of Kentucky.

On page 31 was a feature on Country Dancing In The Park. This was the largest country dance event in Canada. The only drawback reported was that it was not long enough.

Linedancer featured a hot new Country group from Yorkshire called Vaquero on pages 32 and 33. Front man Sammy told Linedancer: "We are predominantly a band of New Country musicians who didn't actively go out to capture the Line dance market but they found us and liked us."

On page 49, George Hamilton IV told us how he became known as an International Ambassador of Country Music: "It started out as a joke at first but my record company took it seriously and it stuck." George presented the awards for the British Line Dancing Championships and he got to try Line dancing. He added: "I'm afraid I was pretty pitiful."

Line dance competitions can be nerve racking at the best of times but imagine what it must be like to compete while television cameras follow your every move. On page 53 Linedancer reported how Border television recorded a Line dance series in Carlisle called The Grapevine. This consisted of four heats and a final. The winners were Nickels And Dimes from Berwick.

Special Moments In Morecombe

Best of Nashville

Barry and Dari Anne Amato are two of the most recognised Line dancers in the world. Their easy going style and supreme professionalism need no introduction. But how did they become the celebrities they are today? Laurent had to find out



inedancer magazine's association with Barry and Dari Anne is not new, far from it. Once you have seen the couple in action it is of little wonder that their fame has spread far and wide. Were they always destined to be on stage? Seemingly so, with eight year old Barry already on stage and Dari Anne singing in the Tennessee Mid and All State Choir as a teenager.

Barry's mother who was aware of her son's desire to sing entered him in a local talent show which he promptly won. Barry's

future from that moment on was all but mapped out. He started going from strength to strength, forming a band and appearing with luminaries like Tammy Wynette as well as becoming a recording artist. Opening shows for the likes of Dolly Parton, Emmy Lou Harris, Bonnie Raitt and Randy Travis proved to him and his family once and for all that his destiny was on stage.

Though both Barry and Dari Anne moved to Nashville in 1978, the legendary couple would not meet until a few years later. From 1982, Barry was in a show produced by Opryland USA Theme Park in Nashville and had become a lead male dancer. This afforded him the opportunity in appearing at The Grand Ole Opry a total of six times and it was during that time that Dari Anne who represented Middle Tennesse State University in a prestigious beauty pageant won the crown. She got noticed very quickly and was asked to join the cast as a backstage dresser, and then onto the stage as a singer/dancer. Barry and Dari Anne finally met in 1986 and the two became friends. Soon friendship blossomed into romance and they knew they were meant for each other.

They left Opryland and went on to perform at Dollywood, Dolly Parton's theme park in Tennessee. They were hired as singers and dancers and were thrust into major dancing roles, which would prove a great training ground for their later lives. This was the time when they also began to get involved in the creative process as choreographers and Barry as a show director. After three years of hard work, they decided to return to Nashville and started looking for a brand new challenge.

It was at that precise time that they both discovered country dancing. With their background, they soon got a reputation and began to appear in music videos (John Michael Montgomery, Pam Tillis) as well as various TV performances including the CMA Awards during Alan Jackson's performance of "Chattahoochee".

Everything was happening at speed and before they knew it, they were contracted to produce the Wildhorse Saloon Dance television series on the Nashville Network. This would eventually become a daily show which took a lot of hard work and commitment from the couple. After taping it for sixty hours every week, weekends would be spent promoting it in different cities coast to coast with just enough time to get back into the studio on the Monday morning. A tough and gruelling schedule which did not leave much time for anything else. As a matter of fact, Barry proposed to Dari Anne during one of those shows, solving his time management crisis in a very unusual way. The show's producer finally found them a little time to get married and this happened in 1997. Barry says: "February 22nd was the day we started twostepping together."

Once the show ended, Barry and Dari Anne stayed with the Nashville network still teaching in another programme. Because Wildhorse was being syndicated on CMT Europe and CMT Latin America, the pair suddenly realised that they had a huge following within the Line dance community.

Today, though they both realize they joined the community in a very unconventional way, they are both delighted to see how dancers welcome them wherever they go. Over the last ten years, they have travelled the globe an average of 45 weeks a year and gone to South Africa, Japan, Denmark, Norway, Holland, Taiwan, Malaysia, Singapore, Hong Kong, Canada and the UK. The couple have received many awards and their ultimate goal is that Crystal Boot of which Barry says: "We have the spot cleared on the mantle piece." Both are terrifically excited about their brand new venture, The Dance Advantage (see next feature) which in collaboration with Linedancer magazine could help to promote Line dance like never before.

Watching the couple, at the last Crystal Boot event you have to wonder if there is anything they can't do? Dancing, singing, hosting, doing comedy, presenting, choreographing are all things they do easily and with incredible charm. Barry and Dari Anne are synonymous of what is at the heart of the very best in Line dance. Perfection and ultimate elegant accomplishment.



You may not be yet familiar with *Kish Mauve*, but you will probably have already heard some of their tunes. Rimmel, the US hit show "Dirty Money" and soon, Lee Cooper are all featuring the duo's music in their ads. *Laurent* spoke to the band exclusively for Linedancer.



There are just two members in the band. They are Mima Stilwell and Jim Elliot. Both met at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. Mima says: "Jim was doing a lot of weird electronic music and our pop songs were written slowly." The band know that pop has "an immediate effect" on people's hearts and minds. She says: "We just love pop." Though the duo tried to organise other projects before Kish Mauve they were all unsatisfactory false starts. She adds: "It took a

few years to find our sound which we call retro synth pop."

Kish Mauve's sound is instantly recognizable and has elements of Golfrapp, Kraftwerk and a sprinkling of 80's electronica. Their distinctive name is a mix of "Depeche Mode, a very cool colour and the word "Kiss" in Polish (Kish)" says Mima.

I ask about Kylie's involvement with the new album. It all started when she was asked to listen to their song Two Hearts. As soon as she heard it, she knew she had stumbled upon something very special. The song was the first single of her new album and was a smash hit. Ms Minogue was so struck by the sheer energy and brilliance of the group that she returned the favour with a "pop swap" in giving a song (You Make Me Feel) to the band for their new album, Black Heart

Of that gift, Mima says: "You Make Me Feel kind of went backwards and forwards - Jim wrote the backing track which Kylie liked, and she worked on it with a co-writer but decided it wasn't right for her album, and then we worked on it some more and it turned out to be a Kish Mauve song." Out of that sequence

of events, unplanned as it was, a great tune was born and is now one of the strongest tracks of what many critics believe the album to be "crammed with singles".

The single "Matthew" is coming out first (end of May) and will be used in the new Lee Cooper ad, once again demonstrating the pair's genius in writing a great song. I ask how easy is it to write a pop tune.

The answer is not straightforward. "Sometimes it's really easy. A song can be written in half an hour. For example, our track 'Matthew' was like that. Other times it takes ages and ages to get it right."

Mima also adds that finding the right lyrics is sometimes the hardest thing to do. "We've been known to start a song, leave it and finish it a year later!"

I suggest that there is a definite retro feel to their sound, a real 80's vibe. She agrees: "We love that era because no-one was afraid of being uncool... just check out the hairstyles! It really was as if people were just having fun with music and style and it was quite innocent. I guess we like being like that." The duo recognizes that innocence



and youth means that you can do things in a bolder way, without experience dictating what your next step or thought will be.

I also wonder whether it is a good thing for a band to have so much of their sound "stolen" for products, ads and placements. They laugh. "Depends on the product! It's great to be on an ad though, it makes us feel very flattered! For them, the Rimmel ad was the best. "It is very much a part of music today and an ad like that one often helps break a band." And Mima

candidly adds: "The royalties can help fund other parts of the project so you don't have to rely on just record sales."

I explain that Line dancers are a cool bunch too and that a dance may make one of their songs a huge international dance hit. Mima is thrilled. "Wow, wouldn't that be fab! Can your readers

sort this one out for us then?" I say I can't promise but who knows? Laughs all round.

The future for Kish Mauve is very bright. Black Heart is a terrific album of eleven potential hits and it won't be long before the band gets an international following. There is no doubt that Line dancers will also welcome this brand new, electro pop sound on their dance floors this summer. All that remains to be seen is which track will make it as a hit first!






your profile

Michel Platje is from the Netherlands and is a well known instructor and dancer who has garnered many awards. In 2002, he and his girlfriend Anita Zwiers founded The Railroad dancers, their own Line dance club and they never looked back. Michel won the World Champion Line dance title three times and he and Anita welcomed the UCWDC in the Netherlands with the Tulip Challenge held in de Rijp (near Amsterdam) last March. Here's Michel's report.







t all started in October 2008. We were just sitting down and having a chat with a few dancers and someone suggested we should start an event in The Netherlands. Daan Geelen and I immediately thought this was a great idea. We called Pedro Machado and he immediately pledged to help us. So the three of us and my girlfriend Anita began to put things in place. I must tell you that it was not that easy finding a suitable venue for this first year. How many competitors could you expect, how many spectators are coming etc. These were questions we did not have answers for. However, we eventually chose Hotel de Rijpereilanden because it had already been a Line dance venue in the past.

We also decided that the event should account for dancers to qualify for Worlds. Daan went to the UCWDC and they welcomed us on board straight away. I then went to the Dutch dance organization NADB and got them to agree as well.

Therefore, this first years event was a UCWDC World Championship qualifier for the World Championships 2010 in Nashville in association with the NADB.

As the event director together with coeventdirectors Pedro Machado and Daan Geelen I feel proud we did what we set out to do. The Tulip challenge was a new event designed for dancers to be given the chance to compete in as many categories as they wished, for a low fee. The venue proved a hit as the hotel has tons of atmosphere. The moment you set foot in the foyer you are travelling back in time. There are old ship sails, antiques, old bars and a huge lounge area where everyone can relax. Competitors came from all around Europe, France, Scotland, Ireland, England, Germany, Switzerland, Italy and the Netherlands.

Everything was very well organized from bus transfers to and from the airport as well as the schedule. The staff of the hotel were willing to help the spectators and competitors, when they didn't have time to eat due to training they fixed them a meal later on that day. So a real team effort from all sides!

At the registration competitors could also enter extra renegade cups and win great prizes, mobile phone, scooter, holidays. They could enter one particular cup for example but they got given music at the event itself and had to choreograph a routine within one and a half days, finally performing the dance on Sunday.

When the competition started on Friday, people immediately loved the atmosphere. Everyone felt cool and competitors where not as nervous as they are usually. The Friday was for the choreography competitors. On



Saturday the competition started off with the classics dances and the venue was packed. Though only in its first year the Tulip challenge had 153 competitors and every day the room was filled with approximately 250 people.

On Saturday night the party started and thanks to our sponsors we had special renegade cups. We had a Telephone renegade Cup for youth under 16 years. They could win a HTC mobile phone sponsored by Lier ICT. Later on that night we had a Scooter cup where dancers could win a brand new scooter sponsored by De Wijk motoren.

We had organized a surprise renegade cup that very evening for competitors and spectators. We asked all people out on the dance floor to bring one Euro with them. The floor was packed with 40 people who were very curious as to what was going to happen. Then they heard that it was an off beat renegade. This proved a great idea and to witness 40 people trying to dance off beat and avoid the judges tapping them on the shoulder for them to leave the floor was hysterical. Everyone including the spectators told us that this was the best party they had, had in years.

Sunday was the busiest day because everyone was waiting eagerly for the awards. All dancers and spectators gave a standing ovation and we were thrilled as to how the Tulip Challenge had gone down. Yes there will be another one next year.... If you are interested, make a note in your diary as the event will be held from 19th to 21st March 2010.


Last but not least, I and my co directors cannot thank all the volunteers and the dancers enough for their good humour and help for what was a fabulous weekend. See you next year!

TAYLOR SWIFT FEARLESS

MERCURY - B00103XKLI

When Taylor Swift first came to prominence at the age of sixteen I am sure that there were many people who thought she would just be a flash in the pan. Well, here we are a couple of years later and Taylor has become an international star with her style of country pop.

Taylor opens the album with title track *Fearless* (102bpm) which, like every song on the album, she wrote or co-wrote highlighting what a great talent she is. This is a lively little number with a good beat and could be a nice track for a beginner dance.

Fifteen (96bpm) is a song on which Taylor sings all about the joys of being that tender age. This track has some really nice lyrics and a steady beat which means it has possibilities as a dance track.

Love Story (120bpm) is Taylor's massive hit and there have been a few remixes of this cool track. It has also got the creative juices flowing in many choreographers as there are several dances to it so why not check them out?

Hey Stephen (116bpm) this is another good song that has had a few dances choreographed to it. Taylor shows what a clever wordsmith she is with the somewhat quirky lyrics.

White Horse (90bpm) is a beautiful song with beautiful lyrics with a cello on the backing and Taylor shows that she is equally at home writing and singing slower songs.

You Belong With Me (130bpm) I am very surprised not to find any dances to this superb track. This song could right at home on a Lilly Allen album and has dance hit written all over it.

Breathe (74bpm) Taylor changes the mood somewhat with a nightclub two step song which is superb vocally, clearly demonstrating the singer's ability.

You're Not Sorry (67bpm) here we have a second nightclub two step and Taylor delivers the heartfelt lyrics with a passion that belies her tender years. I love the string arrangement which compliments Taylor's voice.

The Way I Loved You (80bpm) it's back to the youthful poppy side of Taylor with a delightful catchy song, think Avril Lavigne and you will get the picture.

Forever & Always (128bpm) Taylor shows her versatility on this track, it's more Kelly Clarkson than Dolly Parton! Another cool track that could inspire a few dances to it.

The Best Day (131bpm) is a melodic number and Taylor belies her tender years as she delivers this song with maturity.

Closing track *Change* (96bpm) has a great beat to it and a full on backing production and this will surely have a dance or two written to it soon?

Taylor Swift's self titled first album was very good and her second offering is excellent. She makes country music fresh and young, she appeals to all ages, and along with the likes of Carrie Underwood, she will surely get more people interested in country music. I highly recommend this album to you.

MARTINA McBRIDE

SHINE

RCA/SONY MUSIC - B001R0KHDM

I have been fortunate to see Martina perform live a few times and she is simply outstanding. She has consistently delivered first class albums over the years and now releases her tenth studio album.

We begin with *Wrong Baby Wrong Baby Wrong* (104bpm) which has a nice cha cha beat to it and instantly you know that this is going to be a great album as Martina sounds better than ever.

I Just Call You Mine (74bpm) is a powerful nightclub two step and Martina belts out emotion in spades. This is as fine a song as I have heard this year.

Sunny Side Up (124bpm) Martina delivers an upbeat song next which has a catchy chorus. This is a brilliant dance track.

Walk Away (68bpm) is another nightclub two step and once again Martina puts her heart and soul into it. Simply outstanding.

I'm Trying (75bpm) is a beautiful song with beautiful lyrics and Martina sings it in her own inimitable style.

Don't Cost A Dime (72bpm) is also a nightclub two step but this is an altogether brighter song with a catchy chorus and a big guitar solo.

Ride (117bpm) this is the first single off the album in the States and I confidently predict a massive hit with dancers with the right choreography, I absolutely love this track!

You're Not Leaving Me (149bpm) Martina sticks with the upbeat style on this country rocker on which she shows her "rock chick" side. This like the previous track could be a crossover hit and once again has potential to be a huge dance hit.

Wild Rebel Rose (89bpm) back to a slower style and Martina delivers another absolute gem with another powerful vocal delivery, highlighting why she is an enduring superstar.

Martina closes her album with *Lies* (91bpm) another heartfelt song showcasing Martina's full vocal range from gentle high notes in her top range to powerhouse notes. This is a glorious end to a glorious album.

Martina enlisted Dann Huff to be her producer and I believe that he has stretched and pushed her to bring out the very best of her vocal abilities. I truly believe Martina is better vocally now than she has ever been. This album is one of the highlights of the year and you simply must get hold of a copy now.

SCARLETT LETTER RECORDS

Gretchen Peters is one of the best kept secrets in country music. She has written songs for some of the biggest stars including Martina McBride, Faith Hill, Trisha Yearwood, and Bryan Adams. After releasing some highly acclaimed albums this is the first definitive collection from Gretchen and there are a couple of new tracks too.

There are 5 tracks from Gretchen's 1996 *Secret Of Life* album: Firstly *Circus Girl* (102bpm) on which Gretchen demonstrates that she is not only a clever wordsmith but also has a beautiful voice.

The Secret Of Life (76bpm) was a big hit for Faith Hill and Gretchen's version is somewhat softer.

On A Bus To St. Cloud (87bpm) turned out to be one of Trisha Yearwood's biggest hits. Gretchen's version may not be as powerful vocally but it is beautiful and the sax accompaniment is superb.

When You Are Old (85bpm) was a hit in the early nineties and is a stunning moving song.

Independence Day (115bpm) Martina McBride's version of this song is one of my all time favourites and its writer makes a fine job of the song.

Next we have 3 tracks from 2004's Halcyon: *The Aviator's Song* (107bpm) has Gretchen sounding like Katie Melua. This is one of the most beautiful songs I have ever heard and I often play this with the repeat button on.

If Heaven (65bpm) is a gorgeous song: "If heaven was a pie it would be cherry cool and sweet on your tonque".

Tomorrow Morning (76bpm) is a delightful nightclub two step that many of you may love to dance to.

The set includes two songs from **Gretchen Peters**: *In A Perfect World* (91bpm) a more contemporary song featuring Bryan Adams and *Picasso and Me* (65bpm) a nightclub two step with very clever lyrics.

The last of the previous released songs are from 2007's **Burnt Toast and Offerings**: *Sunday Morning* (79bpm) is a breezy little number, *This Town* (76bpm) which sounds very much like Dolly Parton's early work and *The Way you Move Me* (66bpm) another fine song with a steady beat.

There are also two previously unreleased songs: Don't You Know (90bpm) which has a jazzy night club flavour and could make a decent dance track, and Nobody's Girl (101bpm) which I am sure was covered a few years back. Another great dance prospect.

Circus Girl may not be an album full of dance tracks but it is most certainly a very high class album filled with beautiful country music.



STUART BULL

Smell The Love

And now for something completely different! Its time to get a little rockier with Stuart Bull who has played lead guitar on many albums and has taught tens of thousands to play guitar through his highly acclaimed DVDs and website. I was sent this album to review and as soon as played the first track I knew it was going to be good.

First cut *You've Got The Sunshine* (93bpm) is undoubtedly a rock track on which vocalist Miguel Olivares-Alvarez excels. This music may just inject a different genre into Line dance.

Don't Fall In Love (103bpm) is a powerful track with some great harmonies and some serious guitar solos. This is brilliant!

Jin and Jan (75bpm) I have to admit that this may be a little to "heavy" to dance to but if you like some serious rock music and big, big guitar solos every now and again then you will love this.

I've Got The Music In Me (87bpm) was originally a big hit back in '74 for Kiki Dee and Stuart and the gang deliver a superb rendition of it here. Hold on to your hats!

L.F.J. (136bpm) is an instrumental on which Stuart demonstrates his prowess on guitar and has a Cuban feel. May have possibilities as a dance track.

Give Me Your Heart (135bpm) another good prospect for the dance floor. It too has a Cuban influence and it is undoubtedly a rock track. Once again powerful vocals and big guitar licks are the order of the day.

Freedom 360 (130bpm) is another big rock track however some of the expletives in the lyrics will prevent this one from being used as a dance track.

Heavy Kettle (104bpm) here we have another instrumental and Stuart's lead guitar is simply awesome. If you fancy a bit of head banging then it's ideal!

13 Machine (140bpm) once again its instrumental time and drums are the big feature a la Cozy Powell. Yet another that's not suitable for line dancing.

Stuart's final track is *Fallen Angel* (85bpm) one of the lighter tracks on the album with some superb lyrics from Stuart. This is a classic rock track that you could do Black Coffee to for something very different, go on, open your minds, you never know!

Very often, we strive to find different albums to review, ones that may inject a little difference in Line dancing. The Stuart Bull's album is certainly that. If you would like to find out more then go to www.licklibrary.com

If you like listening to lyrics then this dance is the one for you. It is a bit of a challenge for Improvers but short enough to have fun with and a nice group of steps at the end of the dance. This is also a great track. Just a pity we can't find a video to go with it.



A new Country star is always welcome and Richard Kirk recently met with *Charlie Allen* for another exclusive Linedancer Interview.

ristol, Tennessee is historically the birthplace of modern Country music but another claim to fame is that Charlie Allen, Country singer and songwriter, was also born there.

From the moment of his birth in the 1960's his whole life has evolved around country music and it shows.

"Both my parents were very musically inclined. My Ma was a singer travelling the road and working with Country artists like Jim and Jessie and Carl Stanley. My Daddy, with my uncle, managed other Country artists," Charlie told me, adding: "The family always loved Country music. I remember as a kid listening to Hank Williams, Marty Robbins, David Houston, Waylon Jennings and Merle Haggard. One day I just started singing along. My folks thought I sounded good, they thought I had

talent and my Ma started teaching me. She took an old broomstick and just stuck it in front of me and I would pretend it was a microphone."

Charlie remembers how he started performing: "One night Dad came home and asked, would I like to open for Hank Williams Jnr. I was only aged seven. Sure enough the next thing I knew we took off in that old 'Dr. Pepper' truck to go to the Panther Hall in Fort Worth, Texas." Father and son got invited to get on the bus with Hank Jnr. Charlie says: "He had a song called 'Nobody's Child'. I love that tune and I sung it to him. He told me he thought I had a lot of talent and he invited me to sing on stage. He was just the nicest guy."

The stage was his classroom and his teachers were some of the pillars of Country music. Charlie got to know

them all and fondly remembers them: Loretta Lynn, 'a fabulous woman', Hank Williams. Jnr., Waylon Jennings and Jerry Lee Lewis who loved Charlie's voice.

I ask him about how he got to learn his craft. "I had a band when I was eight and made my first recording aged ten. My voice was kind of high pitched then. I quit school for the music when I was about twelve and had my own tutor while I was out performing on the road."

Charlie remembers "One of my folks were always with me, usually Dad because Ma would be looking after my brothers and sisters." He laughs: "I even recall that Dad had to get a court order so that I was allowed to play the bars as I was under age."

By age 15 Charlie was fronting his own group, The Boulting Brothers. They



appeared on various television shows where they opened for the Nitty Gritty Band, Dirt Band, Charley Pride and others. From there, the rest as they say is history and today, Charlie Allen is one of the most promising stars Country has to offer.

He sings from the depth of his soul and lives the very words of the lyrics he performs. Unlike many of the artists on today's scene Charlie is truly Country with a wonderful deep voice. The songs on his latest album, That Was Then, This Is Now, are all individual, well written tracks and should hold a wide appeal ranging from the danceable to the soulful of 'Good Time Charlie' and 'I Don't Have Forever'.

I ask him about the album and about his inspiration. It is with more than a hint of pride that Charlie tells me: "I and my musicians have just kept working and working. As well as the performing I have been writing for years. I co-wrote most of the songs on my new album. When I write sometimes a song will just write itself, other times they don't come so easy. I always want the next song to be

even better. I always loved the Danny O' Keele song 'Good Time Charlie's Got The Blues'. Charlie Walker, Elvis and Dwight Yoakam all recorded that song and I have included it on the album."

Is there any chance to see him live soon, I wonder?

He says: "We decided we wanted to come over to the UK and Europe because my record 'Prooff', also on the new album, went to number one of the most played on the radio in Europe. I very much want to visit the UK again later this year. I would like to thank all my fans over there for their support and for Country radio making me No.1. So yes, you will be able to see me pretty soon."

Back in the days of the Country music Easter weekends at Wembley an unknown singer from the US, Boxcar Willie, took Wembley by storm. The Americans heard about it, checked him out, and he became a star in his own country as well as the UK. I hope in his own way Charlie Allen will find similar success. He certainly deserves it.

We first met Alison in August 2001. She revealed how Line dance had not only changed her life, but how it had been her therapy after she had lost her husband when he was just 40 in 1997. She said then: "My classes were like an extended family to me ...Line dance gave me a life after David..." After moving from Scotland to Australia, Alison started to carve a new life for herself and daughter Laura in Perth. However, after a while, she moved back to Scotland, Alison worked all over the world as well as with Select Events and her preferred charity "Rachel's House" greatly benefited from her money raising efforts. Eventually, she would return to Perth where she lives today.

She says: "I did continue to work with Select Events and carried on raising money for Rachel's House but something happened that changed my life and threatened my sanity. The road was long and today thankfully things are better again." Here's what happened in Alison's own words.....

9th July 2006: I drive to the gym. Although winter, the sun is shining. During my workout I use the shoulder overhead press machine and I hear two cracks. They seem so loud that they resonate in my head. I instinctively know I have a problem. I gingerly get up off the equipment and leave. Whilst having my X Rays the consultant tells me he is confident that all will be well as I am walking. It is NOT all well. I have fractured my spine in TWO places.

15th July 2006: I cannot believe all this. Reality is hitting home. After all the sadness I already have known in my life, I now have THIS! I was in a new country, a new start, my business is going very well, I have my citizenship, Laura is wonderful and THIS! The pain is immense. Like someone stabbing me with a red hot poker right in the middle





of my spine. I cannot sleepinstead I cry all night. I will never dance again....I will never be the really active person that everyone knows me as.

24th September 2007: I have an appointment with a new specialist. I have a new regime of medicine. I explain that I still do not sleep well and that I have employed a business manager for my finance company as I cannot stand the pain of going to the office, lifting a briefcase, even trying to stand up at the whiteboard presenting to a client. I cannot dance.

12th February 2008: I cannot cry anymore. To the outside world I am the usual happy Alison. Inside I am screaming. My life has changed so much. I cannot imagine the rest of my life like this. The medications make me feel so sick. I have stopped playing music. It reminds me I cannot dance. I cannot work out. I can walk though and I should be happy.

28th February 2009: Are things getting easier? I have booked a cruise and am on it! Very excited. I can visit countries without having to lift cases. I do feel great now. Only occasional pain at night in my back. I see they have a Line dance class at 10.15am every day...... Mmmmmmmm.

29th February 2009: Took a chance, bit the bullet and I just loved the class. Not that it was great (it wasn't) BUT I feel alive again...dancing and smiling. I have been asked to join the more advanced group to practice for a show. Back was not painful. Fingers crossed.

18th March 2009: I feel like my life has turned around. From attending one Line dance class to dancing three hours a day, today I am dancing in the guest show. It may be in our small group but I am dancing a SOLO Celtic piece too. I feel alive. I have my bounce back in my step. I have a constant smile on my face. I cannot get enough.

28th March 2009: I wake at 12.30pm but instead of with pain it is with a song running round in my head. I get up. Pop the song on and choreograph my first dance in such a long time. "A Wonderful World". Indeed it IS!

30th March 2009: I have been in touch with my old dance contacts telling them I am back Line dancing again. Wanda asked me to guest teach tonight and it was an absolute blast! I taught "A Wonderful World" and they loved it. I AM BACK!

24th April 2009: I guest taught at my first large function tonight in years. It just gets better and better. My dance is being danced around the world which is a total shock to me but feels so good. Who would have thought that I would be this blessed? It has been a long dark road but the light at the end of the tunnel in BRIGHT!

What happens between being told that you have no rhythm and no understanding of dance and having tens of videos on Youtube showing the exact opposite. Meet *Daniel Trepat*, one of the most unique and extraordinary talents on the dance scene today.

aniel is 22 and lives in Holland, in a town called Hoogvliet. When you watch one of his performances, you soon realise what an amazing dancer he truly is.

Yet this was not always the case. At school, Daniel excelled in every sport apart from anything linked to dance and music.

He remembers: "Before I discovered Line dancing, I was told to forget dance altogether, and I agreed then!"

Let us not forget that Daniel, amongst many other achievements has also managed to become a Megastar in 2008, the highest level in the WCDF competition.

Daniel Trepat is an amazing man. A great talent, content to share his joy and craft, working hard every day in order to reach further goals and loving the Line dance scene of today. "I love the community. Everyone is friendly wherever I happen to be and I think that is wonderful." His future dream is to open a dance school. "Not any old dance school, mind. I would love to own a huge school, the biggest I could get so that I could bring every style of dance together."

Daniel is a man with drive and no doubt his dance school will one day be a reality, but until then, he remains happy to be invited and share his amazing talent. Watch him in this month's Onlinedancer magazine, and be prepared to be truly amazed.



How can I know if Line dance teachers are qualified?

Please can you tell me if there is a list online I can check? I attend three classes per week and the three instructors teach differently, some easier than others. I also attend other classes when on holiday in UK and again I query if certain teachers are qualified.

Sheila, Margate, Kent

I am not aware of an online list of qualified dance teachers. The most obvious way to find out Sheila, is to ask. In my experience, qualified dance teachers are more than happy to explain their background and qualifications.

It can be more than a little complex to understand the various types of qualifications, but let me try. Briefly, there are various dance examining bodies in UK offering professional dance teaching qualifications. UKA, ISTD, BATD and IDTA are some that you may come across. If a teacher has, for example, AUKA, this means they have an Associate level teaching qualification with the UKA. The next level is Licentiate (LUKA) and the highest is Fellowship (Fellow UKA). These qualifications can be in many different dance genres from ballet, to ballroom to

Line dancing. Depending on the dance genre and experience of the teaching student, an Associate qualification, for example, may take a year or more of study and supervised teaching practice to prepare for the examination. In contrast, there are organisations such as BWDA and BWDA 2000 that offer combined Line and Partner dancing instructor qualifications that only require attending three one day training sessions before taking their instructor examination. Obviously such a short training for Line dancers new to teaching is going to be limited in what it can achieve as far as understanding learning and teaching. Dance teaching qualifications in UK have undergone a lot of changes in recent years and continuous professional development has become vital to help teachers keep up to date with the how, what and why of dance teaching.



Over the course of the weekend 242 dances were danced, obviously the more popular dances were danced more than once, but we still had a total of 141 different dances.



I also love to watch dances that I don't particularly like but like seeing it being enjoyed by a variety of ages, gender, race, culture, etc.

My personal preference is the more funky dances but I also like some of the waltz and slower dances. I hope this has explained myself a bit better. Instructors are the soul of a club and never more so than *Janice and Kay* from Hitch and Hook. They are both true Line dancers who nurture Beginners with a passion and have rubbed shoulders with a "dance" star....

Janice and Kay are amazing ladies. They live, breathe and sleep Line dance and when they agreed to this interview I was curious about their club.

LAURENT: When did you start Hitch and Hook?

JANICE: 14 years ago. Seems like yesterday. I used to do ballroom and latin dancing. I actually progressed quite well when I was younger. When I first went to a Line dance class I was hooked. I started the club once I had discovered a passion for teaching and qualified with both BWDA and as Associate teacher with the ISTD.

LAURENT: What about Kay and her involvement?

JANICE: Kay was always there for me and helped me out when my parents could no longer physically support me at the club. KAY: Music has always been my life. After my husband died, I discovered Line dance and Hitch and Hook took over my life. A new life opened up, a life of fun, new friends and true magic."

LAURENT: Has the club changed a lot in the last 14 years?

KAY AND JANICE (both laugh): You could say that!

JANICE: We have about 130 members, a healthy mix of levels. We love Beginners and Improvers. They love dancing and are never shy in letting us know.

LAURENT: I know both of you really support Beginners. Why are they so important?

JANICE: Oh to be a Beginner again! That is the time when you have the most fun, laughing at going wrong and achieving new

things all the time.

KAY: We always say not to worry about mistakes. Line dancing is incredible fun, terrific exercise and people make such good friends. A Line dance friendship lasts years, you know!

JANICE: We truly believe in our socials being kept at Beginners and Improver levels, the key being to have as many dancers on the floor as possible. Since we started doing this, the attendance has been much larger. Split floors are definitely the answer for us and our dancers.

KAY: We have written a few Beginners dances because we wanted to teach steps in an easy sequence. This has worked very well for us.

LAURENT: So what is your teaching success secret?

JANICE: When we start with Absolute

Beginners we teach all the basic steps (grapevine, touches, scuff, etc) with Electric Slide and Supreme (our own dance). This gives dancers confidence as everyone can do them and we take great care in reassuring everyone that yes, they can make mistakes and yes, it is the right place to learn when others are just like them.

KAY: Reassurance is actually a big part of our teaches. We always try to explain that at the start, it is a matter of training your mind, body to do these steps and routines. We always say it will be easier next week, you'll see.

JANICE: And when they come back, it does get easier. After that, we add new dances, new steps, just like building blocks.

KAY: Confidence is the key. They can only enjoy something they feel they can do, so becoming friends and progressing works for us and has always done.

LAURENT: Tell me about your involvement with 'Dancing On Ice'?

KAY: That was fun. I got a call from the production company to see if we could arrange a small class for Lee Sharp and his

partner Frankie to come dance with Line dancers. It was all about improving his relaxation and as King of The Road was the dance they had chosen to learn, we taught them that.

JANICE: That was a great night. And we got invited to the filming of the show and had a ball with all the stars and the cast. Philip Schofield even gave us a special mention, a good memory.

LAURENT: What makes you both tick?

JANICE: Line dance makes us tick. We sometimes both need a break or a holiday but we miss it all as soon as we are away...

KAY: It always makes me smile when I hear a tune in a supermarket and I notice someone having a wiggle or a half step...We have all done it and I think "Go for it!". As for my friend here (giggles) she smiles insides when she dances.

JANICE: I have been known to smile on the outside as well you know! I would be lost without Line dance. Whatever the favourite of the moment I am so grateful I can dance and enjoy my time on the floor."

LAURENT: So is Line dance about fun, dancing, friends and more dancing?

JANICE: Pretty much, yes. Our members are our lives too. We have a terrific mix of people going from eight to 84. They raise huge amounts of money for charity (latest Marie Curie dance raised £4300). We have Kay's grandchildren, widows, young mothers, everyone mixes and has fun.

KAY: I remember a while back a lady called Eva used to come in on two sticks. As soon as the music would start, she would dance to the best of her ability, not missing many dances. At the end of the night, she would pick up her sticks and go home. Amazing woman!

JANICE: It is all about feeling the music, dance and have fun. That's it in a nutshell and when you have all your problems, aches and pains disappear thanks to a tune or a dance you can call THAT moment one of happiness. That's what Line dance is about, that's what we are about.

After treatment by emergency personnel, Darryl returned to the stage but ultimately had to throw in the towel after the intensity of the storm caused the entire performance to be cancelled.
