In a magazine well known for its fabulous competitions, you stand the chance of winning ten top albums by just spending a few minutes filling in the questionnaire.





about....

Gary Allan is a well known and respected Nashville Country name. Richard Kirk looks back at a very distinctive career and Gary's new release 'Get Off On The Pain'.



Gary Allan Herzberg was born in Montebello in Southern California in December 1967 and grew up as a surfer in La Mirada. The desire to go into rock music was strong right from the start. Still at school, Gary and his eldest brother wanted desperately to make music but their father, Harley, refused to buy instruments for the boys. It was only when their mother remembered that her husband used to play guitar that on the guiet she suggested the boys buy him a present. On father's day the boys presented their dad with a Fender Stratocaster guitar. This did the trick as within a very short time, father and sons had their instruments and a new PA system and amps. When deemed good enough to do so, they played some gigs locally as The Henzbergs.

Aged 13, Gary followed his father's suggestion and went with him and auditioned at a local club playing some Haggard and Jones. That was the time when he finally was given the opportunity to officially play. Within two years, recognised by A&M Records, the budding talent received an offer of a contract. His dad insisted he was too young. He needed to develop his own style and personality by working the clubs for a few more years. Upset, Gary left home and got married at 18. After joining the army, he started a family of his own having three daughters and on leaving the forces worked in the construction business. Aged 22, working by day he formed a band, The Honkytonk Wranglers and played the bars and clubs by night. Gary once said, "I'd get up at six and work on site for 12 hours. Then go

to the club until three am. Some nights no one really paid any attention. You learned to play, to sing, for yourself."

Finally, Gary's boat seemed to come in thanks to BNA Records who contracted him. But just as Gary started to relax, the deal fell through. Shattered, he took up selling cars and trucks. However fate had not quite said its last word as a couple who bought a truck listened to one of his tapes. So impressed were they that they wrote him a cheque for \$12,000 to record a professional demo tape. A recording contract with Decca followed. Gary had finally honed his craft and started to live life as his father had suggested.

It is now 1996 and after paying his dues in the smoky bars, clubs and fairs of Southern California Gary settled down and in time released two albums producing Top 10 hits including 'It Would Be You'. This was also the time when the recording business hit troubled waters. Labels dropped artists including several well established names. Decca closed down and only four artists were kept on by the parent company MCA. Gary Allan was one of them.


The third album in 1999, 'Smoke Rings In The Dark' introduced me to Gary Allan. I thought the record was very impressive and it would go on selling over a million copies. Other great songs featured included 'Don't Tell Mama', 'Loving You Against My Will', 'I'm The One', 'Bourbon Borderline' and a cover of Del Shannon's 'Runaway'. Gary Allan had certainly looked back to the records of his dad's collection with influences of Johnny Horton, George

Jones, Buck Owens and Merle Haggard adding a hint of the classic to his own individual style of Country.

Garv's 'Greatest Hits' album, released in 2007, features his country and not so country styles and is a fine way to introduce someone to his music. Many of the tracks had strong and sad connections with his life. Songs like 'It Would Be You', 'Tough All Over', 'Puttin' Memories Away' and 'I Just Got Back From Hell' are very personal to Gary whose second wife Angela Herzberg committed suicide in October 2004. Apparently, Angela had several problems including depression, very bad migraine headaches and an eating disorder that began when she was a flight stewardess having to keep to strict weight requirements. The couple were only married for three years and had six children from previous marriages.

His new release and ninth album, 'Get Off On The Pain' is a slightly new direction and a more mature release altogether. It certainly is a great Country sound and I particularly love 'We Fly By Night', an atmospheric song that sits well in this guitar led album. As for the album title, Gary says: "You'll never hear me singing about tractors or farms, just because I don't know anything about that stuff. Wrong roads and dark horses I know about. Still, I think the pain can get to be some kind of a positive for me because it connects to everything I've ever dreamed of. While it's relentless, it's confirmation of the actual existence of this big musical drama, the result of the dream."





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Annie Saerens from Belgium is one of those instructors who not only like their members to have a good time but insist on it. However it does not mean she is not a serious dancer. She says: "To be honest I have always been a dancer. For example, when I was younger, I learnt classical dance. And I practiced a lot then!"

It was in 2001 that Annie discovered a love of Country and enrolled in several country clubs. To her amazement, she quickly fell in love with competitive dancing and she followed technical courses organised by Petra Van de Velde, the well known teacher and choreographer (Zjozzys Funk).

She says: "Between 2002 and 2005 I have been taking part in the UCWDC European championships and have won a first place in my category 14 times in Belgium, Holland, France, England, Germany and Switzerland. Something I am very proud of."

Annie continued her success by qualifying as Vice World Champion in Nashville (USA) in the UCWDC championship. Another proud moment for Annie was to end up first in her category of silver advanced at the European Championship in Holland.

Working for a long time with her husband in their export company, Annie finally decided to spend all of her time Line dancing. So today, she gives lessons to seniors, beginners and advanced dancers three days a week and is a well known and respected instructor who gets invited to workshops in France, Belgium and The Netherlands.


She says: "My speciality is to give my workshops in three different languages (French, Dutch and English). I find that this helps a great deal with crowds who may not all share the same language."

She is also known as a fine choreographer with dances like "Sticks and Stones", a dance chosen as a beginner category dance for a Swedish championship and "Bandstand Boogie" which was picked for a Jamboree in Texas.

She says: "When I decided to stop competing, I created my club "Country Planet" because I wanted to share my own experience and passion with others. I also wanted to give people the chance of more technique teaches, which is not always so easy to find. Many people love to be able to be more graceful and precise in their steps." She laughs: "I also wanted to share my deep deep love for Country Line dance. It is my passion and I just want to spread the word as much as I can."

Annie certainly has got it just right. Country Planet started with just 20 and now boasts of a membership of 150 dancers. This accomplished dancer has certainly proved that there is no match for passion and fun paired together and the joy of dance can only add to the joy of life.

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

# Stepping back 10YEARSago

The cover of our magazine ten years ago showed the beautiful and very proud smile of Roxanne Gale, Female Intermediate Junior Teen champion at Worlds 2000.

In the pages of all knowledge, namely our Grapevine section on pages 7 to 9 it was announced that a couple of our favourite stars were to return to the UK. Jo Thompson, the International Instructor Of The Year, was to start her tour on the Isle Of Wight in late April. Max Perry was to return for a brief tour in mid June. We received a Top Tip from Mark Tollafield who recommended dancing Lightning Polka to Dance Above The Rainbow on Michael Flatley's Feet Of Flames CD. Mark told us: "We love to dance this at Bizzi Boots in Barnstaple, North Devon. It's a sure hit." Ten years on and we still love to receive these so let us know your Top Tips. Very exciting news was also announced, Linedancer Hall Of Fame member, Dave Sheriff, was to team up Country Legend, Porter Wagoner, on stage at the Grand Ole Opry. The Opry date comes after the two collaborated on Dave's song, 'Couldn't Find The Words To Say Goodbye'.

When Australian singing sensation Tina Arena flew in to Britain on a promotional tour, Linedancer caught up with her to present her Crystal Boot Award for Best Dance Track, Now I Can Dance. On page 10 Tina told us: "I'm gobsmacked, I didn't think people would dance to the song that much." She revealed she had a bit of previous Line dance experience. "When I was a kid I performed on the Australian TV show Young Talent Time. We Line danced on the programme several times and we had the best fun."

A feature on Pages 15 to 17 reported on the sixth CWDC (UK) European Championships which took place at Pontins Holiday Centre in Brean Sands, Somerset. Over 780 contenders and 600 spectators the CWDC aim was to promote Country Western dance in all its forms. Among some of the live entertainment were The Haleys. Jodie Binstead, who won Division Two Line Dance, said: "The standard of competition rises every year and I enjoy meeting new dancers who might not compete at other Line dance events."

Pages 18 and 19 showed four album reviews, one that received four stars for both listening value and dance value was 'Coast

to Coast' Live by BR5-49. If you have never been to a BR5-49 concert then this album will give you a good idea of what you are missing. There isn't a single track on this that you can't dance to, all you need to do is get out on the floor and change gear a few times.

In a feature on pages 20 and 21, Alison Biggs told Linedancer about her successful career in Line dancing. She originally enrolled at a Line dance class held by Lynda and Graham West but Alison quickly decided to go it alone and formed AB's Stompers Line Dancing Club in Hertfordshire. After teaching Line dance for four years, Alison branched out and became Tour Manager for a number of well known choreographers. Alison is at her happiest on the hardwood and she told Linedancer: "I just want to keep on dancing and keep on touring."

Rick Tells All, was the title of the feature on page 25. Vancouver country star Rick Tippe was busy touring America, Europe and his home country, while bringing out a steady stream of successful independent CD's. Rick's music has also soundtracked a string of Line dance hitssuch as 'Hardwood Stomp', 'Rattlesnake Shake' and 'Dance On'. His latest floor filler, the funky 'I'll Tell You What', packed the dancefloor at the Linedancer Crystal Boot Awards. When asked where the funk came from, Rick said: "I love mixing genres of music, I grew up with country and will always play country but my influences come from everywhere."

Michael Vera-Lobos, Choreographer of 'Into The Arena', simply lets his shy smile, enticingly dark eyes and easy going good humour do the talking for him. However, on pages 37 and 38 the Australian told Linedancer how he sees the future of Line dance: "I would like to see choreographers around the globe keep in touch with each other's work. Linedancer Magazine helps, the top 10 dances and stories about choreographers are informative about what's happening on the Line dance scene. We don't have that in Australia."

The Festival Country Music in Mirande is always a top drawer attraction every July and thousands go there for the music, the motorcycles, cars and the big American trucks as well as the Line dance who each year, has many more dancers joining in the fun.

Line dance started in the South west of France some ten years ago and at that time, the style was very country. Therefore, Line dance had a place at the Festival. The organizers, who always try to provide the very best experience for their visitors, very quickly created a space totally dedicated to this style of dance. And because of that growth in demand, the Line Dance Academy was created to help start new clubs.

So what is the Academy exactly? It is a group of clubs that receive help on their every day administration as well as support for their socials and the organizing of events and advice on how to train new instructors. Today, more than a thousand dancers adhere to the Academy.

The role of the Line Dance Academy is not just looking after its clubs but also invite and welcome guests choreographers during the Line dance Show. This event is held every February and with all day long workshops of every level taking place, it is fast becoming an important date in the agenda of many a dancer. exchange views, an important moment in the life of a club instructor!

The eighth Line dance Show took place on the 12, 13th and 14th February and the ever popular Chris Hodgson was the guest of honour. It was a terrific weekend. Mirande motivates them and we as instructors, just continue bringing (hopefully) the best out of them.

As a matter of fact, Mirande was my starting point too. I began my Line dance club after seeing a demo from Paris at the Festival some years ago. That was my first time and it was in Mirande, so all I can say is Thank you. Some of us, as dancers, owe Mirande a lot.









Linedancer Magazine has recently heard from many people who have had unfortunate experiences on the dance floor, courtesy of other dancers. Multi-talented Gary Lafferty, DJ, choreographer, instructor and dancer, recently revisited the subject by creating an up to date dance floor etiquette guide. So what is dance floor etiquette and why is it important. Dawn Middleton finds out more.

Alright everyone, what is going on with all of this pushing, getting stepped on, getting heeled or elbowed? The dance floor can be a dangerous place. With people often doing out of control air steps with reckless abandonment and charleston kicks that resemble Kung Fu moves, it's a wonder there isn't an ambulance standing by outside some dance clubs. Add to this the bruised feelings that result from rudeness and the frustration one feels when continually jostled on a busy dance floor and you have the potential for a riot. All these things can be easily avoided if everyone simply abides by dance

floor etiquette.

What is dance floor etiquette? We like to think of it as the art of dancing, whether good or bad, in your own space. The art of not being all over the dance floor, unaware of or totally oblivious to other people dancing around you. The art of having consideration for other dancers and of not intruding into their space. Just as you wouldn't want them to intrude into yours.

Gary Lafferty recently placed a comment on Facebook after attending a social night and he found the lack of dance floor etiquette was absolutely shocking. There were people thinking that they could join a line where there clearly was not enough space for them, or literally elbowing and pushing people in an attempt to join the middle of a row when the dance had already started. The response to Gary's post was incredible. "I didn't realise that so many people felt exactly the same and so came the idea of my new document but it is by no means intended to be 'the definitive guide'." Here is a small selection of of the document.

**Etiquette** (pronounced [,eti'ket]) is a code of behavior that delineates expectations for social behavior according to contemporary conventional norms within a society.

Dance in lines! We are not here to Squiggle Dance

- Listen to the DJ to know what dance is being played, and for any floor splits being called — it will help you ensure that you are doing the same dance as the person next to you
- Be aware of your surroundings remember to take smaller steps when a new dance is being taught, or a popular dance is being played (the dance floor may be fuller than normal) and NEVER kick too high or jump with both feet off the floor, it's not a gymnastics class!

- Walk across the dance floor when music is playing to reach the other side of the hall as this is dangerous not only to yourself but to other dancers who may not see you - you should ALWAYS walk around, not cut across
- Try to join an existing line where there is not enough space for you to do so, you wouldn't like someone to push in beside you, so please don't do it to anyone else
- Bend down in the middle of the floor to tie the laces on your sparkly dance shoes, this is very dangerous as you immediately become a hazard to the other dancers moving around you

- Please remember everyone was a Beginner once, and that newcomers should be encouraged but similarly, please don't get up for a dance that you don't know, you may become a hazard as other dancers move around you, or if you then try to exit from the dance floor in the middle of the song
- It is courteous to apologise to a fellow dancer if you bump into them, or kick them accidentally

Country Club Route 45 is a French club in the Orleans region and it is also an association borne out of the desire to share dancing at its purest state, ie the joy and fun that like minded folks experience together.
Franck Boucheraud, the association's President tells Laurent what Country Club Route 45 is all about.

When you meet Franck for the first time, you can't help but notice his absolute passion for Country and Line dance. I met Franck for the very first time in Cagnes during the Country festival held there in the Summer. He was then as he is now very clear on what direction Line dance should be about. I was not surprised to learn of his role in Country Club Route 45. Speaking to him again, I ask how it all began. "Country Club Route 45 started out as an idea when we realised there was no Country and Line Dance association in the region and what did exist was just not our vision of how or what to promote as music and dances. We just wanted to be able to dance together in country socials and just share our dance pleasure together in a friendly way."

Route 45!

It was in summer 2007 that it all started to work out. Ulrich Bernard, the association instructor and amicable front man came back with Franck from the huge festival "Country Rendez-vous" held in Craponne sur Arzon. Franck remembers: "At that time, I was not involved in this incredible event but I was so happy to be there, I felt the vibe and I wanted to be part of it." Later, as a volunteer, Franck's dream would come true and he is now helping as a Press officer and also as a mediator for artists coming at the Festival.

So how does Country Club Route 45 work? "Simple really. Our objective was to promote Country through dance and Line dance. We just want to share what we do with the public at large and promote the music and steps we love.



Why? "Well, again, this is simple. We don't want dance and music to be seen as elitist, you know, a bunch of French snobs dancing to unknown stuff. We want people in the street to come to us and enjoy what we do, realise that they too can have a good time. We want to make sure we do things the right way. You can have fun and look good too. Quality is important to us." So much so, that the man whom many consider as France's Line dance First man, Robert Wanstreet accepted to be the club's godfather, an honour he had never bestowed on any other organisation. Franck says delightedly: "We have since collaborated on many other projects."

This vision of sharing a unique dance and music passion has meant that from starting with just 40 dancers the association has now close to 200 members.

Ulrich and Franck are proud of their achievements. "We are involved in many new projects and events like being at the Billy Bob's in Disney Paris for the Festival of Line Dance last year, demoing on national TV and going all over France to show what we do."

An impressive partnership with their home town of Orleans means that the association is promoting their brand of dancing and enjoyment all over the region.

Franck says that two events are particularly close to Country Club Route 45's heart.

"We are involved in an annual conference about Country music in relation with dance and we are thrilled to be asked along. And of course our own Country day which is an event that is getting more and more popular each time we hold it. This year our guest of honour is Maggie Gallagher and we are all really looking forward to meet her."

Though Country is at the heart of the association Franck and Ulrich are realists and they are aware that other genres of music are starting to be part of the Line dance scene in France. Franck says: "The big debate between pop and country is not a problem to us. We have no real agenda. We have tried to introduce Line dance with a workshop headed by Florence Chevallet. A big success here. And our presence at the CBA for the second

year running shows our interest and our will to include new elements in our dancing."

Three years in, what are the members of Country Club Route 45 feeling about the association itself?

Franck laughs: "We are still running and going ahead with our collective passion. We try to create an atmosphere, a social network that embraces the beauty of music, dance and the wonders of our lovely city of Orleans. So yes Ulrich and I are kept quite busy!"

Born in Basildon, in Essex, right from the start Natalie was destined for a future in music. Encouraged by her parents Helen and Roy (Natalie calls them "Wonderful, just wonderful") she and her two older brothers, Matthew and Chay learnt the piano. Natalie says: "My brothers both went up to Grade 7, my dad went up to Grade 5, and my mum and I got our Diplomas – entitling us to letters after our names. My full title is Natalie Thurlow ALCM (Associate of the London College of Music)!" This early start means that today, Matthew spends all his spare time composing music, and Chay is a fantastic drum player.

Not content with her piano playing ability, Nat also took up Trombone and Sax. It would be at the age of 14 that she started singing in her first band. She says: "We were called 'Doctor Palmer and his seven daughters', a pretty unforgettable name!"

Later, Natalie became involved with many Amateur Dramatic Societies. She says: "For the past few years I have turned my hand to Musical Directing - which I love." And with shows like- Half A Sixpence, Annie Get Your Gun, Annie, Lust, Barnum, High Society, Mack and Mabel, and a second production of Annie, she certainly does not get bored. She adds: "I am currently working on Fiddler On The Roof and The King and I This production is for the charity, Lennox - which is a wonderful group who help Children with Cancer which makes a lot of my work worthwhile."

As if that was not enough she also belongs to 'The Howard Wallace Chorale' in Shenfield, Essex, under the direction of Tim Rhys-Morgan and sings alongside 80 other people.

Her journey as a Line dance artist was almost parallel to all her other activities. Natalie used to sing in a Function band when she was just 18, thanks to her music teacher. Eventually, the band folded up and the same teacher, John Stevenson, who by now, had become a true friend asked her to duet with him. "It Takes Two" was formed in 2000, and two years later Nikky Napier asked Nat to join Calico. She says: "I quickly explained that

I knew absolutely nothing about the Country/Linedance circuit but Nikky assured me that I would soon grow to love it, which indeed I did! Nikky and I became the best of friends, and I loved working with both her and Shanks (Brian) The band, as all bands do, went through their changes, but all for the better."

In 2006, unable to meet the workload she had to face with her Amateur Dramatics she had to make the difficult decision to leave the band. She says: "Thankfully Nikky totally understood my reason for leaving and was very supportive. I had absolutely no ambition to work as a solo artist at that time."

But life has a curious habit of turning people's worlds upside down and three months after leaving Calico, Natalie was asked by Michelle Risley of Peace-Train to perform at their birthday social. She remembers: "I soon realised how much I missed the circuit so decided to give it a go on my own. This decision worked much better for me, as I can balance my other passion during the week which is musically directing Amateur Dramatic Shows." She also adds: "Glenn Rogers has also been a huge support over the years — I could never begin to repay him for his help."

She laughs: "You know, in the whole 11 years that I have been in this profession, I had never worked on my own, so the first few gigs were very daunting. I just felt so nervous and so "unprotected"." A few months down the line though, Natalie soon warmed up and she got to love the experience . She says:" Now I really wouldn't change a thing!"

With a full diary booked for the next two years the future looks rosy for Natalie Thurlow.

"I am a lucky woman. I have been very lucky to perform in Portugal, Sweden, Spain, France, and this year going over to Dublin." Any other places she would like to visit. "I would LOVE to perform on cruises

but who wouldn't?" she says with a smile. A great part of Natalie's success is due to her versatility and she is aware of that. "I love Rock and Soul, people like Aretha, Stevie Wonder and Pink are my idols but it is wonderful for me, to be able to perform all different styles. I try my best to keep up to date with dances, not always easy..." I ask Natalie about what makes her run, what ambition she still has and she does not hesitate.

"My family is really important. For example, I now have five nieces and they are such a joy to me. But my proudest moment so far in my career is to have won the Crystal Boot Award for 2009." She pauses. "I am overwhelmed by the support I receive from the dancers and am forever in their debt!! My biggest ambition is to write some music that hopefully will get noticed some day."

And as Natalie has the habit of achieving all she sets out to do, I am sure we will one day dance to her very own sounds. Just remember you read it here first.

Phone calls out of the blue can definitely be good news. *Lisa Mason* can vouch for that! In this exclusive report, she tells *Linedancer* what happened ....

I instantly agreed to help and suggested they come down to my Friday evening class.

My instructions were to keep it Country. I was happy to do that because I like to keep a Country element at my clubs. After all, that's how Line dancing started out when my club opened 13 years ago.

They also wanted us to "Keep it country can you all dress up?" and that was no surprise to me. I did explain that this was not what really happened any more in Line dancing and I really fought our corner. I explained about all the genres that people dance to but.... I just kept getting "It is public perception".



Easton Corbin was born and raised in a small farming community in Florida. He worked on his grandfather's farm and learned to play guitar. He was influenced by his grandparents' country records and after getting a degree he married and moved to Nashville in 2006. He releases his debut album on Mercury Records.

The opening song *Roll With It* (122bpm) is a lovely little country cha cha, full of Easton's rich country voice, which would make a good dance track

A Little More Country Than That (85bpm) is the first single in the States and it would be right at home on a George Strait album. Easton could be heir to throne of the king of country!

This Far From Memphis (78bpm) this super country song is one of Easton's co-writes with some great lyrics and it demonstrates just what a great talent he is.

The Way Love Looks (133bpm) with its good solid east coast swing beat this would make for a great dance track.

Someday When I'm Old (120bpm) the rhythm changes to waltz with brilliant song. The beat is solid and the musical accompaniment to Easton's wonderful vocal makes this one a joy to listen and dance to.

**Don't Ask Me 'Bout A Woman** (128bpm) is a fine country dance track and Easton sounds a lot like Craig Morgan with good lyrics, good music and a really good beat.

*I Can't Love You Back* (68bpm) has a strong nightclub two step beat and I will be very surprised if some choreographers don't pick up on this one.

A Lot To Learn About Livin' (121bpm) is very much in the vein of "Five O' clock Somewhere" and this could be as big a hit.

She gets Me (66bpm) Gary's emotive vocal make this song an absolute delight to listen to and once again it's a nightclub two step.

Let Alone You (80bpm) by now I just can't believe the quality of this album, it's just one great country song after another. This is another fine dance prospect.

That'll Make You Wanna Drink (94bpm) is another that Easton had a hand in writing and this is a "good ole boys drinkin' song" which could also tempt a few choreographers.

The album finishes with another of Easton's songs Leavin' Lonely Town (124bpm) which sounds a bit like a tempered down Steve Earle song and once again it has great possibilities as a dance track.

This album is a superb debut from a talented young artist who may well just be the next big thing in country music. Get in on the act early you will not be disappointed. Highly recommended.

GARY ALLAN
GET OFF ON THE PAIN
WRASSE RECORDS – HUMPO79

Back in 1996 a young country singer Gary Allan had a smash hit with his debut album "Used Heart For Sale". We have danced to several of Gary's tracks over the years and now on the mighty Hump Head roster Gary releases a brand new album.

Title track *Get Off On The Pain* (72bpm) sets the album off. This is a country rocker with a powerful backing and you realise right away that Gary is as good as ever.

I Think I've Had Enough (70bpm) although a renowned rocker, Gary can deliver a heartfelt song packed with passion and this is exactly the scenario here. This is a powerful nightclub two step.

Today (68bpm) is a moving song of watching the one you really love getting married to someone else. Another stunning nightclub two step.

That Ain't Gonna Fly (152bpm) is cracking, has a great Tush Push beat and it is real country rocker that deserves a good dance writing to it.

Kiss Me When I'm Down (78bpm) Gary sings of losing his lover and trying to entice her back. The song demands to be listened to as it has powerful lyrics in a powerful song.

We Fly By Night (93bpm) Gary co-wrote the rest of the songs on the album and this lovely song with a cha cha beat sounds like early Mavericks music. A good dance prospect.

When You Give Yourself Away (95bpm) has a superb musical backing and Gary uses his falsetto on his powerful vocal delivery. The B3 organ on the backing is amazing.

Along The Way (106bpm) this is more typical Gary Allan in style and it has a good strong cha cha beat.

She gets Me (66bpm) Gary's emotive vocal make this song an absolute delight to listen to and once again it's a nightclub two step.

No Regrets (104bpm) is one the most moving songs I have heard in a while and I just can't stop playing it.

I have the deluxe edition of the album with four extra songs including *Long Summer Days* (88bpm) which is in the vein of Kid Rock's "All Summer Long" and it's a lively dance track.

There are live versions of three of Gary's big hits; *Right Where I Need To Be* (110bpm), *Best I Ever Had* (83bpm), and *Watching Airplages* (80bpm)

Airplanes (80bpm).

If I am honest, I expected a few more rockier tracks however this is a superb album of country music, there are several good dance tracks and you can't help but love Gary's voice. This is definitely a "must have" album.

JESS KLEIN Bound to love

UNITED FOR OPPORTUNITY - UFO 1019

New Yorker Jess Klein has released six albums to date. Jess moved to Austin, Texas in 2008 and has now recorded her new album in the state renowned for its good music.

Jess opens When The Time Comes (142bpm) a lively up tempo number Americana in style but with overtones of Punk thrown in. Refreshing!

Don't Wanna Say It (110bpm) there is a certain rawness in the production on this track and Jess's voice is smooth and very easy on the ear.

**Bound To Love** (68bpm) Jess wrote all but one of the songs on her album. This is nightclub two step song although the fact that it is a mainly acoustic.

I Just Want To Know Your Name (92bpm) with a little more power and electronic production I could see this one being a mainstream hit. The staccato style makes you tap your feet as you listen, a good dance prospect.

**Postcard** (138bpm) the mood changes with this lively upbeat track with catchy lyrics.

Before I Go (94bpm) was written by John Hiatt and is the only song that Jess didn't write herself. Jess really lets go vocally and packs power and emotion into this track.

Fool (110bpm) this is one of my favourite tracks on the album. Jess's voice is stunning and as it has a nice cha cha rhythm.

Putty (82bpm). With its cheeky contemporary yet with somewhat vintage sound it's a complete change of direction for this track. With a remix it could well be a big hit.

It Will Come (121bpm) Jess starts this country like track in a deeper register highlighting her excellent vocal range.

*Travellin' Woman* (128bpm) reminds me of a latter day version of Suzy Bogguss' excellent song "Eat At Joes".

Rosalie (78bpm) this track will remind you of songs by Judy Collins and Joni Mitchell.

Jess finishes her album with *What For* (75bpm) which is nightclub two step in style. Jess sounds like a real Texas troubadour on her finale paying homage to the state to which she now calls home.

Here we have an album that is an eclectic mix of folk, Americana, and country. There is no doubt that Jess Klein is a very talented singer songwriter and whilst this album is not full of strong dance tracks, it is a fine album nonetheless.



MINDY MCCREADY

I'M STILL HERE

Mindy McCready burst onto the country music scene back in 1996 with the release of her award winning debut album Ten Thousand Angels. She was destined for superstardom but personal problems led to some jail time and Mindy rapidly fell from grace. However she has since turned her life around and is now releasing her first album in eight years.

Mindy's opener Wrong Again (76bpm) was written by one of Nashville's best songwriters Gary Burr. This is a beautiful nightclub two step.

By Her Side (63bpm) is also a nightclub two step with a good solid beat and Mindy delivers an emotion packed vocal. There is also an acoustic version of this song on the album

I Want A Man (88bpm) Mindy delivers a sassy number which has a driving beat and is very much in the vein of her big hit Guys Do It All The Time.

I'm Still Here (72bpm) is one of three tracks that Mindy co-wrote. This is a poignant autobiographical song that Mindy delivers with heart and passion. It is yet another nightclub two step in style.

Your Smile (108/216bpm) is cracking two step song and therefore you could be dancing to it soon.

Lovin' You On My Mind (76bpm) Josh sounds like the late great Conway Twitty on this gorgeous nightclub two step.

I Want To Love You (74bpm) this track could well be a crossover hit as it encompasses several genres. Mindy's voice is powerful yet subtle and is accompanied by some fine harmonies.

Songs About You (78bpm) has a good solid beat and it is Mindy's anthem about saying goodbye to failed relationships. A great track!

The Way You Make Me Melt (84bpm) is a big production with a strong musical backing and Mindy's vocal is powerful and emotive.

The Dance (88bpm) this is Mindy's version of Garth Brooks iconic song. Mindy's heartfelt rendition moved me as I am sure it will move you.

I Hate That I Love You (84bpm) is a feel good number that flows along and Fades (65bpm) is a superb song that once again Mindy puts her heart and soul into. Simply wonderful!

Mindy McCready has bounced back from adversity and shows that her voice and her spirit is as good as ever. We should all wish Mindy every success in life. This is a beautiful album from a very special lady and I can highly recommend you order a copy today.



Dear Sho,

I am 76 and love Line dancing.
I have problems keeping my
balance in some dances. I am healthy
and want to keep Line dancing because it
keeps me fit and I like the people. Is there
anything I can do to stop my legs feeling
feeling like this? Will this go away? I worry
about falling and I do not want to cause
problems for the teacher and everyone in
the class.

Margaret

Margaret I am delighted to hear that you enjoy your Line dancing and that it is keeping you active. You don't say how long you have had your balance problems or whether you have asked your doctor about this. Balance problems can be due to many things and so if you haven't already had a word with your doctor then I would suggest that you do so to rule out anything that requires medical treatment.

The next thing to consider and understand is that our bones, joints and muscles change, as we get older - and don't we all feel this to some degree? For example, we gradually lose muscle tone. And this means that some things that have been easy to do can become more challenging Although we can't prevent this natural process happening we can do something about slowing it down to maintain as much muscle tone as possible. Our balance depends on good muscle tone to maintain our posture and hold us steady. When the muscles are not strong enough to hold us secure and strong then we can experience a bit of shaking or feel unsteady on our feet. There may also be changes in, for example, the hip or knee joints and these could also contribute to balance problems.

Exercise is one of the best ways to slow down or prevent problems with our muscles, joints and bones. It is good for our bones and helps

to keep them strong. It can also help to keep our joints flexible and our muscles strong. Line dancing can contribute to your exercise needs but you also need to make sure that you are doing some exercises specifically designed to helping your flexibility and strength. Pilates or other conditioning exercises are brilliant for this as they focus on good posture and the correct anatomical alignment of the joints as well as optimising strength and flexibility. Finding an instructor who has specialist understanding of conditioning work with older people would be ideal for you. This work is often offered as a small class or as 1-2-1 sessions. This sort of specialist class or session takes into account the changes mentioned above and specifically aims to help with the challenges of for example, loss of muscle tone. A 1-2-1 session would be carefully designed to meet your specific needs and also provide advice about exercises you can do regularly at home. Once you have got some regular conditioning work under your belt and start to feel the benefit from it you should also feel stronger when you are Line dancing.

Then it is a case of keep up the conditioning exercises so you can continue to enjoy your Line dancing.

PS You may also want to try doing my foot exercises, available as a free download from my website, to help you tone up the muscles in your feet and lower legs.


# King Of The Diets

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


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

One of the amazing things about dance is that, seldom, dancers limit their interest to one particular genre or style. Once you discover how to move on a dance floor, you get to love it all. Not everyone though can multi task... Meet *Maggie Palmer* who is at the helm of the Line dance club Triple M Dance Academy based in Wolverhampton and who is not only successful in Line dance but also Zumba and Burlesque.

name is Maggie and I discovered Line dance thanks to my Mum who was an ardent dancer way back in 1996. That was also the year when we lost her and I miss her to this day. Line dance is all the more special to me as it was a shared moment between us of something she loved. I was already a dance teacher and a fitness instructor so I knew I could teach it and I started out as an instructor in 1997. My father helped me start my own club and he was very proud of what we achieved over the years until he passed away in 2005. Again, that sense of deep belonging to Line dance is all the more acute because both my parents encouraged me and loved it too. They are still the wind beneath my sails and they guide me each day.



Then in 2008 tired of dealing with room hire increases and having venues taken off us at the drop of a hat, I knew I had to do something fresh. It seemed that Line dancers were always seen as the last choice by organisers and I thought: "Enough!"

For the longest time I had wanted to open my own dance studio, and so I started to look for the right opportunity. I soon found a building on the outskirts of Wolverhampton

and helped design what would become Dance By Design studio, which today is the home of Triple M. Opening in November 2008, all my business was strictly Line dance based. All seemed well until I made a huge mistake. I closed down all my Line dance venues and moved them to the studio. It started well enough with a huge following but as a couple of months went by my regular dancers stopped coming back. They did not like the feel of the place, the mirrors, in short it was not working out. I panicked as I had a five year lease and had to make it work.

What was I to do?

I have always loved dance in every way and I started to research burlesque and I began to train to become an accredited teacher. This I did for two months and finally in March 2009 put my first course on at the studio. It went down a storm and I have never looked back. I regularly put six week courses on for beginners with the chance to progress further if they wish to. I have found some budding stars during the last 12 months, I can tell you.

I also hooked up with an old friend who had danced with me for years and had started to teach Line dancing as well. His name is Scott James and we decided to put together a unique service offering couples the chance to do their own tailor made first wedding dance. Again, it seemed we had found something and has become a real success.

In one of our private wedding tuition class we met a lady called Misty who is American. She asked Scott and I if we had heard about Zumba. Had we seen it? No, we hadn't. She had tried it in America and said we should look at this new Latin inspired dance fitness class. We researched it on the internet and what we saw amazed us both.

It seemed right up our street as we Triple M Dancers are always known as energetic, stylish dancers wherever we go. We immediately contacted Zumba and we had to wait three months to get onto a training

course because everything was fully booked. We finally got our first qualification in June 2009 and have since done another three training courses furthering our knowledge to include the new Zumba Kids, which is for the younger generation and Zumba Gold for our more mature age group which is a milder version of the standard Zumba class. Scott started teaching first in September 2009 followed by myself in January 2010. We are so busy that we have even had to renovate the studio in Wolverhampton to make it larger to cope with the demand.

I realise the following may sound rather immodest but over the years I have inspired a lot of people to teach and I have trained many. Most of them are today successful teachers in their own right. I have one person whom I would like to thank who has been true and loyal to me, a lady who I have worked with for many years in Line dancing. Jackie Faulkner is that friend, a cornerstone of my work and dance ethic. Words can never repay my debt of friendship to her. And if people have been inspired by what I do is because people like Jackie and my parents inspired me too.

So when all is said and done and when I look back I know that I truly owe everything to Line dance. Without Mum or Dad introducing me to it, I would never have found my new skills that today have allowed me to broaden my dance horizon and be successful as what I love doing. And how many people can say that?

I had a personal surprise when former Superstar Pedro Machado sat down beside me and we reminisced about 'The Good Old Days' Pedro hasn't changed. Still full of mischief! The same goes for Rob Fowler, we realised we are, together with Liz, among the survivors from way back.

Congratulations to the winners of the Crystal Boots. Many thanks to Linedancer Magazine for their organisational

skills and the very warm welcome, to not only Robert and I but everyone who attended. Many thanks to the performers, instructors, technical staff as well as the staff of the Norbreck hotel. All of which went to making a very fun filled weekend and a nostalgic walk down a Country Memory Lane.

We also heard from Corinne Bertile herself. As Maureen explained, Corinne came to the CBA for the very first time all the way from La Réunion, an island situated in the Indian Ocean. For Corinne, attending the CBA was a dream come true. This is a translation of her message to Linedancer:

Since coming back home, all I have spoken about is my experience at the CBA! I really was so happy there and I just have one hope, to be able to come back one day. # Flashuamus

Flashmobs or spontaneous dances are a phenomenon borne by the Internet's social interaction possibilities. Through sites like Facebook, hundreds of people are given a venue and a time where they meet and burst into apparent random but synchronized moves. *Bill Bader* recently participated in a Vancouver flashmob organised by the charity imagine1day. *Laurent* talks to *Bill* and *Sapna Dayal* the Charity's executive director about an amazing day.



Imagine1day is a Canadian registered charity and is a growing global network of people who are passionate about educating children. Launched in 2007, imagine1day's goal is to bring quality primary education to all children in Ethiopia by 2020.

I ask Sapna Dayal how the charity is organised. She says: "The organization works to directly educate impoverished communities without corruption or loss of funds. With base funding provided by Chip and Shannon Wilson (creators of a Canadian fitness chain Lululemon Athletica - www.lululemon.com), 100% of every dollar given to imagine I day goes directly to fund new schools, water points, latrines, teacher training and supplies. "

In just two years of existence, the charity has built six new primary schools, nine water points, 11 latrines and has provided teacher training, sports equipment, science kits, and support in developing models for income generation to 30 community schools.

So why organise a flashmob?

Sapna says: "The whole concept was a perfect fit in mirroring imaginelday's core values of fun and infinite possibility. We take

pride in staying connected to the community in a unique way and using excitement and energy to raise awareness about our goal. And what better stage than the Vancouver 2010 Olympics!"

As you can imagine the organisation of such an event takes time.

The next step for imagine 1 day was to decide which tune they would pick. Sapna says: "We chose to make the dance accessible to as many people as possible because we are committed to people finding their unique contribution to the world and to our work. Our dance was a perfect demonstration of that and so we chose the song Dancing in the Street by Martha and the Vandellas because its lyrics appropriately reflect the spirit of community (it doesn't matter what you wear, just as long as you are there). This was our way of connecting a community in Vancouver with a community across the world in Ethiopia."

So far so good, but surely the hardest bit was yet to come. Sapna admits: "It was a bit daunting but because we had incredible support from many amazing people who gave their time

and energy, we made it a huge success." She laughs. "At imaginelday we call people's contribution "CREATRIBUTIONTM", a word we made up to describe people creatively turning their passion into contribution."

Amazingly, the whole thing itself took under a month to organize. Sapna says: "We used social media to direct people to a video with step by step instructions on how to learn the dance and we asked people to invite as many of their friends as possible to join the movement. Over a three week period we held rehearsals in our office space which were led by a local dance instructor, Mara Branscombe."

All the while the charity learnt of schools, dance studios and friend circles that were hosting rehearsals in their respective spaces. Imagine 1 day also coordinated with the Vancouver Police Department to ensure that the location (kept secret until two days before the event) would be closed off for the period of the dance and they received sound equipment and electrical wiring from local businesses. Sapna says: "Beyond that we trusted that the stars would align!"

The result was unveiled to the world on



Saturday, February 13th, 2010 at 4pm PST. Bill Bader was there and he says: "Hundreds of dancers were contacted about 25 days before the event. There were two rehearsals scheduled, but some of us just learned the dance at home from the video instruction."

He continues; "We were told to show up and mingle in the crowd inconspicuously on the day. That turned out to be quite difficult because of how crowded that block was, so we simply gathered in place and waited for the music. As for the routine istelf even though the moves were quite simple, it was challenging because it was so long. Considering a long-ish line dance is 64 counts, this dance pattern was 136 counts, with 20 different sections! But it was lots of fun and energetic. It included a lot of 1960s dance moves like The Twist, The Jerk, and The Pony." He laughs: "I lost an inch off my waist practicing it."

Bill was amazed at the result as most people were. "It went really well, and some people were surprised to be caught up inside the mass of dancers. You can see that in one of the videos where a lady in a bright yellow coat had no idea what was going on, but she wasn't going to let that stop her from joining in for a while."

Sapna agrees: "It was a fabulous day and though our original goal was to have 200 people participate, in the end, the flash mob dance was performed by over 2,000, creating an incredible buzz throughout the city. Crowds lined the street to take in the event as the street was abruptly overcome by dancers.

After a few brief moments, it all ended as suddenly as it began, with dancers calmly dispersing and onlookers scratching their heads. Fantastic!"

Imagine 1 day had organised a unique performance and had erupted in the heart of Olympic bustle, leaving onlookers amused, excited and wanting to know more.

Sapna says: "We set out to create a fun, inclusive event for the community during the 2010 Olympic games and in doing so to raise awareness about the work of imagine 1 day.

We surpassed all expectations and thanks to those few minutes and the wonderful people who took part, the charity raised its profile. We would do it all over again without one moment's hesitation. "She laughs again. "And who's to say we won't!"




