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Dear Dancers



How do you see yourself as a dancer? Are you serious about the fun you have? Or do you dance if you can and when you can? If you are a casual dancer, do you feel a tad shy in going back, just in case you get exposed to a choreography that 'everyone' knows while clearly, you are the only person in the world who doesn't. Does the eight times a week brigade

put you off? Do you feel that you have missed so many classes that you are sure to have forgotten everything you ever learnt?

Truth is that the one thing Line dance demands most of its adepts, is time. Very often, dedication, passion and loyalty follow but just because life all of a sudden is busier for someone does not mean that by not going to a regular class dancers are not interested anymore. As for many of us, once you stop an activity (the gym is a good example in my case), the motivation of returning falls flat. Before you know it, yesterday's burning passion is today's cold mash potato.

So it makes me wonder whether you have ever thought of those dancers who have left your club of late? Do you meet them in the street sometimes as they hurriedly walk by with a vague excuse for chat, seemingly embarrassed and ill at ease?

Have you got something in place to tempt them back? If not, why not? Have you thought of, maybe, organising a 'returner club' once a month, a nice informal class to recap older dances maybe? Or going through your clubs top three of the last four weeks? It need not be anything arduous or complicated but if you hold a class that people can pick, leave and come back to without too much problem, I reckon you could be onto something. When someone's appetite is renewed, you may very well find that he or she will come back more often to your regular classes, again.

What level would you have to choose for such a club within a club? Certainly Improvers and maybe Intermediates too, you will know your market best. The point I am trying to make is that you never forget a first love and you, as an instructor or even as a dancer, can help rekindle the flames as well as swelling your club's numbers too. In my experience, once a dancer always a dancer.

We all need a little encouragement at times, a little motivation. By making it easier for someone who may think 'Not for me anymore', by allowing hesitant dancers to become once again capable and graceful on the dance floor, you will also have done the rarest of things. You will have helped to recapture a dream and transform an almost forgotten wish into a reality. And that is what I call an achievement!

Artists booked to appear to date


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Easton Corbin is the new boy in Nashville and last month, Tim Ruzgar gave him Album Of The Month as his outstanding debut CD made a huge impression on him.

Richard Kirk explains why Easton is set to make waves. If a Country fan tells me his favourite artists are George Jones, Merle Haggard, Keith Whitley and George Strait that man is a soul brother. If a new Country artist states the same, I am interested! Easton Corbin's first ever album had to be something special. After listening to it, I can vouch the album is very special indeed.

Now you may think the State of Florida is just sandy shores and theme parks. Not so. There are the very rural areas particularly in Gilchrist County where Corbin was born and raised. He confirms one of his earliest memories: "I was about four sitting between my parents in the car and a Mel McDaniel song came on the radio. It was 'Baby's Got Her Blue Jeans On'. I began using the gearshift as my microphone.' The roots were planted and would grow deep.

His parents divorced early and the young Easton spent long periods helping out with the chores on his grand parents 150 acre cattle farm. He loved the life working with the animals and the fishing on the Suwannee River.


His grandparents, on his father's side, liked to watch the Opry: "We would start Saturday night off with 'Hee Haw' and then 'Opry Back Stage' followed by 'Opry Live'."

Allowed to use the record player in the front room he played the old records left behind by his father and father's sisters for hours on end.

Aged 15 he started taking guitar lessons from a local musician who, in the past, had played sessions in Nashville. When not helping on the farm Easton practiced for hours. He became lead guitar in a local band at school functions and parties and anywhere he could. An audition at a local music store led to an appearance at the Suwannee River Jam held in a 40 acre field. In time he became the opening act for top line artists passing through the area including Mel McDonald whose song on the car radio had left such an impression on the young boy.

Having taken a business degree in agriculture at college, Easton married in September 2006 and three months later the couple moved to Nashville. He took a day job at Ace Hardware and at night performed at writers night showcases. To support the family, his wife took a job at a doctor's surgery.

A distant relative, a professor of music management at the University of Montana, impressed by Easton sent a selection of his music to several contacts in Nashville. An invitation followed to play in person in front





of a booking agent and, Joe Fisher, a director at Universal Records. The dark haired, good looking, young singer with the baritone tones performed his songs and his dreams came true when Fisher, without hesitation, offered him a recording contract.

Carson Chamberlain, now a record producer, who had toured with the late Keith Whitley as steel guitar player and band leader, linked up with Easton Corbin in the recording studios. Both loved traditional Country. They listened to many songs from many songwriters and while out in Colorado, co-wrote four of the tracks included on the debut album.

At the time of writing the first single from the album, 'A Little More Country Than That' has stormed up the charts to Number Five. Impressed with their fine new artist. Mercury in Nashville are putting their full weight in support of Easton Corbin. In June he is lined up to appear at the prestigious

CMA Music Festival. The album titled Easton Corbin is available in the UK on the Hump Head label

Several of the new male artists appearing on the Country scene today are making more of a of a move towards the traditional style of Country appreciated, especially, by fans in the UK and Europe. Easton belongs to a much more Classic Country sound. The steel guitar, fiddles and backing instrumentation on this album complement and do not overpower the vocals. This may be a debut album but there is little doubt that not only a new Country star is born but as far as this writer is concerned, is definitely here to stay!



Page 3, is usually where our great leader Betty writes down her words of wisdom for the month, this was replaced with photographs of what the Linedancer team got up to while she was on holiday. It was not a pretty sight. Look back to your copy of issue 49, if you dare!

In the informative pages of Grapevine between pages 7 to 9 we reported on the 2000 HMV British Country Music Award winners. Among them were Charlie Landsborough – British Male Vocalist, Mary Duff – British Female Vocalist and British Group – The Haleys. Another report told how Line dancers were going to attempt to break the world Line dance record that was previously set in Tamworth, Australia. Around 6300 dancers were to be expected to form a line from Salisbury Cathedral in Wiltshire, to the ancient Old Serum site, two miles away.

On pages 10 and 11, Linedancer's cover girl, Rachael McEnaney, told us how she always wanted to make the grade as a dancer. Rachel's aunt was a British ballroom champion and her mother learned ballroom, latin and introduced Rachael to Line dance. Rachael has danced since she was four but never felt under pressure to follow her family's example. She said of her career plans: "Dance. End of story. That's what I want to do for the rest of my life."

To celebrate Linedancer Magazine's fourth birthday, readers were asked to enter a competition on pages 14 and 15. First prize was a two night break in Paris. Readers also sent their good wishes, Pauline Crowson said: "Happy birthday Linedancer, long may the lines continue." "Happy birthday to the Linedancer crew, you are the best and never number two," said Andy Race.

Album reviews on pages 18 and 19 featured the album 'I Hope You Dance' by Lee Ann Womack, our reviewer wrote: " At first I thought I'd put the wrong CD in. The voice I heard bears an uncanny resemblance to another much loved country artist, Dolly Parton and although Lee Ann's voice is somewhat softer it still has that lovable country twang."

Many people know Joanna Lee as a Line dance world champion but in a feature about her on pages 24 to 26 she told Linedancer of her career and the stars she has met along the way. At 16 she became a professional dancer and performed in shows with Shirley Bassey and Sammy Davis Junior. From working 'Danny La Rue's' in London, 'The London Palladium' to working around the world, Joanne moved to Line dance. She then entered her first competition and came first. She said: "I don't dance to the judges I dance to my audience. I pretend I'm on stage dancing as I used to. I still get a huge buzz, putting on costumes and learning new dances."

News of Reba McEntire's tour of the UK was talked about on pages 28 and 29. She brought her American band to the UK headlining the Radio 2 Country Festival. She was then due to visit London, Glasgow and Dublin. Reba told Linedancer: "It's fun to work, visit new places and find great places to eat."

The talented choreographer, Chris Hodgson, popped into the Linedancer office and spoke to us about the benefits of going for it and never giving up. "Don't give up, put yourself into your choreography and above all, be yourself."

On page 48 we told how the Millennium Dome in London was going country. Over 6200 dancers at Australia's Tamworth Festival set the current world Line dance records in January, now the Dome's central arena was to host a new record attempt on its 7000 capacity dance floor. Music for the attempt was to come from Scooter Lee who sings the track 'Baby, Please Come Home' which Jo Thompson choreographed the official dance for the record breaking attempt, 'Makin' Tracks' to.

Makin' Tracks dance script was featured in the magazine as was: Sex Bomb; Sway To The Rhythm; Rock Bottom; The Promise; Perhaps; D.N.T.O.; Would You; Who Did You Call Darlin'; She Will (Sometimes); Never Say Never; Swing & Jive; Let's Make A Deal and Black IC3.

Differing Levels

This is a problem that we hoped the introduction of the AB and Improver levels would have solved. However it seems choreographers level notations can still vary greatly. We have, in the past, suggested choreographers change the level of certain dances but will give your suggestion of a Linedancer level some consideration. That's what Truends are for

Apart from helping to run Silver Stetsons who have classes in Bedfordshire, Buckinghamshire and Northamptonshire, Mel and her husband Terry, also look after their adopted 14 year old daughter Coral, Coral, as most adopted and chosen children, is a very special child to Mel and Terry. "We have looked after Coral since she was three and a half years old but prior to that Terry was struck down with a paralysing illness that left him disabled." Sadly, Coral has Fybromyalgia, a disease characterised by unrelenting chronic pain. Any pressure is painful. The little girl was only able to walk on her toes and for the next six years, life for Coral was lived in plasters, splints and wheelchairs. Little by little, Coral, a sporty child at heart, had to give up everything she loved. Karate, dancing, sport, playing outside with her friends, all the simple pleasures were removed from her life. Mel says: "We were sent to Guys Hospital in London, where the diagnosis was confirmed." This terrible disease also has other side effects like debilitating fatigue, sleep disturbance, joint stiffness, bowel and bladder abnormalities and cognitive dysfunction.

Mel and Terry are resourceful people and have started making plans to better their child's life. "We are trying to raise enough money to send Coral to America to get her the treatment she needs that will help her manage this lifetime condition and get her off all the medication she is taking." Coral used to be able to dance but now can't do this because it hurts too much. "We need to raise approximately £7000, which will cover her treatment and any further medication and telephone consultations that she may require." The treatment will teach Coral how to manage her illness as there is no cure. At the moment when the pain is at its worst she has to take morphine and also hypnotic sleeping pills. This is not acceptable for a child who has many years of this ahead of her. Her quality of life is not what it should be and this will give her the ability and courage to manage it and maybe even give her back some of the happiness she deserves.

Coral is hoping that her trip to America becomes a reality. "I have a real chance of getting a lot better as there is a clinic in Atlanta that knows how to treat my illness."

Coral wants to have a reasonably normal life as any child richly deserves. She wants to be able to go out with friends and not have them be scared of her collapsing or panicking when she can't walk, to able to go to the cinema without feeling ill and being in pain from sitting for so long, to be able to go to school and concentrate on her GCSE's. "I don't like to keep copying work I want to be in the lessons and learn for myself. I want it to be my work, not someone else's" Coral wants to live as normal a life as any child deserves and is tired of being depressed all the time from the illness. Most 14 year old girls have a long list of 'I want's' but Coral's are what most young girls of her age take


Mel told me that one of the most heartbreaking things for her is: "To see Coral so depressed from the continual pain and when she says, "I hurt" and my answer is that I cannot do anything."

for granted.

With the help of friends, family and everyone at Silver Stetsons, Mel and Terry are holding events and have had four CD's produced to help raise funds for Coral. The CD's are Corals Country Sunshine, Corals Country Roads, Friends In Dance and More Friends In Dance. They all feature well known artists. "My dance 'Country Through And Through' to the first track on Corals Country Sunshine is slowly moving up the country dance chart. I couldn't do it all without everybody's help. Myself, Lisa and Dawn Ball James, whose idea it was, approached the artists and nobody said no."

Simply DJ


The first time I encountered DJ Denys (real name Denys Ben) was in Cagnes a couple of years ago. Betty, Steve and I were representing the magazine and I remember we very quickly became aware of the 'driving force' behind the festival. DJ Denys was at the microphone's helm and he never let up the whole weekend. From introducing musicians to getting dancers onto the floor, from drumming up business for the sellers there to playing discs in between acts, he was a total wonder. His style was casual yet completely in charge, his manner strong but never forceful and his whole performance was great fun. He also had total command of the event, and when things looked likely to over run or someone was late on stage, it was no problem for Denys....


We met him again last year and he, again, kept the thousands of dancers and Country fans happy with his easy banter.

I knew then that I wanted to interview him for the magazine and in typical style, he wondered why. Denys does not understand what is so special about him. So I tell him how impressed we all were and he laughs. "I just try to remain faithful to who I was when I first started, I try to keep it simple. I guess the most important thing for me is to be a pro at all times." These are the very qualities that people have come to love as Denys is riding a huge crest of popularity in France.

Denys loves Line dance, that is easy to see. With wife Marie-France, both are instructors

for Line dancers and couples, living their passion every day. Denys started at just 19 by creating a small theatre group. "That's where I REALLY picked up my craft. Improvising and placing my voice for example were two things I found quite difficult at first." Always aware of the pitfalls that poor public speakers face (screaming into mikes or monotonous delivery are Denys' pet hates), he emphasises that 'How to communicate' was the backbone of his learning. He explains: "To compere an evening or an event, is a huge physical effort and many people do not realise the amount of stress that comes from synching elements as diverse as computerised systems, sound, managing artists and getting people somewhere exactly at the right moment. On top of all that, never forget you too are a guest at someone's party...."





In Linedancer magazine, we celebrate every aspect of Line dancing. From dancers to choreographers and musicians to associations thoughout the world we leave no stone unturned. However, it is too rarely that we showcase DJ's. Without a DJ, no socials, no competition, no dancing would ever take place, and it is the same the world over. *Laurent* meets *DJ Denys* from France.

After founding their own club, Denys and Marie-France decide to create an event for themselves. They find a huge empty warehouse near home, in Marseille and go for it. They need 450 people to attend so as to break even, their friends tell them they are crazy. But Denys believes he has a market. And the couple's dedication is soon rewarded with 780 people turning up and making this first event a unmitigated success. From there, the couple goes on to create the Masters Country Team event, which at the time, is something new and exciting. The year is 2004.

Alain Mangenot, who represents Country-France, a well known website portal for Line dancers in France has no doubts and tells Denys. "If you continue to work as you have

done tonight the sky is your limit." Ten days later, the phone never stops ringing. Was Alain behind this sudden rush of excitement?. Denys laughs. "I am sure Alain helped me then by suggesting my name to the right people at the right time."

And the rest is history as they say. Since then, Denys has never stopped with a huge calendar of activities keeping me in demand most weekends of the year.

"I am a lucky guy. I have been able to work with great artists like Charlie McCoy, John Parmenter, Donna Summers and Michael Peterson amongst many others. I just love the excitement the DJ life has to offer." As a DJ, he is very aware that because he is a versatile

dancer, organisers benefit from this for events with dance at their hearts. He is looking forward immensely to 2011 as he will, for the very first time, attend the Crystal Boot event in Blackpool.

"I am so looking forward to see other dancers, to listen to other DJ's, try a different culture. I love all music, all styles." However when pressed he admits that Country remains his greatest love.

"I have a sentence that I pinched from Dolly Parton which I believe to be true. "Country music is a simple thing, made by simple folks but in an extraordinary way." That is what I would like to achieve as a DJ too. Keep it simple but do it like no other."

The Call Of Spring

Ivy York is a new band with a difference.
Impossible to describe other than a cocktail of sound veering from Country and Western to Bollywood, this is a terrific album that deserves to be listened to...

Laurent speaks to Ivy York for Linedancer.



Caroline Sullivan, from The Guardian has called this album "Exquisitely right for this season" and I was curious. Listening to "The Call Of Spring" was a true musical experience. Many bands come and many go, all touting a difference from the rest, but seldom has this been more apparent than with this CD.

Ivy York is a sound made up of a hundred different styles and the result is fresh, sweet, catchy and at times quite folksy too. I first asked Ivy about THAT sound of hers....

IY: I describe our style as country Bollywood as Rav (my producer) and I took elements from our upbringings to create the sound. It started when we decided to cover an old 1950's Bollywood record after seeing the original film on TV.

Rav's known these tunes all his life, but for me, I had a bit of a struggle with the Hindi lyrics thanks to my Aussie accent getting in the way. I decided to write the song with new English lyrics. We then added a bit of a country feel to reflect on the type of music I had listened to growing up.

LS: Certainly sounds different.

IY: You bet! And we were feeling pretty proud of our sound when we went to a music do, met our manager and told him we did country Bollywood. The style of music actually comes across quite folk at times, I've been called a folk singer as sometimes country Bollywood is a little too confusing for people to imagine.

LS: How did you get started?

IY: I was 17 when I first got signed to

AMC which was AC DC's record label in Sydney. I released a pop record and it gave me an opportunity to see places I don't think I would have got a chance to see otherwise. However I was not allowed any part of the creative process, I was told how to sing, speak, act, perform, look, and as I'm a pretty independent type that didn't wash with me for long. I feel sorry for those reality TV kids who are nothing but puppets.

LS: So how did your love of music start?

IY: I was three when I fell in love with Here You Come Again by Dolly Parton. My earliest memory is my parents playing records after dinner and my sister and I hopping about singing along. Year after year I'd still be hopping about singing for hours to my favourite songs.

I started going to singing lessons when I was nine, I thought all the kids were doing the same thing as me until I got to school and realised otherwise. I'd be singing along to myself all day at school, volunteering for all the singing parts in the school plays. Singing wasn't an acceptable career back then, I guess they just thought I was dreaming.

LS: So when does it become a career?

IY: Never believed anything but. My mum convinced me to get my A levels although I wasn't very interested in that, too busy recording demos with my band and busking in the mall. I finished school and headed to Sydney, and did a short course in reception and admin to keep everyone happy. When times are hard you'll find me in some office with my best phone voice on!



LS: Does inspiration come to you easily?

IY: Depends. I've always got my head in the clouds so a lot of what I write are fables which may relate to where my head is at the time. I once saw a girl sitting in a shop with her back turned, from that angle she looked just like me. I wondered if she was another me that had or hadn't experienced an event that in someway created who I was and what would she be like now?

LS: You are Australian so why the UK as a launch pad for the album?

IY: UK has been home to me for almost ten years now. Besides I wouldn't be doing country Bollywood without knowing Rav, so here is the best place to be.

LS: How was the band formed?

IY: Rav and I met just over five years ago, we were both playing in different indie bands when we met. I'd been writing some tunes and asked him if he wouldn't mind helping me out putting them down. We've been creating music ever since and the band gradually came together over the years.

LS: And what does the future hold for Ivy York?

IY: Well, firstly, I would love to tour non stop. I love performing and it's an absolute joy for me to sing live. We have an amazing band and they're all such good guys it wouldn't feel like work at all. I've started writing for the next album and I can't wait to see where that will go. Every time you start a new project it's like an adventure. I'd love to do some music for a Bollywood film, write a song with Dolly Parton, duet with Jack White. So many plans!





Lathan Moore was raised in a mining community in Illinois and later arrived in Tennessee via Texas to settle for a life in country music. He was courted by a few labels before signing to Blue Steel and now releases his debut album for them.

Lathan kicks off with *It's A Feel Thing* (104bpm) which is a super country cha cha with a good beat that gets your foot tapping. Lathan co-wrote this and his rich voice and solid musical backing ensures this is destined for the dance floor.

Beautiful Girl (128bpm) is a cool west coast swing track that is guaranteed to make you want to dance. This is Lathan's first single release in the States and I can see it being a big hit for him.

You Can't Leave Me Like This (90bpm) this is a gorgeous story song of a boy's unrequited love for a girl that never gets reciprocated. Lathan's voice is outstanding on this beautiful song.

Shot Down (120bpm) Lathan spoils us with another great dance track, another super west coast swinger and it will be a joy for both Line and couple dancers.

Cornfield Cadillac (75bpm) a beautiful musical backing compliments the

sentimental vocals on a wonderful story song. It is a nightclub two step in dance style and should be enjoyed on the dance floor.

Angel Fire (122bpm) is laced with steel guitar and has a couple of cracking guitar solos. A good country rocker and definitely a good country dance track.

Love In Your Life (114bpm) has a Cuban rhythm on a delightful track. Lathan's vocal is outstanding once again and this is my personal favourite on the album. Dance until your heart's content!

I'd Rather Be Lucky Than Good (142bpm) we now have a brilliant east coast swing number which has rocking guitars, a punchy base line and some Jerry Lee Lewis style piano. A classic country rocker and a great dance track.

That's The News (70bpm) "When I need a dose of the real world I turn off the tube and pick up the phone", a great line in a great dance track that has a good solid beat.

The finale comes courtesy of *Even Angels Have Bad Days* (134bpm) and what a fantastic ending! This has a super beat and has got country dance hit written all over it. I can see choreographers falling over themselves to get hold of this track.

Lathan Moore has delivered an outstanding debut album for Blue Steel. This is as good a country music album as you will hear from any artist this year. There are no fillers on this album, every track is superb in its own right and I highly recommend this album to you.

JUPITER ONE SUNSHOWER RYKO RECORDS – RCD10982

Jupiter One released their debut album back in 2007. They are now signed to Ryko records and have released a new album.

The album's opener *Volcano* (94pm) is a lively up tempo track that sets the tone for the album.

Lights Go Out (76bpm) has a sort of punky new wave feel to it and even though the beat is great, whether it can become a Line dance, I am not sure. It's a great track nonetheless.

Flaming Arrow (118bpm) is the band's current single and it's a cracking dance track!

Made In A Day (86bpm) has a very modern sound and it clips along at a fair old pace. Those of you who like to dance to more contemporary music will love this one.

Anna (139bpm) reminds me of the work of Supertramp and Foreigner and has a nice steady beat that could be interesting to dance to.

High Plains Drifter Finds The Oracle At Delphi (87bpm) this one is not for dancing but is a nice little track.

Find Me A Place (65bpm) has a very dramatic opening and it is a nightclub two step in style.

Come On (136bpm) this is the best dance floor prospect on the album. It has very strong undertones of Coldplay with superb vocals and a driving beat. I can see this one being a big hit.

Strange Teacher (76bpm) this is a seriously good song, reminiscent of the Beatles latter work or even Sergeant Pepper and I am sure you would love to dance to this cute track.

The finale comes courtesy of People In The Mountain, *People In The Ocean* (116bpm) another very interesting title and this light hearted little ditty is one of those songs that you will either love or hate.

Jupiter One are hard to define into a genre and I found their album did take me on a very enjoyable musical journey with influences from many great artists. This is not an album full of solid dance tracks but there are a few good songs to dance to nevertheless.

DOGGONDEST FEELIN'

Jeremy Parsons cultivated his love of country music legends by collecting vinyl records in his teens. By his early 20's he had written 750 songs and was opening concerts for George Jones.

Jeremy's opening track sets the tone with *The Night Hank Williams Died* (93/186bpm) which is a super two step number and you are instantly aware that this album has very strong leanings towards traditional country music

Doggondest Feelin' (109bpm) is a smooth west coast swing track that is sure to make you want to dance. This is modern day Hank Williams music without a doubt.

Hide Her Angel Wings (94/188bpm) Jeremy spoils us with another two step song, presenting choreographers with another opportunity.

Out Comes The Sun (100bpm) there are some strong harmonies complimenting Jeremy's rich country twang on this brilliant song

Can't Recall The Fall (114bpm) the dance style changes to country cha this time and Molly Smith's beautiful harmonies make this track an absolute delight to listen to.

Since My Baby Left Me (107/214bpm) once again it's back to the two stepping on this track which features some great fiddle, banjo, old time country guitar licks. Brilliant dance track!

I'm Scared (122bpm) this melancholy song is a fine west coast swing track.

I Could Be Your Pick Me Up (106bpm) is probably the most traditional song on the album.

Passenger Seat (108/216bpm) Jeremy whisks us round the dance floor with another fine two stepper.

When My Old Man Was Young (116bpm) is the final cut and it is a superb up tempo country dance track and one of my personal favourites. I say final track but there is a hidden track which is a version of title track.

Doggondest Feelin' (109bpm) delivered in a scratchy vinyl style that takes you back many years to early recoding days.

There is no doubt that Jeremy Parsons music is aimed at true country music lovers. There are flavours of the likes of Hank Williams and Faron Young and other great country artists. If you like to dance to real country music then this album is a must for you.



BIG & RICH

John Rich was a vocalist in Lonestar just before their major breakthrough. He teamed up with Big Kenny (Kenny Alphin) to write songs and after Martina McBride recorded one of their songs they got a record deal. Their mixture of country and rock with a hint of hip hop became a huge success and they released three chart topping albums.

The collection opens with their biggest hit *Rollin'* (*The Ballad Of Big & Rich*) (94bpm) a five minute anthem that included Cowboy Troy's rapping. This is still as good a track today as it was in 2004.

Wild West Show (106bpm) is probably one of the most normal country tracks that the band released and it has some great harmony vocals

Save A Horse (Ride A Cowboy) (102bpm) this was another massive hit and it's easy to see why. A real anthem of a song.

Holy Water (94bpm) the guys surprise with this song which has a good cha cha rhythm.

BigTime (122bpm) again the boys surprised with another cracking cha cha and I wonder why there aren't any dances written to this great track.

Comin' To Your City (102bpm) it's back to the more recognised style on this classic country rocker.

Never Mind Me (92bpm) is another surprise and a gorgeous song whilst 8th Of November (114bpm) is a brilliant waltz track.

Lost In the Moment (72bpm) once again the band surprises with a smooth nightclub two step song which sounds like it came off a Hal Ketchum album.

Between *Raising Hell* and *Amazing Grace* (94bpm) is another steady cha cha *Loud* (124bpm) and is exactly that, a butt kickin' country rocker!

Jalapeno (100bpm) is a cool funky track that mentions lots of dance styles.

The Man I Am Right Now (84bpm) is a previously unreleased track and is as country as country gets!

Everybody's Rocking (130bpm) is a superb east coast swing number leading into the album finale Kick My Ass (130bpm) which is a tongue in cheek country track awash with fiddle and steel guitar.

This is a superb collection from two guys who tried to help country music evolve and appeal to a different market. The definitive collection from a brilliant duo.

First Steps

France is showing the rest of the world that Line dance is not only a wonderful pastime but also a challenge and skill acquiring one too. Alain Mangenot from Country-France, the French website with all the information you ever need if you are a French dancer (www.country-france.fr) sent us this report on a first in France.

he French national final of the very first Master Country Team was held last March in the town of Issoudun, in Northern France. The idea came from DJ Denys Ben and his wife Marie-France whose story you can read in this very issue.

For this very first Master Country team festival they asked the well known French Federation, the FFCLD to help and its president Gerard Simoncello was only too happy to do so. Inspired by his visits to the CBA, Gerard who had wanted to create an event himself decided to involve many of the dance clubs and associations he knows hence the very healthy number of participants for this first set of championships.

The city of Issoudun was chosen as it could provide the best facilities (the Pepsi venue can hold up to 3500 people!) for the Master Country Team event.

So on the Friday evening, the first dancers met in the Atelier de la Bière, a well known bar in Issoudun and the unveiling of a special brew designed specially for the event by beer master Franck Bellon

took place. If you ever have a chance to try the 'Santiag Berry Country Beer', do so (www.atelierdelabiere.fr) as it is a heady, smooth and boldly flavoured beer.

Music was at the heart of the event and many artists in France are now creating their own brand of Country. Quite a few turned up (Danyel Gérard, Eric Carbonne, Steve and Heather, Rose Alleyson and Lily West) to delight the crowds. Gerard Simoncello says: "Line dance is governed by music. It is absolutely right to promote Country French style as more and more of our dancers enjoy what is on offer here."

Line dance guest included Steve Healy from the magazine who had been asked to judge and Chris Hodgson who is getting very popular in France, as well as some home grown judges like Christiane Favillier, David Linger, Marie-France Ben and Violette Vanderborck. The competition started on the Saturday afternoon and the ambiance was just amazing. People had toy trumpets, flags, were whooping and singing, in short the competitors certainly felt supported.

The teams were competing in three divisions, Academic 1 (Beginners),

 $\begin{array}{lll} \mbox{Academic 2 (Intermediate and Advanced)} \\ \mbox{and Show (Freestyle).} \end{array}$

Three associations were particularly lucky and received a first prize. Country 52 in Academic 1, Blue Way in Academic 2 and Western Pleasure in Show. Blue Way also got the Public vote and Cadance received Country-France prize. As Steve Healy said "The quality of the dancers and the shows were amazing. This was reflected in the results with many having just a point between them. But you know what I really liked? The good humour and the real pleasure in dancing that people have here in France. This is unique, really unique."


For the organisers, the event has been a real tangible success thanks to the guests and dancers as well as the support from the club who welcomed all the activities, the Berry Country Dance headed by Etienne Lobry.

In an open letter,

Laurent looks at why
voting is important for
I ine dancers too.

Don't worry, your favourite magazine has not started its own political campaign by asking for your votes. Rather we would like to remain as impartial as we can by having as many of our subscribers vote for their favourite dances all year long.

Voting is for everyone. Social dancer, choreographer, instructor, beginners, intermediates, advanced dancers, lovers of modern or traditional country, pop or funky, it makes no difference. Each vote is important. Each vote counts.

If you don't take action, how can you sit back AND damn the ones who do?

or her responsibility to launch it, nurture it, talk about it and plug it every which way. Popularity is not instant, nor is it a crime. It is borne out of confidence and recognition of someone's worth, someone who has created something people like. Whether you agree or not, sitting "voting" out will not change anything.

So let's say that after reading these few lines you think "Right! I will vote", but.... Online is all the rage now and you have not got a computer. Unfair? Yes, I think it is and as from this month we are reintroducing the voting form. We need to know your name and address and we will enter the forms for you. 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Hi my name is Lesley Baker and I live in Spain. I was amazed, on reading the article on Maria Hennings Hunt in a recent edition of Linedancer to see none other than the faces of David and Eric, my Line dancing teachers here in Jávea on the Costa Blanca. So I wanted to find out a little more about them.

Eric first told me that he had always been interested in dance and performing arts so it was he, in the early 80's, who persuaded David, to accompany him to a Line Dancing class in Cricklewood, North London. David was bitten by the Line dancing bug and the pair have not stopped dancing since.

In the early 90's they were invited to an international football match, to join other dancers in a Line dancing demonstration.

It was here that they met Maria and that the photograph I saw in Linedancer was taken.

In 1995 they branched out into teaching. A friend who was leaving the UK was looking for someone to teach the class. Eventually and not without some misgivings, David agreed to try teaching and started to run the class until a permanent teacher could be found. This temporary position, with the Ruislip Rebels, lasted 12 years!

In 2007, having taken early retirement, they planned to enjoy a more leisurely lifestyle and moved to Jávea. By 2008, both were missing their Line dancing and a neighbour suggested that they start a class. The New Country Linedancers were born.

Not content with simply teaching, they have taken groups of dancers to perform at a local Nursing Home, have entertained at a Hoe Down and have joined other dancers from the Costa Blanca at a sponsored Line Dance to raise money for local charity. Their current project is to persuade dancers to perform for tourists and locals at the Jávea International Festival in June.

David told me: "Line Dancing changed our lives. We so enjoy meeting new people and watching dancers progress from complete beginners to talented dances. We can't imagine life without Line dancing and will continue as long as our feet move and our brains can remember the steps"

Being one of their students I know that The New Country Linedancers are here to stay a long, long time!

June is LDF month!



As we report, month after month, Line dancers are known universally for their generosity of spirit, time and thoughts. Many charities benefit each week from the hundreds of socials held by you. The Line dance Foundation (LDF) right now needs your help and June is the month where YOU can make a difference... Laurent gives you the low down.

The LDF was created for the very people our industry depends upon, those who give so much of their time to our pastime and whose livelihood depends directly from their Line dance earnings. We all know that working within this industry will never make anyone a millionaire and it is all the more reason for LDF to exist. If your beloved instructor falls ill and cannot pay some basic bills, his or her life will be greatly impacted. The LDF should be there to help and yes, the only it can is through you and your amazing fund raising resources.

So as to remind us exactly of what the LDF is all about, I asked *Betty Drummond* some clarification on important points about the charity.



LS: Betty, who controls the finances of the LDF and what criteria must a would be claimant meet?

BD: Linedancer Magazine is in control of the finances - i.e. we operate the bank account. Our finance director Lyndsey Naylor is the treasurer. At this stage of development, the criteria for helping is simple: Anyone whose livelihood depends on Line dancing and has fallen on hard times for whatever reason will be considered.

LS: Has the charity helped anyone so far?

BD: Not yet. All monies raised are still in the account. We have made only one offer of help. Even though the illness was long and serious there was no need for financial support, so the person concerned declined. Since then, no one else has ever approached us to ask for help though the LDF doors are opened to anyone who may need help.

LS: Who will make the decision of giving help out to an individual?

BD: At present it is myself and I consult with three others:- Peter Metelnick, Alison Biggs and Glenn Rogers. I would like more people to make up a formal panel but although many have given verbal support to the LDF at the time of launch no one else has come forward so far.

LS: What are the guidelines on time delays and amount for claims?

BD: We don't have anything formalised along those lines. I'm open minded about who we support and in what way and for how long. It all depends on our funding levels. The important thing for me is to establish the charity and build a strong Foundation that can help those in need in the future.

LS: We have tried hard to promote the LDF and Cathy Hodgson and her group of dancers have been incredibly hard working as well as John King who has shown amazing generosity, however not much else has happened. What about the LDF future?

BD: Yes we have tried hard, haven't we! I really don't want us to be discouraged yet as despite the poor response I see this as a very long term project involving a lot of work and effort. It will only work when people believe it is an honourable and worthwhile initiative. My dream is that the Foundation will become a professionally run charity that will become of enormous benefit for Line dancers whose livelihoods depend on their Line dance activities and who fall on bad times.

So, there you have it. As I recently wrote in my Dear Dancers column, I was really saddened to see so little of this amazing community believing in the LDF and wanting to take part. One social in the whole year would actually be enough for the charity to benefit enormously, and in time, individuals who have NO way of recouping lost earnings through no fault of their own would have a much easier ride. All thanks to you.





As you also know, after reading Dear Dancers Cathy Hodgson from Cath's Kickers was moved sufficiently to write to us and pledge a variety of different things (10% of her door monies during the year, wristbands and events participation), all of which brought the LDF over £1000 in three short months. Cathy has become a passionate advocate for a cause she now sees as essential. I know by speaking to her that she believes herself to be lucky as, though a passion, Line dance is not essential to pay bills. She also knows that this is not the case for many people.

I actually got a call yesterday from a dancer who wanted to remain anonymous and who was greatly worried about her beloved instructor about to go into hospital. Could the LDF help? And my reply was "Of course..." From our conversation, it will be up to the individual to decide what to do but I felt happy to have been able to say "The LDF is here for you, we can help."

There must be no stigma, no shyness about asking for help. The LDF is about helping to get people on the road to recovery faster. In some cases this will mean they will be able to get back doing what they do best in record time, but with limited funds, the LDF can only still do very little.

So yes, June is LDF month and what will you do about it? A social? An afternoon sponsored dance a thon like Cathy? If you are on your own or a small group, why not join her and her dancers on Saturday 26th June at The Manhattan Club, Beech Avenue, Harrogate in North Yorkshire from 7.30pm to midnight. Tickets are just £8 but need to be prebooked, buy 10 and get one FREE... Cathy is also looking for a well

known choreographer to help out on the night so why not contact her and help make THAT evening a real success for the LDF. Cathy tells me if she does not sell 50 tickets by 20th May she will have to cancel the evening, please do not let that happen.





Where

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Daphne, good to hear from you and that you are still dancing regularly. You are not alone in suffering with your feet after Line dancing. There are a variety of complaints from aches and pains, hot pulsating feet, cramps, tingling and so on. It was because of these problems that I introduced and promoted, foot exercises and relaxation for the feet and legs into my Line dance courses, events and teacher training. The foot exercises use a spikey ball and can be done before you Line dance as part of your warm up and afterwards to help to release tension in your feet. If you have access to the internet you can download the exercise chart free from my website www.decodanz.co.uk and then click on Freebies where you will find the chart. You will also find details there of how to purchase a spikey ball.

Other things to consider regarding your feet are obviously, good foot hygiene and of course, the shoes you wear and the floors you dance on — different floors make different demands on the feet. You say you wear proper dance shoes from Linedancer with suede soles and find them really comfortable — as you know, comfortable feet are so important when you dance. You also say that before wearing these heeled shoes you

previously wore dance sneakers and they were also very comfortable. As we get older we can lose come of the natural cushioning under our feet so you want to make sure you have plenty of cushioning from your footwear which you are already doing. If you find that after dancing for a while your feet don't feel quite as cushioned as when you started the session then you might find that changing into another pair of dance shoes helps. The cushioning in the pair you change into will be at its plumpest and putting on fresh shoes can feel good when your feet are hot from dancing. Also you may want to consider alternating between your heeled shoes and the dance sneakers that you used to wear as they have additional cushioning under the ball of the foot. It means taking extra shoes with you when you go Line dancing but if it helps then it's well worth it. Don't forget that spending a couple of minutes doing one or two, foot exercises with the ball, before putting on another pair of shoes will help to perk up your feet too.

I hope this helps you Daphne, and do let me know how you get on.

Dear Sho,

I am hoping that you can help me with an increasingly annoying and problem. If I have been Line

dancing all the evening at a social or party, soon after I get into bed, I get really bad cramp in my feet and legs which can take at least half an hour or so before it stops.

I started Line dancing at your beginner class at the Hailsham Leisure Centre many years ago and dance three and often four times a week. Although I am now 76 years old apart from taking blood pressure tablets I am quite fit and not overweight. I don't smoke or drink and I unwind for about half an hour after an evening dancing. I also drink water when I go dancing, maybe not enough.

If you have any suggestions as to something I could do either before or after dancing to prevent the cramp, I would be very grateful. I always enjoy your section in the Linedancer Magazine.

She says: "I was never afraid and we just had to take things in our stride. We could not live in fear, we would have never got out of bed!"

She was part of a musical group she formed called the Gibson Sisters (using her maiden name). The three girl group was a harmony band in the mould of the Andrews Sisters and Frankie led a nomadic life style for seven years, living in tents and travelling.

When she left Britain, it was on a convoy and she remembers being surrounded by destroyers.

When the Gibson Sisters sang, Frankie recalls all the boys were appreciative to them and just sat on the ground listening and remembering home. Everything was makeshift and make do. She also laughingly adds that there was plenty of flirting going on but that nothing untowards ever happened.

Once the war ended, Frankie continued her theatre lifestyle for several years longer until she gave up the boards to start a family with Buddy, her musical director husband, who was also a talented composer and pianist.

Then in the Seventies, Frankie moved to Horley to be closer to her grand children. She may be reaching 97 but the youth and vitality she has comes from deep within. She dances like she lives, with total commitment, passion and pure joy. And ultimately THAT is what Line dance is all about. Or at least should be. Frankie is like no one else I know. And it makes me very proud to think she chose us to be part of her life.
