

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# A likeable guy

Vince Gill, along with George Strait, has received the most CMA Male Vocalist of the Year Awards with a total of five. He also joined Grand Ole Opry in August 1991.

Born April 12,1957 in Norman, Oklahoma and raised in Oklahoma City, Vince Gill is the son of a banjo-playing federal judge, his mother played harmonica and his grandmother the piano. With this pedigree, the young Vince's musical destiny was assured. Aged six, he started guitar lessons and as a reward received his own instrument at the age of ten. By 15 he had a bluegrass band, Mountain Smoke. His personal heroes were always his parents. While he has described himself as simple, driven, and a perfectionist, he values friendships and does not take anything too seriously. Which adds up to an undeniable fact Vince Gill is a very likeable guy.

The summer following high school Vince seriously considered taking professional golf. However, on receiving a call from Louisville, Kentucky, he threw his belongings into his van and hit the road to join the Bluegrass Alliance whose members included Sam Bush and Dan Crary. After a year re-locating to Los Angeles he signed with another bluegrass group called Sundance. Luck took a hand when Pure Prairie League, a band he had opened for in the past came into town and held auditions. They recognized Vince and offered him a job. He recorded three albums with them and with his lead vocals on their recording of 'Let Me Love You Tonight' put them back on the charts.

One of Vince Gill's biggest musical influences was Emmylou Harris and several of her band members were to play an important part in his career. He often included "Till I Gain Control Again" while with the Sundance band a song penned by Rodney Crowell, Emmylou's guitarist. Crowell caught Vince on stage and introduced himself. Vince would eventually follow Crowell in his own band, The Cherry Bombs. Meanwhile, Emmylou's pianist, Tony Brown moved to The Cherry Bombs and then on to RCA Records

working on the production side. He signed Vince to the label in 1984. Before they could produce a record Brown moved on to MCA. Emmylou's ex-bassist Emory Gordy, also at RCA, produced three albums with Vince Gill yielding several Top 10 records including "Oklahoma Borderline", "If It Weren't For Him" (A duet with Crowell's wife and Johnny's daughter Rosanne Cash) and "Everybody's Sweetheart".

As well as a very fine vocalist and superb guitarist Vince plays mandolin, banjo, dobro, piano and fiddle. Always in demand as a session singer and musician he could have made a very good living. However he concentrated on writing songs and working on his solo career.

In 1989 Tony Brown signed him to MCA. Their first album "When I Call Your Name" showcased his talent from dance hall swing to contemporary pop music. The title song with harmony vocals by Patty Loveless won two CMA awards and a Grammy establishing Vince Gill as a superstar in country music. The album hit over a million sales. Declining an offer from Mark Knopfler to join Dire Straits as a full time member the next two albums "Pocket Full of Gold" and "Still

Believe In You" sold two million and three million respectively.

Vince Gill first co-hosted country music's big night of the year ,CMA awards, for the first time in 1992 as he did for 12 consecutive years setting the standard for future presenters with respect for his peers and audience with gentle humour and dignity. The singer would know success after success and in 2000 Vince married singer Amy Grant and marked the occasion with a hit titled "Feels Like Love". The couple celebrated the birth of their daughter Corrina Grant Gill in 2001. The second for Vince. His first daughter Jenny born in May 1982. While still writing performing and recording his music Vince Gill is regarded as one of country

music's best known humanitarians participating in hundreds of charitable events through out his career.


In August 2007 the Country Music Association inducted Vince Gill into the Country Music Hall of Fame.

Vince Gill's latest album 'Love Songs' received a release in the UK in May on the HumpHead label. A generous offering of fourteen songs originally featured on previous albums between 1991 thru to 2006. This album is a mood. A collection of laid back, gentle, reflective songs with heart and meaning. As writer and co-writer Gill's name appears alongside every song. I particularly liked the final track 'Whenever You Come Around' -a fabulous rendition that touches the heart as well as two tracks co-written with Reed Nielsen, the slightly uptempo 'The Only Love' and 'Nothing Like A Woman' with lyrics a soul artist from

Vince Gill is an artist who still surprises the listener and who, after a career of hits, does not sit back to produce "more of the same". Country music should be varied, touching and resonate with all kind of people. Mr Gill understood that a long time ago and his fans, the world over, can verify to that.



**Corinne Bertile** 



We met Corinne in April 2009 and though it is only a little more than a year ago, she has managed to make many of her wishes come true. Here's how....

When we met Corinne in April 09, she lived in Vincendo in the Ile de la Reunion, southwest of Mauritius. She told us that after discovering Line dance in 2006, it soon became part of her life, it was she said "her oxygen". She danced at every opportunity and Country was just starting to make an impact in her beautiful part of the world. Her big ambition was to open her own clothing studio. She said then: "Being able to spread the word about what Line dance to others, who are unaware of what they have yet to discover makes me the happiest woman in the world."

Since then, time certainly has not stood still for our intrepid dancer. And it is a credit to

her that every one of her wishes has not only come true but that she surpassed it.

She had tried to get her fashion studio organised for over two years and in October 2009 Lulicouture finally opened its doors. Mad about Country and its styles, Corinne added Lulicountry to its range, something she is very proud of.

But Line dance was going to be her finest hour yet. After moving to a new neighbourhood in the Island she made the important decision of becoming an instructor at long last. She also took another big step to come to the Crystal Boot Award in 2010. Her mind was made up. She would travel to France first and would pass the exams she needed for the qualifications she was looking for. She had to book huge sessions in record time as her stay was only going



to be a short one but that did not stop a very determined Corinne!

Then, the revelation. The Crystal Boot weekend was something she had looked forward to but she was still not prepared for the levels of joy and amazement she was about to experience. She says: "I had read about those incredible people so many times. And there I was with Bob Bahr, Glenn Rogers and so many others. I felt happy there. I was at home."

She still cannot believe on how friendly and available people were to her. And many loved the fact she was from such a beautiful island so far far away.

It is at the CBA that she meets Robert Wanstreet, the famous luminary who introduced Line dance to France and it is there that more important details about her exams are being confirmed.

Returning to France with the family Petit she meets more wonderful people during a Country festival there. She says: "The dream continued. I met singers and dancers, and I was taken to the Disney Billy Bob in Paris, well known for its fantastic Country music. I was at a party and it lasted for days!"

Today, Corinne who is 40 and looks a good ten years less still lives on the realisation of her dream. She says: "I came back with

a suitcase of memories and I was also able to open my classes to a total of about 40 dancers. Not bad for a new instructor..."

A year ago, Corinne Bertile wanted a fashion house and to be an accomplished dancer. Both goals achieved, she sill has one burning ambition remaining.

"Because I love Country and dancing so much all I dream of is to bring some of the biggest names here to show us how it's done." Looking at her past record, it is not too difficult to imagine that any day soon the world of Line dance is going to discover the Ile de la Reunion. And all because of one little lady....Corinne Bertile.



# Stepping Cack 10YEARSago

The Linedancer Magazine Cover showed Malcolm White with the headline 'Let Me Entertain You'. The feature on pages 14 and 15 says: "His displays

are eye-catching, full of flair and colour and that's not just the flowers. Florist, World Champion and one of the most popular personalities in Line dance, The Crystal Adult Advanced World Champion from Washington in Newcastle knows how to enjoy himself whether it be on the dance floor or providing cabaret entertainment for his fellow Line dancers. He has one word for Line dancers who wish to reach the top: "Showmanship. Dance as if you're on stage," he urged. "If you've got the personality, which most dancers have, you can project yourself while you dance."

Among the Grapevine pages, 7 to 9 there are more reader's top tips, we loved these then and we love these now: "Try dancing Islands In The Stream to Burning Down The House by Tom Jones and the Cardigans, for a funkier feel," said Mathew and Janet from Keighley.

The top five dances in the dancers top ten published on Page 12 was Islands In The Stream by Karen Jones, J'ai Du Boogie by Max Perry, Into The Arena by Michael Vera-Lobos, Picnic Polka by David Padden and Syncopated Rhythm by Rob and Michelle Fowler.

Among the album reviews on pages 18 and 19 were Faith Hill's album, Breathe. Faith was described as having 'one of the smoothest and sexiest voices in Nashville'. Also being reviewed was The Fabulous Picasso Brothers album, Live In Birmingham England. This was topped as 'one of the better cover version albums available.'

A report from the CWDC (UK) Country Western Dance Championship Finals was published on pages 24 to 26. The finals took place at Pontins in Southport. Contestants went from a child of two years of age to an adult of over 70. Some of the results were: Open Junior Line Dance — Lisa Rees; Open Senior Line Dance — Samantha Young; Open Duo Line Dance — Lisa Rees and Nathan Paul Donnelly.

On pages 28 and 29 was a feature on The Derailers, a band formed in Austin, Texas. "Few live acts fill a dance floor as quickly as The Derailers. They are set to hog the hardwood in

the months ahead with 'Then She Kissed Me', the music for Peter Metelnick's stompin new dance, 'Derailed'. The Derailers reached a milestone this year when they played The Grand Ole Opry in Nashville."

A talented six year old by the name of Shane McKeever was crowned Male Junior Primary Novice Line Dance Champion at Worlds 2000. Shane started bootscooting when classes came to his home town of Crossmaglen in Northern Ireland fours years ago. His Gran, Susan, told Linedancer: "Shane's dream is to become a Line dance instructor and choreographer like his idols, Pedro and Johnny Two-Step."

The Sixth Annual Ulster Championships were held at the Devenish Complex in Belfast. A report on page 35 told how the event had grown so much that this year it was held over a whole weekend.

The band BR5-49 were touring the UK promoting their new album, Coast To Coast. We spoke to the group of five skilled musicians and reported on pages 36 and 37. Lead singer and guitarist, Chuck Meads describes the band's distinctive sound: "It's a composite of all of our influences," he mused. "We come from diverse segments of America and love all kinds of music. I'm from Kansas and grew up listening to country music, Hank Williams, Buck Owens and people like that. Donny is very influenced by Bob Wills and also Stephanie Grappelli and Django Reinhardt, which is jazz. Gary is heavily into gospel. We're Rockabilly influenced as well. It's basically American roots music."

On pages 44 and 45 we featured a club from Jersey in the Channel Islands who prided themselves on keeping the locals informed with what is hot on the dance floor while attracting stomping holiday makers back to Jersey, year after year. Ricky Le Quesne, instructor at The Rednecks Line Dance club, told Linedancer: "Rednecks is also a social club. People have gone on from their Line dance classes to organising ten-pin bowling nights, beach barbecues and trips to major Line dance events throughout the IJK."

It's true to say that cruising is a wonderful holiday and for those of us that love to dance this holiday had everything. However, for me one of the most enduring memories will be meeting up with Jo Thompson Szymanski again.

Like so many others, for the past four years I have followed the incredible story of Jo's battle with Aplastic Anaemia via her blog, which is entertainingly albeit candidly written by her husband Tim.

Seeing this young lady back on the dance floor were she belongs was the equivalent of witnessing a miracle. Although Jo carries scars on her knees, hips and shoulders from replacement surgery and is a little thinner than she should be and no doubt still taking vital medication she has returned to the dance floor with more grace and charm than ever before and is looking the picture of health and happiness.

At six a.m. on Easter morning Jo hosted a Line Dance Church (in the disco) and we danced to songs from Scooter's Gospel CD which included This Little Light of Mine which Jo choreographed just before her illness was diagnosed. Jo told us what this song and dance meant to her and how she would sing it to her baby daughter.

She shared her moving story of the past four years and why she believes her recovery and remission is due in no small part to her faith and the flood of good wishes, prayers and kindnesses that she received from dancers from all over the world.

During the cruise Jo and Tim hosted swing workshops as well as teaching several line dances including her own Fortune Foxtrot and Jo 'n Jo Tango both to prove great favourites on board. Another huge hit was Sing A New Song, Dance A New Dance which Jo choreographed to a song of the same name by Scooter. It's a neat 32 count, four wall intermediate level dance that fits the song like a glove. Another great Scooter and Jo combination on a par with This Little Light of Mine.

In other classes, the lovely Michele Burton and her partner Michael Barr proved that having fun while learning a dance routine is part of the package. I so enjoyed their combined teach of Go Greased Lightning switching from one to the other in a seamless handover we quickly got to grips with this fun, phrased routine and had an absolute blast dancing it on deck later in the evening.

Joining them for other workshops I was mesmerised by their relaxed, easy teaching style and impressed by their ability to incorporate technique and styling while teaching a basic routine.

Not only are they ultra professionals but they are such a nice couple too and great choreographers to boot. If you ever get the chance to attend one of their workshops don't miss it.

Incidentally, you should check out their dances Covered in Kisses a 32 count four wall Beginner dance to Gotta Get To You by George Strait and Trickle Trickle a lovely 32 count easy fun dance to the song by Manhattan Transfer.

However, we all have favourites, and one of mine was Triple J. I missed the workshop but managed to pick it up during the social. It's has 48 counts, and described as high intermediate. We danced it to Evil Girl by Scooter Lee and everyone enjoyed it.

From nowhere she would appear in a flurry like a protective mother hen clucking and fussing until she was sure everything was just right. She simply never stopped working for the entire cruise.

During the evenings she delivered her live performances against the backdrop of the Caribbean on an open deck. Her powerful voice filled the night air as dancers packed the floor. From time to time she would selflessly give up the stage to call on an instructor to run through anything the dancers were unsure of or mindfully call a floor spit before she sang her next song so that everyone had the opportunity to dance.

You have to hand it to Scooter Lee when she puts on a show, she puts her heart and soul into it and she is unreservedly dedicated to dancers.

The Carnival Conquest is a luxury floating resort and the party atmosphere was everywhere but I think this trip was made extra special because on each of the the social evenings we shared the floor with the Swing dancers.

I'm off now to practice my Fasting Swing and would like to thank Johan and Sidsel from Kom Og Dans for their kind lessons and friendship. Also, greetings to all the dancers I met on board the Conquest with a special 'hi' to George and Jean Cervantes from Texas and to Amund Storsveen from Norway.

Amund is a great dancer, has a lovely personality and is a very capable instructor too. His party dance Funny Feeling created with Monica Lind Emmerud was the party dance hit of the week and frequently performed or should I say 'partied' to Scooter Lee's Roll Back the Rug. It's well worth putting on your party play list.

On the final note, dancing under the stars on board a luxury cruise liner sailing the Caribbean was just as magical as it sounds – and my advice is, if Scooter hosts a cruise next year then start saving up now and get your booking in Fast!

What a great time we had when he came down from the stage and showed us the dance, but what even more astonishing was that he instructed us in French. Something every dancer appreciated very much.

We certainly hope that this visit by the legendary Mr Sheriff won't be the last in our little corner of the world. And I have to thank the LCD 56 dance club who organised this amazing evening and allowed us to meet one of the greatest Name of Country Music



# Outroscous Mr Roscis!

If there is just one name that a Line dancer will recognise anywhere you go it is the name of *Glenn Rogers*. We all know and love the multi talented singing power house that is our Glenn. In this first part of a very exclusive series, Linedancer asked Glenn to retrace his amazing life and career.



# PARI ONE

#### The beginning

I was born in London's East End. My family history (both Mum and Dad's side) goes back to the 16th century and seems to be centred around an area that was know as 'The Nicholls' which took in Shoreditch, Aldgate, Bethnal Green and Hoxton. I suppose it shouldn't be surprising that there has always been an element of organised villainy in the bloodline! My Great Grandfather, William Banner-Pullum, was a noted pugilist (basically a bare knuckle street fighter) and racketeer while, in contrast, his three brothers comprised a watchmaker, a stone mason and an 'artificial florist' (whatever that was in the 1800's) Even more in contrast, one of William's relatives (probably his sister) married William Calcraft, the executioner. Those conflicts of character and conscience seem to have continued through the years. My Great, Great Grandfather, Henry Ebenezer Banner was Professor of Music at Oxford around the mid 1800's and that's probably where my own gifts stem from. Music played a huge role in my life from as early as I can remember. Every house had a piano, some had guitars or banjos,

violins and my Uncle Ivor was the proud owner of a drum kit. The highlight was always the parties at Uncle Gerry Tisbury's. Gerry was my mum,s uncle and had moved out of the city to Walthamstow, a huge barn of a place by our standards with a beautiful grand piano in the 'best parlour'. Mum and her sister, Auntie Eileen, were both dancers, predominantly tap in those days but moving more into Ballroom in their later lives (They would have LOVED the Line dance scene), so parties in those days (up to the early 70's really) were like mini stage shows. I'm told that when I was two years old, Ivor or Gerry would sit me on the bar at the Prince of Wales in Leabridge Road Clapton and make me sing 'Give me a good old fashioned pub' for an arrowroot biscuit. My Dad was in the merchant navy all his life from the Atlantic convoys during the war, through the great passenger liners in the 50's and 60's and ending his navy days on the P&O ferries. He was rarely at home in my formative years and my 'Father figures' consisted of Mum's brother Ivor and her uncles Lenny and Gerry. I suppose, in hindsight, my upbringing was almost 'Edwardian', these men were strong characters, Gerry stood at 6'11", an immense man that you simply didn't argue with. As a child you did as you were told, to the letter, no question. Respect and loyalty were of paramount importance. Yet my childhood, in







the city and later when we moved to Essex, was a very happy one, probably because of the clear and strict guidelines I grew up with. I think I've taken a similar approach with my own children, which has often brought me into conflict with the system, but I firmly believe they are better people for it. Just before you start to form this picture of a bright eyed goody two shoes, let me share this story with you; When we first moved to Romford, we lived in a corner house in the (then) village of Collier Row, always referred to as 82. I own the house today, it's almost a family heirloom. My Grandfather had acquired the place in the 50's because it has a builders yard to one side with gates that opened onto what was then a lane that ran into Pinewoods. Uncle Ivor, a builder, made the fatal mistake of giving me a small ball pin hammer. I invented a nice little pastime of placing objects, usually a pencil or an old penny, on the ground just on our side of the gate so that it could be seen by passing kids. When the eager little fingers appeared under the gate to pick up the prize, they'd get a whack with the hammer. Mum and Nan were horrified, Ivor was less than pleased, but saw the funny side. You didn't get grounded in those days and sore legs served as a much clearer reminder not to do it again.

I suppose you could say that I was a born entertainer. Anything that made people laugh or smile seemed to come naturally to me. My first interest was drums. The music department at Chase Cross Boys School was well noted in Essex and I enrolled in the school orchestra and choir on my first day. The Music master, William Richardson, seemed quite excited that he had a pupil that wanted to play drums, and I quickly discovered why. In the 60's music education at school level was

almost anti modern establishment. There were no 'drum lessons' as we know them today. So when Mr Richardson told me that I would need a manuscript pad and a recorder for my first lesson I was, to say the least, confused. I quickly discovered that I was, in fact, going to learn to be an orchestral percussionist, starting with the bass drum; boom .. count for 60 bars ... boom boom boom .... Count for 32 bars ... boom, rest, boom ... count for 80 bars .... For an eleven year old who really just wanted to be Keith Moon it was really hard going. But it did spark my interest in how music, or more precisely musical arrangements, were constructed. In those days, at Chase Cross at least, you had to really work at music. Failure for me wasn't an option, I couldn't see myself doing anything else. After a while on percussion I decided to 'jump ship'. Mr Richardson assured me that changing instruments at the beginning of my second year was 'stupidity', but I had become very interested in choral music and the finer workings of the orchestra by then and percussion just didn't feel 'musical' enough. So, in September 1970, I moved from percussion to contrabass (double bass), while studying orchestration and voice with Family friend John Chapman who was a lecturer at RCM. Studying with John Chapman wasn't only about music theory, it became an education in show business, he was a professional of the highest quality with a set of principles that were set in stone, principles that were hammered into our heads, principles that are too often absent in the business today. With John's guidance and Mr Richardson's patience, I attained the required grade eight pass and held my place in the music department. At that time, there were no exams in the recognised curriculum for music. Again, with the help of John Chapman I got a place on what was basically an early City & Guilds course at Guildhall focusing on voice. In the summer of 1971 John asked me to consider joining a band with his son and a guitar player. This didn't go down well with Mum and Dad, mainly because it would entail travelling extensively in the London area (I was only 13) and because my main role in the group would be to play Bass guitar. I'd never touched a bass guitar, it meant buying the instrument and associated amplification which were not cheap in those days. My Dad, God bless him, didn't feel that music would ever be a 'proper' job and Mum was worried that I'd get into bad stuff. The inevitable happened, and Dad signed on the dotted line for my Precision Bass and Fender Bassman 100 (about £700 which was more than they'd paid for the house) with a cautionary note that I would have to repay every penny. . . and I did. Our first rehearsal took place in Moss Hall Grove, Finchley on the 11th August the date of my birthday! To this day I remember John telling me "Get used to it Glenn, from this day on, Birthdays, Christmas, weddings and funerals are occasions you won't have time for" and he meant it! He would also say, not long after that, "people will pay you to take their minds off their troubles, never burden them with yours". For John, show business, the music industry wasn't just a way to earn money, it was a way of life that would occupy every corner of your life, he had a framed copy of Berlins lyric "There's No Business Like Show Business" on the wall at Moss Hall Grove, to him it wasn't just the words to a corny song, it was a route map for life in the business, it sort of is for me too.

# LADY Antebellum **Need you now**

CAPITOL NASHVILLE - B003EG8YLY

Lady Antebellum are Charles Kelley, Dave Haywood, and Hilary Scott (Linda Davis' daughter) who worked together as songwriters and went on to perform as an act. They released their first self titled album to much acclaim.

The band begins with the big hit single **Need You Now** (108bpm) a harmony laden number which is one of those songs that once heard you just can't get out of

your head. There have been a few dances already to this track so check out the website and take your pick.

Our Kinda Love (112bpm) Charles takes lead vocal here and this super up tempo song reminds of some of Trick Pony's best work. This has a good beat and a good hook and should definitely be considered as a dance track.

American Honey (66bpm) is a smooth track on which Hilary's beautiful voice is to the fore and there is already a dance or two to it.

Perfect Day (102bpm) once again the band switch back to upbeat tempo and Hilary shows that she can be a country rock chick with a great vocal backed up by solid harmonies from the guys. Yet another good dance prospect.

Love This Pain (128bpm) once again Charles takes lead and delivers a fantastic vocal on this hot country dance track.

When You Got A Good Thing (68bpm) is a stunning nightclub two step and is as good a country song as I have heard in a while. The vocals are first class as is the musicianship, especially the steel guitar. This has potential to be a massive dance hit.

Stars Tonight (124bpm) it's back to the country rock style with this brilliant west coast swing number. It's a toe tapping, but kicker of a song and choreographers will be falling over themselves to write something to this.

If I Knew Then (78bpm) just when you think it can't get any better the band hits you with an amazing waltz track, one of the best songs I have ever heard.

Lost In the Moment (72bpm) once again the band surprises with a smooth nightclub two step song which sounds like it came off a Hal Ketchum album.

Something 'Bout A Woman (88/176bpm) this time a two step gets thrown into the mix and now the band are just spoiling us. Charles lead vocal is enhanced with gorgeous harmonies and the production is superb.

Closing track To Love Again (102bpm) has Hilary back on lead vocal and this is a gorgeous song that epitomises what good country music is all about.

I can't think of enough superlatives to describe this wonderful album of superb country music so give it a try for yourselves and you will see what I mean.

#### **BRAD PAISLEY** AMERICAN SATURDAY NIGHT SONY MUSIC

Brad Paisley has released some fantastic albums over the years and there have been many dances written to his songs. It doesn't seem long since he released his first album but here we are with his eighth release.

Brad gets things moving with title track American Saturday Night (158bpm) an awesome country rocker with a great Tush Push.

Everybody's Here (106bpm) Brad gives us a super cha cha track with a good solid beat enhanced with some great fiddle and steel on the backing.

Welcome To The Future (142pm) is a cool east coast swing track with some of Brad's very clever lyrics

Then (72bpm) the dance style changes completely to a nightclub two step and this is a brilliant song highlighting Brad's fantastic

Water (98bpm) Brad has a great affinity with water as is proved once again in this lively song.

She's Her Own Woman (70bpm) is a smooth nightclub two step that would need a couple of tags added to dance to.

Stars Tonight (124bpm) it's back to the country rock style and this brilliant west coast swing number.

Anything Like Me (82bpm) is a sweet little number, an interesting story song that Brad does so well.

You Do The Math (110bpm) Brad likes a tongue in cheek number which is exactly what this track is!

No (78bpm) once again we have a beautiful song with beautiful lyrics delivered in a very traditional style.

Catch All The Fish (156bpm) is a fast track showcasing Brad's amazing guitar skills. This is ideal for Applejacks if anyone still does that neat dance.

Oh Yeah, You're Gone (78bpm) it's back to the smooth nightclub style again as Brad delivers another wonderful vocal.

The Pants (122bpm) Brad now sings a fun track about who wears the pants. This could really put the fun back in your dancing.

I Hope That's Me (74bpm) has a good strong beat and it has a very rich sound with feel good lyrics.

The album closes with a "hidden" untitled instrumental track and Brad's amazing guitar pickin' is once again to the fore.

American Saturday Night is an awesome album of first class country music from one of the finest country artists ever, Brad Paisley, who shows that he has lost none of his magic.

Mercy (85pm) yes it is that Duffy song and I have to say that I love this rocky version of it.

I Won't Run Away (130bpm) is a real catchy number whilst I Feel Like Buddy Holly (115bpm) is strictly for fans.

Other Side Of Me (127bpm) Alvin sings country .....honest! It's a pretty good dance number too.

Jealous Mind (140bpm) you would swear you were at Butlins listening to Alvin's other big hit.

In The Shelter Of Your Arms (98bpm) is a new song with some decent lyrics but I am afraid Alvin sounds a little old here.

Shakin' All Over (90bpm) is a decent enough cover and new song I Know It's Over (110bpm) is a very good new song.

You You You (140bpm) was another hit and actually it still sounds good enough to be a fun line dance track.

My Sweet Elvis (96bpm) Alvin sings all about his hero on this somewhat clichéd track and the guitar work is awesome.

Dirt On My Hands (131bpm) is another song and it's pretty good whilst Red Dress (140bpm) whisks us right back to seventies and again this could make a decent party line dance track.

Be Careful With My Heart (118bpm) is another new song, a west coast swing, and it is a duet although I don't know who the

Reverend Jack Daniels (80bpm) is a country rocker and is one of the best Line dance tracks on the album.

"Bonus Track" track Tell Me Why (116bpm) brings the curtain down and I believe Alvin saved the best fr last. This is a brilliant track and you will enjoy dancing to it.

So there you have it from Alvin Stardust 19 tracks, three covers, eight hits, seven new songs and a bonus, what more could you want?

Sisters Emily Robinson and Martie Maguire are two thirds of the Dixie Chicks and as the latter are on a long hiatus so the girls decided to form a new outfit and release songs that Emily had written.

The girls start out Skyline (64bpm) a harmonious number showcasing the girls beautiful vocals.

The Coast (78bpm) is an altogether different prospect, it is a catchy song with a good beat and should tempt someone to write a dance to it.

Delight (Something New Under The Sun) (105pm) has a staccato style at the beginning and then electric guitars kick in and change the feel altogether.

See You In Spring (54bpm) is a duet with Jakob Dylan (Bob's son!) and this is a wonderful collaboration which is nightclub two step in style.

Ain't No Son (110bpm) I was trying hard not make comparisons to the Dixies' work but you can't but help it on this brilliant up beat

She's Her Own Woman (70bpm) is a smooth nightclub two step that would need a couple of tags added to dance to.

Fairytale (98bpm) this is an exciting dance prospect as it is a gorgeous waltz and Emily's voice is outstanding. This will definitely have dance written to it.

I Miss You (118bpm) has a good cha cha beat and it reminds me of Chris Izaak's work.

In this new report, *Vivienne Scott* tells us about a Spring Workshop with a difference and some very well known guests.





She had a huge success with 'Nobody But You!' and recently joined up with Queendy Lee to choreograph the funky 'Strong Baby' which might well repeat that success. It was a pleasure to watch Emily and her dancers on the floor, their sheer energy of the dance is contagious.


However, all good things must come to an end, and Craig and Dee had to leave. There was a lot of hugging at the airport just before they left and the house seems much too quiet without them. Dee and Craig were terrific guests and my memories of them will always be with me.

## And Ther's More...

In the early sixties it was Shane Fenton, singer with the band The Fentones. In the seventies it was Alvin Stardust, pop singer and actor. Both were very successful careers and they both belong to the same man. Dawn Middleton finds out more.









Most of us know Alvin Stardust, the man with the leather glove and catsuit who shot to fame with a string of hits with catchy choruses. He has won countless awards and had hits over three decades, 13 UK hit singles and three UK chart albums. Along the way Alvin has also starred in many productions on the West End stage and in countless TV programmes. Alvin is currently touring the UK which coincides with the release of a new album.

DM: I Love Rock 'n' Roll is a really good album that dancers we know will love. Tell me a little about the playlist of the album? How did you choose the songs?

AS: Hi there, I must just to say, Jules my wife and I are massive country and Americana fans. A while ago we went Line dancing and had a ball. Jules was only a little bit better than me but then she has played the lead in the West End production of 'Cats'. Still I think I cut some smooth moves. The track 'Dirt On My Hands' is about a biker who's away from home and missing his wife so much, he wants to get home as quick as possible. So to save time, he wipes off his bike and loads it on a train. I think it's got a good 'Line dance lean' to it. I hope your readers agree with me.

All the new songs are written from a personal perspective. For example the lyrics to 'The Other Side of Me', I really have met women who scare me! 'The Rev. Jack Daniels' came about because every night, two minutes before the show begins, the crew knock on our dressing room door and call, "Two minutes on stage please". We grab them and tell them they have to join in our 'prayer meeting' first. Well, they usually look a bit apprehensive, until I say, "It's with the Rev. Jack Daniels." Guess what, we all hit the stage running. 'My Sweet Elvis' is about my life really. When I was born my folks lived on Mile End Road in the East End of London and we

soon moved to Mansfield Town. I learnt to read and write at St. Peters Infant School. Every Saturday morning I watched Roy Rogers and Gene Autry, the singing cowboys. They introduced me to country music. There were Jimmy Dean, Marlon Brando and Steve McQueen on the silver screen. Then Elvis came and stole everyone's heart away. Well, the words just fell onto the paper and the song was born. It means a lot to me. I hope I get the sentiment across.

DM: You started your career as Shane Fenton and had huge hits so why did you change to Alvin Stardust? What was the inspiration behind the name?

**AS:** It's quite simple really. In the seventies I took on the name Alvin Stardust because the record company were certain we wouldn't get any plays on Radio One with a sixties name. They were probably right.

DM: How would you feel if some of the songs on the CD became line dance hits?

**AS:** I would be knocked out if line dancers took a liking to some of the songs.

DM: Dancers love catchy songs and the album is full of them. Where do you find your inspiration and how do you make your choice of material? **AS:** All these songs are inspired by things that have happened during my 'journey' through life and music.

## **DM:** Do you have a particular favourite on the album?

AS: They are all a bit special to me. The cover of 'Shakin All Over' was because I grew up as a teenager alongside Johnny Kidd. 'I Love Rock And Roll' is a real favourite of mine and my daughter Millie wanted to choose either 'The Climb' by Mylie Cyrus or Duffy's 'Mercy'. We went for 'Mercy'. I guess 'My Sweet Elvis' I'm proud to have done because it's a tribute to my idol, Elvis.

## **DM:** What are your plans for the immediate future?

AS: Right now we've got the album releases to set up around the world and our UK tour. I'm excited and nervous, I think that's the best way to be.

### DM: And long term?

AS: Long term, who knows what the future holds? I'd love to record a live album with my band and Jules, my wife. She did back-up vocals on the album. She's great to work with and has a fabulous voice. 'The Stardusts' Live At The Americana', that would be a great project. Guess what, I'm 'headlining' there next year! Now there's a thought!

My favourite moment as Alvin, has to be right now. After all, who would've thought I'd have a new album out where I can be myself. Playing and writing my own kind of music and songs. You know what comes to mind? That old football quote, "And They Thought It Was All Over!"



Your first time at anything is something you never forget. Meet *Marilyn Lee* of Blouberg Bootscooters from Cape Town in South Africa who came to this year's Crystal Boot Awards...Here's her thoughts on her first time there!



I have been teaching Line dancing in Cape Town, South Africa for the past eight years. **Franck Boucheraud:** Hi. Could you introduce yourselves....

**Hey Romeo:** Sure. We are a group of three. Stacie Roper who is the main singer, Rob Shapiro (keyboards)and Darren Gusnowsky (guitar)

FB: How did you choose your band's name?

**HR:** We had a few names we liked, but the song from the New York punk group Ramones felt right. So we went with it.

**FB:** You are all from Canada. How did you meet?

**HR:** It is all thanks to the musician Gord Bamford. The three of us were at a festival and the two guys were playing for him. Gord recognized Stacie in the audience and asked her to join him on stage to sing a few songs. Stacie liked us and we liked her and the rest is history.

**FB:** You love live performances. Why is it so important?

Line dancing is not just for Christmas or for fun! It can also be very therapeutic for some. *Greg Dunstone* from South Australia has taken his passion for dance into the workplace. Here's his story.....

I live at Aldinga Beach, a small bayside fishing resort about 45 kilometres from Adelaide, South Australia. My family originally came from England in 1840 from Redruth in Cornwall.

As a child I was always interested in watching dancing and singing on television. No one in my family liked dance. I think I was an exception. I did want to be a back up dancer for pop singers but my mother said men don't do that. I went Square Dancing two nights a week and also sat on the Square Dance Society Committee for three years helping to run the annual convention and various other events.

When I left school I was an apprentice carpenter but the company went into liquidation. I worked for several other companies but the building trade was going through a hard time. I eventually got my certificate in Aged Care, Lifestyle And Leisure and have worked in the industry since. This was a major change from working in a male environment and moving to a predominantly female workplace. Wow! I was like a kid in a lolly shop. Two wives later, I now have a lovely girlfriend who is also a nurse. I work as a Diversional Therapist in a Dementia wing of a nursing home, which I really enjoy as the residents need lots of support and love and care, as most days they are very confused.


I first discovered Line Dancing in the early 90's. I watched a TV programme at the time and decided to take my interest further. As part of my Diversional Therapist course we had to do an


activity for the residents so I introduced Armchair Line Dancing. I have also choreographed dances for the residents to dance too. The way I do that is, firstly I select the appropriate music and think of the steps for that song. I then choose moves that fit in with the music and that my residents can easily achieve.

I find that generally my groups tend to find tags difficult to master. For me the ultimate reward comes when I write a couple of dances and my students do them well. On my day off I also go to about ten other aged care facilities and teach them armchair Line dancing. I also teach intellectually disabled people Line dancing. Most of my dancers are women but one man I have at my Saturday class is over 70 years old and goes dancing three times a week. My oldest lady is 87, she goes sky diving, golfing, bush walking and does enjoy her life. My reward is to enhance those people's lives, I just love to see some of the results.

To say that Line dancing has taken over my life is an understatement. I run a newsletter for the whole of South Australia. I also run the Line Dance HELP Service which assists people in finding a class to go to in Australia or the rest of the world. I also run major events for Southern Australia, *S. Australia Bootscoot* usually held in August and *S. Australia Line Up*, a longest Line event at Christmas time at the local Glenelg Pageant. I am also learning Salsa and Ballroom dancing. My ambition is to own my own studio which would enhance my dance teaching. In my spare time I sleep!













Line dance belongs to truly passionate people. Take this village from the Auvergne region in France. Their story is one borne from the simple desire of having lots and lots of fun...

Tallende is a little village in the county of Puy-de-Dôme, some 12 kilometers from the main Auvergene city of Clermont-Ferrand.

In this quaint setting, an association was born in 2008, one that simply wanted to promote Country dancing and American culture through learning and demoing some well chosen choreographies with a strong Country flavour.

This little club, Tallende Country Passion, is the place where friends and fans of Country meet and dance. In short, every member is after the same thing. Enjoy life to the max. And although they are all French, their motto is in English...Life is good!

Chris is their president. She has been a policewoman for over 23 years now and is the mother of twin girls (now 16). She loves travelling and she drives a Harley Davidson 883 Sportster that she loves.

She says: "In 2008/9 we had 39 members. This year we count over 70!"

It is during their second year that their decision to go with the FFCLD (French Federation of Country Line Dancing) opens another door to this little club. They start a Collective association for all the clubs in the region and now have about ten members to their credit.

The club is also helped by the town of Tallende which gives them use of their main Hall. As the classes are more and more popular, Tallende Country Passion now holds four each week for every level.

The girl at the helm of it all is Chris and with Eliane (aka Cheyenne), her best friend, both teach and take care of the club's affairs after having danced together for eight years. They followed training and qualifications as NTA members with Guylaine Bourdages this year and are currently awaiting to pass further exams in their constant quest of being the very best an instructor can be.

They are proud to have been chosen as second place in a friendly contest as

dance partners held in the French town of Courpière last April during the first "Salon Regional de la Country" festival. They say "We were eight couples and to be chosen as second was a real honour."

The girls love dancing it's true but they love the fun and the relaxation that Line dance has brought not only to them but to their group as well. Their club dancers are often booked by other little villages and small town surrounding them. The reason for their success? "The fun we bring to them of course" Chris and Cheyenne exclaim together with a laugh...

Tallende may be a small village but this club's heart is huge and once again, dancers like the ones you will find in Tallende Country Passion are what Line dance is or should be all about... Serious dancing, serious fun!

it is not usually much of a problem until the dancers try to dance alongside others doing the same dance and then confusion reigns as everyone looks at everyone else wondering what's what.

Choreographers of course, can make mistakes in the script — it is amazing how we humans find it so easy to read what we expect to see printed on the page rather than what is actually there. So, even although the script might have been checked and re-checked there can still be some errors lurking somewhere. When this happens, it is usual for a revised script to be published. But we live in such an instant world that by the time a revised script has been published lots of teachers might already have taught the dance complete with errors and of course this can cause havoc on a dance floor when there are different versions being danced.

You might think with videos of dances being so easily available that this would prevent a lot of misinterpretations of scripts. But that is not the case. Videos not done by the choreographer might have errors or maybe just some nuances in them that are not quite what the choreographer intended. Often a little personal interpretation is not a major problem but if it is an error that affects the foot that is being used or the direction of travel or a turn then it can cause real problems and a lot of bumping and jostling on the dance floor. So even when using a video it is a good idea to check that it is doing what it says on the script.

If we all do our best to be accurate where scripts are concerned and then hopefully problems like these should only cause an occasional blip on the dance floor.

Dear Sho

I Line dance three times a week and go to socials and events regularly. What gets me is that I learn a dance and then go to an event and it is not danced the same as I have been taught it. Why can't everyone teach the dances the way they are on the step sheets?

Hi Dave

This is a good question and one that arises time and time again. As you know, Line dance sheets or scripts, are usually prepared by the person who created the dance, the choreographer. The script ideally should provide sufficient detail for someone who is familiar with Line dance terminology and who knows how to read a Line dance sheet to work out the dance from the information provided. This usually works very well for basic Line dances using single beat rhythm and the most common movements and steps. One type of challenge can come from new steps or movements that are introduced that some teachers and dancers are not familiar with. Unless they are able to find out what the choreographer means in the script then there is the potential for mistakes to occur. Another might involve the rhythm, phrasing or counting of the music - over the years there have been quite a few discussions about a particular phrase or section of a dance where the counting is out of the ordinary. This can lead to differences in the way dancers phrase the dance to the music on the dance floor. Sometimes it is the tag, bridge or restart that causes confusion. Music tracks these days can have various versions and depending on the one used the tags and so on might or might not fit with the track. And of course there can be instances where the person teaching the dance has simply got it wrong. Mistakes happen but they can be put right. Teachers may teach a dance one way and then discover they have made a mistake. Then they will either re-teach the dance making the

necessary changes or they will carry on doing

it with the mistake. This does happen and
