



#### **Bad Break**



#### **Changing Times**

I've been Line dancing for 16 years now and how things have changed in that time. When a new dance is choreographed I no longer have to buy a whole album for one track of music or wait for the Line Dance Fever albums to come out. I can now download the one track I want immediately. I can even listen to a sample of it first to see what it is like. I can also get music from the Linedancer website when the dance is in the top 20. As an instructor the easy availability of the music and videos is a huge help. Dance scripts are really useful and I refer to them all the time but to be able to watch the dances on my laptop is like having the choreographer at home with me. I know straight away what the dance is like, how it fits to the music and I can practice any tricky bits and get the timing right.

I no longer have to carry heavy CDs with me. I use my iPod to play the music in my classes. The Linedancer website keeps me up-to-date with all the dances and what is popular. I just need to press the 'send' button and it's on its way. I have adapted over the years and embraced the new technology. What will be the next development?

Josh Bray's 'Whisky & Wool' is refreshingly acoustic in nature. With a folk blues influence, the album is a mix of uplifting, melancholy tinted, gorgeous tracks.

Half of the album was recorded in Truck Studios run by the Bennet Brothers (Danny and the Champions). Josh says: "The studio is on farmland in a metal shipping container within a barn. The equipment was fantastic but it was freezing cold as we were there mid-winter. So we resorted to woolly jumpers and whisky to keep us warm, hence the title." Not a bad way to keep warm....

The other half of the album was recorded in London's Apollo Control Studios by Howard Gray, who is a producer of some renown and has worked with Tom Jones, Van Morrison, Jimmy Page, U2 and The Cure in the past. With such an impressive production pedigree, Josh Bray gets a terrific start and the album draws plenty of inspiration from his childhood.

Born in Devon, Josh does his growing up in Dorset where he spends his time listening to the likes of Pearl Jam, Nirvana and Led Zeppelin, which in the light of his sound today seem odd choices. A few years later, while watching TV he stumbles across the late Nick Drake singing 'Riverman'. It all suddenly makes sense.

He starts looking into 1970's rock and folk music and soon his idols become Bob Dylan, Neil Young, Joni Mitchell and Fairport Convention. 'Whisky & Wool' echoes throughout with sounds reminiscent of songs that could be attributed to any of these artists. At times, Josh sounds like a really early Neil Young and that is no bad thing.

Following his unconventional journey into what would eventually become his calling, Josh picked up an old Spanish Guitar which had belonged to his late dad and which he still owns and plays, setting about to teach himself. Staying faithful to the sounds he loves, his detuned style which again is very significant of the British folk scene of the 70s is still at the helm of what makes the album so special.


Josh Bray then, plays a few clubs and dabbles in music. Still unsure of his future, he abandons his tentative dream to study law at university. He graduates and decides to move to the USA, where he hopes to be working with human rights

law as he has a special interest in legal matters for those who face death row but he gets offered a job in the UK and his life changes again. A friend persuades him to put law on hold and follow a music dream while he can. Josh agrees and puts a band together. They soon set to record an album. The rest as they say.....

'Whisky & Wool' is a work of passion. A personal collection from a man who is simple and grounded. "I don't want to walk around in fur coats or wear sunglasses at night. I just want to play live and put records out that people will enjoy. Style over substance, pretence and fakery are rife and they all pass for talent because people are so caught up with it...."

"Whisky & Wool" tracks seem easy to listen to and yet have a depth seldom heard in a body of work so accessible. Josh has a very subtle quality about his voice and the gentle tracks feature fabulous guitar work and other instruments like harmonica, seem to lift the album."

'Whisky & Wool' is not savage rock, just gentle folk music as it used to be. Sometimes, the sound veers a little towards country and Josh is a new, British talent that we hope will soon be discovered in a big way. He certainly deserves to be.







Dance For Good Health, Peace and Joy has been an annual event since 2005. It was created to promote goodwill and fellowship among Line dancers. We put a lot of hard work in to this event and all we have ever asked is for the dancers to bring their goodwill and open their hearts to new friends.

On the day of the event about 500 Line dancers turned up from different parts of Malaysia, Singapore, Indonesia, Western Australia, Taiwan and Japan. Many of

us are from different religions too but differences have never been a problem with Line dancing in Malaysia.

Our opening dance for the past five years has always been 'Come Dance With Me' by Jo Thompson. This year was no different. As with every year we dedicated the event to our friends who were down with ill health and prayed that they get well soon. This year we dedicated our event to Jo and wished for her to be back on the dance floor very soon.

Niels taught four terrific dances. They were: Your World, 1234, Hallejunior and NC Forever. Our dancers love Niels, not just because of his talent but also because he was so easy to chat to and mingle with.

We also had a number of Malaysian and Singaporean choreographers present. Jennifer Choo and Leong Mei Ling came from Kuala Lumpur, Yeo Yu Puay from Sarawak and Janice Khoo from Penang. From Singapore were Allen Koh, John Ng choreographer of Funky Fire Dance and

Gossip Girls, both of which are big hits in Asia. Peter and Eelin of the world famous step sheet archive website www.yipee.sg and Philip Sobrielo. Amy Christian-Sohn on a home visit to Singapore from the USA also made a welcome appearance. Later they all taught some of their dances and they were all extremely well received.


With a pre scripted dance list and stage dancers to refresh memories for those who needed a little help every so often, the event was a real success for us and the participants.

A brilliant new British talent is emerging with an album already making huge waves here and in the US. 'Woman On Top' is a collection of songs that listeners and dancers alike should find inspiring. Laurent chats to Zoe in this exclusive Linedancer interview.





#### LS: Hi Zoe. Was music always important?

ZS: Yes, very much. I grew up listening to my dad's rock 'n' roll collection. From Little Richard to the Rolling Stones, Guy Mitchell and the Kinks. I listened to them all. I discovered Jim Morrison in my twenties. He seemed to encapsulate everything exciting and thought provoking about being a performer. I was totally enthralled and wanted to be like his female counterpart. I also love a lot of the artists from the 1960's: Bob Dylan, Janis Joplin, Jimi Hendrix, The Beatles, The Stones. I also particularly like psychedelic rock out of the West Coast of America in the 1960's. So I moved from the UK over to the West Coast of America and now live in Laurel Canyon, where it was all made! Once I started recording I was looking for a female artist to kind of get inspired by. At that time it was all about Sheryl Crow, I liked her words, her songs and the rocky licks of her guitar. I also love Stevie Nicks, I met her once back stage at one of her shows and she offered to produce me. It never happened unfortunately.

#### LS: How did you continue to develop your style?

ZS: I have always believed that the more songs you write, the more you get a handle on your own craft. I've had some amazing mentors, it has to be said. I definitely had a vision for my new record, 'Woman On Top'. I wanted it to be woman rock: gutsy, empowered. I wanted it to feel how I feel. Sometimes sultry, sometimes rebellious. For me making music is a very organic process, it's what inspires me in the moment. It can be anything from a scene from my own life to someone else's song.

#### LS: How do you think people will react to your sound?

ZS: Well, I call it 'Woman Rock' and I think they will love it, because although it sounds quite American it has a lot of the cheek and humour of the Brits. A good portion of the songs are really meant to be fun and if you listen to the riffs on the record they are very 'Stones-y', so I hope the UK will love it.

#### LS: How about the process of writing a song? How does it happen?

ZS:It often starts with a phrase which keeps going around and around in my mind. I start to paint the picture in the verses. I'll play it to friends and if they love it I'll develop it further. I write wordy scrawls about my feelings every day, and confessional letters that I then don't send, but turn into songs. The pieces of writing I like I will strum guitar chords under and start shaping the song.

## LS: Line dance today is about many musics and many genres. How would you feel if one of your songs became a dance hit?

ZS: I would love it! A lot of my songs are about liberating some part of myself, and dance is liberation. I would love it if my song 'Woman On Top' became a dance hit. I would love love love to see all the ladies waving their hands in the air and feeling that their moment has come to be on top, and dance to it. That would be a victory.

#### LS: What are your future plans?


ZS: I would love to find my soul mate and I hope I can continue to live an inspired, creative life. I've written a bunch of TV shows I want to produce and I'd like to make some movies since I trained as an actress in the UK.

LS:How will you keep your identity intact. Your sound could be thought of as US based and yet you are British.... is that important anyway?

ZS: You know, I love contradictions. I'm an English Rose in the Wild West. There is a freedom in being an outsider, so being a Brit with an American sound works for me. Having an American sound in the UK gives me the space to do my own thing. I'm basically quite sponge like as an artist, and my surroundings definitely influence me. I am open to be influenced by my roots and I'm sure that if I spend more time in the UK that will influence my music.

LS: In the US, country is as popular, if not more, than pop music. Would you like to be THE person who changes things around in the UK?

ZS: I would love to be that person. I love the fact my music has a bit of that American big sound, but it also has some Brit sensibility. Listen to 'Black Roses', some of the arrangement almost sounds like it could be an Oasis track. I love rock and I love pop, I love the attitude of the American Ladies of Rock, they really express themselves. They strap on a guitar and say "Hey, I'm a chick but I can rock like the men!" I will be happy to be that woman in the UK.





## Tim's Ruzgar album of the month

# VARIOUS ARTISTS COAL MINER'S DAUGHTER COLUMBIA RECORDS

Loretta Lyn needs no introduction, she is as synonymous with country music as is Hank Williams. Loretta is a member of the Country Music Hall Of Fame and after winning four Grammies she has received the Grammy Lifetime Achievement award. 2010 marked the 50th year of her debut single 'I'm A Honky Tonk Girl' and now Columbia Records have got a bunch of country music's finest artists to record this tribute album.



Firstly we have *Don't Come Home A Drinkin'* (168bpm) from Gretchen Wilson and whilst this lively track is perfect for a good old Tush Push it is certainly worthy of it's own dance.

*I'm A Honky Tonk Girl* (136bpm) is by the delightful Lee Ann Womack and it has a good east coast swing but it is very traditional country music.

**Rated X** (128bpm) surprisingly is by the band The White Stripes who put a very contemporary slant on this song and I absolutely love it!

You're Lookin' At Country (128bpm) gorgeous Carrie Underwood gives us a superb rendition of one of Loretta's classic tracks. This track too is east coast swing in style and will delight dancers with the right choreography.

Louisiana Woman, Mississippi Man (98/196bpm) a superb duet from Alan Jackson and Martina McBride comes next and this is a brilliant two step number with a huge Cajun influence and it is a strong dance prospect.

You Ain't Enough (To Take My Man) (146bpm) is by Paramore is basically an acoustic track whilst Faith Hill sings Love Is The Foundation (90bpm) a beautiful

track delivered with power and passion by Faith.

After The Fire Is Gone (116bpm) this time Alison Moorer duets with Steve Earle on a west coast swing song which again is a very good track but is also very traditional country music.

If You're Not Gone Too Long (78bpm) they could not have made this album without a contribution from country legend Reba McEntire who delivers a brilliant Texas swing song.

I Know How (138bpm) is by Kid Rock who certainly lives up to his name bringing this old track bang up to date and this is one of the best dance prospects on the album

There had to be a waltz on somewhere on the album and here Lucinda Williams brings you **Somebody Somewhere (Don't Know What He's Missin' Tonight)** (100bpm) but I have to say it is a bit of a dirge.

The big finale sees Loretta team up with Miranda Lambert and Sheryl Crow for *Coal Miner's Daughter* (138bpm) which whilst being true to the original does sound very much up to date and is a fitting end to this fine album.

What we have with this album is a great tribute to a brilliant artist and it is a mixture of old and new country music that I believe works really well. The album includes some very good dance track possibilities.



he Dixie Chicks came to the fore in the mid nineties and became one of the world's biggest girl groups. Their music has been used extensively in Line dancing over the years and now Columbia releases their anthology.

The best of the dance tracks include;

Lubbock Or Leave It (180bpm) a fantastic
upbeat Tush Push type of number; Bitter

End (148bpm) which is a lovely waltz that
had a couple of dances choreographed to it;

Everybody Knows (118bpm) a nice cha cha that
again had a few dances written to it; Long Time

Gone (86pm) and Lil' Jack Slade (148bpm)
showcases the band's musical talents; White

Trash Wedding (152bpm) which sounds like it
is at breakneck speed but is a cool track; Ready
To Run (98bpm) had a plethora of dances to

it but it still sounds superb today; **Goodbye Earl** (122bpm) is another fresh sounding track; **Some Days You Gotta Dance** (170bpm) was the Chicks version of Keith Urban's track: **Sin Wagon** (142bpm) is one of their best ever tracks and Peter Metelnick had a huge hit dance to this: **There's Your Trouble** (125bpm) has no less than 18 dances on Linedancer Magazine's website; **I Can Love You Better** (123bpm) is another that had over 20 dances written to it; **Give It Up Or Let Me Go** (104/208bpm) is a super two stepper and **Tonight The Heartache's On Me** (124bpm) one of Peter Metelnick's biggest dance hits and still a floor filler today.

There are 16 more tracks on what is surely the definitive Dixie Chicks album so whether you are a fan or not this is a superb album to add to your collection.

om T Hall is often called 'The Nashville Story Teller', a tribute to his story telling style of songwriting over the decades.

Tom's first record deal was way back in 1967 and he has released 35 albums which have garnered him dozens of top ten hits. Hump Head now release this 50 track album and Tom wrote all but a couple of the tracks.

Most notable dance tracks include; *I Washed My Face In The Morning Dew* (110bpm) a very catchy upbeat number; *Ravishing Ruby* (144bpm) an east coast swing; *Spokane Motel Blues* (106bpm) a banjo flavoured bouncy little track; *Ballad Of Forty Dollars* (1140pm) which sounds like a Johnny Cash song; *Cloudy Day* (118bpm) a super little dance track; *Watergate Blues* (132bpm) a political song which is in a

hea Tippin had aspirations to become a country singer from an early age and in the early nineties Thea got an administrative job at Reba McEntire's Starstruck company. She met her now husband, country star Aaron Tippin and put her career on hold to raise the two sons they had. Thea now releases an album of her favourite songs produced by the legendary Jim Horn.

Suitable dance tracks are; *I Can See Clearly Now* (124bpm) which has a good solid cha cha beat; *I've Got The World On A String* (106bpm) a catchy big band number; the Bread classic *Baby I'm A Want You* (74bpm) a nightclub two step which is a beautiful duet with Billy Dean; *Pennies From Heaven* (160pm) which is given a very jazzy feel dominated with upright bass; *Hit The Road Jack* (164bpm) a duet with husband

great polka style; **Shoeshine Man** (177bpm) sounds very sixties but is a brilliant track; You can't help but love **That Song Is Driving Me Crazy** (166bpm) it's so infectious: **Sneaky Snake** (146bpm) somewhat dated but funny; **Deal** (128bpm) another lively polka track; **I Like Beer** (173bpm) is another fun track, this time a fast waltz; **Salute To A Switchblade** (118/236bpm) a lively two step; **Chattanooga Dog** (124bpm) which has a good tempo; **Faster Horses** (116/232bpm) a somewhat dated song but a good two step; **Fox On The Run** (126bpm) on which Tom sounds like George Jones;

I Can't Dance (160bpm) a good title for one of the best dance tracks on the album and Redneck Riviera (116bpm) a tongue in cheek song with a good beat.

Aaron and this Gospel flavoured number is just about the best track on the album; *I'll Be There* (92bpm) Michael Jackson's track also gets big band treatment courtesy of Jim Horn whose sax playing is brilliant; *I'll Never Fall In Love Again* (125bpm) a super duet with Billy Dean and Bobby Gentry's hit brought right up to date; *Someone To Watch Over Me* (160bpm) on which Thea goes jazzy once more and *Then Came You* (118bpm) another great dance track and again excellent musical backing.

Other notable songs are **So Far Away** (72bpm) vocally Thea's best effort on the album; **Sunshine On My Shoulders** (74bpm) John Denver's beautiful song and **My Funny Valentine** (72bpm).

Thea Tippin's album is an eclectic mix of music with something to suit most tastes.



Vivienne Scott has sent us her report on what many consider one of the best International Line dance events of the year.... The Las Vegas Dance Explosion.



This was my seventh year of flying down for the Vegas Dance Explosion and the city still retains its unique aura. That's part of the allure of the Dance Explosion, that it gives you a chance to explore a city of neon lights, luxurious casinos and overthe-top attractions as well as dance your little tootsies off.

The Riviera Hotel and Convention Centre, right on The Strip, is the home for the Explosion and dancers started arriving Wednesday morning. Workshops start Wednesday afternoon with the last goodbyes being said late Sunday night after the Awards Show. There are four workshop rooms with classes starting at the civilized hour of ten a.m. There are no classes during the lunch and dinner break although a DJ mans the controls for one room of open dancing. I really like this idea as you can go for lunch with your mates and not worry about what you are missing.

There is no wasted dance time at this event. Wednesday evening is the only time for Instructor demos as they are subsequently streamed on the TV in your hotel room. Just put your feet up and watch your instructors strut their stuff. There are also no separate reviews as all dances, except for the Beginners, are taught twice. It alleviates the dreaded decision of which class to go to at the same hour and/or gives you an opportunity to try that particular dance one more time.

For the evening dances each workshop room has its own flavour. The Beginner Room, led very capably by John Grrowler with instructors popping in and out to help, was active every evening. Right next to it was the Playlist Room and dancers checked out the list and made

sure they were back in time to dance their favourites. Across the corridor was the main ballroom with the indomitable DJ Louie at the helm. This was a busy room at night and Louie did an excellent job of mixing and matchin'! 

attended as I didn't want this to be a onesided report. I'm really grateful for all the emails that flooded my inbox.

We weren't off to a great start when we arrived in Nashville on January 3rd, 2011 for Worlds X1X. Last year, my luggage had been lost for over 24 hours. This year Tajali's luggage was missing! A feeling of déjà vu started to settle over us.

It put a bit of a damper on our arrival and we weren't sure what to expect when the bus pulled up to the Opryland Resort. The flooding in May 2010 had shut down the hotel for 195 days and I wondered if the resort might be up to the standard it had been last year.

As we walked into the Cascades Lobby and waited to check in, we looked around and we agreed that we were indeed glad to be back. This is an immense complex complete with waterfalls, gardens, an indoor river, an 85 foot nightly fountain show and more. Rooms are spacious and quiet.

We found that the number of dancers in attendance had reduced from last year, and this had upsides and downsides too.

Workshops were very small in numbers for the first couple of days with more people arriving over the weekend but classes were never packed. The Line was also available during the day for open dancing for those who wanted it.

One thing that I enjoy about UCWDC events is the opportunity to go and watch competition. This was the event to do so. Dancers were breathtaking in their costumes and they put their heart and soul into their performances. Emily Drinkall's performance in her solo medley was stunning and she was the overall champion in female superstars.

We missed many instructors who did not come from the U.K this year. We didn't have Dan McInerney, Nigel Amon or the Kinsers who were there last year and there were very few U.K. or European Line dancers there unless they were competing. Even so, the competitive Line dancers rarely came in to dance socially.

Having said that, we had so many superb choreographers/instructors and some great dances were taught by Rachael McEnaney, Scott Blevins, Guyton Mundy, Max Perry, Kathy Hunyadi, Joanne Brady, Zac Detweiller, Amy Christian-Sohn, Ruben Luna, Jamie Marshall, Darren Bailey, Judy McDonald, John Robinson, Scott Schrank, Junior Willis, Rob Glover, Frank Trace and more. Darren Bailey from the U.K. was extremely popular and his musicality was apparent in the dances he taught. His dances, 'Voodoo' and 'Johnny Got A Boom Boom' filled the floor at night. Rachael's 'Ooh

I Like That', co-choreographed with Ryan Lindsey, was a crowd pleaser and a fun party mixer dance that had all participants smiling and laughing throughout the dance. Guyton and Scott always draw a good crowd of dancers and this event was no exception.

Even though it was a small crowd, we had fun and it was a cosy, intimate group. Fun is what you make it. What was particularly enjoyed was the fact that all our social evening dancing took place in one room. It meant that everyone danced together and that advanced dancers jumped in and danced alongside Beginner dancers. Dances of all levels were played along with a mix of new and old favourites. We had great DJs with Jill Babinec, Tim Hand and Louie St. George who played request

after request. It was great to connect with many friends we hadn't seen for a while and as always, it's the people who make the event special, whether the event is small or large and we all agreed that we had a great time.

There was however, an energy level missing that I hadn't experienced in other





y e a r s of attending Worlds. I still remember being at Worlds in Edmonton, Alberta Canada in 2001 and seeing hundreds of young Line dancers on the floor, many or most of them from the U.K. and Europe. It was a sharp contrast to this year's event.

So, how do you encourage Line dancers to attend Worlds again? If Worlds wants to bring back Line dancers to their event, maybe a few changes should be made. A list of confirmed instructors and an international variety would be great. Put out flyers at other events and encourage people to attend, let the world know. A Line dance flyer for non-competitors needs to be out early in the year and available at ALL Line dance events.

I would also suggest that everyone gets to know well in advance about those who are confirmed to appear at the event. How can most people commit to something they know little about? Worlds is one of the best event potentially that Line dancers have. Marketing it right will make such a huge difference.

Those of us who were there had a great time and we were sorry that more people didn't join us. We had a good crowd last year and anticipated that there would be approximately the same number this year but this was not to be. On the up side, those of us there got in so much dancing and the DJs played whatever we wanted since there were fewer of us making requests.

We know the potential for growth is huge if the effort is put into making it happen and we're ready to support Worlds if they're ready to do whatever it takes to bring Line dancers back. There's a year to put Worlds right back at the top of the map before next year.

# A Wonderful Lad

Dance at its very best is experienced as an emotion, a motivation from within that makes people achieve incredible things. Kelsey Trevett from South Oxhey in Hertfordshire, is only nine years of age and has just received a Pride of Britain award. He is also a keen Line dancer and Laurent spoke to him and the people who love him.



Kelsey may be only nine but he has already been recognised with the Pride of Britain award that he received in 2010.

Kelsey was diagnosed with cancer when he was just three months old and doctors had no option but to remove one of his eyes. Then, the cancer returned when he was five and his other eye also had to be removed. When the doctors gave the family the bad news, the little boy said: "Don't worry Mum we can't always have what we want." Since then, Mum and Dad are the proudest of parents though they take their lives one day at a time. As for Kelsey, he says: "The best things in my life are my Mum, my Dad and my sister Jorden."

Kelsey has always loved music and started very young to attend classes at the local leisure centre. His carer Sue already attended the club Waveliners and he took to Line dance in a jiffy. He says: "I love dancing and I love all kinds of music, especially Skinny Genes, Mamma Maria and Poker Face." He adds: "The club is great because everybody treats me as normal."

Viv is the force behind Waveliners and she recalls that Sue who is Kelsey's carer brought him along once during the school holidays. Both teacher and student never looked back. "It was just a pleasure to have him with us. He is such a happy little boy and he just loves dancing. He fits in really well and we have a great family atmosphere at Waveliners so everything is just perfect. Dancers just love him, especially when he showed them his award!"

Kelsey was nominated for the award though no one as yet knows who was behind the recommendation. One day at

work, Mum Jo got a call from ITV Pride of Britain and the rest is history. Kelsey is still on cloud nine. "I could not believe it. I have had a great time since the win. I have met lots of famous people and I am really enjoying myself." Jo says: "Kelsey told Simon Cowell he could not understand why he got an award for being normal!"

When you realise that Kelsey wants to do lots of extreme sports when he grows up, as well as write a book to help children in the same situation as him, you realise that what Kelsey wants, Kelsey manages to get.

Sue says: "When Kelsey badgered me no end to take him dancing, I knew I would have to comply eventually. In the end, he did like dancing very much and all the dancers liked him, so I guess he was right all along."

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I ask Kelsey what is the most difficult thing for him in life. After a short pause, he replies: "If things get moved around at home, I bump into them, so that is not very good." His peer group love him. Boys think he is cool and girls can't wait to cuddle him. He is so active that many of the kids forget his disability and the teachers have to remind them. School for Kelsey also means more great activities and there is plenty of help available to make his life easier. For example, he plays football like any other boy but the difference is that the ball has a bell within it.

Dancing though for a blind person is never obvious. However, Viv was not so daunted. "I had taught a blind lady before taking her through the basics quite successfully using the clock face as directions. Kelsey already knew some dance steps as he had been going to other groups so it was all very natural." For student and teacher, though, the nightmare scenario is "forgetting to speak a direction, point or simply stop calling the steps!"

Viv is a fabulous teacher with over 17 years of experience and dancing is in her blood. She holds seven classes each week and one of those is a twelve week course for the charity Mind (Stress and stroke related work). She says: "It has been quite successful and I was pleased to see 40 people attending the last course, so all worthwhile."

There is no doubt that a club like Waveliners is as inspiring as Kelsey is in their own way. It is a joy to think that both have met and are supporting and complementing one another. Kelsey brings a lot of joy to Viv's dancers and

the dancers give Kelsey a fabulous fun and loving time each week.

Viv concludes: "What is not to like about Kelsey? He is a wonderful lad and an inspiration to everybody. He is always upbeat and just gets on with things. He is so positive and can teach us all a thing or two. He just sees himself as another member of the class. Children are the dancers of the future and my grandchildren also take part in my classes, even if they are only three and eight! Kelsey and his lovely little sister will always be welcome at Waveliners."

Kelsey may have won a fantastic award as Pride of Britain but if the Pride of Dance award should exist one day, there is no doubt that he would win one hands down for his dedication, his talent and most of all his joy of living.

of Names steps terminology used in Line dancing come from a variety of places. Some get their name from the particular pattern or image that the steps create. Some are based on terminology that already exists in other dance genres. And others have emerged from the names that people have given them that have gradually been accepted as the name of the step. Although there is quite a lot of consistency in the terminology there will always be some steps or movements that are known by more than one term. This is not so unusual in the dance world considering all the different dance genres that are around today. In this column in issue 161 (October 2009), for instance. I discussed the similarities and roots of side shuffles and chassés that we use in Line dancing. Some dance associations may use slightly different terminology for some of their steps from another dance society. The important thing here is to have an awareness of the most common names for steps so that you recognise what step is required.

Take a very common step in Line dancing that appears in hundreds of thousands of dance scripts all over the world - shuffles. The term shuffle in Line dancing has emerged from the shuffling action of the feet in some of the old dances. But what we in Line Dancing refer to as a shuffle would be known in other dance genres as a step ball change or perhaps a type of chassé. But the interest goes deeper than that because a shuffle in tap dancing is nothing like the shuffle that we do in Line dancing and it is certainly not a step ball change either. So a tap dancer attending a Line dance class would be forgiven for dancing a totally different type of shuffle than what is expected in Line dancing if a demonstration was not given first. It is not that the tap dancer is wrong, it is just that more information is needed in order for the correct step to be danced - for example, an explanation that the step in Line dancing differs from the

step of the same name in Line dancing. Line dance teachers with an awareness of terminology used in different dance genres can help their dancers get to know them too.

You will find that some steps are found in lots of dance genres and they generally follow the same principle across the board, although the nitty gritty of the technique may differ according to each genre. Take a kick ball change, for example. The basic form of a kick ball change is a common step that can be found in tap, modern dance, jazz dance, ballroom and Latin and many more. Each genre has its own way of dancing the kick ball change but the idea is generally the same.

Then there are the cases when a step is known by more than one name within the same dance genre. In Line dancing the term sailor shuffle is also often called a sailor step. The tricky bit comes when some separate the terms into two separate steps – this can happen and then again the key thing is to be aware there are more than one version of these steps out there. The use of video to show dances can help here as long as it reflects the steps intended by the choreographer.

Finally I want to just draw your attention to the differences in step names across different countries and continents. Just as we have language differences within say, English-speaking countries, these can spill over into dance too. Let's take a hop for instance. In UK a hop in dance is generally accepted as being a step of elevation begun and ended on the same foot. But I discovered many years ago when Line dancing in the USA that a hop did not mean what I thought it did at the places I went to. Instead they called a small jump forward on two feet, a hop. So it was quite a different step. I expect there will always be some differences in terminology but if we are prepared for this then it should not cause too much of a problem. It just keeps us on our toes.

Alan Connor is becoming more familiar with Line dancers everywhere after the success of the dance Go With The Flow to his track Let Your Love Flow. Alan updates Linedancer on his career so far and future plans.

Alan began singing and songwriting in his early teens and initially joined established local bands. However, Alan then decided to go it alone and by 2001 was developing his own distinctive dance pop sound and voice, writing and performing. Since then Alan has had a very successful and varied career and has also been busy producing for other artists.

Following the success of his track 'Let Your Love Flow' in 2008, Choreographers Alison Biggs and Peter Metelnick heard the song and really took to it. They created a dance called 'Go With The Flow' and it attracted a lot of interest and took off around the world. Alan proudly told us: "It was totally unexpected but I was of course delighted. A friend of mine sent me a link to the dance. I had a look at the choreography and was completely blown away by it. It's funny because as a musician you can become wrapped up in the promotion of a song and forget to take note of how it is doing with different audiences. I was caught up in getting the video shown on TV and I wasn't paying attention to where

else the song was taking off. You never know who a song will appeal to. I have friends who are in Line dance classes but I haven't a lot of knowledge about it, although I've always known that it's a very popular pastime and it requires a lot of commitment and effort to learn a routine. I'm really proud to be a part of that."

In 2009 he released the album 'Something Going On'. He also had a big track on the international dance scene called 'I Love The Sunshine'. "This is a song I did in Germany with Deep Melange. DJ Tiesto, one of the biggest DJs, played it as part of his set on his world tour and the crowd went absolutely nuts to it. I also made another track with Distant Soundz called 'Close Your Eyes' and I have had songs appearing in a couple of movies."

There were a few very successful Line dance hits also on that album. "I was thrilled to see so many people enjoying some of the songs from that record. Youtube was packed with clips from around the world for 'Let Your





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Love Flow' and 'Dance Away'. They really opened me up to a whole new audience and I'm incredibly proud to have made such an impact on the Line dance community. I can't help but smile every time I see someone dancing to one of those songs. I'm a pretty hopeless dancer and I really can't get my head around how people can remember those complicated steps. I've been thinking that a Line dance video for a single at some point could be very interesting."

2010 was a very busy and fruitful year for Alan as he explains: "I spent a lot of time writing and recording new songs, releasing the single 'Sun Went Down', doing some live shows and also writing for a couple of other artists as well. I've just written the song that might hopefully represent Sweden in the 2011 Eurovision Song Contest. It's been a busy year, stockpiling new songs and I'm probably about half way there to my next album, due this summer." It is hard to believe it's been two years since Alan's last album.

Alan is releasing his new single called 'Stone Cold' in February 2011. "I think it's a very instant and contemporary song with a good backbone on it for dancing to. I've been working with a producer called Beltek from Slovenia and he produced my last couple of singles but I think he surpassed himself with this one. I love the video, I think it's my best one yet."

When asked what else he has lined up for 2011, Alan told us excitedly: "I'll be trying hard to get my album finished before the end of the summer but I want it to be absolutely perfect so I don't want to rush it. In the meantime though, I have a record due out with Bobina. He's the number one producer in Russia. That one is called 'Caught In The Rain' and it screams summer hit. I've also just done a record with Dutch producers T.O.M. It's a lovely song, the best I have ever written in fact, and it's called 'The Things You Say. I wrote it with 'Wherever I Lay My Hat (That's My Home)' in mind, so it tells a similar story. I'm very excited about 2011.'

Speaking to Laurent John said "I have always been impressed by the support



On December 27th to 30th, we all congregated at the NH hotel in Milan for the Fifth annual WCDF World Championships. This would prove to be a total of four days jam-packed with competition, workshops and parties – including an early new year's party.

As usual, the event kicked off Monday evening with choreography and proam, followed early next morning with preliminary rounds in both the newcomer and novice divisions. Some groups had up to 17 competitors. The ensuing days offered a variety of different divisions – social, newcomer, novice, more choreography, more pro-am, showcase, renegade, couples and teams, plus a

special version of the Italian Country and Western Dance Championships. The final day of competition featured the Intermediate and Advanced divisions plus the Regal, Jewel and Megastar dancers. This year, the female Megastar division featured no less than seven of the world's greatest dancers.

Some fulfilled their dreams of a first place and the title of World Champion, and others came in at a close second place but that is the nature of the game. Advanced dancers were crowned World Champions and thus became new Megastars and in what can only be described as, a first in the Line dance world, Raymond Sarlemijn took first place

in ALL six choreography divisions.

To say that the level of the competitors has increased would be an understatement. The rise of the level of all divisions is truly amazing, not only compared to seven or eight years ago but even compared to one or two years ago. As stated by WCDF President Herman Falkenberg in his speech to the dancers, Line dance is firmly placed on the dance map as a serious sport due to the amazing talent that has emerged over the years.

The World Championships in Italy had much more to offer than just great competitions. Everyone in attendance was treated to some great shows with the



Marlon Ronkers dance team, LeeAnne & Matt Oakley and the fantastic Roy Hadisubroto, who did a very special show which included a spoof on all the talent shows currently seen on television.

Every day there were several workshops to choose from, both the new competition dances for 2011 and lots of social dances. Also, every night ended with a party, so that everyone had a chance to relax and meet up with friends from other countries. The many friendships that the dancers have with people from all over the world plays a big part in what makes such an event as the World Championships the great success that it is and is sure to be for many years to come.

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


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
