Just Breathtaking

On the evening of Saturday 28th January 2012, a crowd of more than 700 people stood up and applauded as one, refusing to let two performers leave the stage.

All over the world, people joined in having watched a defining dance moment on their computers.

The venue was
Blackpool Norbreck
Hotel, the event was
the Crystal Boot
Gala Night and the
performers were Alex
and Jacqueline Glijn.

Laurent speaks to Alex.

To describe the atmosphere that night, after watching two dancers, she in a wheelchair and he able bodied, is impossible to put into words. Electric, emotional, out of this word, redefining, all these descriptives apply. It changed the whole perception of what a dancer can do. Effortless glides, amazing lifts, elegant moves, this was a dance that two able bodied dancers could never equal.

Laurent Saletto: Tell me a little about the two of you please?

Alex Glijn: I am 44 and Jacqueline 34 years old. We are married and we live in Spijkenisse in a small house, part of which is adapted for Jacqueline. I have been working for the last 20 years for the police force and act as a buffer I guess between 15000 civilians and the government. As for Jacqueline, she is trained as a nurse but is unemployed due to her handicap. She does a lot of charity work and keeps our house beautiful. She is truly my better half as I am not always that organized at home!

LS: What is the problem with Jacqueline?

AG: It is a long story. Briefly, she has SLE (Systematic Lupus Erythematosus), an auto immune disease. Her body is producing anti substances against her own system. That means the body is constantly under attack. Sometimes the pain is really difficult to bear and she has not been free of it since she was nine years old.

LS: How does dancing come into this partnership?

AG: I have been dancing since 1988 and Jacqueline was a gymnast before she took ill. After she found herself in a wheelchair she had to find a way to regain some of life's meaning and started wheelchair dancing with a Though they gained Dutch woman champion titles in the amateur classes. Jacqueline's goal always was to reach the top of the world. At the time, I started coaching the ladies and then, one day in 2008 Jacqueline challenged me to dance and compete with her.

After one year we won the highest level. We did win more trophies and we are in the list of the best ten wheelchair dancers in the world.

LS: What is in this for you both?

AG: If we want to live to the fullest and dancing is our life then everything important to me and Jacqueline translates into dancing. I know it does sound unbelievable but we really feel "in love" when we dance with one another and we add to this the emotions the public seem to feel watching us. We try to deliver a message to both able bodied people and people in wheelchairs to eniov each other and eniov music. Don't stay at home and do nothing. Don't think I have a handicap and now it's over. It's not the quality in the sport that matters, it's the way you live your life any way you can.

LS: I must say that I never experienced anything quite like what happened at the CBA that night. A lady came to me afterwards and said that you two had been "a lesson in life".

AG: Lovely words. And though we often get a lovely welcome and appreciation, the reaction at the Crystal Boot night was amazing and took us by surprise. Funny because we had to say no to an important Dutch competition to come



to you but I can't say we regretted our decision.

LS: What are the difficulties you face as a dancing couple? There must be quite a few...

AG: Yes they are. We both have our limitations. With a wheelchair there are no breaking possible, no engine and it can't go sideways. So yes Jacqueline has lots of physical limitations and I am older than lots of dancers I compete against. But we don't look at the things we can't do. Instead, we try to find what we can do best and explore and expand that. Everybody has a specialty. Work with that and create your own identity.

LS: What stood out for me is the obvious devotion you both have for one another translated in your dancing. It never felt "acted" always real...

AG: Yes, well.... My wife is a beautiful woman and that draws attention.! She moves like an angel and her dresses are stunning. She is breathtaking but that's my opinion. Some say the love we have for one another just reaches out and we feel that too sometimes.

LS: I would say both of you are breathtaking. One without the other would not exist on that dance floor... Now, one of your big moments was Holland's Got Talent on Dutch TV. Tell me a little about your involvement in the program?

AG: Though our coach wanted us to get involved, at first we were not that interested.... Could not see how this program would work with our wheelchair dancing. We would have to compete

with different talents all from able bodied candidates. But eventually we thought... why not? Let us use this window as an opportunity for the wheelchair dance sport and any handicap sports. Let's show the world that you can still achieve your goal even though life is not treating you fairly.

So we danced in front of 3.2 million viewers. The result was amazing. Jury member in tears and a crowd that went wild. We made the semi finals. And we got enough votes to get into the finals. We came fourth. But we felt we had won. We had made people realize that having a disability is not a reason enough for people to feel sorry...

LS: What is the future for Alex and Jacqueline?

We want to continue demos like the CBA and would like to do things like documentaries and acting in pop videos.... If people are kind enough to continue inviting us we will come and do what we do best.

LS: What did Blackpool and the CBA mean to you?

AG: It has been said that you never danced until you have been to Blackpool. Our problem though is that wheelchair dancing is not so common in England. But we had to try and go dance at the Blackpool Tower. We actually managed it and it was wonderful. As for the CBA it was just amazing. The organization there was unbelievable and you guys work from the heart. We can only say... We love you all for the time you took in making us welcome and the reactions from everyone there. We can't wait to get back and share our love with you for one and other and for dancing.

LS: We hope to see you again ourselves. And soon too...

AG: Oh you will. Jacqueline and I promise you that!





A Happy Fifth Birthday

Alain Mangenot from Country France gives us the low down on a fab event held near Paris. Certainly looks like a lot of fun and nice to see children not only involved but encouraged to dance.

The Salon Country Western of Cergy Pontoise, in France near Paris, has just had its fifth birthday celebrations and this event is fast becoming a must for many Line dancers

Cergy Pontoise is in the Parisian suburbs and the festival was created five years ago by two Country fans, who love music and dance equally as much. Karine Fournier et Thierry Capdeville decided to bring their passion to the fore and had no idea whether or not it would work. Five years on, at the beginning of February, the site was once again full of visitors, dancers and Country afficionados.

The salon of Cergy Pontoise for France and its organisers a first experience of its kind in the region. They say: « We just wanted to try out something new for the Parisian crowds because in 2008 nothing like this existed. We wanted to merge music, dance and diverse professional services all related to Country in one big meet. We knew we wanted a covered space, fun and happy place where all Country cultures could be together, even down to motorcycles, » They add: « When we organised the very first one, we did not think there would be a follow up but it amazed us straight away. It was a complete success and now we are looking at the sixth event next year which will take place on the 16th and 17th February 2013. »

The accent in this festival of Cergy Pontoise is definitely on the dance aspect of things. With a huge dance floor which can accommodate a large crowd of dancers as well as many teams, and demonstrations which follow one another under the watchful eye of DJ Denys, who has been there since day one, it is easy to see why the Salon is such a winner.

This year's Salon was particularly

remarkable for its youth element. Many children were in teams and presenting demonstrations which thrilled the spectators. The Rollot Country Club for example had a team of 73 with many young dancers present. Others worth a mention were Kids of Western Rodeo Dancers, Escale d'Ecouen, Step Dance 95, le Cheyenne Band of the Servois, Wanted, Handi' Friends and so many more....

Young Country dancers are a brand new sensation on France's dance floors and one that the French Federation FFCLD is particularly keen on. The FFCLD which is this event's partner since its first year is also at the helm of the demonstrations with Jonathan Brice, the main man and responsible in the Paris region. We also particularly liked a demonstration by the world champions UCWDC Hervé et Martine Canonne.

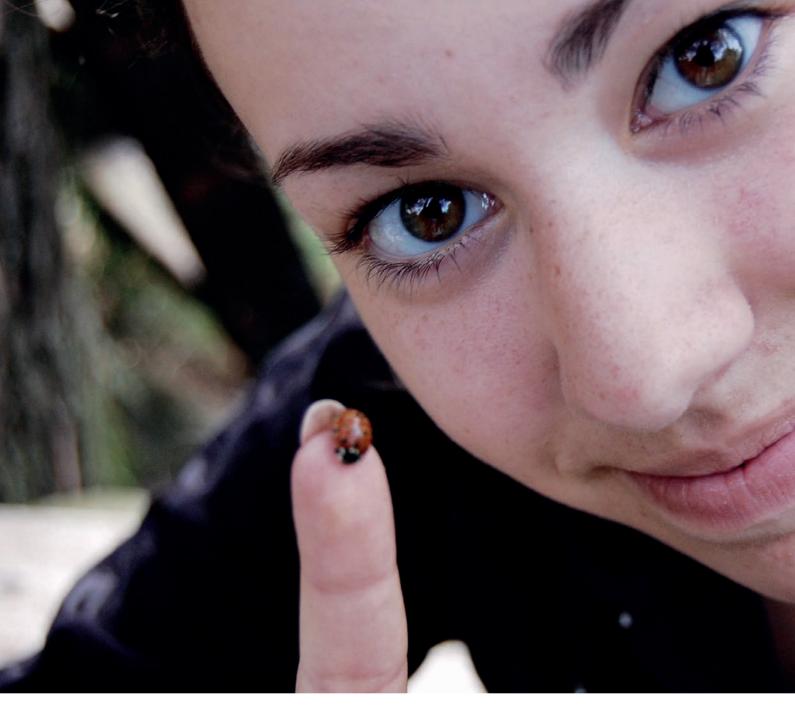
The FFCLD is also behind the organisation of the « cloakroom » with Jonathan Brice where all monies go towards the Robert Wanstreet charity. This year, a cheque of 1317 Euros was the result of their work.

So yes, Country, Line dance and all things Far West are as popular in France as ever. The trick is of course to have very well organised events for the dancers who are becoming more and more sophisticated in their choices of venues. Something that the Salon of Cergy Pontoise is more than aware of and has made one of its priorities as we all witnessed this year.

This IS Gonna Work!

"This Ain't Gonna Work" was the dance that won the Linedancer Magazine 2011 Choreography competition. For the first time, the competition was video based and we received entries from all over the world. The winner was Kristina Liukaityte from Lithuania and Laurent finds out more about this brand new and young talent.



Kristina was born in 1994 in the beautiful town of Ukmerg, in Lithuania. The country is steeped in rich history and the town is no disappointment. Wonderful architecture and friendly locals mean that Kristina still lives there. This is her last year in school and she started Line dancing at the age of 13.

She says: "My Mum encouraged me and I am glad she did!" As for many young dancers, Kristina chose Line dance because it was a very new concept for Lithuania at the time. Because she was so young, it also meant that by not needing a partner and having lessons in the evening she could not only follow but get totally involved in what would soon become a major pastime for her. She managed to easily fit dance in her student life resulting in becoming more and more accomplished until two years later, when in 2009 she took part in the Lithuanian Championships in the Social category.

Kristina says: "I did not get as far as I would have liked but this did not deter me from wanting to do more. And better too!" From then, she made the grade as a newcomer and worked hard for the following couple of years. In 2011 she took part in Denmark's Danish Classics and was thrilled when she became a novice. She says: "Yes I was really pleased. And now it means that this year I can enter the open category at that level."

For her the lure of Line dance is much much more than just dance. Kristina says: "I always wanted to meet new people, make new friends and travel to different parts of the world to take part

in championships....that was always my dream." And as a young dancer, Kristina craves in learning more, truly a lifelong need for her. Every dancer in the world knows how she feels, every dancer tries their best to better themselves each day of their lives. She adds: "I just cannot imagine my life without a regular dose of Line dance in it... it means so much."

Kristina finds it quite difficult at times to find places where she can dance. She says: "I use the local gymnasium Jono Basanaviciaus gimnazija because there are simply not enough clubs around. Especially for teenagers, so I can meet friendly and helpful young dancers there a few times a week..."

She was amazed when she found out she had won the Linedancer competition. "I never thought I really had a chance but it was wonderful for me to get this prize. I have to thank my dance teacher Egidija Merenanu. She is well known in Ukmerg." Egidija is apparently very strict, but fair and Kristina holds her in very high esteem. As a dancer she knows that people like her teacher and other more seasoned dancers help her along the way of success. She says: "Egidija encouraged me to put my name forward for this Choreography Competition and I am very grateful for her."

So what does the future hold for young Kristina Liukaityte? Only time will tell of course but if she fulfills the promise of her winning dance it is hoped she will soon become one of the new choreographers tomorrow and help put her wonderful country forward on the dance floors everywhere.





The International country Music Festival has come back to the UK shores, the first time since 1991. Claire Butterworth sends us her exclusive report for Linedancer on a day of pure heaven for any Country fan!

The International Country Music Festival introduced country music to Britain 45 years ago bringing the biggest stars of country music to Wembley Arena. The show was promoted by the legendary Mervin Con up until 1991 and now by popular demand on Sunday 26th February Mervin presented the music festival once again.

Unlike any other show in Wembley Arena right from the start some of the stars for the day were there to meet and greet everyone as we came through the doors selling their t-shirts and albums themselves, and pleased to sign autographs and have a picture taken including George Ducas, Will Banister and one of Line dancers favourite dance artists Tim McKay.

I had very mixed emotions at this time, I was really excited about what the day was going to bring and at the same time a bit nervous as we knew we'd be meeting big international stars of country music. When Laurent asked myself and Steve Rutter to go to Wembley it was like all my

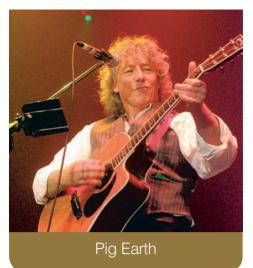
Christmas's had come at once, so I had to soak in everything I could. London to us (especially Steve) is very overwhelming because the population is huge compared to where we live in Shropshire.

The ten hour show was kicked off by Raymond Froggat who entertained the crowds with his sounds. Shortly followed by Sandy Kelly, George Hamilton IV and Tim McKay. Tim fitted in extremely well, he looked like he felt at home up on the smoke filled stage, his professional Nashville sound made him sound just as good as the greats that have been performing in front of 1000's for years. I reckon we will be seeing big things from Tim and his band. Tim has also just announced he will be touring with Dwight Yoakam, Joey and Rory, and also Laura Bell Bundy in Europe this coming June. proving once and for all that Country in the UK is alive and kicking very well.

We were then introduced to 16 year old newcomer Ali Isabella who has just released her first album 'Say You'll Be Mine'. Ali told us she had written most







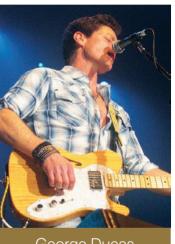

songs on the album, an impressive achievement for someone of such a young age.

The atmosphere at this time was rocking with more and more people filling the arena every minute in time for the big acts of the day, but before that we were amazed by some more great talent like Irish great John McNicholl, as well as artists from the U.S.A, like Will Banister, Jo-el Sonnier, George Ducas and Narvel Felts.

By this time most people had been sat glued to their seats for nearly five hours wowed by the sensations that Mervin had bought to the UK, but the best was yet to come. Asleep At The Wheel the now seven piece western-swing band who most of us would know for 'House of Blue Lights' had the crowds jumping for an hour, before we were introduced to one of the headliners for the day Lonestar, who have had twenty seven hit singles and ten number ones. These guys had the arena going wild, with everyone on their feet singing and dancing while they beat out some of their top hits. Following Lonestar was the legendary Ricky Skaggs fourteen times Grammy award winner famous for his blue grass sound.

Ending the best country music festival I have ever seen was the one and only Reba McEntire and as you can imagine the crowd went wild! She had the whole arena filled with an amazing atmosphere, which could be described as "electric", she sang songs which she said the band hadn't done in a while. Amongst them favourites like 'Because of You', 'Till He Loves Me' and 'Why Haven't I Heard From You' truly shone. Reba went on to tell everyone that she loved her experience in the UK and had filmed for the popular TV show 'Who Do You Think You Are'. Apparently she had found her seven times Great Grandad and he was from Macclesfield! In conclusion, Mervin Con had definitely pulled out all the stops to organise this day of pure Country Heaven.... For those who were present it will be a day never to be forgotten.

Lonestar are a Country Music group from America who made their debut on the Billboard Country Music charts with "Tequila Talking" Since then they have had 27 singles in the Country charts including 10 number ones, one of which being "Amazed" which was at number one for eight weeks. We know this better for the dance Amazing Faith by Rob Fowler. The band consists of Richie McDonald, Keech Rainwater, Dean Sams and Michael Britt.

While at Wembley Claire and Steve had the chance to go and interview the band.

CB: You've been together for 20 years how does it feel to be back after such a long time?

Dean Sams: Actually it feels great! This band has been through so much, it's funny... Richie just ran into some guy recently who had bought our van that we travelled all through the United States and Canada. We put over 100,000 miles on that thing, and to think we've gone from those days and now being able to do things like come over here to London and sing for 12,000 people in Wembley arena, what an amazing ride it's been. But the greatest part about this is that we're not done yet, were in the process of writing a new record, and after a four year absence Richie is back where he belongs with the band and it's just really exciting.

CB: Has being back at Wembley lived up to your expectations?

Dean Sams: For me I didn't know what to expect. All the historic amazing acts that have been here over the years is a daunting thought... there's so much talent that have played these halls and to think that we now get to be among them is pretty incredible. I didn't know how the fans would react to us but as you could see by the last song everyone standing on their feet, I don't know what we waited 11 years to come back for but I think it should be an annual event.

CB: Are you nervous or excited about bringing new material out?

Richie McDonald: We're excited you know, I think we set the bar very high with Amazed all these years ago. We all feel the same about the music that we recorded and any of the new songs could be hits. We're excited to get back into the recording studio in March and finish the new project. The songs are about life, love and hopefully they are songs that people can relate to. That's the big thing about Amazed, that's what struck a chord with all the fans. This was a song that reached out and touched the world, and hopefully there's another one of those in the new batch.

CB: What have you guys been up to in London?

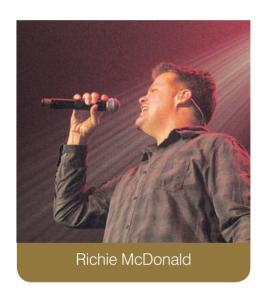
Michael Britt: We went sightseeing, we walked all the way from Sheperd's Bush to where Big Ben is, it's about a six mile walk, we've tried to see as much as we can, we only have about a couple of days to chill so we have to cram it all in.

CB: On the next album your bring out, how much of it will be your own material?

Keech Rainwater: Well, right now, we've recorded four songs, two of which we have co-written and two that are outside songs. The great thing is we're trying to work together now more than ever. We must not forget though that Amazed was written by some national song writers and we're never close minded about other song writers because there's some great songs out there regardless of where they've come from. The truth is we're trying to do a bit of everything on our own and with the song writers.

Pedro

Pedro, a name known by the vast majority of country couples, swing and Line dancers all over the world.

Pedro is a legend and one of the rare people in our community to be known by his first name alone.

But who is he and why has he remained so popular for so long?

Maureen Jessop investigates....



As with many of us, Pedro, formally a champion breakdancer, discovered Country line dance by accident in the early 1990's and became addicted. Possessing a natural talent as a dancer he quickly began competing as part of a team then as a solo Line dancer, eventually becoming the very first UCWDC Male Superstar, a title he kept for three years. Some say that his style of dancing, certainly inspired by breakdance, completely revolutionised Line dancing.

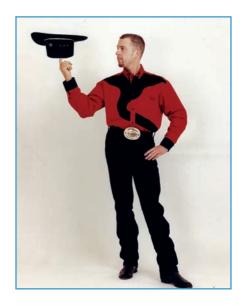
With an outgoing, larger than life personality, always seeking to make the activity fun, the charismatic young man could not be ignored. Very soon he was in demand as an instructor choreographing such hits as Mambo #5 and Jungle Freak, he travelled far and wide. Looking through dance magazines

from the late '90's and early 2000's, there is hardly an issue where his name is not mentioned. He became a familiar face at European festivals and events such as the CBA's, adding his amazing spotlight performances to his workshop schedules.

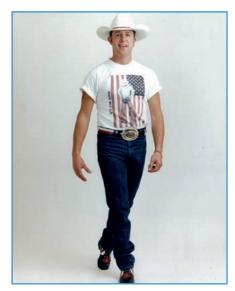
It was about this time that Pedro, together with Rob Fowler, Rachael McEnaney and many of the British and Dutch Champion dancers of the time formed the performance troupe, Superstars Productions to tour around Britain. The same team then went on to form the competitive organisation Masters In Line. Recently he was a codirector of the Dutch event The Tulip Challenge. But Pedro is always on the lookout for new challenges.

While still in demand as an EmCee, he no longer teaches or choreographs and even seems to have hung up his dancing boots. Through his ability to reinvent himself he has found a new niche in which to serve the dance community, that of providing one of the most important tools a dancer can have – a decent dance floor.

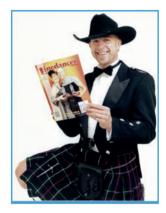
He got into this business by accident. Having helped lay other peoples floors at competitive events he got the idea that he could do the same for himself,













and being a dancer, would know better just what a floor should be. Setting out from scratch he learnt all there was to know about building floors. The best sort of adhesives, best kind of wood, edgings etc. got himself a huge truck for transportation, and he was in business. Now living in England with his lovely Scottish wife Tracy, he regularly crosses Europe to install his dance floors for all kinds of dance events

Pedro, has the faculty of learning very quickly, with the ability to see and understand the heart of a problem or task and find a solution, he is a man of many talents. One of his other his new challenges is to organise his very own event in his family's country of origin, Portugal. This has been a dream of Pedro's for many years. I can confirm this as he mentioned it in an interview I did with him 14 years ago! Now, the dream is coming true.

The event is calling upon all of Pedro's talents as an organiser. Set by the sea in the lovely village of San Martinho do Porto between Lisbon and Porto, the event offers a weekend of Line dance 14-16 September followed by a weekend of West Coast Swing 21-23 September. A star studded cast of performers and instructors from Europe and the USA will be in attendance. Dancers may

participate in one or both weekends and enjoy a beach or sightseeing week in between. True to Pedro's party attitude, pool, pub and other party nights are on offer. The traditional Saturday Night Show promises to be a blast. Pedro, using his persuasive skills, has retained the local bullring for the show and open dancing, very much a first for an event.

Line dance does not seem to have penetrated Portugal as much as in other countries and with that in mind Pedro wishes his event to be open to the local people, especially the Saturday Night Show, so they can also enjoy the fun to be found in our activity.

Pedro admits to being driven. What drives him? 'Making people smile, happy, entertained!' he tells me. These events promise to do all that. He has a passion for events which he claims comes from his father who was the president of the Portuguese Club of Washington DC. He already has plans for next year, hoping to add latin, street and jive to the programme.

On his Facebook wall, Pedro has almost 5000 'friends'. They probably are real friends too, because another secret of his success is the fact that despite all his accolades he has always remained a very approachable person. At events,

he likes nothing better than to chat and joke with dancers, he loves people. And people love him as they have always done. And that is what makes him a legend of today and of tomorrow.

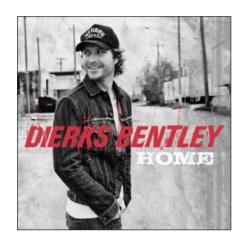

Opening number *Am I The Only One* (82bpm) is a butt kickin' anthem with solid guitar riffs, banjo picking and a solid dance beat.

Gonna Die Young (94bpm) this too is a power packed track laced with fiddle and steel and Dierks shows how effortlessly he can belt out a

Tip It On Back (72bpm) although this song is nightclub two step in style it is by no means a gentle ballad and on that basis it could interest choreographers to write to it.

Home (110pm) here Dierks changes the mood completely with the title which is a steady harmonious number with a powerful backing.

Diamonds Make Babies (116bpm) has the potential to be a massive dance hit, it's a cha cha with some fun, tongue in cheek lyrics that are guaranteed to have folks singing along. Brilliant!

In My Head (122bpm) we have another cha cha which is an altogether bouncier number and once again I can see this song being very popular with dancers. **Breathe You In** (74bpm) Dierks bares his soul on this stunning song which is a wonderful nightclub two step and is sure to delight those of you who like a nice smooth dance.

The Woods (84bpm) this is a track I really like, it has a staccato beat, meaningful lyrics and superb vocal delivery from this fine artist.

When You Gonna Come Around (72bpm) is a beautiful duet with Karen Fairchild of Little Big Town and I absolutely love this gorgeous nightclub two step song.

5-1-5-0 (118/236bpm) we switch back to a country rocker on this uber cool track which blows your socks off, think Big & Rich meet The Rolling Stones and you will get an idea, a cracking two step track.

Heart Of A Lonely Girl (84bpm) in complete contrast we have a track with superb backing of banjo, fiddle, steel and awash with acoustic guitars. It's got a great dance beat and it's another track I really love.

Dierks finale comes courtesy of **Thinking Of You** (112bpm) a beautiful song with beautiful harmonies and a little twist at the end as when the song fades out it comes back with Dierks three year old daughter singing her daddy's song.

This is a brilliant album from a very fine artist, there are several really good dance tracks, the production is first class and you may find yourself hitting the repeat button as you won't want it to stop.

Geva Avalon Get Closer

Geva Avalon is a blues/folk/rock singer/ songwriter from Israel whose music is likened to that of his biggest influence Neil Young. Geva has been support act for Paul Weller in the States and his album now gets a UK release.

There are a few dance tracks that may be of interest; *Here Comes The Tune* (110bpm) which is a rich sounding waltz track; *Help Me Girl* (90bpm) which is a good track musically; *Come Race Me* (80bpm) has a very different sound that could tempt someone to write to it; *The Wind Whispers* (64bpm) Geva's powerful vocal make this nightclub two step a delight to listen to; *I Can See The Stars* (70bpm) is another nightclub two step with a haunting melody and sticking with the celestial theme;

Comet (102bpm) a pleasant number with a steady beat

Geva delivers several listening tracks; *The Folks Back Home* (64bpm) is a powerful track with an excellent musical backing; *Fade Away With You* (72bpm) is somewhat of a dark number; *Green Valley* (94bpm) is a very deep and meaningful song and finally *Get Closer Now* (60bpm) which starts off gently but crescendos into a powerful track on which Geva belts out the vocal.

There is no doubt that Geva Avalon is a very fine singer songwriter. This is not the most exciting album from a dance point of view however, musically it is a fine album and if you like the folk/rock genre then this may be right up your street.

Country singer/songwriter Jill Johnson is from Sweden and if like me, you were lucky enough to go to Toby Keith's recent UK tour, you will have seen Jill as support act. I was introduced to her music some years back whilst working in that beautiful country. Jill's latest album now gets a release in the UK.

The notable dance tracks are; *Flirting With Disaster* (120bpm) a super west coast swing track that immediately showcases this artist's talents; *What's A Little Rain* (62bpm) has a strong cha cha beat; *Roll My Way* (108bpm) is a song I really like with a good solid beat that could make an interesting dance track; Jill seems to like nightclub two steps as there are few including *While You're Sleeping* (68bpm); *Didn't Wanna Let You Go* (72bpm); *I'm Never Far* (78bpm); *The Sound Of*

Leaving (74bpm); Used To Think He was Everything (74bpm) and Dreaming Me Away (66bpm).

Jill sings some beautiful ballads; *I'm Awake Now* (76bpm) on which Jill's voice is amazing; *When We Had It So Good* (54bpm) demonstrating Jill's excellent songwriting skills and bonus track *Song To Heaven* (82bpm) an absolute peach of a track that could have graced any Nashville album.

This album started out with some country rockers which seemed to set the tone but after a few tracks the mood of the album changed completely. Having said that it's the best country album I have ever heard from a European artist and I highly recommend it to you.

Vince Gill is a country superstar with an incredible 19 Grammies and 18 CMA Awards. Vince's last studio album 'These Days' was a four CD box set back in 2006 and as he has provided lots of music for Line dancing over the years it will be interesting to see what he has come up with here.

The dance tracks include; *Guitar Slinger* (1150bpm) a superb rocky east coast swinger which will have you all dancing soon; *Tell Me Fool* (96bpm) is a bluesy number with a good dance beat and great harmonies; *Threaten Me With Heaven* (68bpm) a smooth nightclub two step; *When The Lady Sings The Blues* (88bpm) think 'Swing Your Chains' for this one; *When Lonely Comes Around* (108bpm) is a cha cha on which Vince's voice is outstanding; *True Love* (102bpm) is an absolutely

beautiful waltz on which Vince is joined by daughter Sarah; *Billy Paul* (88bpm) has a nice beat and Vince's 10yr old daughter Corrina harmonizes with dad and lastly there are a couple of waltz tracks, *The Old Lucky Diamond Motel* (114bpm) which is a little lively and *Buttermilk John* (84bpm) which sounds a lot like Amazing Grace.

Vince delivers some gorgeous listeners; *Who Wouldn't Fall In Love With You* (65bpm) a beautiful song; *Bread And Water* (62bpm) a Gospel flavoured song on which Vince uses his full vocal range and lastly *If I Die* (62bpm) a somewhat melancholy song but a good one nonetheless.

This is a great album with lots of dance tracks to suit all preferences and for me is without doubt one of Vince Gill's best albums ever.







Dancing has always been Juliet Lam's passion. Many of you have viewed Juliet's teaching videos and have enjoyed her clear demonstrations and detailed step by step instructions. Dawn Middleton finds out more about the lady herself.

Juliet was born and raised in the beautiful country of Taiwan. She comes from a large family and has three brothers and two sisters. Juliet looks back: "My late father was a retired Air Force Colonel, while Mom was a beautiful and pleasant homemaker. She is a healthy 86 year old and living in the San Francisco area. I am married with two sons and two grandchildren, a boy aged three and a half and a girl of 23 months."

After graduating from Law School at the Soochow University in Taipei, Juliet went to the USA to further her legal education. "In May 1976 I graduated and earned a JD (Juris Doctor) degree from Southern Methodist University in Dallas." She now lives in Richardson, a city in Dallas in the State of Texas and is very proud of where she lives. "Richardson is an affluent inner suburb of Dallas and was ranked as the 18th best place to live in the U.S. and in a report on the 'Best Places to Raise Kids', was ranked second in Texas. I have lived here since July 1999. Line dance is quite popular in Dallas, there are many Senior

Centres, Community Colleges, private clubs and studios that offer all levels of Line dance classes. I believe that Line dance is not only good for your body but it's great for your mind."

"I was introduced to Line dancing by my friends in 2002 at a Christmas party and I quickly developed a great passion for it and soon became addicted. I started attending classes in 2003 and in 2007 I became an instructor at the local Church. An unexpected turn of events then led to me taking over my friend's Line dance classes at the Chinese Community Centre in Richardson. Unfortunately her health prevented her from teaching any longer. I have been teaching and learning Line dance ever since."

Juliet has gone on to win various awards, among them are 'Dancer's Choice Award 2010' for 'The Regional Instructor Of The Year'; 'Dancer's Choice Award 2010' for 'The Best Internet Video Teach Of The Year'; Linedancer Magazine Choreography Competition 2011 - Winner of Beginner Category.

"I really enjoy what I have been doing and my children have told me that they are very thrilled that I have found my passion. I have been choreographing since August 2008 and I dedicated my first dance 'Happy Dancing' to my grandson. I wanted to show how happy I was welcoming the new addition to the Lam family. I enjoy all kinds of music, especially Latin and modern music and I like to try different styles of dances. However, I prefer Nightclub Two Step, Waltz, Cha Cha, Rumba and Samba."

Juliet has a YouTube following of close to 3,000 subscribers and I ask her what keeps her going. "I have been teaching for the past four and a half years and posting my video demonstrations for the past three and a half. I have made many, many friends and supporters, that's the real prize and reward I will treasure forever. As I often tell my students, "If dancing is your passion, then teaching you is all mine."

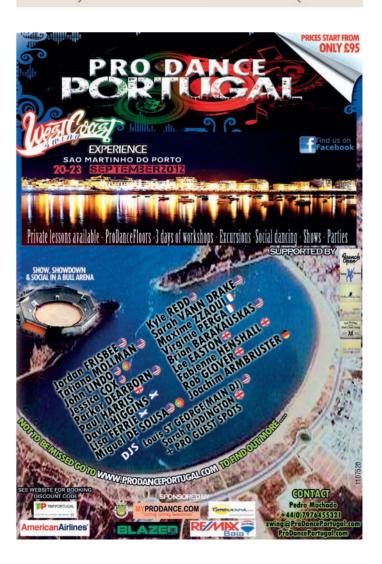

So often we hear that Line dancers were 'dragged' to their first class ending up being totally devoted to Line dance. Choreographer, Karl-Harry Winson is no exception and Dawn Middleton finds out a little more about this exciting new name.

23 year old Karl is from Bournemouth and started Line dancing exactly ten years ago. He told Linedancer: "I began Line dancing when my mum had a group of Line dancers at her Country and Western themed 50th birthday party. She enjoyed it so much she asked if I would join her in going to Line dance classes." Karl's first thought was: "Are you kidding? I'm 13 years old and don't really want to go Line dancing with my mum". She 'dragged' the young lad along anyway. "I remember a Beginner class was set up particularly because mum wanted to start Line dancing so we both went round locally and recruited people to come along and join us. I didn't really know what to expect the first time I went along but I do remember the first dance I learnt was 'California Freeze' and from that moment I was hooked. Other favourites of mine when I started included: 'Elvira Freeze', 'Tush Push' and 'Native American'."

Unfortunately, some time later the class had to close. So, not wanting to give up this new hobby that he had kept up for more than six weeks, Karl stayed with the same group but moved to their Intermediate class. "I felt that I was still a Beginner. I remember seeing so many great dances at classes and socials that I would want to learn and took the liberty to teach myself from the step sheets, dances like 'Mysterious Girl', 'Some Girls', 'Chill Factor' and 'The Beast'."

"My passion for Line dancing grew and a few years later I had the idea of teaching people and I thought I could do a pretty good job of it. I started training and every so often would teach a dance to the class I attended for experience, the first dance I ever taught was 'Nothing But Taillights' but what happened next was very unexpected and sudden. In 2006 my instructor, Roger Swansbrough, who ran the club Marshals Line Dancing,

unfortunately died in a car accident which then left Marshals without a leader and an instructor for some of their classes. It was then that I was asked to step in and take over." The rest, as they say, is history.

Karl adds: "Six years later I am still running the classes and have started up a number of other level classes which are well attended and I think Roger would have been proud that the club is still running. My dance partner Liz and I now run the club under the name Dance & Funk's Modern Liners and hold regular classes, socials and tea dances in Dorset."

It was just after Karl started Line dancing that he also joined the Stagecoach theatre school in Bournemouth, as his main ambition at the time was to be on the West End stage. "I remember being in a dance class at Stagecoach and they told us to do a Grapevine, Chasse and a Kick-Ball Change step and I would be











thinking "I have done this step before at Line dancing". I think it was Line dance that helped me with my confidence on the stage and dancing in front of others as within Line dance you have so many different steps and styles I could incorporate that with what I was doing at the time."

After three years at Brockenhurst College on the performing arts course Karl went on to University to earn a BA (Hons) Degree in Musical Theatre last year. "Since finishing my degree I started to teach singing at theatre schools to young people who have the same ambition as I. One of the schools is Stagecoach, where I started. I also worked at other schools, taking workshops, choreographing musicals such as West Side Story and Hairspray and teaching children who have the same passion in the theatre. My next piece of theatre work is on the other side of the stage. I am in the process of directing and choreographing a musical concert which will take place this November at Poole Lighthouse Theatre, entitled 'The Legends' based on the legendary music. musicals and composers of the musical theatre world. With a cast of over 50 this will be quite a challenge but one that I am looking forward to. At the moment I am also enjoying being involved in work for TV as an 'extra', recently being involved in documentaries for the Discovery Channel and also auditioning for the new feature film 'Les Misérables'.

Choreography has always been a passion for me and I remember listening to the song, 'I Heard It Through The Grapevine' by Marvin Gaye and thought a Line dance could go well to this song. I remember trying out certain steps to fit the music and wrote them down as a step sheet and sent it off to Linedancer Magazine in 2007. I was delighted when they said they would like to publish 'Through The Grapevine', this was the start of many dances to come.

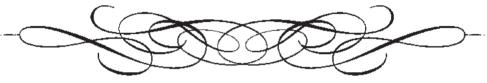
One of my many highlights came a few years ago when I met Robbie McGowan Hickie in Torquay. He asked me what dance I was dancing and I told him, 'My Lady Soul', which was one of my latest dances at the time. He then said he would like to take the dance away with him and asked for the step sheet. He also invited me to choreograph a dance with him, I was honoured and in shock that he would put faith in me to write a dance alongside him. I thank Robbie a lot for helping me in the Line dance world, for encouraging me with the choreography

and for helping me get my face out there. We've since choreographed a few dances together but the one I am most proud of is 'Unpredictable' which reached number one in the Linedancer Magazine chart. So I thank Robbie for taking a chance on me and trusting me."

One thing that we can predict is that Karl is going all the way to the top. Having been booked for numerous workshops this year and next, the bright, young choreographer can't see himself doing anything else. "Line dancing is such an amazing form of dance and I am very proud to be part of it. Even though I have a strong passion for theatre, I don't think anything comes close to my passion for Line dancing. The way I think it has evolved over the years with its music, steps and global interest is fascinating. You get to meet so many amazing people and watching them dance your dance and having FUN is the highlight of it all. I was made aware of this when at this year's Linedancer Crystal Boot Awards I saw a room full of people dancing 'Jealousy', what an amazing feeling! When you see people enjoying what you have created, certainly makes it all worthwhile and that's the main thing. Enjoy it and have fun!

MG: Ghislain, this is the tenth year for the Line dance Show. What are vour first impressions of this 2012

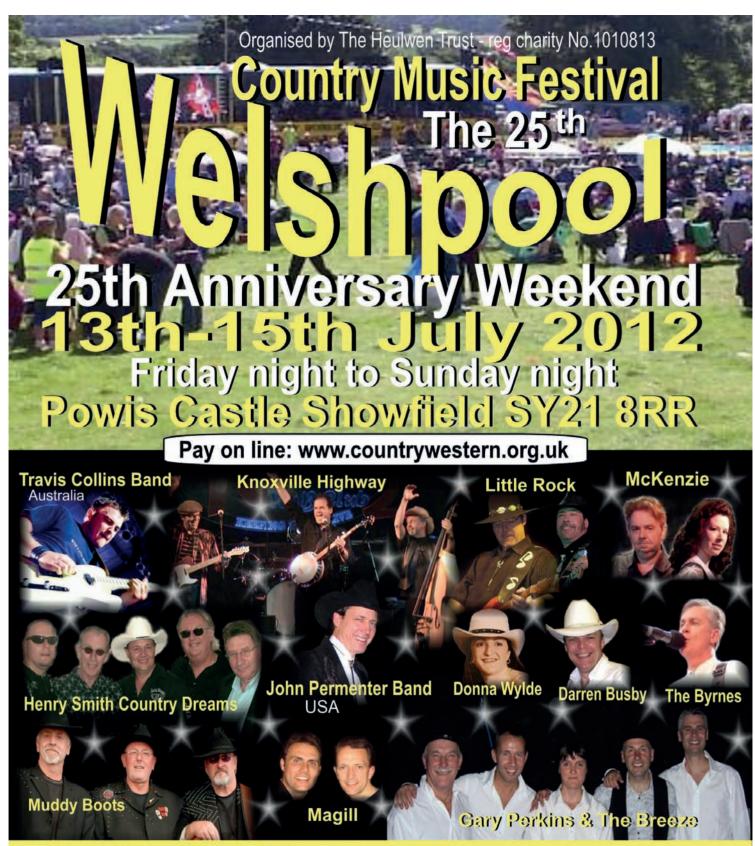

We have long believed at the Crystal Boot Awards that the Gala evening is a great way of showcasing not just Line dance but dance in general. From modern to tap and from ballroom to comedy, our audience have well and truly seen it all. Joanna Brown has been a guest at the Crystal Boot a few times and always leaves the audience spellbound with her grace and agility in her chosen style of contemporary dance.

Joanna comes from Fife, from the town of Glenrothes to be more precise and has travelled a little namely working on the Isle of Wight and in Paris for a while.

She is currently shaping a career in the demanding hospitality trade at the prestigious Wellsgreen Golf Range but for her, dance will always be the first love and the passion that drives her life.

She says: "I am told I have always danced. Almost as soon as I could walk, I would move to music and copy dance

steps I saw on television." And indeed it started very early for Joanna.

She laughs when she remembers that when she was two, the big love of her life was "The Singing Kettle", a Fife based children's entertainment group. From that childhood fixation, good things did follow. When she reached the grand old age of 12, Joanna joined an After School dance class and performed with them on several occasions.

She says: "This was really a big step for me. I was doing something concrete about what I loved and I was so lucky that my dance teacher was so very encouraging and actually chose me to choreograph dances for the performances."

From The Singing Kettle days, Joanna's idols have changed a fair bit. She laughs

again and says: "Yes well, I am not two anymore. I love dancers that I can watch and admire not just for their talent but for the work they do to get where they are, their dedication really. People like Glenn Ball, Adam Garcia and Kimberly Wyatt are up there for me." So it is no real surprise to also realise that Joanna's favourite dance styles are Jazz and Contemporary.

She says:"I am definitely better suited to these styles and understand as well as enjoy performing the type of movement in those genres." She adds: "I also love choreographing so again, these are the genres in which I am at my most comfortable. And I also have to admit a real penchant for Hip Hop."

Today, Joanna is a member of a dance group called "Attitude Dance" and is able to take part in dance competitions with the group, namely in Hip Hop, Disco and Jazz.

She trawls the internet and the national press for auditions and shows she would like to be part of. "I am a bit choosy which may or may not be a good thing but I will find something I really want to do one day. It will be dancing for sure!"

She is forever grateful to Betty Drummond for the CBA opportunity given to her over the last few years. She says: "I remember being first invited to perform when I was 16, just after I started Dance College in Dundee. It was a wonderful opportunity for me to choreograph a dance to the theme for that year, which was Disney - another subject which is close to my heart!" For

Joanna the atmosphere at the Awards is always fantastic and she is grateful when the people from the audience have taken the time to compliment her on her great routines. Her favourite performance is this very latest one, the 2012 CBA. She says: "I feel I have improved so much as a performer and of course to dance while Gareth Gates was singing was a magical moment." A love song was the right choice as Joanna loves choreographing routines to slower songs. She says: "You see, ballads and love songs allow me to express myself through the music."

Why Gareth? She replies with a smile: "Ah well, in my teens, I was a big Gareth Gates fan and choreographed dances to several of his songs.". She wanted to really create an impression this year, conscious of the WOW factor the evening always has. "I suggested the "Strictly Come Dancing" type performance where an artist sings on stage while a dancer or dancers interpret their song through

movement. When Gareth agreed to be part of this year's CBAs, he was asked if I could join him and he said YES!". She credits her family for the support they have shown her throughout her dancing life. "My Dad facilitated the Gareth Gates thing for me and I will always be grateful to him. I am a lucky girl, I know that!" And like every young dancer in the world Joanna has plans for her future. "I would be privileged to get the opportunity to work with any other artists in the future. I would love to be able to choreograph more dances to well known artists songs.... I really enjoyed the CBA performance."

Joanna Brown is a young lady and her dance talent matches her dreams. The reality of the profession is a tough one for sure but if you reach for the stars as she is planning to do, you may very well, one day, become the dance name of tomorrow. Joanna is certainly on her way to achieve excellence on a dance floor or a stage near you soon.



It all began back in September 2011 when Sarah Jayne, who is considered one of the leading tribute acts to the country music legend, was offered the job of meeting and greeting guests at a Dolly Parton concert in London's 02 arena. "I was so excited and when we arrived I changed into my Dolly costume to look the part. On waiting to meet the queen of country, we were introduced to Steve Summers, Dolly's costume designer, who complemented me on my dress! I told him it was a replica and he said 'Yes I know I designed it!' with a huge grin on his face."

Sarah Jayne then got the moment she had been waiting for, the meeting with Dolly. "We were taken backstage and the band were standing around waiting to take their positions on stage. Dolly then appeared from a walkway from her tour bus. Dressed in a light purple sequined dress with her immaculate hair, long red nails and the purest of skin she stood in front of us, held

her hand out and said 'Oh my you look wonderful. Thank you for dressing up again and coming here tonight.' I thanked her for giving me my lifestyle and career because, without Dolly my life would have taken an unknown path."

Sarah Jayne then met a lady who inspired her just as much as Dolly herself, Natalie Turnbull, the UK director of Imagination Library, Dolly's charity that gives free books to children.

"We had spoken previously," says Sarah, "and I was aware of the work she does for Dolly's Charity but to meet by chance here made a moment in history for me and my family."

The Imagination Library was set up by Dolly in 1996 initially to benefit the children of her home county in East Tennessee, USA. The aim is to provide children with high quality, age-appropriate books by mailing them directly to their homes. Dolly wanted children to be excited about books and she wanted to ensure that every child would have books, regardless of their

family's income. Already statistics and independent reports have shown Dolly Parton's Imagination Library drastically improves early childhood literacy for children enrolled in the program. Further studies have shown improved scores during early literacy testing.

This is where Sarah's promise comes in as she told Dolly she would do all she could to help her make this charity a success in the areas needing it most in the UK.

She has kept her word and organised two events to raise money for the charity which she would love Linedancer readers to get involved with.

Sarah adds, "There is simply no limit on how far we can take this program and to all ends of the earth. We would be so grateful to anyone who can help make it a success and being books to children in the UK."

You may remember Jessica when we reviewed her first album a few months ago and here she is again with her second 'Loving This Day,' a mix of pop and soul perfect to see you through the summer.









The talented US singer suffered many knock backs on her journey to stardom, many of which she puts down to her curvy size, and almost gave it all up until she was accepted on pop TV series American Idol. Although she didn't make it all the way Paula Abdul said to Jessica, "We'll see your name in lights one day." Ever since then Jessica has had the confidence to get out there and show everyone how talented she really is, first singing the National Anthem for her hockey team and becoming an icon within the gay community who loved her right from the beginning.

Jessica says, "I was held back from singing solo in the high school choir simply because the teacher forbade me, even though hoards of people were petitioning for me to have the part. People have always judged me because of my weight. Somebody once told me that putting on make-up wouldn't help – I was fat and nothing would hide that. I've had challenges in my life that have tried to halt my passion. A weaker person would have crumbled, but that just made me more determined".

'Loving This Day,' is an upbeat, colourful album which isn't too dissimilar to the likes of Vanessa Williams and Shanice with its up-tempo 80's sound. 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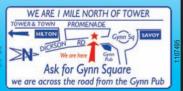
