#### 2. Dance Interactive Pages (DIPs)


This unique resource is full of helpful information relating to each dance.

Besides the basic header information like name, counts, levels, walls etc. it shows all the facts relating to the dance and interacts with users. On the Dance Interactive Page you can see the following facts:

#### **VOTES AND CHARTS**

- From the DIP we show you where a dance is in the charts and it's level.
- You can make a "quick" vote for the dance with the oneclick Vote Button.
- You can follow the link to the charts and look up everyone who has voted for that dance.





Dance Reviews

#### REVIEWS

- At the top of the DIP a display shows how many written reviews have been left for the dance. Click on the number and it will display them all. You can also see who left the reviews.
- It asks if you would like to leave a review of your own and takes you to Review Form.
- It also displays the overall star rating for the dance.

#### **TEACHING SURVEY**

- You can see who has taught the dance and where they are from. The Teaching Survey shows the dances taught within the last 30 days, (the same as the charts).
- If you have stated that you are an instructor (on your profile page) you are then asked if you have taught the dance, so you can take part in the Teaching Survey too.

#### **DIP EXTRAS**

- The DIP shows all the videos for the dance (and allows you to upload your own).
- It allows you to search for other dances to the same track of music.
- You can link to iTunes and Amazon to buy the song.
- You can share the dance via email, Twitter and FaceBook.
- You can let us know if there is something wrong and we'll fix it.



# Linedancer launched in Southport



Betty Drummond and Steve Healy hosted a special Line dance event in Southport where a couple of hundred new line dancers enjoyed the day dancing to Dave Sheriff and watching nineteen year old European Line Dance Champion, Alan Clarke demonstrated 'Fever.'

Betty announced she was launching a magazine for Line dancers and held up subscription forms. A stampede of dancers joined the queue to sign up for membership and Linedancer Magazine was born.

In issue one, Linedancer used a unique script format for the first time making dances easier to learn. It was called Stepping Off The Page. They cause a sensation.

The first Grapevine appears

with news that "Peter Fairhead and Jane Matthews from Neon Moon are to start American Line dancing at the Adelphi, Sheffield's newest nightspot."

In the same issue the British Line dance championships tour is announced. Co-producer Steve Crosby says: "The great appeal of Line dancing is that it's choreographed for the public... We want to provide enjoyable entertainment, nationwide It's June 1996, and the Spice Girls are making headlines as Britain's best girl group and a brand new hobby called Line dance is starting to get noticed worldwide. In the UK, the IRA bomb blasts Manchester city centre, Prince Charles and Diana, Princess of Wales get divorced and Mad Cow Disease hits Britain (BSE). No wonder that a hobby based on feeling happy and upbeat is so well received.

In the next edition dance legend Liz Clarke is the Teacher Feature. Liz explains that she come across Line dance 11 years previously "If you leave with a smile on your feet as well as your face, then that's what Line dancing is all about."

The same issue gives the lowdown on the best boots to wear for dancing and Linedancer magazine advocates that, "It's fun to look the part and get more involved!

We team up with Dave Sheriff who sponsors our first Line Dance Choreography Competition which attracts hundreds of entries. Dave donates £500 in prize money and we agree to publish the best dances. Christina Brown enters her dance called - Red Hot Salsa. How will she do?

On the March cover is a young Scott Lawler and inside we interview Lyndon and Mona Foster teachers for overten years and famously accredited with launching the dancing career of Rob Fowler. Lyndon recounted his first meeting with Rob "Let's just say he'd had little too much of the brandy butter and came along to take the mickey" he jokes. "We challenged him to dance the California Freeze, Rob was so taken with it he stopped larking around and stayed for the rest of the week". So this is how Fowler found his feet.

You needed sunglasses to look at the May cover with its flags, an ornate carousels, a brightly coloured background and Scooter Lee in a vivid yellow jumper. It was a tad overwhelming to say the least! (The cover not the jumper)

Thanks to Alison Biggs and her ChildLine charity initiative we have Esther Rantzen on the cover launching an appeal which escalated into a massive campaign of events and socials up and down the country.

We introduce a new column "The Truth Is..." by Scooter. Her first topic is about copyright and as always Scooter nails it. She says: "If you plan to play it... you have to pay it!"

The lovely face of Kimber Clayton smiles out from cover in August 97. "Jose Cuervo's wild and sassy singer would sadly die aged 38 in 2006.

In October, we announced the first Linedancer awards show. Betty told readers "You've heard of the Oscars, the Grammy, the Tony, the Emmy - what should we call ours? In the same issue a tiny note appeared in the Grapevine about Linedancer's new website.

In November, A new group called Steps release their first song '5,6,7,8' and Rodeo Ruth Lampden creates a dance of the same name. It was hoped something big would happen....and of course it didn't get much bigger than 5,6,7,8.

We reported on the British Line dancing championships held in Wembley Arena, a spectacular event where 5,000 people danced the day away. At the same event CMR (Country Music Radio) surprised Betty with an award for her Outstanding Contribution to Line dance.







The Dunn family made the cover of December 97 edition. In their article the three-generation dancing family says: "Five year old Siobhan is a born Line dancer, she choreographs her steps as she dances, her interpretation of music is unique and a delight for others to watch."

And finally, in the Grapevine we publish a photograph of Debbie Hogg with a group of totally naked line dances taken at a nudist camp.

Debbie said "I learnt a lot that morning but no new dances! I haven't been able to teach a shimmy or thrust since without thinking of the 25 nudist doing Black Coffee" We think that would be a site to behold.

At the Floral Hall in Southport Dave Sheriff, Chris Hodgson and John Sandham were the judges at the live final of the Choreography Competition. So many great dances to choose from, they placed Red Hot Salsa at number six! As the passage of time shows, the dancing public out voted them good style on that one!

Money is rolling in for the ChildLine appeal. The February editions reports £36,000 raised so far including £5,000 from Heroes and Villains in Cheltenham,

£2500fromSouthWalesValleyStompers.£2000formMiddlesexDancin'Linewithmore to come.

Bouquet Corner - is filled with thank messages. you Jane Marsden congratulates Graham Mackey on passing his D & G exams. Hank and Denise Hall from Cardiff are thanked by class members Angela, Carole and Eileen for making fun and Frank

World news was dominated by the Clinton and Lewinski scandal. The Good Friday Peace Agreement brought an end to 30 years of conflict in Northern Ireland and Linedancer Magazine floats a 'Titanic' from Australia and takes Line dancing to 'Dizzy' new heights.

Mitchell from the Isle of Man is praised by dancer Sarah Nelson.

Robert and Regina Padden appear on the March cover with their Crystal Boot award for Electric Reel which won Dance of the Year 1997. We also meet Peter Metelnick for the first time and it was clear this young guy was going places.

In May we meet 'An American In Paris, non other than Robert Wannstreet who graciously tips his hat to Malcolm and Viv Owen, Stella Wilden and Rob Fowler for their inspiration and influence. In the same month another Scooter Lee and Jo Thompson combination of song and dance, 'Dizzy' makes it's first appearance in the charts.

In July 98, a new instructor from Nottingham is interviewed, her name is Kate Sala and she says: "I'm a funloving person. It's just my character. I've always been active and I've always enjoyed dancing, whatever the music, whatever the dance. When I'm dancing, I'm happy." And what happiness she

has brought to the scene ever since.

In August Australia's Cindy Truelove and a 22 vear old Simon Ward just popped into the Linedancer office. Simon had just choreographed Titanic and the magazine says "We almost resisted the temptation to ask how well it was 'going down' - but couldn't!" Simon says, "It is a bit of a challenge at first but when mastered it is great fun to do!"







# Dancing with Dogs

In February Ronnie Beard, looking every bit the epitome of the singing cowboy tells the amazing story of how line dancing "found" him: He thanks Stella Wilden for creating Million Dollar Cowboy and Linedancer for publishing the script. Most of all he thanks

a stranger he met in Nashville who took copies of his CD to England because a copy made it's way to Stella.

Jenny Collins's business in St Helens 'Way Out West' is going places thanks to her new website which received (a staggering) fifty hits within its first week!!! Jenny herself says: 'I know IT will become vital in business and if I want to expand, I need to have a presence.'

Guess who gave us this quote in March 1999 "I have no musical background and if anyone had told me I would have been writing and teaching dance steps three years ago I would thought them totally mad" It was none other than Robbie McGowan-Hickie. It was inevitable pets would soon join in the craze and Angela Horsley, a trainer of Line dancing dogs told us there were three routines for Line dancing dogs. Pooper Scoop Slide, Doggy Din Din and The Dog And Bone Waltz. (NO, we're not making this up). In the same edition Ros Brander- Stephenson poses





with her handsome pet in his boots and neck scarf!

In May 1999 not to be outdone by dancing dogs, Alistair Reed landlord of the Bull's Head and Alan Monk of Diver Services from Blackburn team up for a Dancing Dive and in full gear they raise £1200 for MacMillan Nurses. Music was played underwater to help them hear it and keeping in time wasn't easy but fun.

"Dancing is cool - it's wicked" is the verdict from seven year old Siobhan Dunn and her twelve year old partner Scott Lawler after their success at UCWDC Worlds VII in San Antone Texas.

On the UK music scene new band Lonestar Country consisting of Chris Owen and Charles Cole make their first appearance in our pages. In other news there's heartbreak as



The Cheap Seats announce they are splitting up. Originally formed as a duo and progressing to a full eightpiece band the boys agree to bow out on 4th July 1999.

Then in December we meet Derek Darby and Dave Marr (aka) Magill as they begin their journey into the world of Line dancer entertainers. Wonder how they'll get on?

In December, we meet Robert Lindsay for the first time. He discovered Line dance 18 months before and is in awe. "I was immediately hooked" he said "I just had to learn more. It was also an education in music too, until then, I never knew new Country existed."

It was in the August sunshine when 2,000 dances in thirty venues up and down the country took part in a simultaneous line dance to raise awareness and funds for the Winged Fellowship, an organisation which provides quality holidays for people with physical disabilities. Line dancer asked organiser Michelle Risley how it felt, "It was up-lifting" she smiled "to know that although we could not see each other, line dancers up and down the country were all doing the dance at exactly the same time for exactly the same reason"

In October 1999, the new look Linedancer charts are published for the first time.

Jean Garr of JG2 fame spoke to us in November and said "I think more people are reading dance scripts and sharing dances than they used to. Now you can go anywhere and there will be at least four routines you know. People are having a good time and Line dance is growing". Never a truer word spoken Jean and that is what keeps us together.



# Into The Arena



As we enter the year 2000 'Into The Arena' by Michael Vera Lobos is top of the charts and Linedancer welcomes Steve Brereton to the team. Steve is the new Website manager who explains his priority is to give readers a searchable dance database and Betty tells dancers "If you have access to the Web you can now submit a personal Dance Review".





Pedro Machado is asked where he sees himself in five years and answers: "Dancing. I'll never give up line dance: that's my passion. I am not about money, or about being first on the headliner list. It's not about being the best, it's about doing my best" So, fifteen years later and the man is still true to his word.

Reporting on the results of the Dave Sheriff Choreography Final that year, Do You Love Me By Shooting Starts takes first place and an unknown choreographer called Kim Ray reaches number seven with her entry 'Celts Fire'.

What! Change A Dance! You Wouldn't Would You? was the headline in February when Harry Seddon investigated the difference between a variation and a deviation with Teresa Lawence and Vera Fisher. Knowing some instructors deliberately altered steps this was a hot topic at the time.

We reported on the BCWD Championships held in Barton Hall where a charismatic Malcolm White won Showcase. Steve & Yvonne Dunn retained their British title closely run by the teen partnership of Chris McManus and Jennifer Stephenson. Eddie Ainsworth danced to victory in Male Classic and Johnny Two-step showed how to get back on track after losing your way in the vanilla. He won Advanced Diamond after jumping up and down until he found his place again.

In Nottingham Julie Langstaff raises blood-donor awareness by charging a "pint of blood" entry free to one of her socials. Over 100 dancers attended the sell-out event and twenty gave a pint of blood (but not at the event), while the others opted for the £3 alternative. Of the twenty dancers who gave blood ten of them were first time donors.




The youngest, slimmest, freshestfaced Daniel Whittaker in black Stetson and leather waistcoats is riding high on his dance success as he talks passionately about selling line dancing to the lads. We're still working on that one Daniel.

Oh Gosh! It's the O'Gormans from Ireland! A fun-loving crazy couple if ever there was one or two!! Noel and Joan are renowned for their comedy antics and all-out party attitude. With their famous catch-phrase "Massive" they bring contagious and sometimes outrageous fun to any dance event. "We never forget why people want to come and dance" says Joan "its just for the craic."

Bill Bader's UK summer tour is announced. The Canadian who gave us Cowgirl Twist, Whirl-Y-Reel and many more was celebrating 20 years in dance way back then. He admits: 'If I had to choose between being an instructor or choreographer, I would choose instructor every time. I love teaching."

From the other side of the world Julie Talbot is seen at the annual Tamworth Country Music Festival. The dancers are aiming to break their current record of 5992 dances by making it a nice round 6,000. Those Aussie know how to put on a festival.

14 years old Glenn Ball explains how he developed a taste for line dance after trying T-bone Shuffle. A year later he proudly walks off with a World title in Nashville. Glenn said "I have a phobia about learning dances! I don't learn many. I get bored standing up there being taught so I use my disco experience to pick up dances straight from the floor"









Our reporter Linda Willis interviews Alison Biggs and says "Her Scottish accent may still be as think as Edinburgh fog but Alison's teaching method is rapid. She rattles out instructions fast - accurate and no messing. You'd better be quick, or you won't keep up. We all know Alison became a leading choreographer in partnership with Peter Metelnick and the couple famously keeps us all on our toes trying to keep up with them!!!

In the same edition Darren Bailey looking every bit of his 18 years has teamed up as the second half (or the first half) of a dancing due called Double Team. The other half is the flamboyant 16 year old Matt Jenkins. There is no question about their dancing pedigree or talent but Matt's hair is a horse of a different colour regularly changing from green, to pink, to yellow in a rainbow of hairstyles.





Maureen Jessop, our reporter onthe-spot in France gave us a "Judge's Eye View" and tells readers what it is like to be in the judges shoes. She explains judges are human too and gives a top tip to competitors: "forget your nerves and don't be afraid to smile - especially at the judges"

Here's where we welcome our new columnist, Tim Ruzgar and we meet Charlotte Oulton. and fiance Paul Macari who is a pro footballer. Charlotte says: "We have a very friendly club, we all get on so well... We have members who have lost their wives or husbands and they find great companionship coming to our club.

Bobbie Matthews is in our November edition. Bobbie, a talented artist paints on material and we see her go on to have a hugely successful business painting T-shirts for thousands of Line dancers.



# Line dance branded sinful!



In ironic contrast the Reverend Sir Ian Paisley brands Line dance as sinful. In a BBC report Mr Paisley,

Even now the people who teach me are very important in my life and I hope to pass on what they have given me." There is no doubt that Jo's style of teaching is as good as it gets.

In the same edition, Dancing At The Dome looks at a momentous event where Maggie G, Rachael and Paul, Scooter and Rob and many many more thrilled dancers at the London Millennium dome.

Tim Ruzgar explains that fashion has evolved on dance floors and tells us that diamante is in, navel studs The main focus in 2001 was the unimaginable terror and carnage caused by the al-Qaeda suicide attacks on four symbolic U.S. landmarks. America declares War on Terrorism and invades Afghanistan, airline security causes travel chaos and things will never be the same again.

being the latest fad. He goes on to assure us he won't bother with one of those....

Ethan Allen, after a split from The Cheap Seats in 1999 is back and is plugging his new album. He says:



'My market is my fans. I'm aiming at everybody. My music is out-and-out pop. It's great, it's well produced....'

It's March 2001 Rachael graces the cover....and Sho Botham gives us a few reasons why Line dance is good for us. Amongst the many benefits, she lists "Improved blood pressure, less aches and pains, increased energy and reduction of stress levels".

November and it's Line Dancer's Grand national. This was a precursor of a flash mob, a British Heart Foundation idea to rally dancers for their very own Grand national. Chris Hodgson and Maggie G joined in the fun amongst others and a huge £50k was raised!

In December Rob Fowler is keeping schtum about his latest project Masters In Line. No one would talk to us it seemed and we promised to tell more next time..... shhhhhh.

In this same edition 'the dance world's best kept secret" is unveiled. A newcomer called Glenn Rogers! Glenn





says 'We're big believers in the small club scene – we want to help them out and the dancers invite us back again and again, so we must be doing something right.'

The magazine is slowly changing as the scene demands. More pop stars are being interviewed, shoes are coming in and although the Christmas cover that year is a pair of boots, western wear is slowly giving way.







# The Arrival of Masters In Line!



The United Kingdom celebrates the Queens Golden Jubilee. Manchester hosts the Commonwealth games. Linedancer is geared up for another exciting year and Tim Ruzgar talks about "The Good Old Days".





A radiant lady in red Maggie G adorns April's cover with her momentous win that year at the CBA with no less than five boots to add to her growing collection. In the same edition Paul Bailey talks about his life on the road and credits Dave Sheriff for opening the doors



for him at the right time (1996). But Paul has been playing live since 1982 and he admits to liking Country music most. 'I'll tell you what though' he intervenes 'give me the Tush push any day!'

On 1st May 11,967 Line dancers from Singapore and Malaysia gathered at the huge Expo Centre in Singapore to dance their way into the records. Numbers were counted and verified by the Guinness World Records officials recognising this as the "World's Largest Country Line Dance" 11,967 dancers in one place - incredible.

Chill Factor is the dance of the moment. Daniel Whittaker is 23 at the time and says 'I love all kinds of music and working as a DJ gives me an advantage in terms of Line dancing.' Created with Hayley Westhead it is a 48 count, intermediate must-learn dance. Chill Factor was the wow factor on the dance floors.

Linedancer's sixth birthday edition claims its Celebration Time! And we learn a little more about Betty herself. 'One of the many things I wanted to do was standardise dance terminology and scrips format' she said 'If you saw any of the early script you'd be horrified, they were almost impossible to fathom.' The Linedancer script template is still the code most dancers feel comfortable with 20 years on.

In the same edition the breaking news is the creation of Masters In Line. Steve Healy shares the low down on who Master In Line are and what they







are all about. They are Rob Fowler, Pedro Machado, Paul McAdam and Rachael McEnaney arguably the most talented foursome of the era. They were trailblazers in those days bringing a new dynamic to line dance, to events, to choreography and to entertainment that raised the bar.

Kiley Evans becomes the famous cover girl in September. Her colourful pose who would become a familiar image for many years as part of the Linedancer website banner. At only 17 Kiley is determined to be a dancer and clothes designer. 'I came to love Line dance because it borrows from other styles and you can put something of yourself into it' Kiley told us back in the day. Today she is still a great dancer and an outstanding designer specialising in dance sport fashion, competitions costumes and bespoke Pro dance Boots.



The seven page report on the XVII C o m m o n w e a l t h Games finale became 'a defining moment for Line dancing' in 2002. With 800 dancers, 8,000 pumped up fans in the City of Manchester Stadium and а billion TV viewers this was a huge opportunity to see dancers line in action. To achieve the spectacular effects of the closing ceremony every dancer was given a personal location number

and had to learn their moves and timing for a number of sequences.' The effects were amazing as dancers created moving and lasting messages spelling out the words "Seek Peace" and forming a "Flying Dove of Peace". For the grand finale 800 Line dancers dressed in high-visibility workwear and carrying brooms performed Chill Factor around the perimeter - enough to give you goose bumps.

In November we tell our readers 'There's No One quite like Frankie...!' The irrepressible Frankie Cull stepped reluctantly into the spotlight for a change. He confides that the secret of his success is simple. 'Patience and having the knack





of explaining things to people....Teachers should do whatever they're comfortable with'. Frankie says. Anyone who has been to one of Frankie's classes will know that his unique knack of teaching is worth bottling..... "Baileys" maybe.

# 12,000 Dancers in Hong Kong!

care.' Jill started with a small group then built her reputation locally and nationally.

In March, Peter Metelnick gives his thoughts on the dance scene "Let's do our very best to encourage beginners in to this great pastime, after all, they're the life blood of this whole business." Peter stressed "One of the things people talk about is how






The challenge from a choreographers' point of view is to produce dances that will appeal to instructors and dancers". In August 2003 we begin to publish your dance reviews! Glenys Dawson from Sheffield City Liners is one of the first and says of Come Dance With Me 'I think this is really well put together and flows so well that even the 64-count fans don't mind doing this little one...' Since then so many helpful reviews have been safely placed on the database for all to see.

Alan Birchall respond to last month's questions about the future





of Line dance. Alan suggests 'If an alternative move isn't provided in the script then the majority of experienced instructors should be able to find an easier alternative.' Well said Alan.

Dance clinic by Sho Botham looks in some depth at the issue of skills. A skill such as Grapevine was identified as a possible risk for loss of balance and Sho suggests how to reduce that risk at the teaching level.

December cover is Liberty X, the pop group smouldering for Christmas! We say in the feature that 'Liberty X has worked for line dancers where others have failed...' as quite a few of their songs had found choreographers jumping up and down for joy including Rob's S.X.E,

This is the year when a very young looking chappy called Craig Bennett has a dance published (99.9%). The music is definitely changing with many dancers unsure whether they like that or not.

As we enter 2004 a new start business is launched - it is called Facebook (whatever happened to that idea?) On Boxing Day the world catches its breath as we watch one of the worst natural disaster unfold in Southeast Asia as a tsunami kills 186,983 people with more than 40,000 people reported missing. Line dancers are quick to respond with fund-raising initiatives around the world.






In Grapevine of April 2006, a glamorous expectant mum is featured. Maggie G is expecting and alongside




Judith Godleman, who is also expecting, they enjoy showing off their bumps!



Icon of Line dance Maggie G celebrates ten years at the top. Friends and fans say a few words, among them,



song.' Good sound sense from the Scot but not always observed by everyone!


June is Line Dance Foundation month and in preparation this month Betty clarifies some important points, as


For some of our readers, August 2010 will remain one of our best covers










## The Prince and the Line dancers get naked!

Betty took the positive decision to change the nomination process for the Crystal Boot Awards in November. Aware that social media canvassing for nominations was getting out of hand she announced that dance nominations for the Crystal Boot Awards would be based on dances that had reached the Linedancer Top Ten Chart during the previous twelve months. This ensures it is only the views of dancer who regularly vote in the charts that decide the nominees.

Pat Stott is our cosy cover girl in January and pays tribute to Linedancer: 'Choreographers spend hours searching for music, writing and rewriting steps and then typing them up. After that we just hope dancers will like them and Linedancer magazine is where we showcase the best we have to offer.'

In February we have a profound message from Carol Craven 'Frankly I think there are too many dances now. The proliferation of the internet has added a frustration to the Line dance community that hurts everyone. I used to be able to go to an event and dance so much more

We get DAZZA-led with a report of Darren Bailey and Fred Whitehouse and their capers with the Malaysian dancers. JP Lim recalls: 'For some of our Line dancers, dancing with Darren and Fred was the highlight of their day.'

In her Open Letter Betty explains why she thinks the future is digital. 




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# The Journey...

The Magazine

Linedancer Magazine was launched in June 1996 with a print run of just 1,000 copies. We expected to sell a few hundred but quickly sold out completely. Linedancer went on to became the world's best selling dance publication.

### Dance Database

We began working on our dance database almost from the start and it has now grown into a trusted source of reference for dances around the world. It is continually updated with the latest dances and videos and has over 17 different search options as well as a quick search facility.

Stepping Off The Page

We pioneered the standardisation of dance scripts and dance terminology in a unique format that followed the same formula designed to make learning new dances easier. The "Stepping Off The Page" format is now used the world over as the template for printed choreography.

Dance Charts

In 1996 we began publishing dance charts. At that time there was a selection of clubs and classes willing to share a list of their favourite dances. This proved so useful that it went on to became the Linedancer Dance Charts that we all know and use today.

### Dance Reviews

In our early days, we would review dances as part of the editorial service but we quickly realised that was a mission impossible. We asked our readers, instructors and dancers for their opinions instead and we published their responses. This independent endorsement of a dance developed into the Dance Review Feature which is one of the most frequently viewed pages on the website.

### International Promotion

Linedancer covered events of every size and in every place in the world and we still love to share your news with the dance community. We have been bringing people together since 1996 and are proud that our coverage and promotion has helped to elevate the status of Line dancing around the world.

The Website

We are now on version three of the Linedancer website. With each version we have listened to our readers and responded to their suggestions and requests. Work is continuous but the site is all about Line dance and has an abundance of information, entertainment and interaction that is simply not available anywhere else.

Voting Controls

One of the biggest challenges the magazine faced was devising a fair voting structure for the Dance Charts and of course for the Crystal Boot Awards. After many years of evolution we have finally built a system that is totally open and fair and covers all levels of dance. The charts are created by dancers for dancers, however the votes are monitored to prevent abuse and we enforce a zero tolerance policy for any misconduct.

### More than just a magazine... ...a trusted friend who danced that extra mile

Choreographer Recognition

Whenever possible every dance script we published credited the choreographer and where they came from. This gave recognition to their talents and endorsed their work. All scripts included the choreographers personal details, dance instruction and music recommendation and levels which was helpful when we moved all our scripts online to the searchable database.

Crystal Boot Awards

As early as 1996 we presented three awards. Those simple accolades set in motion the foundations for the wonderful Crystal Boot Awards. Each year guests from all over the world attend the fantastic gathering as we celebrate the best of the best and present the Crystal Boot Awards show.

### CBA Webcast

Attending the CBA is not possible for all, so in 2011 we began a test to stream the event live from Blackpool around the world. Now anyone can join in and watch the fantastic show, workshops and awards ceremonies. It's not the same as being at the event but it is the next best thing.

Hall of Fame

In 1999 we introduced the Hall of Fame award, presented to honour those whose dedication and commitment to Line dancing was outstanding and worthy of special recognition. It is the highest accolade that we can bestow upon anyone in the Line dance community and each year H of F members vote to select the next inductee.

Line Dance Foundation

The Line Dance Foundation was launched in February 2007. Since then, thanks to the generous support of the dance community, the charity set up to support those in the industry, has been able to give financial support to many people who have found themselves in difficult circumstances.

### Level Guide

Setting the correct level for a dance has always been a source of debate with many dances inaccurately classified. We believe it is the choreographers who must ultimately determine which dance level applies to their own dances. However, we have, with collaboration of several dance experts, prepared a written guide listing step patterns that are most appropriate at each level of dance. It is an excellent reference that choreographers, dance teachers and dancers find it helpful.

Linedancer WikiDance

Our latest enterprise was creating the LinedancerWiki. A searchable database of information regarding dance steps, styles, images, videos, audio clips and all things Line dance related. It is an exciting project that is a collective work of dance knowledge and information and can be found on our website.
