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teacher Pat Griffiths of the Texas Travellers in Frodsham. being short of cash, but two weeks before the event his parents offered to pay for the trip, and off he went, again with little in the way of preparation. He had a wonderful time in the company of his friends The Cheap Seats, Johnny Two Step and the Montgomerys - Aden, Tina, and Jonathan. Ed says the highlights of Nashville were firstly his result - overall second place in Division 3, secondly watching his friends dance so well, and thirdly, finding himself treated to a night out courtesy of Cheap Seats' Ethan and John and Rob and Michelle Fowler.

ED THE URBAN FAMILY MAN' WITH BABY DAUGHTER EBONY

The competition bug has now bitten hard and Ed is determined to win a World no.1 belt buckle from the next world championships in San Antone, Texas at the end of the year. His recent results are encouraging. At the European Championships in Holland he came first in his division, and at Wembley's British Line Dancing Championships he was placed second in Division 3. Add to that his success with his wife Lisa in the Partners Competition in the U.K. Championships at Southport, plus the success of his teams, in Holland and in the U.K, and it's clear he's on a roll - and when someone the size of Edward is rolling you'd better get out of the way!

Training his two teams - The Stoke Stompers (seniors) and The Crazy Cowgirls (juniors) - is a particular pleasure for Ed. He gets the best out of them by 'jollying' them along with his endless banter and antics.

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Op dancing says Lionel Blair

One of the nation's best known entertainers, Lionel Blair is a star of stage, screen and television, appearing regularly over the years with the Lionel Blair dancers.

He has appeared in numerous West End musicals, as well as tackling a diverse range of projects from Shakespeare to pantomime! He is the Chairman of SAGE, the celebrity arm of Help the Aged, and is the latest celebrity line dancer.

When Linedancer's Linda Willis caught up with him at Wembley while he was hosting the Awards Ceremony at the British Line Dancing Championships.

Linda firstly asked Lionel what he liked about line dancing.

What I think is wonderful about line dancing is that it's family dance. No matter what age you are. It's from young to old. They all do the same steps. They can all join in, and if a family can all line dance they all go out together and can all dance together. And the family that dance together, stay together!

And what's more you don't make the steps easier for young or for old, the steps stay the same for every age. I watched them all in the Arena just now. The whole floor was packed one of the most exciting things I've ever seen! Every age was there - from the young to old. That, to me is magic! If the world could be like that, as happy as line dancing - it would be a better place. I have never seen anything like that, it was so exciting to see. It was like - if Northern Ireland could be as happy as that - there would be peace there. I'm knocked out with it.

How did you first become interested in Line Dancing?

I was never that involved until a few months ago. I put it in my pantomime a couple of years ago, because it was fashionable and very

successful, so I did it again last year. And everyone said, "Oh, I wish we could have the line dancing back!" - so that's it! Mervyn (Conn) telephoned me and asked me to become involved, his wife was one of my dancers! They wanted me to give the Championships a boost - and it's wonderful to be involved.

What do you think of the Championships?

Well, I haven't seen any yet, but I'm going in now to watch. Like Ice Skating has a Championship, so line dancing has a Championship. But line dancing is an all year round thing - it's not just a winter sport. But I just think the thing that is wonderful is the ages. There is no age gap. They all do the same thing.

Do you do any line dancing?

I've done some, yes! I hope to bring out a video called "Line Dancing With Lionel" soon.

What's your favourite line dance?

Well, there's one that I saw recently at the Electric Ballroom club in Camden, called the "Tush Push" - which I loved! That's the one, my favourite at the moment!

So, you haven't choreographed any line dances?

No, not yet, but what I'd like to do is to show a line dance choreographer my kind of work, and see if he could adapt to that.Do you know what I mean? But I'm quite happy with the choreography of line dancers everywhere. I think it's wonderful. I think the "Tush Push" - do you know the "Tush Push"? he asked the lady from the Sunday Mirror, sitting opposite, who reluctantly admitted that she didn't - It's great isn't it? he continued, as I agreed with him.

What are your favourite kinds of dances?

Well, I'm 'hoofer'. I'm a tap dancer, so I love tap dancing, obviously. The other thing I love about line dancing is that everybody does the same steps which always looks effective. I mean, if you think about the dancing in Saturday Night Fever and watch "Riverdance" the most exciting parts are when they're all doing the same steps together - like a line dance.

Any advice for young dancers?

Do line dancing! Some of the line dancers asked "how do you dance and smile at the same time?" I know you're concentrating hard on the steps but my advice is to learn those steps well enough so you can smile at the same time. That's all I can say because line dancing is a happy dance.

Do you like country and western music? I've never been a country and western fan, but as a type of music to dance to I think there's almost nothing as exciting!

Can I ask you how long you've been dancing? Lionel gave a hearty chuckle, grinned broadly, and replied "I'm not going to telf you in years, but a 1-o-n-g time - and make sure you write it like that a 1-o-n-g time! But what's nice is that I can do this sort of dancing and not be out of breath at the end of it.

Why do you enjoy dancing so much?

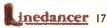
It keeps me young! It's a form of exercise, and exercise keeps you young. Never give it up. I once asked a very old man "When should I stop exercising?" Never was his reply! Never stop clancing, you've got to keep the juices going, I believe. He said, laughing heartily.

Do any other members of your family dance?

Not really, no. My daughter's a model. My son works on a ship as a Stage Manager, and my young son is into heavy metal music. But, when I showed him my shirt (Lionel was wearing a black and gold satin cowboy shirt with cowboy boots embroidered across it), he said "oh dad, you're not really going to wear that? Lionel laughed again. "And I said, yes, I am!"

Would you like to make any final comment?

Just this, if the whole world would line dance it would be a happier place!

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FEATURE Take me home Country Roads

It is fifty years ago in a Latvian household. There are people all over, singing, dancing, playing familiar Latvian folk tunes on piano accordions and banjos. There is a little girl under the table staring out wide eyed at the wonder of it all. Then there were festivals, hundreds of people dancing in the streets and at home, Mother singing when she cleaned the house. There was music, everywhere. This is the scrapbook full of memories which belongs to Gita Rennick, a 'full of life' line dance teacher. Jill Douglas met her.

"You will travel half the world because of your legs" said the clairvoyant to 11 year old Gita. - who thought she must be destined to be a model.

Gita started line dance instruction almost by accident... or was it

written in the stars? She first learned line dancing from the Americans who held dance evenings at a base. At about the same time, an up and coming line dance duo called The Dean Brothers were starting to make a name for themselves on the music scene. Gita went out on the road with them and helped to sell their cassettes. She started showing the people at the Deans gigs some of the steps she had learned from the Americans. From then on the future was bright. She did some specials for Peter Fairhead, got a residency and became part of the Loose Boots company. The wheel came full circle when she actually taught American Brownies to dance!

Then the other week she found out that "Cross My Heart" was really hot in Australia. Gita had choreographed it in her living room, Rob Fowler had taught it where American and Australian dancers were

present who, in turn, taught it when they returned home. "Half the world because of your legs..." Makes you think! Gita lists her greatest achievement as teaching Jonny Rye (The Rye Brother who can't dancel) to Applejack to such effect that according to his wife he was demonstrating the dance whilst cleaning his teeth!!

Probably though, her greatest achievement is all the money she has raised for charity, from hospital radio to Marie Curie and she is

currently trying to raise £4000 for air conditioning in The Manhattan Club. Busy line dancers get awfully 'drippy'! Acknowledgement of Gita's choreography skills are to be found on The Most Awesome Line Dance Album 2 where she is accredited for her dance Cross My Heart to Ricky Lynn Gregg's If I Had A Cheatin Heart. A co-choreography venture with Rob Fowler resulted in Just Love to The Cheap Seats' It's Just Love, taught by Rob on a tour and now fast

becoming a worldwide hit.

The little Latvian folk dancer saw the rock and roll invasion of the fifties, the hippie trippy sixties, the pop of the seventies and the seemingly endless raves of the eighties. There seemed to be no fun . Then she opened the door to Country music and found the happiness, the families, the dancing and it seemed to parallel her own childhood life. She had come home. 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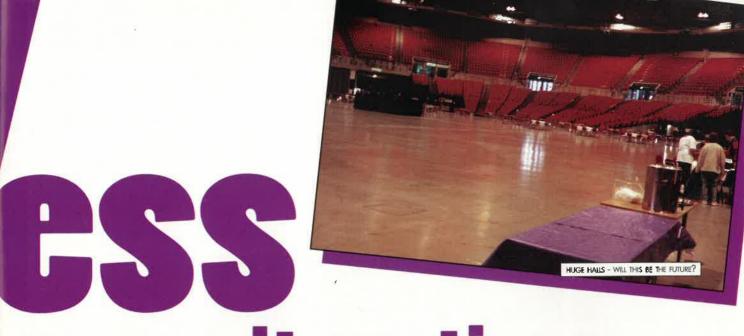
Line dancing has many virtues and features to recomm end it as an activity. Everyone knows that it's great fun, sociable, good exercise and so on. One feature that is sometimes taken for granted, however, is the accessibility of line dancing.

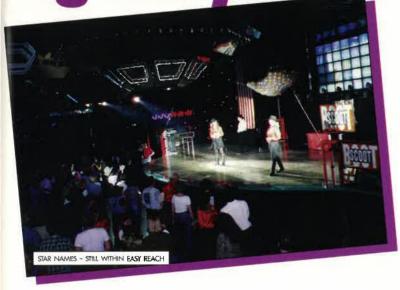
It matters not in which part of the country one lives or visits, there is line dancing within easy reach. Not just within easy travelling distance, but often 'right on the doorstep'. A lot of these classes are organised by people who just love to line dance and want to share that desire with others. These classes need to be supported in order to keep them viable and to maintain the accessibility we presently enjoy.

People who are dedicated to line dancing will travel any distance to dance, but those who enjoy it simply as a 'night out' will only travel what they consider a reasonable distance or inconvenience themselves to a certain degree. Beyond this point they will find alternative entertainment, with the inevitable reduction of classes. This, of course, impacts on everyone, including the dedicated dancer. For the keen and committed line dancer, it may seem hard to believe that there are those who come to classes or dances just for a night out. Most instructors will be familiar with 'social dancers' but our industry ignores them at its peril as we need these people to keep our smaller classes and events viable.

A rough survey of classes and events, publicised as taking place at opposite ends of England, indicated 70 events in Kent and 170 in Cumbria and Southern Scotland. These numbers almost certainly do not reflect the true magnitude of what is actually available and there must be many more events than those publicised. It does, however, serve to quantify the accessibility of line dancing. If further proof is needed, a quick count from our 'Stomping Ground' section reveals approximately 1300 classes. Bearing in mind that a lot of these entries will run more than one class each week, it is plain to see how easy it is to find a class or dance close to home.

Another exciting feature regarding access is the opportunity we all have to see the best that line dancing has to offer, not only locally, but at a price that most people can afford. In the entertainment industry very few areas can offer it's followers top flight stars in their





own locality. It is easy to dismiss this as nothing special because it is what we are used to, but we should appreciate how fortunate we are in this respect and, by being aware of it, be ready to defend this special relationship between our heroes and ourselves.

An example of this would be our own Awards Event, which boasted a line up of stars that was our industry's equivalent of a BAFIA Awards Evening. So What? All areas of entertainment have their presentation events where stars attend. However, how many 'ordinary fans can attend these events as we could and not only attend, but meet the stars and be instructed and entertained by them?

In what other pursuit could we have a holiday abroad, receive instruction in our activity and have a star name with us, and all at a price which makes it accessible?

At the present time, event promoters are still able to bring world class choreographers and top class entertainers to a school hall and charge a single figure sum to see them. Or, at a different venue, with a maximum capacity of 200, it is possible to dance your boots off to a

top band and still have enough change from a tenner for a pint of whatever you fancy - unless you drink Southern Comfort by the pint that is! If that's not accessibility I don't know what is?

There is, though, something of a catch here. The more access we have to our heroes, the more famous they become, and by using the simple economic theory of supply and demand fee requirements can rise and they become less accessible. Nobody is saying for one moment that these people don't deserve all that they can get, whether it be recognition or monetary reward. They have, after all, worked long and hard to get where they are now and that must be paid for. It would, however, be very sad if we could only dance to well known names, or receive instruction from top class choreographers in auditoria capable of holding vast numbers, or by paying high prices for the privilege.

In summary, accessibility to line dancing is everyone's responsibility, not only the stars, instructors and promoters. It is up to everyone to support their local groups, keep going to see their heroes especially when they appear in your locality for it is this accessibility that makes line dancing unique - long may it continue.



Young At Heart

Young At Heart' was the name of the 'Country Music Festival', and what an apt name it is! The weekend event was promoter and radio presenter Vic Woodhouse's creation. Emma Wilkinson reports.

Held for the second year running, Vic was keen that the festival provided a showcase for the younger, 'up and coming' country acts and has found a terrific venue to do just that. The Towerlands Centre at Braintree in Essex can seat up to 2,500

people and despite the weather staying sunny between the rain, (an optimist's way of saying that it bucketed down!), a situation we have all become used to this summer. Luckily though, this was no problem as all the action took place indoors.

Set in rural Essex and providing touring and camping facilities and plenty of open space, when the sun was out, we had the best of both worlds. The dance floor, which was laid especially, was excellent with

more than enough room to accommodate all the enthusiastic line, and couples dancers.

The overall standard of musicianship from the 16 bands who performed during the weekend was very good, however four acts really shone through. These particular acts,

Kane & Co., The Glen Mitchell Band, Nadine Somers Band, Adam Couldwell combined talent, personality and presentation to come to the fore. Adam on this occasion did not go out solo, as he often does, but performed with the John J Paul Band, who provided terrific backing. Proving to us, once again that all he needs is a bit of luck and the right song to show what real talent he has. His network of fans across the country is fast growing.

The Glen Mitchell Band are making a big effort to take their music to the wider audience, which their excellent original material deserves. The bands performance on this occasion was again of the highest quality. A great dance band.

The Nadine Somers Band have only recently formed but pack loads of experience. Nadine not only has a great country voice, but is stunning looking and presents herself very well. She is joined by Rob Childs and Geoff Hall, two top quality musicians

with over ten years experience on the country music scene. This is an act that will attract a younger crowd, and give 'the big names' a run for their money. As with Adam Couldwell, luck and the right song is required. If Steps can be manufactured into the charts, why not genuine country singers with real talent?

The last but definitely not least of the four to make an impression were Kane & Co., a five piece band with

a big sound. Fronted by Dave Kane, the band dressed in black and white have a real stage presence, and are about as far removed from the 'gingham and frills' version of country music as it's possible to get. They are a friendly bunch of guys and it is as enjoyable spending time

chatting with them, as it is witnessing their fabulous live act. They don't just stand and play but really put on a show. Visually exciting, there's loads of movement and interaction on stage, musically very strong with superb lead vocals and tight harmonies. Their own high quality original material which makes up the majority of their act could best be described as 'Meatloaf meets Garth Brooks'. The band have only been playing publicly for a year, and are aiming for the top - an ambition which is not unrealistic. Kane & Co are already in demand on the continent, don't miss them - this is the kind of band the British Country Scene has been waiting a long time for.

One of the most important criteria for a truly successful band, is excitement. All the bands that we have chosen here are exciting, and in company of others with the same attitude will enable British country music to leave it's cottage industry status behind and make its mark!

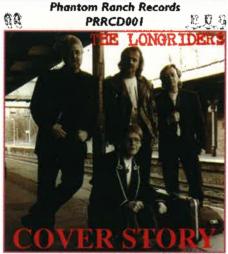
Speaking of NAKED NASHVILLE, a compilation of that name is also now available, an odd selection of the old and the new which is worth avoiding.

have never seen the Longriders in action but I am assured by people whose opinion is to be trusted that they do what they do very well. An established live act on the country dance scene, they have now thrown their hats into the ring of recorded music. COVER STORY is their debut CD.

As a country fan, a reviewer and a Brit I always look forward to receiving material by UK based artists with a hope and expectation that I will hear something to rival the cash rich stars of Nashville. For example the recent album by Glen Mitchell (who appears as a guest with the Longriders incidentally) was a pleasure to listen to.

Unfortunately there is nothing in this set to inspire the same enthusiasm. Half an album of the same old cover versions everybody does

plus half an album of cover versions that fewer people do. All are copies of the original arrangements and none offer anything new.

Maybe some of these songs will be new to listeners. Mark Collie's EVEN THE MAN IN THE MOON IS CRYING is a beautiful love song that never got the profile it deserved. Lonestar's TEQUILA TALKIN' is a slower lilting cha cha in similar vein. But most of this set is far too 'safe'. SEMINOLE WIND is past its sell-by date and who needs another version of FLY LIKE A BIRD, CHILDREN, CANNIBALS, SOLD or WHAT A CRYING SHAME?

From a dancing point of view there are few complaints. Most of the tracks will work on the floor. The production is fine, the musicians more than competent and the vocals, if not award winning, are quite acceptable.

As a souvenir at a Longriders gig this is probably great but if these guys want to sell records to a new audience then it's either new material (surely they must have written a couple of songs between them!) or imaginative cover versions that offer something different to the originals.

As forgettable an album as you're ever likely to remember.



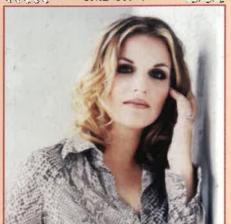

t is not by chance that Trisha Yearwood won 'Female Vocalist Of The Year' at the last CMA awards. She is the best. Others come close, but nobody can interpret a lyric or capture a feeling quite like her.

Trisha Yearwood could sing MY OLD MAN'S A DUSTMAN and it would sound good so when you put her together with a bunch of songs as well crafted as those on her new album it is inevitable that the result will be worth £13 or so of anyone's money. For dancers there are four or five tracks that will work and of these POWERFUL THING is simply superb, a brilliant frolic of a chugger that will surely be Trisha's biggest dance floor hit to date. Written by the prolific Al Anderson it demands a smile, a clap and a holler all at the same time.

THERE GOES MY BABY (her current single) is an infectious early sixties sounding swayer, THAT AIN'T THE WAY! HEARD IT a whimsical jaunt, WOULDN'T ANY WOMAN a mid tempo 'stand up for yourself' stroller and LOVE WOULDN'T LIE TO ME a magnificent, moody late night belly rubber.

Of the out and out ballads WHERE YOUR ROAD LEADS is a duet with that Brooks chap that is powerfully romantic, BRING ME ALL YOUR ŁOVIN' a bluesy lament and I'LL STILL LOVEYOU MORE the latest in the Diane Warren hit ballad production line, moving, melancholy and melodic.

NEVER LETYOU GO AGAIN is a classic. A 'drummer boy' backbeat and lifting acoustic guitar accompany a haunting arrangement and Ms. Yearwood's picture painting vocals. A second chance at love song that oozes with class. Timeless.

There is a wad of excellent albums out on the streets at the moment. In which direction to throw your hard earned cash is not an easy decision. But if you like a listen as well as a dance and female vocals are your bag, put this right at the top of your list of purchases. You won't regret it.

ow here is an artist with imagination! And before anyone puts pen to paper to complain about biased judgement let me make it clear that although Barry Upton and I wrote the Steps hit 5678 together I did not collude on any of the tracks recorded here. I do not have a vested interest in the album and if I like the album it is because I like the album, not because I feel obliged to like it

Now I've got that off my chest, let's crack on.

Where was I? Oh yes, now here is an artist with imagination! An ear for the commercial, a musical taste that extends from country to pop and a talent for production which speaks for itself. It is only in the vocal department that there can be a hint of criticism where, by his own admission, Barry's voice may not give Garth any sleepless nights and which suits some songs better than others.

Barry Upton and The Wild At Heart gang are about good time fun. This album is an example of pop country at its best. Sometimes clever, sometimes derivative, but always of the highest quality.

5678 is included here in a new, cheeky country-dance format that will be a welcome alternative for those who have

played the Steps version to death. Also included are several tracks that have seen the light of day on various compilations. I'M STILL FALLING, a summery sing-a-long strutter was a CMT hit as was HEY YOU ON THE RADIO, a haunting slow cha cha which features Kimber Clayton in a cameo role as a radio DJ. SHOOTING FROM THE HIP, a dual tempoed rapping stomper and YOU LOOK SO GOOD (YOU GOTTA BE BAD), a versatile mid tempo chugger are the others which may be familiar.

Of the brand new tracks RIDE ON INTO THE SUNSET is outstanding, a Rednex meets Steps upbeat shuffle that is now accessible for Rodeo Ruth's 'Ride On' dance. EARTHQUAKE CITY is another potential whopper that is begging for some original choreography, a rocking tush pusher that sounds 'large' on the floor. WILD WILD WIND is a Creedance Cleerwater Revival inspired strutter co-written with T.Cane Honey, FRIDAY ALL NIGHT LONG a storming party rocker and PLANET NASHVILLE another double tempo stomper.

And to balance the scales there are some lovely mellower tracks and a waltz where Barry proves he can produce the goods in the yummy department. LOCKED INSIDE YOUR HEART is a terrific love song chacha, whilst THE REST OF MY LIFE (IS CALLING ME) and LOVE IS GONNA WIN are slightly faster shuffles.

The waltz is BLUE LOOK\$ GOOD ON YOU, a bouncy swayer of a ditty that is not dissimilar to George Strait's 'You look so good in love'.

Best of the 'aaaaagh!' bunch is the one cover version on the album, the old Cascades hit RHYTHM OF THE RAIN which is another song waiting for some inspirational choreography.

For one song Barry gives up lead vocal duties to Shelly Mintrim, a young lady from the Wild At Heart entourage whose provocative dress sense is as appealing as her voice. GO TALK TO HIM is reminiscent of Wilson Philips in style and is another cha cha that will find its place on the floor.

Several dance steps are included in the liner notes as are dance suggestions for all of the tracks.

Barry Upton And Wild At Heart are not regulars on the country scene so you will struggle to find them at a live event but check out this album. It's really jolly good.

DAVE SHERIFF

UK LINE DANCE TOPTEN



ave Sheriff's last album was a treat, a progression from upmarket one man band pub singer to credible country performer. It paid no specific attention to the needs of the dancer and concentrated on the singer and the song. The trouble for Dave is I don't recall hearing too many folk requesting

tracks from it for the floor, even though many were suitable.

It seems that what is expected of Dave Sheriff is evenly phrased boom crash drum tracks with whatever line dance theme, rhythm and tempo is necessary, thrown on top. You can't argue with it. Thousands of people buy his albums for it and he has carved a niche in the market, which no one else is ever likely to emulate in this country.

And this is more of the same. OK, the packaging is a bit different and the ëhook' is new; an album of songs recorded specifically to fit dances by emerging UK choreographers who succeeded in last year's DAVE SHERIFF/LINEDANCER MAGAZINE Choreography Competition.

The musical package is a variation on a theme too, with slowed down versions of each of the ten tracks for teaching purposes. In essence this is another collection of songs with

accompanying dance steps that come under the heading line dance fodder.

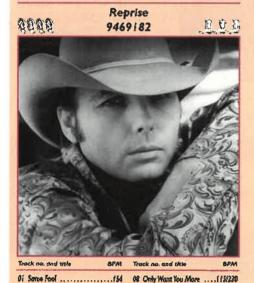
Please understand, every track here is dance floor friendly, ideal for the good old plates of meat. It's just that musically nothing grabs you. RED HOT SALSA is better than the rest, and WHEN YOU MOVE THAT WAY and TROPICAL MOMENT are OK, but everything else doesn't quite do what Dave is capable of doing. VALENTINE WALTZ lacks emotion and The Andrews Sisters inspired BOOGIE WOOGIE SHERIFF is a bit lightweight. Dave even sounds out of breath in delivery.

Come on Dave, you have the talent and the ability to do better than this. You proved it with FLY AWAY. There's nothing wrong with merging the quality of that album with the formularised line dance package of this one is there?

I expect to read the outraged letters of complaint from Dave Sheriff fans in next month's issue.

ver the past few years Dwight Yoakam has been messing around with several projects; a couple of movie roles and concept albums such as his recent Christmas offering and the "Under The Covers" album of other people's songs. Even his last full-blown studio album, "Gone" was, in many ways, experimental. It just seems so long ago that a Dwight Yoakam album delivered good old honky tonk, dark, soul searching ballads and classic country twang.

I am therefore delighted to announce that A LONG WAY HOME is a return to the form that established his Dwightness as a major 'New Country' player in the early 80s.

All the songs are penned by the leathertrousered hip grinder himself and the musicians include amongst their number such legends as Bluegrass banjo king Raiph Stanley and long-time sidekick Pete Anderson on guitar who once again produces the set.

For dancers there are several beauties. The rocking boogie of I WOULDN'T PUT IT PAST ME, the jaunty SAME FOOL, the gentle cha chas THINGS CHANGE and I'LL JUST

TAKE THESE, the rockin' sockin' full steam ahead ONLY WANT YOU MORE, the chirpy Buck Owens influenced THAT'S OKAY and the Duanne Eddy like, punchy LISTEN.

There are four stand out tracks. TRAVELLER'S LAMENT, a searing high lonesome waltz with spine tingling gospel backing vocals from Ralph Stanley offers a message of hope and salvation. THE CURSE takes you on a Johnny Cash like canter through the black magic side effects of love with enormous dance floor possibilities. THESE ARMS is true honky tonk with a full blown Phil Spector middle eight, as wonderful a shuffle as you could wish to hear and check out the classic plinky piano!

Final selection is A LONG WAY HOME, with hints of "Pocket Of A Clown", a finger clicking country stroll that for me sums up the genius of Yoakum, a hybrid of musical themes and lyrical sense. Perfect.

The album is perhaps best summed up by a line on the sleeve that describes it as "Cosmic cowboy music for the next millennium". And if this is the future for country music then we're in safe hands.

Little did Sho and Josh Botham know that the derelict Victorian church they visited one day was to be the ideal venue for their new studio. That was after months of conversion work had been completed. Here she tells the story.

We didn't know when we saw the 'For Sale' sign at what looked like a derelict old church, we were looking at our new studios. Buildings suitable for dance studios don't come along every day, so we were curious to see what the inside looked like. We had been looking for a property to rent or possibly purchase for some time but there had been nothing that was even remotely possible. An appointment was made to view and that's when our lives changed. The inside of

the church though, was covered in cobwebs and looked like a House of Hammer movie set - it was fabulous!

A phenomenal amount of work was needed but the atmosphere, character and accommodation was just what we were looking for. We could have a delightful reception area, two studies, one upstairs and one on the ground floor, a kitchen and office area, plus large gardens and parking close by. All we needed was the money to buy

it. We felt so positive about the project that we put in an offer which was accepted, the church being delighted about the proposed community use. It was then that the whirlwind began devising business plans, getting quotes for work and most important, seeking the bank manager, who visited the church with us and agreed that the potential was there. Everything felt right, it was definitely meant to be.

It helped that Josh was previously a Finance Director so all this high finance was familiar territory to him. Planning permission had to be obtained and took much longer than anticipated, but we got it. In fact, it all took much longer than we hoped, because we were purchasing from the church there were more people involved in the sale than expected. At times we began to wonder if it would ever happen but then last September, we became the proud owners of the building, complete with the pulpit and font.

We set to work with great gusto, learning as we went, watching builders, asking advice and generally learning from our mistakes. We have tackled lots of things that we would never have dreamed of doing but necessity is a great motivator. Certain jobs we left to the experts, such as window repairs and replacements, electrical work, and plumbing. Our new front doors were made by a specialist joinery firm to exact templates of the original doors which have been admired by many as they walk past the church. We have also had help from some of our enthusiastic dancers who came along and brandished

paint brushes and helped to clear the jungle so that we could see the garden. The height and situation of the stair walls meant that scaffolding was needed. No time to worry about having a head for heights.

Gradually, it all began to take shape. BBC South Today did a feature about us, our line dancing and the renovations at The Old

Church. Various local papers gave us a mention and we opened our doors for the first time in December to hold a Christmas Fair. What a wonderful feeling, so much work had been done and so much still to do but we were up and running. We even rang the bell at midnight on New Year's Eve to celebrate a new lea

Year's Eve to celebrate a new lease of life for a building that has been around since the beginning of this century.

Classes started at our new studios in January and so many people comment on the beautiful building and atmosphere. The smoke free environment is also welcomed.



In addition to our regular classes, we promote many other dance and health related activities and workshops in East Coast Swing, Caribbean Aerobics, Dance is Fun, Relaxation and Stress Management, Personal Development, Body Image and Weight Management, Lifestyle Management. We run profesional teacher training courses in various dance branches including line dancing, as well as one day intensive workshops for teachers wishing to improve their teaching skills.

We continue to hold our Eastbourne Classes too, and we are pleased that many of our Eastbourne dancers also support events and workshops at the studios in Bexhill.

What a year it has been. There is still lots of work to do but we're getting there.

Plymouth Hoe in Devon is a popular tourist location. It is the place where Sir Francis Drake sighted the Spanish Armada, and today many a naval fleet is waved off from its quayside. It is also the home of a line dancing troop who have adapted the appropriate name of their town to form their title. Debra Williams meets the pride of Plymouth's 'fleet'.

The Plymouth Hoe-Downers are making their mark in our own 'deep South' with their many charity events. Leader of the pack Hayley Masters, who owns the Haysways line dance club, tells of how it all began. "I had been teaching various fitness activities for eight years when I attended a line dancing workshop. I soon realised it was great fun, but never in my wildest imagination could I have known it would take over my life!"

she said.

Supported by her parents and aided by The Princes Youth Trust and the Plymouth Small Business Fund, Hayley set up her first class in January 1997 - and was amazed at the outcome.

"I hired a local hall and, to my surprise, had so many people attend that they not only double-parked in the car park, they fifled the football pitch with cars too. I can't thank my family and friends enough. They drove for miles pinning up leaflets, and the result was staggering."

The formation of the dance troop was an inadvertent progression. Youngest member, nine year old

Zoe, a proficient dancer and quick learner, was assigned to lead a side wall as an assistant when Hayley taught. She was immediately adopted as club mascot. Sara and Denise were then singled out to become Haysways' instructors, and soon a core group of dedicated dancers who excelled in class appeared.

Initially the group demonstrated line dancing at social functions, but then word spread and they were continually asked to perform at a range of charity events. On June 21st this year, they attempted to recreate their 1997 American theme extravaganza when over 3,000 people line danced on Plymouth Hoe, raising more than £6,000 for three local charities.

Together they are an industrious group, and their innovative thinking was in abundance at a dance last Halloween when team members Kim and Linda devised a routine to Michael Jackson's Thriller' track.

With a little more input from the rest of the troop, the resulting chareography transformed the traditional country image of line dancing into a spooky spectacular complete with smoky dry ice and ultra-violet lighting to emphasise their skeleton costumes.

It is this adventurous outlook which spurs the dance group on to enter into the spirit of every event they attend. Hayley is resolute in her opinion that line dancing should be fun and enjoyed, and the feeling is shared by her fellow Hoe-Downers, whom she describes in 'wacky' detail.

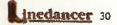
Mascot Zoe, who Hayley admits was nearly lost to the Spice Girls at one point, is a nine year old

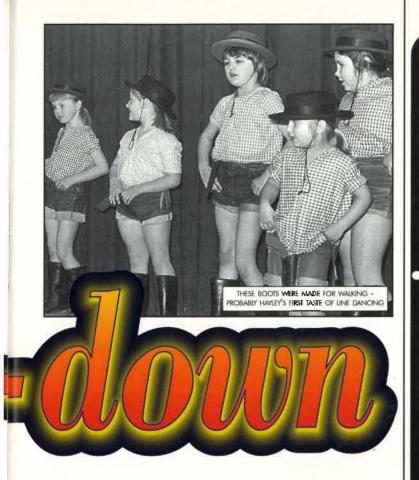
with a zest for line dancing who possesses striking confidence for one so young. Last year, at the tender age of eight, Zoe gave an interview on Devon Radio plugging the virtues of line dancing as well as any adult could have done.

Along with Hayley's assisting instructor Sara, there is her bubbly and cheerful counterpart Denise plus Heather and Brigette, a duo who Hayley suspects share some kind of telepathic bond.

"These are a great couple, but the weird thing is when not in the group's uniform, they still manage to turn up dressed alike!"







Clare is noted for her flexibility, and also holds the crown for the best dance 'attitude', while Lynne, at eighteen years old, is held in high regard for her photographic memory - picking new dances up quickly, and recalling old ones at the 'blink of an eye'. New recruits to Hayley's 'Crazy Team', as she calls them, are Kathy, Donna, Vanessa, and Lois, which just leaves the two remaining dancers - husband and wife Alex and Linda. Married last year, they even incorporated line dancing into their wedding's evening reception.

Alex is the only man among thirteen women, but admits he enjoys every minute! Hayley said "Alex used to be guite normal before Linda introduced him to line dancing. He has an unquenchable thirst for learning new dances, and drives us up the wall trying to teach us 'another one he's just come across'. Our memories are constantly on overload!"

Hayley's memory is also failing fast due to another condition. On August 1st - her birthday - is the date she is due to have her first baby, and in true 'Hoe-Downers' style, the group are using the occasion to raise even more money for charity. The challenge is to guess the baby's sex and weight, with the funds callected to be sent to their local hospital's baby unit.

The Plymouth Hoe-Downers are living proof of the caring nature of line dancers throughout the country. Every day, somewhere, lines are being danced with the thought of someone else in mind. It is this community feeling of line dancing, coupled with absolute fun, which Hayley's group captures to the full.

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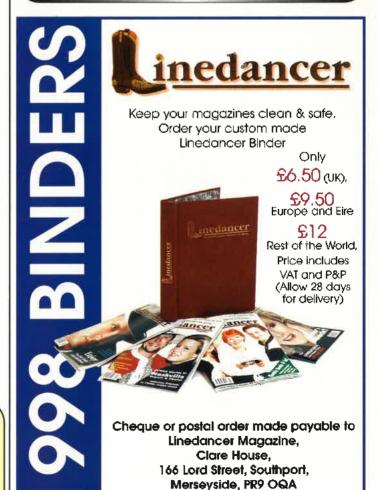
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Woolpackers Country

Nichola Hill is fifteen years old and the current World Junior Teen Advanced line dancing champion. She has 'scuffed her boots' across hardwood floors in competitions throughout Britain, and even crossed the Atlantic to take on the Americans at 'their own' game. It is an impressive record for one so young, yet in true teenage style, she seems totally unruffled by the whole Nashville adventure. Linedancer's Debra Williams discovered how she 'jetted' her way to the line dancing 'throne'.

Nichola Hill's World Championship experience began with a family holiday to Florida. Long planned, ironically enough, for a few weeks before the start of the finals. Extending the trip was an obvious course of action, though Nichola says she probably saw more of airport departure lounges than she did of Mickey Mouse. "We flew from Birmingham to Sandford (Orlando), to Miami, to

Nashville, to Chicago, to Birmingham - all in five weeks." Despite the hectic schedule she went on to take the world 'crown' - an amazing feat considering the extensive touring was just one of the obstacles she had to avercome. Nichola needed to learn three new dances for the competition - 'Blackberry Cobbler, 'Wildest Dreams' and 'Cha Cha Lengua' - and only received the dance sheets shortly before she flew to Florida! Practice therefore became an integral part of the holiday, with Nichola making good use of the Hotel's dance floor early every morning.

Possessing this degree of dedication, it is no wonder that nerves played little part in her

winning performance. Despite the usual fear of who she would be competing against, Nichola says that the thrill of dancing overrode any jitters on the day. She said "The atmosphere at the championships was marvellous, and the standard of dancing very high. I was a little nervous beforehand, but as I started to dance I really began to enjoy myself. When I enjoy myself it really shows in my dancing, it changes and looks even better." Taking the experience in her stride, Nichola had mixed feelings on her chances of winning. "I was very pleased with my performance, but I know that if I didn't win I had still achieved a great deal by qualifying for the world finals. Though when they called my name out it felt great. I was speechless!"

One of Nichola's proudest 'post victory' moments was returning to her Solihull dance class and showing off her award - a belt buckle engraved with her new championship title, which, understandably she says she is extremely proud to wear.

Though that wasn't all she came home with! His name is Josh, he lives in Houston, Texas, and he is one half of the Junior Teen World Couples Champions'. He is also Nichola's 'E-male' Internet boyfriend, and she is currently spending two weeks in Texas with

him and his family. Perhaps it is inevitable that when interests draw people together, friendships are formed. Nichola's line dancing career has introduced her to hundreds of other young dancers so now she has pen-pals all over the world. This proves that line dancing is a great opportunity for young people to socially interact, and discredits the usual assumption that all teenagers congregate

on street comers to cause trouble.

In Nichola's case, line dancing has also brought her fame and success in her chosen pastime. She was in the Dave Sheriff line dance video, on the cover of the 'Line Dance Fever 3' CD, and has appeared on two BBC television programmes already this year. Her first introduction to line dancing was over six years ago when she was taken along to the Smokey Mountain country music club at Wythall, Birmingham, by her parents Joyce and Chris. Only eight years old at the time, Nichola enjoyed watching the members dance to the live bands, and was soon joining in with 'East Coast Swing', 'Electric Slide' and

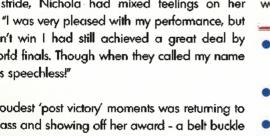

TAMMY WYNETTE

Donna Hartley The Golden (

Donna Hartley was British athletics' 'Golden Girl' of the 1970s - a title which not only signified her success on the race track, but her trademark blonde hair which trailed in her slipstream like a pennant flag. Today she is a line dance instructor. Debra Williams brings her story up to date.

Over a period of ten years Donna Hartley repeatedly donned British and English vests and sprinted to glory endearing herself not only to the success starved British athletic fans but to the general public too. She won two Commonwealth Gold medals, an Olympic Bronze medal, received an M.B.E., was the BBC TV Sports Personality of the Year in 1978, and became the British female athletic face of the decade - all before she reached the age of 26.

Though she will be forever remembered for her athletic achievements her career may never have happened at all....

Having shown considerable athletic skill at the age of eleven, Donna Murray as she was then, was taken under the wing of Gay Thompson, her P.E. teacher at Hampton Park Comprehensive in her home town of Southampton. "Had Gay not recognised my talent, I might never have gone on to do what I did. It was a case of being in the right place at the right time." she said.

Donna subsequently joined Southampton Athletics Club and made a name for herself running for Hampshire County. However, the night before an important letter dropped onto her door mat, she was involved in a minor car crash. The letter was

from the British Amateur Athletics Board, asking Donna to compete in an invitation 200 metres sprint to be televised. It was her big chance, but she had five stitches in a gash on her shin. Many of the day's top British sprinters were at the event. Joining them, despite the handicap, was Donna, her hair in pigtails, wearing her school vest – and she beat them all! As a result, she was invited to compete in the Olympic trials and earned a place in the British team for the Munich Games in 1972 when she was only sixteen

years old. Despite the entire British team being evacuated from the athlete's village due to an IRA bomb scare - that was the year of the infamous Arab terrorist killings of Israeli competitors - Donna reached the semi final stage of the 200 metres. Two years later at the Commonwealth Games in Christchurch, New Zealand she was to experience the low point of her career, coming "nowhere" as she put it, in the 200 metres. Returning home, Donna wanted to end her career, only to be persuaded by her coach to take up the

longer distance of 400 meters.

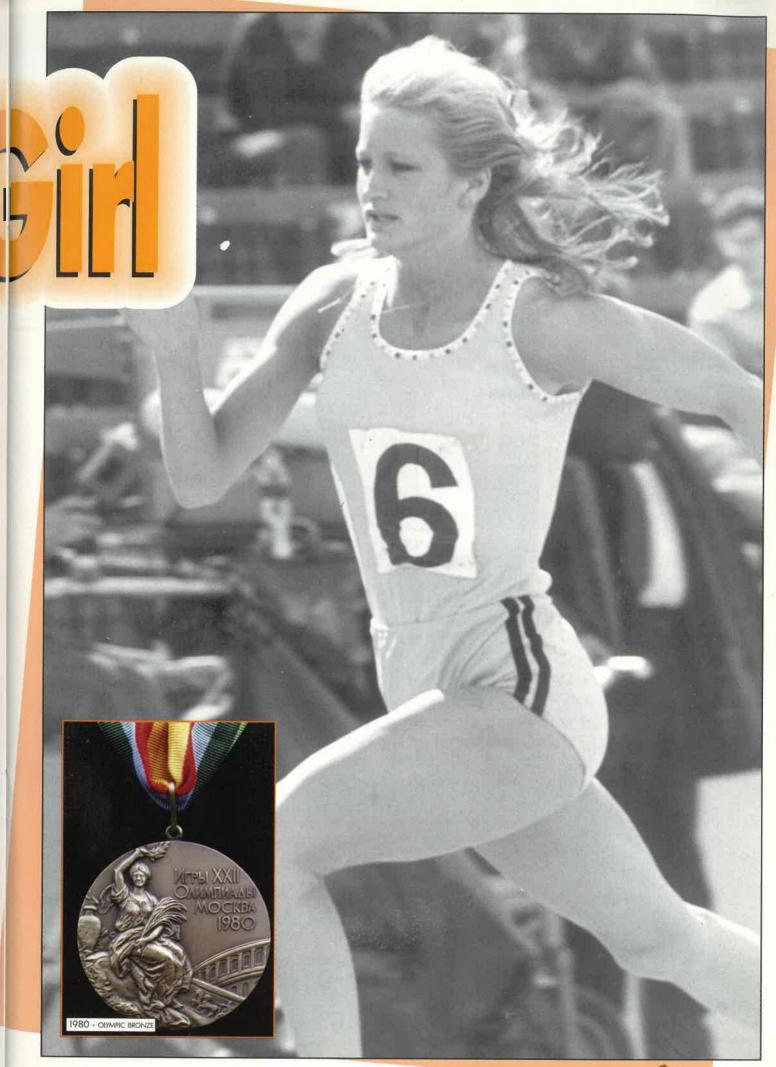
Success was not immediate as her trip to the Montreal Olympics in 1976 proved fruitless but two years later Donna Hartley - she had married fellow athlete Bill Hartley - won two gold medals for England in the 400 metres individual and relay events at Commonwealth Games in Edmonton, Canada. She had been the first to break the tape at a world sporting event, but elation was not her initial emotion. "Mainly I was relieved, because all the hard training had at last paid off, and I was actually a gold medallist after being called the 'Golden Girl' for so long. It was a wonderful feeling just to have no more nerves!"

The following year, Donna's achievements for her country were

rewarded when the Queen presented her with an M.B.E at Buckingham Palace. "I felt so proud. It was a complete and wonderful surprise. This honour still gives me a lot of pleasure." she fondly remembers.

The medals were mounting up, and as the seventies slipped into the history books, Donna was training hard for her ultimate goal of 1980 - The Olympic Games in Moscow. Controversy surrounded the whole event as only





months before Russia's invasion of Afghanistan had caused a rift in the international community. The USA decided not to attend and Donna came under pressure from activist groups who targeted her with obscene letters. Like her fellow British competitors, Donna decided to put the sporting spirit before politics and competed. In the eagerly awaited final she came third, adding an Olympic Bronze medal to her tally, and says that standing on the podium with the national anthem playing was a fantastic feeling. She continued, "On paper we stood no chance at all because the Eastern block athletes had dominated the 400 metres for so long."

From high to low, and Brisbane's Commonwealth Games of 1982 where injury ruled out Donna's defence of her 400 metres crown. That was the year the 'bubble burst' when suffering the achilles tendon injury was to ultimately end her athletics career - the same injury that more recently put paid to Sally Gunnell's running. After four long years in

and out of plaster, Donna realised that her athletics career was over. But that didn't put an end to her passion for fitness - or her competitive streak.

She bought a gym and fitness studio, teaching aerobics, and eventually took up body building. In just eighteen months, Donna swept through the ranks of women's competitions to take the crown in 1988 as the NABBA Miss Great Britain Physique Champion, following with the Miss Europe Body Building title.

Following her divorce in 1986, Donna met and married television actor and comedian Bobby Knutt, more recently known as Emmerdale's Albert Dingle. Her life began settling back into a positive pattern - until 1996, when she was introduced to line dancing!



She says, "The studio was doing very well, friend in but my Scarborough Julie Greathead, who was always one step ahead in the fitness field, kept ringing to tell me to look at line dancing. I laughed at first, but she pestered until I relented and attended workshop. One of the first things that struck me was that many of moves in line dancing were similar to those I was teaching in aerobics, but in a different format. I didn't



find it easy to start with, so I went away and over the next four months introduced a little dance at the end of my fitness class to see how it went down - and obviously to see if I could do it! I knew I could teach, and cue ahead of time, but this was so different."

As one who works on the principle of doing something right, or not doing it at all, Donna had reached a turning point in her fitness career. Did she carry on with a lucrative business, or risk it all for line dancing? She took the risk, closed the studio, and secured two venues in Sheffield - where she lives with Bobby. She admits it was a major decision, "I advertised my first venue, but when I turned up on the night I was really scared. It was almost as bad as going out onto the track!" The night went well, and, as her

'Golden Girl' nickname suggests, Donna Hartley gave her line dancing classes the same Midas touch that she gave to every other sporting career throughout her life even though that touch has never been based on luck - but sheer hard work, a mountain of enthusiasm, and determination to succeed.

So how does Donna Hartley start her classes? On your marks...get set...line dance!

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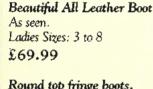
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Cowgirl from 'Down Under' pays a visit...

Visiting the UK for the first time in October are two Australian dance notorieties. Instructor and Choreographer Cindy Truelove, and the 'high energy' 22 year-old Simon Ward, described as one of Australia's top line dancers.

Cindy was the first Australian line dance instructor to be accredited to the NTA organization and Simon recently choreographed 'Titanic' to the dance mix of the theme song 'My Heart Will Go On' by Celine Dion, a 64 count four wall dance. We almost resisted the temptation to ask how well it's going down - but couldn't! Simon says 'it is a bit of a challenge at first but when mastered it is great fun to do'. Linedancer has heared that 'Titanic' swept across dance floors in Australia. The script can be found in 'Steppin' off the Page' this month.

Although Cindy has lived in Australia since her teens she is originally from the US, growing up in a small town in Oregon, saying'I was raised on country legends like Hank Williams Sr, Buck Owens and Johnny Cash. I lived on dance instruction in tap. ballet and iazz'.

As a ten year old Cindy would travel with her family to the local rodeos and horse show even riding in the steer section baby steer that is! 'Every summer 1 entered my own horses in county fairs and still have the trophies to prove it'. The move to Perth, Australia meant changes including trading horses for boys - horses made better friends but they're hard to keep in the city!

After school her childhood dreams of becoming a dancer seemed to recede 'I went to university and majored in psychology, not really knowing what career that I would choose, but knowing that it would be nice to do something that would help people'.

With so much country music in her blood Cindy naturally kept a link to her past and traded her saxaphone for a guitar and began writing country songs which she still does to this day. Her interest in line dancing was stirred after watching the video for 'Achy Breaky Heart'. Two and half years later her evening classes attract 300 dancers. 'I had three young kids at home and needed a way out of the house. I needed something of my own and then I saw the perfect solution. Suddenly I was getting fit, losing weight, making friends and having the time of my life. Line dance instruction is not something I just decided to do because it became a fad. I was country before it was cool. I loved everything about line dancing before it became a craze. All the things I've loved in life - country music, dancing, being a cowgirl, helping others, they've all been put together in one neat little package for me as a line dance instructor. With my history I feel as if the 'Great Spirit' has given me a calling in life and I am grateful every day for that'.

Cindy has spent the last few years studying

how to teach people to line dance. Unable to find good training programmes in Australia she returned to the US. "I have been learning from the American people who started it all and have been refining the art for years, they have a lot to share with us, their achievements as well as their mistakes"

She has just returned Canada after completing the NTA Acreditation (teacher training) Programme. Maintaining regular contact with prominent American instructors by letter and phone, "you should see my monthly phone bill" smiles Cindy. Her tips for instructors? "The main thing we want to remember is that people come to us

to enjoy themselves, so number one is always make the lessons fun! Have fun yourself. We want to teach our students correctly using good technique and proper terminology. When I first started teaching I know I taught things that I could have taught better - I simply didn't know any

Before Cindy and Simon reach Britain they visit the US and will have the latest dances from America and Australia to teach when they arrive here. "I am excited to be coming to the UK and to have the opportunity of teaching some popular dances from Australia". Do you always have the final decision on what is put on the album?

Tony Brown (the album's executive producer who is responsible for George Strait and Vince Gill amongst others) brought a lot of material to me for this album and we work together on making the decisions on what tracks will be used but I always have the final say. I could never record something I didn't feel comfortable with. As an artist this is the way I express myself so they have to be songs I believe in, not something someone else thinks will be a hit.

One of the songs that struck me on the new album for its energy and danceability is the Al Anderson track Powerful Thing. Al seems to be getting everywhere at the moment (he wrote several tracks on The Mavericks album), what made you choose this sona?

All is one of those people you just love. I have wanted to cut one of his tracks for some time now and have just been waiting to find the

right one and the right time to do it. This was a song I already knew and I felt the time was right to use it. Actually, after we cut the track I felt something was missing from our version. On listening again I realised what was missing was Al's guitar playing, so we called him to come and play on it for us which is just what it needed. We even managed to get him to hop in and sing harmony too!

The single 'There Goes My Baby' is very radio friendly and an excellent pop song. Are you trying to move, as so many country artists are now, into the more commercial pop field of music to gain more success?

To be honest when I recorded it I didn't think it would be an obvious smash. As it's not a straightforward country record 1 was surprised at its rapid success on the country charts in the States. When I look at this new album I'm not sure how commercial it is. Do

I want to have more success, sure, but I have never recorded a song because I thought it might be a commercial hit.

Would you ever go 'the whole hog' as Shania Twain has done and have your entire album re mixed to take out the country element so there is more chance to appeal to the pop market?

No, but I've thought about it and been tempted. I even considered getting together with a pop producer with a couple of the sonas from the album just for release outside of the U.S. But for me that would seems like trying to manipulate the market. I'd much rather say to people "This is my music, I really want you to like it but if you don't, I don't want to change it for you to like it". I'm not a traditional country artist, my music already has other elements to it and hopefully that is enough for it to be played here. I don't want to change it; I want it to be accepted for what it is.

When you see artists such as LeAnn Rimes, Shania Twain and of course the Mavericks having huge success on the British charts does this encourage you to want to come over here more to try to gain your own success here?

Yes, I've been coming over here about once a year for the past four years gaining a steady fan base, but I think the artists you mentioned are opening the door for greater success now. I think if it's going to happen for me in a big way over here, the timing is right. I haven't booked my tour for next year yet, I've been waiting to get the dates in Europe sorted out before I tour the States, so Europe doesn't get the 'leftover' dates.

If I can touch on the possible sensitive subject of 'How Do I Live'. I guess its not your fault or LeAnn Rimes' fault that you got caught up in a record company war. But does it make you jealous that LeAnn has had a huge hit over here with your song from the 'Con Air' movie?

If the UK had the only success with this song then yes, I might feel very defeated. But I had the first Platinum single ever in Australia and we went to number one in all of Asia. We have gold records in Taiwan, Malaysia and the Philippines. Also we had a big hit on country radio in the States with it. LeAnn, of course, had a big hit on the pop charts.

I feel that we've both claimed our territories with it and won.

Do you speak to each other about it?

No. It's awkward for both of us and I don't feel either of us wanted to be in a competition together. We speak and are friendly but we don't sit down and discuss how this happened because I think it is frustrating for both of us in the same way.

As you know our readers are line dancers, are you a dancer yourself?

No, I think if you asked a lot of country artists if they line danced, maybe one out a hundred may say yes. The only dancing I have ever done is a simple two step in Texas.

How does it feel to you to know some of your songs have become line dance hits, songs such as Perfect Love, XXX's & OOO's and Believe Me Baby I Lied?

I think it gives my music a great presence. As I know a lot of people love to line dance it's a compliment, especially as most of my well known songs are ballads it's great that people

have found some of my songs to dance to.

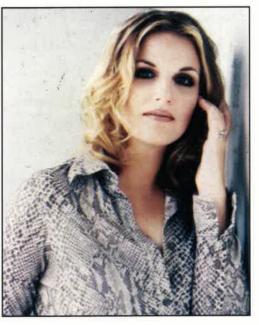
For those who don't know, you are married to Robert Reynolds from the Mavericks. You must be pleased at how well they have taken off in the UK.

Yes, I'm thrilled, it's been a great year for both of us in different parts of the world. It's made it harder for us to get to see each other but I am pleased the guys are having the success they deserve.

When you're at home does Robert ever tease you by saying "I've done better in England than you have"?

No, because if he said that then I could say "Well how many records have you sold in America?"!

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How useful is the



line dance event

John Stapleton asks whether instructors can use special occasions to strengthen their own groups and deepen the line dancing appeal within their area.

From time to time instructors and dancers alike are able to attend, usually with a day pass around £10, a major line dancing event. Although there are many 'evenings only' occasions costing less, the best learning opportunities are for a part or the whole of a weekend.

The weekend usually starts with a 'taste of things to come' on the Friday evening followed by instruction on Saturday morning and afternoon. During these sessions well-known instructors/choreographers provide tuition for a mixed audience, often starting with a 32-step beginners dance and followed by an intermediate dance with more difficult steps or sequence and possibly a brand new creation.

Sometimes the intermediate dance may simply be longer with steps designed to stimulate other instructors or dancers.

In the evenings groups or a star performer, supported by a DJ with a wide-range of dance music, provide easily recognisable tunes, all appropriate to the more established line dances. Both beginners and experienced can dance happily together to favourites and the chances are that Texas Stomp, One Step Forward, the Freeze, Electric Slide, or even Elvira will figure in the groups'

Established DJ's are aware that old 'dassics' still fill dance floors everywhere whilst the current 'crop' have yet to achieve universal popularity. Perhaps, these new ones will fill the floors in the future, when they, in their turn, become classics. Commercially, this will be good for the entire business because it helps to keep big dancing 'herds' together on the smaller ranges. The big event helps to reassure instructors that traditional dances are still popular and must be retained on the weekly menu.

No one denies the value of new dances as a vital stimulant, but they are not yet essential foodstuffs. While the few rush to try each new dance, the majority are happy to wait. They seem to know that if a dance is good it will be around long enough for them to learn in their own time.

Remember, the saying - the old bull does not rush to meet a new herd, he waits for the cows to come to him...

Pressure at the big event for the latest dances will frequently come from choreographers/instructors who may be anxious to impress. Alternatively there may well be a large group booking determined to learn and dance the latest numbers.

Amongst the dancers at the event, harmony begins to bond. Dancers have travelled together, have been eating and drinking together, and now dance together. New friends are made and good oldfashioned English reserve brushed aside.

Line dancing is the common thread, competitiveness is the cloak and harmonisation is the result. Whether drink induced or a result of good-natured training it is the attitude attached to particular dances that tends to be noticed, copied, and 'rustled' at these events. Recent memories of short sharp heavy breathing accompanying hip thrusts during 4 Wheel Drive, finger snapping in beats held with All Night Sambo, and double daps in beats 2/3 while knees are raised in Midnight Waltz have established those dances in the minds of participants. It is such attitude incorporated into

dances that bring them to life or to renew interest in some old dances.

The magic of the big occasion, and not just the full weekend, is at its most visible as visitors, whether dancers or not, dress in their finest cowboy/cowgirl outlits. Resplendent in boots, charity-badge decorated hats and more. Rare would it be for anyone present not to browse around and maybe buy western items or music from the usual trade stalls. The range and attractiveness of the many items on display is a delight to all, particularly as few high street shops carry such wares.

For most line dancers and their instructors the 'big event' is an important part of the calendar and some attend many every year. It enables dancers to learn new dances, to compare level of OWN competence and progress, meet new friends and maybe, even, to verify their interpretation of a dance sheet.

Properly used these events can help individual business to prosper as subsequent classes will still 'buzz' of the event and so attendances can climb with revenue growing accordingly.

For the line dance industry as a whole, large events provide opportunities and revenue to groups, build reputations, balster self-confidence, and encourages their understanding and participation.

Each 'herd' of dancers and every small business has to have a life-support mechanism, and one that will reach corner every the 'range'.

The big event or special occasion is one such mechanism which can be enjoyed by all.



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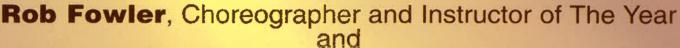
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The Truth Is

Standards and Legends

Where have all the great ones gone long time passing...
Where have all the great ones gone long time ago...
Where have all the great ones gone We slowly forgot them one by one...

I'm having melancholy thoughts as I travel today by train to Switzerland from Germany. I have just picked up a newspaper that said, "Roy Rogers, the King of Cowboys is dead." It makes me sad to think of so many of the things in my life that have influenced my music career and now they are gone. Just a month or so ago we lost Tammy Wynette, Frank Sinatra, and last year we lost Mae Boren Axton (writer of Elvis' first million seller, Heartbreak Hotel). Irreplaceable legends. Opryland is now a shopping mall and The Grand Ole Opry is no longer the Opry I grew up with. The legends are no longer created on the stage from pure talent but now with the help of technology and lots of money. Where is all this coming from and more important where is it leading?

Well, dancing of course - and dances, dances, and more dances. The ones that will come and go, the ones that will become standards, and the one or two that have become a legend. I am touring in Germany at the time of this writing and as I am going from venue to venue in the smaller towns I am asking myself, where are the instructors? I am talking about the ones who are trying to keep our industry alive. I see hundreds of people wanting to learn line dancing and there is no one to teach them. The energy is there yet they don't know any of the standard dances. Instructors who are taking the time to come to continental Europe seem to be interested in only one thing - themselves! They don't care if dancers learn the standard dances but care more about the dances they are creating.

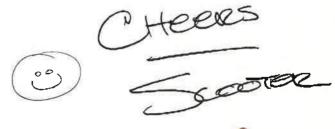
I walk into a venue and ask how many know Crusin' or Rock Around The Clock or Cowboy Charleston and they look at me dumbfounded. They know Barstool Stomp or Berlin Boogie or Backstreet Slide. Then I go to another city and they know none of the above and give me six more dances I've never heard of I looked at my promoter and asked him, "How do you expect line dancing to explode in this country as it has in Britain and the USA if you don't teach some basics and standard dances?" He responded that the instructors that are coming are saying the dances that they are teaching are being done everywhere in the world and how is he supposed to know the difference? What a dilemma - it's made me very sad. I don't have the answer, I know I 'harp on' about this all the time but I have to say it again. If we want this phenomenon to continue it will be important that we keep teaching some of the classic dances. We have new people coming in all the time and no basics dances are being taught. We are so busy trying to keep up with the latest that we are forgetting to teach some of the greatest. Besides everyone knows them anyway, or shouldn't they? Well, if you are not going to teach them, who is? Let them learn it on their own you say? Easier said than done. In the USA I tour from east to west and north to south, I ask how many know "Rock Around The Clock" or "Double Duchess" and I get blank stares. How can you not know "Rock Around The Clock"? Or even worse how can you not know Crusin' or Waltz Across Texas? What great dances! Everyone should know a line dance for a Cha Cha Rhythm, a 2-Step line dance for a 2-Step Rhythm and Waltz line dance for a waltz rhythm. We need a basic cha cha that will fit every song out there that has a cha cha rhythm. I personally feel that Crusin' fits



the bill. I don't know any Cha Cha song that you can't do Crusin' to. But I know lots of Cha Cha dances that don't fit every cha cha song. Shadows Cha Cha was written for Shadows In The Night. It fits best with that song but not many other songs but most of the time I call Crusin' anyway because I have no doubt it will work. Midnight Waltz is a wonderful dance but it doesn't go with every waltz song so I call Waltz Aaross Texas as it does go with every waltz rhythm ever written and it can be done to slower waltzes and faster waltzes.

So why wouldn't you teach a dance that can be done no matter what the tune? We have standards and legends in dancing as well. Tush Push is a legend and will never be forgotten. I have never been to a country yet that doesn't know Tush Push. But stop and think about what dances we have now that we can say will go down in history? Maybe Waltz Across Texas, maybe Crusin' but do we have others? I had always hoped that Honky Tonk Twist would be one and possibly Louisiana Hot Sauce but I find they are being taught less and less and it is assumed that everyone knows them anyway. Five years from now will they be remembered? What about Jose Cuervo, Watermelon Crawl, Fly Like A Bird, Black Coffee, Scotia Samba, Dizzy and Electric Reel? Will they be remembered after I stop touring and Max Peny and Jo Thompson and the others have retired from travelling and instructing?

I sure hope so.

The word was out ... The "King and Queen" of Country Western Dance, Dick and Geneva Matteis, were to grace Irish shores for a second time. Ann Cunningham and Damian Brady of the W.D.A.I. played host to their guests at the regular venue of The Mourne Country Hotel in Newry, Country Down.

In 1984 they were the first to introduce country western dance to the Britain and Europe. Though Country Western clubs existed there were no structured dances and the couple's dance tuition consisted mainly of partner steps which were received very well.

After a busy day of meetings and instructors' workshops the night got under way with some energetic line dancing, although the demand for a "royal audience" became more insistent as the night wore on. Despite this they kept their promise to teach four new

dances - Cripple Creek, Sink or Swim,
Zydeco Lady, Patacake Polka. And in
true American style Geneva
taught each dance in a laid
back, easy way but the eager
crowd was just "dying" to

get them going on the dance floor.

It was soon time for my interview and I started with a little background. Dick and Geneva live Virginia in a small town called Hayes. Country western dance brought them together and remains a special part of their lives, keeping them active and 'on the go'. "The best part of our dancing is the opportunity to meet and make friends with people around the world. We always extend a special invitation to dancers travelling to south-eastern Virginia to give us a call so that we may enjoy

a visit and some dance fun." they said.

After winning numerous country western dance competitions in the early 1980's, Dick and Geneva decided to train to become instructors and began their teaching career fifteen years ago. Their teaching and performing experiences include Festival Disney (Euro Disney), Pleasure Island (Disney World), Dollywood, Nashville TV Network and many major sanctioned dance competitions in the US.

As they could only visit the UK two or three times a year, it was decided to established a school of country western dance instruction and teacher training in the United Kingdom. That was in 1985 and the training school, The D & G School of Country Western Dance, is now operated under the direction of Brian and Anne Bambury.

Because of their passion for country western music and dance Dick and Geneva wanted to keep it alive and

loved to see people enjoy themselves. They felt that the level of dance would not improve unless competition introduced and they wanted standards to get better. In 1988 held they first competition in Torquay, though chiefly a couples competition they did have what was called a "fun line dance competition" with little structure and few rules. Nineteen ninety four witnessed their first major line dance competition but the couple both agree that line dancing really took off around 1990. The catalyst was, arguably, Billy Ray Cyrus' song, Achy Breaky Heart that helped escalate line dancing to its present

According to the Matteis' their school is the only country western dance school endorsed by the National Teacher Association (NTA) and by the United Country Western Dance Council (UCWDC). They belong to the NTA where Geneva serves as a Zone Director and are members of the UCWDC where she serves on the executive board as the European Representative.

The UCWDC governs, sanctions and oversees more than 50 major country western dance competitions and is host to the annual World Country Western Dance Championships.

They are the directors of the British Country Western Dance Championship (nów in its 11th year) held in Torquay and also codirect several other dance events including the Northern Lights Dance Festival, European Country Western Dance Championships, London Dance Classic and the Scottish Gathering of Country Western Dancers.

You need only compete (not place) in two UCDWC events to qualify for the Worlds Championship.

One of their favourite projects is a dance programme they developed in 1988 for wheelchair participants. They are choreographers and directors for a wheelchair performing team called "Dancing Wheels" who have performed at several major dance events and on the Nashville TV Network programs Club Dance and Wild Horse Saloon.

And if that isn't enough to keep them busy they write a monthly dance column for Country Star magazine and contribute to several other dance magazines and association newsletters.

When they are not travelling, Dick and Geneva can be found at Heartbreak Alley Nightclub Hampton, Virginia on Tuesday and Thursday nights and, to keep busy, they have served for the past 13 years as judges for regional, national and international competitions.

During their stay the couple said they were amazed at the energy displayed by their Irish hosts. When two teenagers, attending a wedding reception in the hotel, posed a question was asked of Dick and Geneva, which nicely summed up our meeting. They asked "are you line dancers?" "Yes" was their simple reply. Almost in unison the girls said "you look cool, we should try that some time." Staying in modest form and with a big smile, Dick replied, "yes you should, it's a lotta' fun!!"

I couldn't agree more!

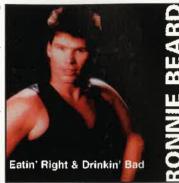
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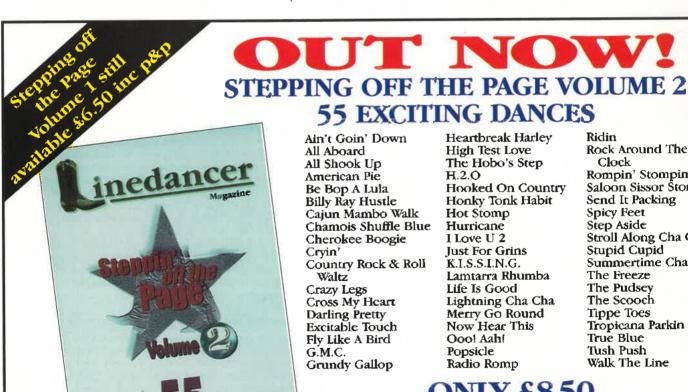
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Boots N Blisters

What makes a successful 'Capital Club'? Linedancer poses the questions to Emma Wilkinson, co-founder of the London based Line Dance Club Boots 'n' Blisters.

Why Line dancing?

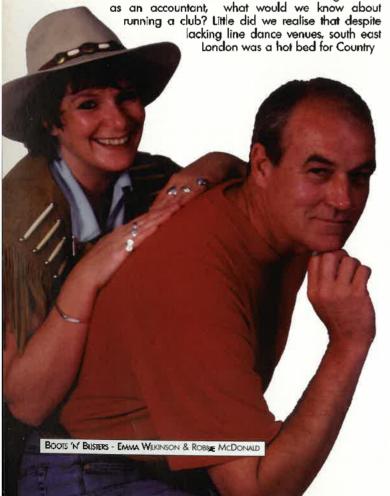
Long before either of us had even heard of line dancing, my partner Robbie Mc Donald was a country music fan. Although I had always enjoyed dancing - my sister is a professional dancer - I plumped for a career in art. I came to enjoy the music more, and discovered that it isn't all about dogs dying, men being unfaithful and houses being repossessed. Years on, friends returned from a holiday in the US, and told us of the existence of American Line Dancing, we promised each other that as soon as we found somewhere that did it we would have a go. Anyway to cut a long stary short, we eventually found somewhere, and went along.

And Then You Were Hooked?

No not really. Robbie and I didn't take up line dancing in the same manner as so many do - with full gusto. We gently drifted into it. For many months we would attend only once a fortnight, Robbie would sometimes dance, but mainly sit with a drink listening to the music. There were fewer dances then, so when you learned a dance you danced it so regularly that it stuck.

So When Did You Decide To Start Your Own Club?

We decided that if we couldn't find anywhere else offering what we wanted we would have to start up a place of our own. It was Robbie's idea that I thought was a pipe dream that would fizzle out, I didn't think for one moment that it would actually happen. After all I was an illustrator and fine artist, and Robbie was working full time



Music, it was almost a community. We grew friendly with the people involved but a year later still we hadn't found what we were looking for. Robbie was given the opportunity to take redundancy, so here was our chance and we took it.

How did you get the club off the ground?

Once the decision was made, we went full steam ahead. With my grounding in graphic design, I knew the importance of image and presentation, so first things first, we needed a name that would make people smile, said line dance club and had the onus on fun. We also needed for people to recognise that we were also a young and lively country music club. Not an easy task, but two weeks later we had Boots N Blisters Brand New Country (usually shortened to 'Boots N Blisters'). Our intention was to place ourselves between the line dance and country music clubs and endeavour to encapsulate them both in our own way, without treading on anybody else's toes.

Next came the venue, we wanted to remain local and a bar was essential. After viewing at least a dozen premises we found what we were looking for, good dance floor, cheap bar, and the potential for a great atmosphere. So, we had the name, the premises, then came the logo. One old style Mexican, one new style American cowboy boot. I chose not to have a pair for several reasons, separate boots to signify you don't need a partner, different types of boot to suit different tastes, one old, one new. Most importantly it was a logo that would be easily recognised, and one that I could play with.

Getting the local community on side was definitely a step in the right direction. Day one arrived, and boy oh boy were we nervous, would anyone show? Well there was no need to worry, 45 happy faces, eager to take part in the hottest new dance craze, I believe, all bar one absolute beginners. I loved it, Robbie, who was now DJ, loved it, and the crowd came back for more, so presumably they did too!

Before long, word had spread and the class was rapidly becoming too big, demand for decent tuition was great. We needed to expand so in October of the same year we started our second night. We both feel that despite the fact that learning to line dance is great fun and good exercise it should be a means to an end. The aim to be knowing enough fun dances to enjoy yourself on the floor. Surely one's enjoyment is stifled if you never get a chance to put into practice all those line dances.

Now this is going to sound cliched, but we wanted to start a dub where every night is party night. We intended to have bands but a lot of dancers become frightened when it comes to dancing to live music, so for these reasons we didn't charge into it, we waited eight months and it was worth it.

Have things worked out the way you had imagined?

Boots N Blisters has continued to expand, having started another night at a new venue, also in south east London, we now have over 300 members. We have presented some of the very best bands in the Country. We were determined to do things well and two years on, though it's been a struggle at times, both financially, physically & emotionally, I'm happy that we're getting there.

How do you see the future?

We aim to continue to teach line dancing to the public in a fun and friendly manner, to demonstrate that there's lots of funky and fun country music to dance to, and to present the best British bands. Obviously line dancing isn't for everyone, it would be boring if everyone enjoyed the same pastime. But two years on line dancing in Britain is second in popularity only to bingo, and the best is yet to come.

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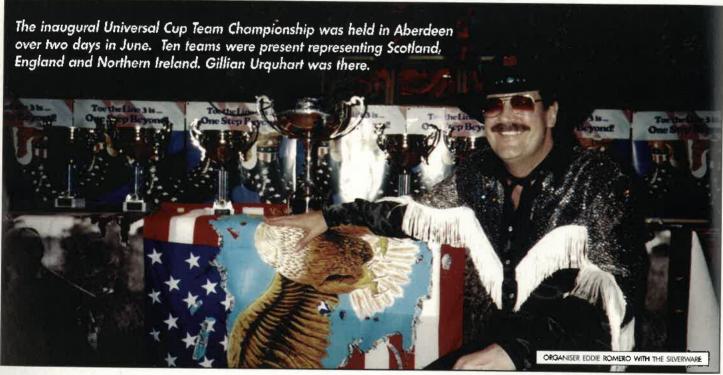

After the heats the disco took over and spectators filled the dance floor dancing many popular dances to same unusual tracks which Collie seemingly specialises in, despite this not going down well with an element within the crowd who preferred more familiar music.

The evening session began with a selection of Kimber Clayton tracks played to set the mood for the American "Wild Child" who was set to appear later. During the evening an urgent appeal went out for a copy of our June edition as the dance steps were needed for an impromptu

lesson from Liz Clarke who was needed to teach Addicted To Love. The aim to enable dancers to give Kimber a nice surprise when she sung the song later that evening.

After all the preparation Kimber burst onto the stage like a human dynamo, launching into a rendition of Ring of Fire which had the audience singing along. Next up was eight year old Sinead McGavigan, the All Ireland and Scotland Junior Champion, who strode confidently onto the dance floor. She danced a very athletic Honky Tonk Twist, the envy of many dancers who could only dream of being so supple. Her reward was a huge round of applause.

After Kimber's second set the crowd wanted more and were set for a long 'stint'. The Cowgirl Twist filled the dance floor and although it was now 1 am all present were enjoying themselves hugely.

Day two of the competition dawned and bleary eyed spectators and competitors emerged to participate in the workshops. Liz Clarke, Ros Brander-Stephenson and Margaret Broadhurst-Clegg had dancers on the floor exercising both brains and feet. Liz began by teaching Rob Fowler's A Piece of Cake and then taught the packed dance floor Let 'er Rip, a Peter Metelnick dance of 120 counts. Studious expressions could be seen on dancers faces as they tried to get the hang of it, yet it was such a success the majority of dancers were oblivious to the thunder, lightning and torrential rain outside.

Ros took over the teaching with two of her dances Fame, which can be danced to the track of the same name and then a slower dance called Shadows, to Shadows in The Night by Scooter Lee. Liz then returned to complete the workshop by teaching another Rob Fowler dance called Shocker. 'Oor Lizzie' was in her usual good form throughout the afternoon despite being woken up at two thirty that morning when a porter arrived at her bedroom door with her breakfast only to discover he was at the wrong room! Despite this, the Scotia Samba star didn't flag all day.

Sunday evening arrived with social dancing before the final began. The atmosphere was tense as the first team took to the floor. All of the teams gave splendid performances which were really appreciated by the crowd. As the judges deliberated the dance floor was again filled with spectators and competitors alike until the results were announced. The winning team was adjudged to be Nickles and Dimes who collected

the Universal Cup itself and £1,000 cheque, in addition to being voted the best dressed team, an award sponsored by Aberdeen Football Club. The Marine Stompers came second winning £500, followed by the Heroes and Villains in third, taking a cheque for £300 back to Gloucestershire. Fourth were the Fermanagh Flyers who won £200, in fifth place were the Strathspey Stompers winning £150, followed in sixth place by the Footloose Fillies who won £100.

The winners sparkled in their silver outfits as they were presented with the Universal Cup by Kimber Clayton. The team later revealed that their current line-up had only been dancing together for a fortnight and their routine, danced to Billy B Bad, had only taken a few hours to choreograph.

The end of the weekend was rapidly approaching but not before Scottish band Hullaballoo made their appearance. The party atmosphere really took off as those dancers still standing were determined to make the most of the time left and danced into the small hours of Monday morning to lots of favourite line dance songs.

Organiser Eddie Romero announced that the Universal Cup would repeat next year, the venue to be announced. All I can say is roll on next year!

If you go down to Lowestoft you'll be sure of a big surprise.

No, not a teddy bear's picnic, it's better than that! There's a real live roller skating, line dancing, fast talking auctioneer who, in the evening exchanges his mallet for a microphone. Liz Holding met him.

The man in question goes by the name of Maurice Waller who, with his wife Mary, set up their classes in Lowestoft and the nearby village of Kessingland just fifteen months ago. They call themselves the Trailblazers Line Dance Company and Maurice has taken the town of Lowestoft in Suffolk by storm.



Going Once, Going Twice

First impressions of Maurice are of his undoubtable talent for teaching, combined with flair and style in his dancing - two talents which we know don't always go together. He is refreshingly modest about his skills, summing up his success in a nutshell - "I just love to dance - that's all."

Maurice works ten hours a day, five day week as an auction room manager, and is out and running his classes by 8pm four nights out of five. He does charity gigs at weekends, and on his Friday night off, surprise, surprise, he goes western partner dancing at the Wild Stallion Dance Ranch in Norwich. As he says, "It's nice for Mary and myself to do something together."

The energy and drive of this '56-going-on-20-year-old' is amazing. Mary says "In 34 years of marriage he never stops surprising me in what he can accomplish. He never confesses to feeling tired, in spite of long days at work and long evenings teaching." Maybe Maurice can let us into his secret. Maurices's talent and enthusiasm for dancing came purely by accident when in 1982 his two daughters Elizabeth and Petrina started roller skating at the Waveney Roller Skating Club, Great Yarmouth. Mary and the girls announced to Maurice that they had also joined him up too!

He showed a talent for skating, thanks to his natural rhythm and style. He had soon passed his grade 6 exam and instructor's course before entering and winning competitions. Ultimately though, the competitive element was not for Maurice, who firmly believes in friendship and fun rather than rivalry.

For seven years he held the post of Treasurer at the club. However, a friend persuaded Maurice to try a new type of dancing - line dancing,

and he was smitten! He was so overwhelmed by this new passion that he resigned as treasurer and swopped his roller skates for a pair of western boots. He began his first small class with a friend in 1996 in a school gym, and this was followed 15 months later with Mary and himself booking the Lowestoft F.C.'s club, where his first class saw over 150 pairs of dancing feet through the door:

The rest is history, as they say. Maurice goes from strength to strength with packed classes every week, his enthusiasm creating enjoyment for his dancers.

Success is not so much because he simply "loves to dance" but more likely to be because modest Maurice has a sincere and simple, no nonsense approach to life which is embedded into his teaching. "I don't have to do this for a living, I have a job in the auction room which I love." It's just the 'icing on the cake' for Maurice, whether there's six or sixty in his dasses.

But there never will be six because Maurice cares deeply about his dancers and likes to include a wide variety of music and dances. He understands most of his dancers come for a night's relaxation and not a technical exercise involving complicated dance steps. Whilst he loves new country music best he also infuses techno covers like Ghost Riders in the Sky for Wild Stallion and the latino influence of the Mavericks into his routines.

At the moment he and his dass enjoy Scotia Samba as their current favourite. However, a recent poll showed the most popular dance in all his classes was still good old Matador which clearly proves how we all like to dance the old favourites as well as the new.

Forever imprinted on Maurice's mind will be the very first dance he learnt. "Total confusion" is how he described the steps to Tennessee Twister, until a mental pattern eventually emerged from the routine.

Oasis, was the first dance he ever taught, and such was the emotion of the evening, its melody still brings on 'first night nerves' whenever it's played.

Maurice's skill in the auction room enables him to communicate well to dancers but the warmth and sincerity are his own - long may it 'trailblaze' his energy towards line dancing.

We hope it will be a very long time before the gavel comes down on these happy dancers from Lowestoft!



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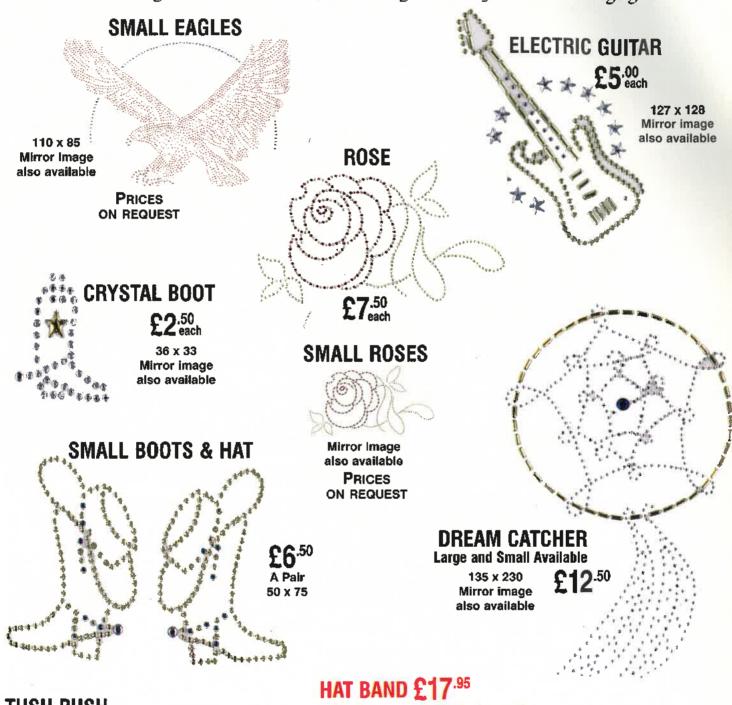

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The Good, ball, and the USIV

Oh No! I hear you say, not another Clint Eastwood feature. Fear not, dear reader, John Stapleton brings you the story of the band - not the film.

If hard work, devotion to duty and concentration of effort are suitably rewarded then the Good, Bad, and Ugly would already be a household name. But, as we all know, no matter how much talent is present in the 'real' world it will never be enough.

To strum skilfully, sing tunefully, play harmoniously or to write and compose creatively will not, without large portions of luck, guarantee success. To be in the right place at the right time is essential.

Geoff Parker, Barry Bray and Dave Burkitt formed the group to cater specifically for line dancers and were 'spawned' from the line dance group Richmond County Liners. All three recognised the potential when Barry's wife Raye started line dancing classes in Skegness. Overwhelmed by recruits it soon became apparent that the demand for line dance bands exceeded supply. For although there was an abundance of Country & Western singers and groups around few, at that time, had a repertoire to suit line dancers. As 'GBU' had a history

in guitar and song they soon put together an act, and have stayed in work ever since.

One reason is that they always announce the established line dance for each track they are to perform, or advise alternative dances. Most venues appreciate such announcements.

New recruits to line dancing will not be aware of the speed at which the line dancing scene has changed in the last two years. More has happened than in the previous ten. East coast line dance pioneer, Raye Bray and her large group of

supporters keep the band up-to-date with the latest dances and accompanying music.

Both Barry and Geoff are experienced and enthusiastic dancers. Each of them are guitarists and vocalists, although Dave tends to be the Bass specialist. They each have a different style to suit the range of numbers coming from the industry. Because both Barry and Geoff are eager and adept line dancers, it is not unknown for them to join in on the floor when not on duty - no matter where the gig.

Barry has a special affection for Fly Like a Bird which shows in his rendition yet Geoff favours Playa Silencio, being proud of Dave Sheriff's tuition for that number. The third member of the group, Dave, enjoys the Sleazy Slide and, despite being the non-dancer of the trio, enjoys watching every dance. The band's current favourites include Razor Sharp - Barry - while Geoff finds Tropicana Parking Lot 'almost irresistible'.

All three made their public debuts in the 70's, Geoff on keyboard, Barry and Dave on guitar. They did not set the world alight at the time, and recognising their workhorse role, they have no illusions about the big time. While they have talent it soon becomes apparent that to 'make it to the top' is not a burning ambition. Asked about their future plans, Geoff suggests "retirement", Barry aims only to "stay out of trouble", with Dave only looking for "a future in recording".

It is, perhaps, indicative of how our industry has changed of late that the band's major musical influences have only a coincidental association with line dancing, for they include Johnny Cash, Willie Nelson, Waylon Jennings, Merle Haggard, Alan Jackson, and, of course, The Mavericks.

Yet the repertoire of this versatile band covers the bulk of today's favourites, each with the stamp of individuality, but close enough to

satisfy the scrutiny and discriminating demand of many of our line dancers. They have yet to play the Irish tracks though.

Their success, or achievement as they would admit it as, has come from their love of music, the challenge to their abilities and a need to step out of every-day life and relieve the stress.

A more business-like appraisal would suggest they are attuned to real market demand, satisfying a universal need, at a realistic rate - in commercial terms, the right product, at the right price, at the right time, and at the right place. In that sense

they have no need to become famous, for they are doing what they want to do for people who appreciate it. They have a following which will travel more than twenty miles for a local gig; no mean achievement in these no drink-no drive days.

The Good, Bad, and Ugly have had what they consider to be their special achievement, in 1997 and 1998 they have appeared at music festivals with the likes of Dave Sheriff, and Texas Gun. Being in such company is a major boost to their self-esteem. They are a band for 'all seasons', a band for all those gigs around the East Midlands where a live group is wanted, a group that announces dances to accompany its music, a group that plays for the love of their trade rather than a path to gold.

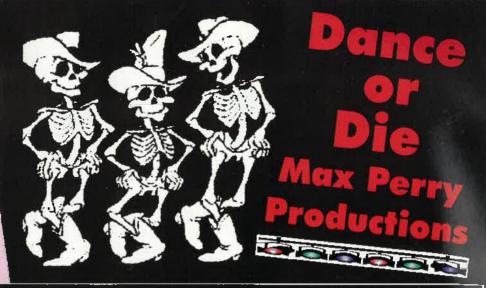
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Love in the line

Line dancers are a friendly bunch. You only have to make a mistake in the line and find yourself looking at forty or more friendly faces to realise that. It's therefore not surprising when romance starts to blossom, but when it happens in your circle of friends it is something special.

About two years ago we all started going to our class in ones them holding hands and smiling into each others eyes in and twos and slowly a group of about 8 or 10 began to gel.

Adrian Hayton was a nice single guy. He has great social skills and would cruise around the table making conversation with almost all the 80 to 100 people who went to our club -Shyboots & Stompers. band or singer we should invite to play at the wedding. Adrian would like Suzy Boguss but guess that's just wishful thinking.



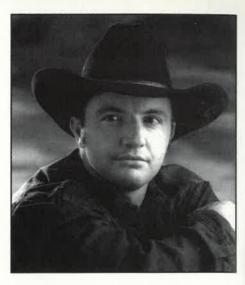

This matter was taken up with the organiser, senior judge and

I would question the logic of a marking system that decided positions by accumulated scores across two dances. It must be said that the judging system this year was much better than last, however there are certain anomalies which must be addressed if people are to be encouraged to participate in future competitions. It would be nice to know if other contestants have a view on the championships.

know what to do about it". Great guy for a line dance judge! Based on the poor treatment line dancers received at the festival, I can certainly believe this comment was made.

Friday workshops were rescheduled without notification. The instructor for our line dance workshop pointedly asked "Is anyone interested in taking a lesson or is it all right to let 'them' continue practising?"... by them he meant the couples who were using the dance floor. The DJ was playing couples music.

When we entered the "New Choreography" room Saturday morning, we found no equipment, no air conditioning and wall-to-wall carpeting. The other two workshop rooms were also carpeted.

At the Saturday night dance, line

dancers were ignored until the majority of couple dancers had left (around 10:00 p.m). Only then did the DJ play from a line dance request list presented to him earlier in the evening (name of dance and music included so there was no effort on his part). We only had one hour because the DJ got permission to shut down at 11:00 p.m., even though the dance was scheduled to go on until midnight.

Unfortunately, this is often the way of things at these festivals. The exception to the rule was Mike Bendavid's festival at Cal State Northridge last August. Mike switched floors on Saturday morning because the line dancers significantly outnumbered the couples. The line dancers were moved to the large, high-céilinged room with a wooden floor.

Needless to say, they will return to Mike's event this year in force. We "rude" line dancers who are "ruining country dancing" need to find and support an organisation which appreciates. advances and encourages the art form that we love. If such an organisation does not exist. couldn't our globe-trotting, talented choreographers and instructors organise one? Perhaps on an international level that way we could save the money we waste on current festivals and go to events near or far where we know we would be welcomed with open arms.

Somewhere, there must be a Line Dance Heaven, and I hope to find it here in the USA, where it all began.

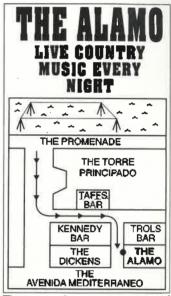

During our recent visit to Benidorm I had great trouble locating the Alamo which has been mentioned a few times in letters published.



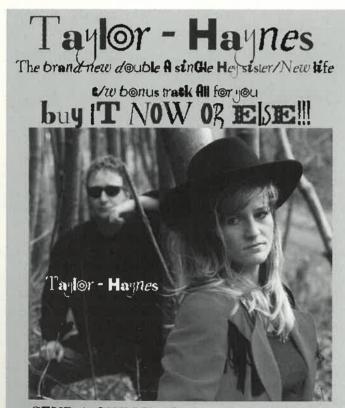
