HEATWAVE



With temperatures in the late 80s and early 90s, you could be forgiven for thinking that I'd travelled all the way to Dubai to interview Diana Tattarakis, writes Tim Matthews.

ut no! It was a hot, sticky and steamy night in downtown Denton (near Manchester) when I caught up with Di on her final day's holiday in the UK. She was guest teacher at Strutting Stars LDC, whilst regular instructor Gill was sunning herself in Anglesey...

Dubai is one of seven of the United Arab Emirates and I wondered why, or how, anyone could dance in 130-degree heat. Puts our 95+ to shame! Anyway, the usual reasons apply; Westerners working contracts in Dubai need something to do! Much of the out-of-work activity revolves around private clubs and facilities and Di has been able to build her Dubai Liners club up to 30-40 regulars. This may not sound like a lot but hundreds of dancers have attended events over the few years that Di has offered lessons and socials. "People come and go out here," she told me. "They make a ton of money and off they go. I've been here for a long time in comparison with most others. I work as a school administrator and have recently gone through a divorce and I found that Line dancing very much kept me going in these difficult times."

Diana was bought up in Long Island on the Eastern seaboard of the United States and lived in the Bronx, New York, for a long time. She has two teenage sons, John (16) and Chris (13, an excellent dancer, by all accounts). Line dancing is a focal point for Diana now and she organises parties and socials as well as classes. So who turns up? "Mainly Brits, Americans, Australians, South

Africans and a few Asians," she says, "and the occasional local too! It's brutal here in summer but the big hotels, which are of the highest quality – some are seven stars – have excellent air conditioning, which means that dancing is comfortable."

She first came across Line dancing eight years ago and remembers how difficult it was to get scripts and information. "Happily, this wonderful magazine called *Linedancer* appeared in '96," Diana told me, "and I combined this with the growing availability of scripts on the Internet to get what I needed.

The heatwave we were experiencing in Denton was added to by Di's sheer energy. On the night she taught Jan Brookfield's *Pins and Needles*, a very enjoyable, Beginner-Intermediate 32-count dance to *Jagged Edge* by Bering Strait. This track sounds entirely different to *Porushka* though! The alternative music by Fontella Bass is Soul Cool! Next up, Diana's very own *Respect*, a 32-count dance that we all managed with a lively triple full turn in the fourth section, to Aretha Franklin's smash hit, *Respect*. Last teach? Kiss My Cheek, by Andrew, Simon and Sheila, which, by now requires little introduction and is a floor filler across the land.

This was Diana's last date on a tour that took in A Rob Fowler weekend in Blackpool, the big charity bash for Willow Wood in Manchester, an event in Newcastle-Upon-Tyne, a Maggie G event in Surrey and classes in Liverpool! "I came over two years ago and visited this time to see what was happening on the dance floor," Diana told me. "There are so many dances, so much style. I love the freedom of choice and, on a personal


note, I could watch Maggie forever. I've stayed three weeks this time and thoroughly enjoyed myself. My friends in Dubai won't know what's hit them!"

Central to Di's busy schedule was support from her friend Lin Houston, a New Zealander, who lives Rhosneigr, Anglesey, where Di was based. "Lin has been wonderful to me and I'd like to thank her through your magazine," she enthused. "We have driven hundreds of miles and the only thing she needs to worry about is that I want to come back...real soon!"

A simple title but the Masters in Line World Championships, held at the Winter Gardens, Blackpool, over the weekend 8th-10th August, was a truly World Class event.

DANCE MASTERS

Linedancer reports...

hen Masters in Line was formed in 2001, there were various predictions from Line dance pundits. "It's a great idea," some said. "It won't last six months," claimed others. Perhaps some underestimated Rob, Rachael, Paul and Pedro's desire, and ability, to organise something of the scale of Blackpool, Summer 2003. Whatever

the case, Masters in Line is growing and is said by some to be the most exciting venture in Line dance for the last few years.

After the success of the British Masters late last year, the MIL team went into 2003 with high hopes. It is fair to say that all expectations have been exceeded and the organisation is now in a position to make extraordinary gains in 2004-5. "We've made tremendous progress," said Rob Fowler, in a post-event interview. "We are just so happy at the way things have gone. We couldn't have worked any harder to provide competitors with what they wanted and needed from us."

Competitors are the key. 375 of them converged on Blackpool's many hotels, guesthouses and B+B's during the week of the championships. When they donned their stunning competition outfits and stepped out onto the floor of the fabulous Winter Gardens ballroom to applause from hundreds of supporters, onlookers and fellow dancers, they cannot have failed to be impressed both by the atmosphere and the organisation.

You see, in the past competition events have been dogged by a number of problems to do with timing, late heats, dancers running from room to room and an accumulation of unnecessary stress. Talking to competitors and their families the one thing that became clear was how well the MIL team had done to keep things on schedule. "Actually, we're ahead of schedule," said a beaming Rachael McEnaney as she walked past on Saturday morning. Judges and floor coordinators worked in perfect harmony and, apart from a tiny glitch with a CD player during afternoon social dancing on Saturday, we moved seamlessly from division to division.

The whole event cost just over £50,000 to organise. "We wanted to create the right feel and to use World class facilities," said Rob. "So there could be no cutting of costs and using lesser venues. Holding it in Blackpool proved to be just right and we also got some positive TV coverage too!"

"But," he continued, "you are right to mention competitors. Providing what they need is what initially led to Masters In Line being created. That was our focus at the start and remains our focus today. We wanted to do things differently and we thought we could do better, so we went into this with our eyes open knowing that if we did things right we'd get a result." And what a result it was...

> This was indeed a world event. talked to competitors from Europe, Australia and North America. (American visitors included Brian Barakauskas and the Amatos.) They loved every minute of it. Carol

Ann, one of South Africa's leading proponents of Line dance, had flown in specially to see if she could arrange for a South African Masters event to be held. She said that the weekend had been fantastic too ...

The three-day event followed a relatively simple format. Heats on Friday and Saturday followed by competition finals on Sunday. That only tells a small part of the story though. Interspersed within the championships were two evening socials of the highest standard featuring some wonderful cabaret routines by the Masters In Line team. Over two nights the DJ team of Gary

Lafferty, Ed Lawton, Steve Neck, Daniel Whittaker, Louis St. George and Big Dave

Baycroft offered eager partici-

pants over 100 dances whilst Rob, Rachael, Paul and Pedro provided us with entertainment featuring Hollywood themes and clowns! One thing is for sure; they never disappoint when it comes to devising ever more complicated and challenging routines. On Friday it was as if PT Barnum himself had walked into the room. The displays followed a big top "circus" theme. The highlights were many and varied but Paul and Rachael's dancing won everyone's heart. Paul was dressed as a traditional clown, with white face and dark clothing. Rachael, dressed as a ballerina, was a puppet "brought to life" by her partner. The

skill and delicacy required here was incredible.

Not guite so delicate the clowning around from Pedro and Rob who got their water pistols out (again) and caused mayhem. Being a clown comes so naturally to Mr. Fowler!

A cast of younger "circus"

dancers from the championship's Primary Divisions supported the MIL team. A nice touch.

Saturday night and it was time for the masquerade ball! People kept asking us what a "masquerade ball" actually is. Don't ask us! Trips to Blackpool's joke shops provided a number of bizarre encounters of the masked kind and everyone made a big effort that added to the sense

of occasion. The cabaret followed a general Broadway theme, with contributions from Rachael (dancing Moulin Rouge style), a Western offering from Rob, Paul and Pedro, Can Can girls (Jamie Davis, Liz Clarke, Cheryl Ainsworth, Dawn Sherlock, Shaz Walton and friends), barmy (or is that balmy?) sailors (in South Pacific mode, including our dance editor, Steve Healy, with Aiden Montgomery, Craig Bennett, Rob and Pedro) and plenty more social dancing.

> Away from the main dance area we visited the Spanish Ballroom on several occasions. The medium-sized room, with an excellent sprung dance floor, witnessed three days of workshops, headed up by leading choreographers. This provided an exciting alternative and was part of the MIL team's attempts to mix the social and competitive sides.

> > The only problem here was beyond even Rob Fowler's mighty team. The temperature outside the building was approaching 100





degrees and the Spanish Ballroom's glass roof made dancing a little uncomfortable. Nevertheless, there was some great new choreography on offer in a relaxed environment. There were too many highlights to mention and a handful of the dances taught will, no doubt, become floor-filling hits during the latter part of the year. (See the separate box for details.)

Masters In Line events are held under CWDC rules and it was interesting to get comments from organisation officials Helen O'Malley, who was judging at Blackpool, and CWDC Press Officer Bill Jewkes. "It was a fantastic weekend," said Helen. "The Irish contingent loved the competition, enjoyed the social dancing and was able to have fun shopping...and mucking around on the beach. Great place to hold it, Blackpool!"

"It is great to see the CWDC and MIL working together," said Bill. "This is what we are looking for and the competitors come first. I think the Masters' team has done a great job and I'm proud to be associated with it."

the competition circuit, and who trains many of our leading dancers, was effusive in his praise. "Everything is going extremely well," he said when we caught up with him on Saturday afternoon. "The whole thing is running on time, if not ahead of schedule, and the competitors are being treated extremely well. It has been a great success."

Everyone we spoke to, whether competitor, supporter or viewer, agreed that the standard of dancing in the competition section was of the highest verv calibre. It would not fair 🥏 to highlight individual successes, as everyone who took part deserves praise for their efforts. As Helen O'Malley pointed out, "You have to admire dancers in these circumstances. The hours and hours of practice, organising the competition outfit, travelling from heat to heat

to venue to venue is an awesome responsibility. The judges were very impressed by the dancing over the weekend."

Suffice to say that Rob Fowler was in buoyant mood when we spoke to him a couple of days after the dust had settled on the Winter Gardens main ballroom. "Only a few people realise what it took to organise this event. When we first started this we knew what we wanted but it couldn't have turned out better. I believe we've set a new standard over the weekend by offering £25,000 plus in actual prizes. We provided competitors with a certificate, whatever their placing, and we actually rolled out a red carpet for each of them! We know what they want because we've all been there, standing on an empty dance floor, butterflies in stomach. That's why this is working so well, because it's organised by Line dancers exclusively for Line dancers."

This is only the start for Masters In Line, according to Rob. "We are expanding and growing all the time. We have an effective strategy and by 2005 we hope to be in something like 30 countries, spreading the Masters In Line philosophy. We are doing some special things, like next year's Mediterranean Cruise and MADCAMP, the Masters In Line Academy, which will help competitors with the dances and technique required to win. It's an exciting time and I'm just so happy with what we've done so far."


It only remained for Rob and the team to thank all those wonderful people who helped over the weekend and in the run up to the event. "They have been magnificent," he said.



Highland Prodigy

MOVIN DOWN THE RED DIRT ROAD



Kix Brooks and Ronnie Dunn have sold 22 million albums, scored 18 number 1 hits and become one of the most consistent Country music acts of the modern age today. Linedancer reports on their new album...

They've sponsored race cars, appeared on the front of Corn Flakes boxes and pioneered a unique brand of Honky Tonk music. Their much-anticipated new album, *Red Dirt Road*, is already a huge hit in the USA and beyond and offers numerous Line dance possibilities that are the focus for new choreography.

So where does the music come from? "My mother and father listened to hillbilly music all the time," concedes Ronnie Dunn of his familial introduction to music he didn't always understand. "He was a hillbilly singer, too, and man, I didn't always know what the words meant, but I knew something was going on when I'd hear those Marty Robbins, those Jerry Lee (Lewis) records...They just didn't rock enough for me. If the music hit as hard as the feelings, it'd've been perfect."

"So, when it was our turn, I was intent on making Country rock. When we did that first album, it was coming off 15 years in clubs with real people. We wanted to give them what they wanted, and we knew they wanted someone to turn the honky tonk up a little louder and really make it punch."

For Brooks, who was raised outside Baton Rouge, Country music was around the house and it was what he learned to play, plinking out the songs of Hank Williams and Johnny Horton on his first guitar. And it was on his grandfather's dairy farm, he made an important discovery about music's roots. "The guys who worked there, for them, the music was all spirituals, Leadbelly and Robert Johnson. From my few chords that I'd learned, I realized Country and the blues were from the same roots."

"The same three chords that moved me moved these other people who liked a whole other kind of music in the same way. Rock and roll may've turned the guitars up more, but it's from the same place to."

From playing in bands and watching the patterns of what people would dance to, because in Oklahoma and Texas, if they don't dance, you're dead...It's like a Honky Tonk education; you have to stand and deliver just to get in.'

Since then, the duo who enjoyed the longest winning streak in the history of the Country Music Association has maintained the highest possible profile both at home and abroad but success is not guaranteed, especially with a host of big name acts on the scene.

"For us, our competitiveness fires both Ronnie and I to push harder as artists, as musicians," says Brooks. "Sometimes that gets in the way of our creativity because letting that tension drive the music misses the point. But we let it make us better. When we do that, like we did here, our drive unifies us..."

"It's true," Dunn adds. "When you nail a song, it's like racing a car...you get this pure adrenalin rush, espe-

even as a song people had never heard, you could see them really connecting with it. Now this song feels good · how you can't get caught up in that mandolin part would be a real trick - but I think people really like the message and the way the chorus moves. Maybe not since My Maria, which was obviously a BW Stephenson song that a lot of people knew, have we had that kind of early response to a song and now the people have been hearing it for a while, they just go crazy when they hear that intro."



cially when you hear that roar from the crowd. That's what we're pushing for! We want to do to the crowd what we want to do to ourselves; have as much fun as we can, give everyone a release, let 'em feel a bunch of emotions and send 'em home exhausted.'

The good news is that they hit top spot on Billboard and Radio & Records' Country Singles chart with Red Dirt Road. The title track from the just released return-to-roots CD captures the reality the four-time Entertainers of the Year have found to be defining in their own lives.

"For Kix and I, this song is very much about who we are and some of the stuff that we've come to realize that is sooo true," says Ronnie Dunn. "I was raised off Rural Route 3... and me and my cousins ran up and down that road, chasing each other. I learned about life on that red dirt road and, the older I get, the more I realized I was learning, I just didn't even know it at the time."

Entertainment Weekly says that Red Dirt Road is, "a gutsy account of the terrible beauty of coming of age," and the song has certainly has struck a note among the 25-million selling duo's fans. "We started playing Red Dirt Road at the very first show," says Kix Brooks, "and

There is a simple secret to their success. "Hopefully we're a party band with some substance to us," says Brooks. "Our main objective is to show people a good time they come to be lifted up. But then you'll be playing Neon Moon or Husbands and Wives and you realize they're really listening, maybe even thinking about it. That's cool; it shows they're looking for something deeper, too. To me, there's a really cool thing about entertaining everyday people because they want to have fun, get lost in the music and the moment. I come from a pretty average background and I'd say our fans are a pretty average cross-section. They speak in plain terms, live in regular houses, wait for the weekend, don't love their job, but do love their family...It's not very glamorous, but it's the truth. And the last time I checked, it's the truth that drives Country music.'



The girls have known each other for many years; they virtually grew up together in the beautiful West Wales coastal town of Barmouth. They are as close as sisters and support each other 24/7. The Country Kittens idea came about - as do all the best things in life by accident. Bethan takes up the tale. We were in a local hotel last Christmas and we decided to have a bit of fun at a

karaoke night. It all just happened from there. We didn't think we were very good but, after we'd stopped singing, people were saying how good we are." Despite the initial surprise, Bethan's dad, Alan, knew he was onto something. "Well he said we should form a duo and see where it would go," says Cherry. "He's become our main sponsor now," she continues, "and buys us equipment, gives us advice." Alan, it seems, is a bit of a legend in the Country music world having first fallen in love with the music on a trip to Nashville. "He went there a rock n roller and came back a Country fan," says Angie, chipping in.

Angie is the Kitten's minder and stylist. "Cherry, Bethan and me agreed that we wanted an understated Western style," she confides, "that would appeal both to Country music fans and to the general public. So we've got two stage outfits now, as you've seen from various pictures; the white and pink one and a darker, red and black one. Both work really well and everyone has told us they appreciate the girls' look."

Locals are so impressed with Cherry and Bethan's efforts that the local hotel in guestion - the Min-y-Mor - has offered them a free practice room. "And free coke," exclaims Bethan, laughing. "It's made a lot of difference and already we've got people like Paul Bailey and Dave Sheriff giving us advice, offering to assist with recording and suchlike." De-

spite the obvious close ties with the British Country music scene the Kittens are quite different. "The image we're trying to project and the music we're trying to create is very New Country," says Cherry, "We've found that the combination of tracks for dancers that we have been performing has created a buzz. You just don't seem to get that too much on the scene at the moment. We were at the Welshpool festival with 9,000 other people and our friends from West and North Wales were telling us to go on stage and do our set."

No wonder, given a set that includes a broad range of dance classics including the Mavericks's Dance The Night Away (Scotia Samba), Travellin Soldier (Dixie Chicks), Breathe (Faith Hill's chart-topper - nice dance by John Robinson), Forever And For Always (Shania), Buckaroo (Lee Ann Womack's hit with several dances to go with it) and Baby, by Blake Shelton. The Kittens aspire to the same sort of success that American girl-trio SheDaisy have experienced. "They started singing at local Country shows too," observes Cherry. Although dreams of working in Nashville may seem a million miles away it's amazing what hard work and sheer dedication can achieve...

The girls' voices work so well together. Bethan's voice is deeper, huskier and, perhaps, more "Country" whilst Cherry's is a sweet soprano. "We're working on our harmonies at the moment," says Cherry. "Trying to get them better and better." They secretly admit that Line dancing is going to be finding its way into their stage routines as well. Although some Country acts have attempted this in the past, nobody has really gone through with it, so this is good news all around.

Festival, reported in Linedancer last month, brought the town square to standstill. It not only impressed the hundreds of dancers and listeners but also their previously sceptical school friends. "They have taken the mick in the past,' admits Bethan, "but they're a lot more supportive now they've seen what the Country Kittens mean in reality." The girls sung at nearby Aberystwyth Boot Scooters LDC a few months ago and were very grateful for support from Sandra and Derek. From every live showcase further dates follow and Angie tells me that the Kittens are appearing at a major music festivals in Shrewsbury (26th-28th September) and in

and Harlech High) and love where they live. The area is steeped in history and, of course, both of them speak Welsh at school. They are proud of their language and heritage and the relative calm of life at home allows them to concentrate on their schoolwork and their singing. "We practice after school and at weekends," says Cherry, "and we really enjoy it. I've got my GCSE's coming up this year and although I work hard at school I'd rather be singing!"

Members of Angie's Buckles and Boots Line dance club have become the Country Kittens' rock solid support and it is here that Cherry and Bethan have been grounded in

Line dance reality. "Our favourite dances reflect all different styles of music," admits Bethan, "so we know that a live Line dance audience will require us to push the boundaries of what we've been doing so far, but that's OK! argaret had been teaching Ballroom and Sequence dancing locally when she was strongly encouraged to look into Line dancing. "I was at a UKA Conference and we were all told that Line dancing was 'the next big thing' and that we should get trained straightaway. After all, we wouldn't want to miss out!"

That was eight years ago and now the Stetson Stompers, an offshoot of the successful Margaret Brown School of Dance, is an established presence in Somerset. "Each week we welcome between 100-120 dancers," she tells me, "and they come from Bridgewater, Highbridge, Westonzoyland and surrounding villages. Line dancing provides local people with a great focus."

"Being fully qualified to teach is vitally important," says Margaret, "not only because it gives class members confidence but because it means I'm ready – prepared – for what will happen. I'd been teaching Ballroom and Se-

quence dancing for a long time before Line dancing hit but the 90s boom required me to re-train, which I did with the UKA." Margaret told me what it took for her to qualify as a Line dance instructor, "Oh, it was a lot of hard work," she recalls. The UKA medal tests have also become a regular part of life for dancers with Margaret's Stetson Stompers. The last session was held a few months ago and 30 dancers completed their tests, winning high praise from the examiner. "There's a lot of debate about medal tests," Margaret admits, "but the dancers really like doing them and gives them a great sense of achievement. The structure of teaching they get in class in added to by the knowledge that a professional body is watching them progress."

Margaret adds that the way a teacher structures each class makes all the difference. One area that *Linedancer* has focussed on is of great concern to Margaret. "Our insurance requires us to warm dancers up before going into the main part of the session. We do this gently, starting at 7.15pm, warming up the muscles, on a teaching night and gradually

build up the tempo throughout the evening. This reduces the possibility of injuries and I cannot emphasize how important this is," she adds. "Every class is the same in that the difficulty level of teaching develops through the night but less able dancers are welcome to stay as long as they like and join in where appropriate. It's actually quite a flexible approach; there's no pressure and I cater for all levels, from beginner to advanced."

Local people who have discovered the joys of Line dance with Margaret have told her that their lives have been improved immeasurably since starting classes. "This is the best thing to come from teaching Line dance," she admits. "Making a difference. They love the social aspect and most of them come to class because they haven't got — or don't require – a partner to take part."

As well as going on twice-yearly holidays with club members, Margaret arranges regular monthly socials at Puriton Village Hall and St. George's Hall (Bridgewater), which attract 40 and 80 dancers respectively. Stetson Stompers is a vibrant club showing the

best in modern Line dancing but, as many instructors and dancers will not be surprised to learn, there is a big problem at the heart of the operation.

"Too many dances," says Margaret, laughing. (It's interesting to note that every instructor I talk to mentions this problem.) "Of course we choose what's right for our class, and training helps you with that, but when you have dozens of new dances coming out every month it makes life so much more difficult. I only teach one new dance a week for my Intermediate crowd and that is enough."

But is there a solution ..?

"Other local teachers and me get together every six weeks we meet at the Parade Dance Studios in Taunton to discuss which dances we have been teaching and which new ones might be of benefit to our classes," Margaret tells me. "Linedancer plays a major part in this and we feel that it's vital to try and teach the same or similar dances so that when our pupils go to socials — either at our own clubs or elsewhere — they can dance." Another vital function that the Apple County group undertakes is to raise money for local charities and two of these are held annually.

"The thing that's so good about the group getting together is that it's a politics free

One fascinating fact to emerge from our discussion relates to advertising. "It's important," says Margaret, "and I've found that local newspapers are a great way to make people aware of what we're doing. We're listed in Yellow Pages too!"

What comes across is Margaret's dedication to building her club and the professional-ism with which she

does this. Her training has made a great deal of difference and her club members trust her to choose the right dances and ro provide the right balance, year in year out. If Line dancing is to grow and develop in the UK we need more teachers like Margaret Brown and we need them to work together so that this hobby of ours can be everything we want it to be ... and more!


WOLVESTOCK

DJ Tony Cook of Stafford Radio had the task of helping them keep the dance area full at all times. He did a great job.

Jim Duncan, festival organiser, had asked Jan Brookfield for advice on dances for the two-day event and she suggested that her Easy-Intermediate Ain't No Way (as seen in Linedancer) might be suitable as a theme. Jim agreed and Jayne and Debbie taught this popular dance to the hundreds of eager dancers on site.

As the rain fell, the first act, veteran Country singer Jim Ryder (with Adam James) arrived on stage. They set the tone for the day with a pleasant set. They were followed by Nadine Somers and the Corn Exchange. Nadine, looking as stunning as ever, sung a great set that included her Line dance hits Tear Stained Letters, In Between Dances, Country Sweetheart, Garth and Trisha's Squeeze Me In, a couple of Eagles songs and You Wanna Make Something Of It by Jo Dee Messina. Nadine also sang a couple of Two-step numbers for the considerable number of couples dances below the stage...

Lazy Dog continued with some great music and their wide ranging set included songs John Prine, Jimmy Dale Gilmour, George Strait and Alan Jackson. The Corn Dogs, after



supporting Nadine, returned to entertain the damp crowd (!). The Deans were in top form on Saturday, as were Broadcaster. Plenty for Line dancers despite the rain!

Stepping into the emerging sunlight, the Cowboys n Angels again prepared the way for an exciting day of dance energy. By 11am the crowd around the stage must have numbered at least a thousand souls with perhaps 500 Line dancers ready, willing and able to do their thing...

The Californian was waiting behind stage and he came over as a quiet-spoken and unusually reserved guy who lets his singing do the talking. He told me that this was his first tour of the UK and that he was thoroughly enjoying himself. He added that he'd for Alan Jackson, George Strait, Tracy Byrd and Trish Yearwood in the recent past. Impressive!

It was not long before he walked on stage to rapturous applause from an expectant audience. A full, five-piece real live American





Country band at a UK Line dance event? How often does that happen? Boomer didn't disappoint and introduced himself by saying, "It's great to see so many Brits taking Country music seriously!" He then launched into a set perfectly tailored for Line dancing. The big hit was *Poor Boy Shuffle*. Impressive, considering that Boomer plays mainly for Couples and Two-steppers back home. For many, The Boomer McLennan Band was the hit of the weekend...and Boomer told me later that he'd really enjoyed himself.

Sean Kenny has a (not so) secret. He was born and raised in Wolverhampton and Jim Duncan was proud to announce that Sean was indeed here after a few hours of jams on the motorways leading from Kent, where, Linedancer readers may recall, he has his state-of-the-art recording studio. Sean told me that he is keen to get back on the road after a recent break and he was in fine form on this sunny afternoon as he gave us hit after Line dance hit.

After a short break we were ready for crowd pleasers Magill. The Crystal Boot Award winners were in top form no doubt buoyed by support from dozens of Magill Fan Club fanatics in the audience. Theirs was an entertaining and energetic performance demonstrating why they're currently the top act in the UK for dancers...

Indeed, this was the perfect, light-hearted, end to a great day of live music and Line. It would be a mistake to end this report without mentioning the big new development for this year, the *Linedancer* Showcase Stage.


We worked closely with Iim Duncan to develop an idea whereby we could sponsor a stage for new acts and for choreographers. The idea worked extremely well and over a dozen acts performed live to audiences carrying between 50 and 300 on Saturday and Sunday. Paul Taylor (see Linedancer, September 03 pages 24-25). The Wanderers (a fantastic local Rockabilly duo), Sarah and Vikki, Bulleon, Many Rivers, Eve 2 Eye, Bill's Music, Mississippi and Irene's New Country Band were amongst those who graced the Linedancer stage with their presence. Choreography is all-important and we were thrilled to see Jan Brookfield, Stephanie Harris-Thomas, Tina Argyle and (the indefatigable) Alan Heighway present some new dances. Jan taught Red Dirt Road and By George whilst Stephanie taught My Next Broken Heart (Beginner, 32 counts, again to Brooks and Dunn). Tina gave us Why Oh Why, a 64-count dance to Wade In The Water by Eva Cassidy from her Songbird album, and Alan taught Livin On Love, a 32-count beginner dance to music by Alan Jackson and Momma Don't Dance, a 64count two-waller to a Dave Sheriff track.

The Showcase stage made Wolvestock 9 even more dancer friendly and Jim Duncan is determined to make further improvements for next year. This time he set himself an extremely high standard; there was something for everyone and each live act made a unique contribution.

It was great to see and meet so many of you – the festival attracts dancers from across the UK. Who knows what goodies Jim and co have in store for us next year. All you need to do is mark the weekend of July 24th-25th on your diary and leave it free because Wolvestock 10 will be here before we know it!



Risk Assessment

Over the past year or so I have delivered many seminars raising awareness of risk assessment and child protection issues to hundreds of dance teachers from many different dance disciplines...

At these seminars teachers want to know how all this affects their business. Feedback confirms that teachers are changing their approach. This article looks at why there is a need for risk assessment and how you might go about it.

INCREASING LIGITATION

Assessing risk is not new to the dance profession although much of the day-to-day work has been done informally with no records being kept. In recent years, however, the need to formally address risk has emerged. It is the increasingly litigious society that we live in that has influenced these changes. Not long ago, dance teachers in the UK did not have or feel the need to have insurance cover but, with the ever increasing pressure on people to make claims under the "no win no fee" basis as well the usual channels, insurance cover is now a necessity.

IMPACT OF "NO WIN , NO FEE Claims

Over the past year I have been stopped several times in the street by people asking if I have had an accident, trip or fall in the last three years that could possibly be the basis of a claim for compensation. Even someone who had no intention of making a claim may be persuaded by an enthusiastic sales person, especially if the legal fees are only payable if the claim has a successful outcome. Claims generally, for personal injury, have risen enormously in recent years. Line dancing, like every other business or activity, cannot ignore the possibility of an increase in the number of claims made.

RISING COSTS

When the numbers of insurance claims increase for any type of cover you will find that the cost of insurance cover usually goes up. In addition, there may also be limited cover for

certain areas of risk and/or additional exclusions imposed. For Line dancers this may lead to higher costs to attend classes and events. For teachers and others involved in the provision of Line dancing it impacts on all aspects of how you run your classes or events.

IDENTIFYING KEY RISKS

If you want to reduce risk then the first thing you need to do is identify what the risks are that you are going to assess. For this article I am using three key risk areas:

Environment

This is about the safety of the venue. You will be checking things like floors, entrances and exits, lighting, ventilation, temperature, toilets etc.

Equipment

This is about the safety of the equipment you use and how it is placed at the venue. For example, you would be concerned with the condition and maintenance of electrical items, positioning of leads, CDs and other items.

•Teaching

This is about the safety of the teaching content and the teaching methods used. For example, is the content or dances being taught appropriate for the people you are teaching? How do you justify the teaching methods you use?

WHY A WRITTEN RISK ASSESSMENT?

Historically, many dance teachers have carried out basic, visual checks to the studio or venue before teaching to ensure that everything is in order. These teachers are already familiar with doing basic risk assessment checks. The problem is that they do not keep written evidence of these risk assessments.

CONSIDER THE FOLLOWING

A claim for compensation is made by an adult who fell when she tripped over a speaker cable during a Line dance class two years ago. The claimant says that the cable was dangerous and should not have been trailing across the dance floor. With a written risk assessment the teacher should be able to show that the floor was

thoroughly checked and did not have cables trailing across it. Without a written risk assessment what evidence does the teacher have of safety checks carried out two years ago?

Keeping written risk assessments demonstrates that you have exercised responsibility and have taken care to minimise risk. In the case of a claim being made having written risk assessments will certainly be useful evidence. The sample risk assessment sheet shown is just one example of the type of a simple form you can create and use.

DOING YOUR RISK ASSESSMENT

What you are doing is identifying what the risks or potential risks are and taking all steps that are reasonably practical to reduce them. For example, I often find that the floor is not totally clear when I arrive to teach a class. There may be little bits and pieces of paper or crumbs etc that someone could potentially slip on. To reduce the risk, I sweep the floor. This would be recorded on my risk assessment.

RECORDING HOW YOU REDUCE RISK

Once you have identified the risk, you need to say what action is required to minimise the risk in the sort term and also say whether any further action is required to further reduce the risk in the long term. Some risks can be dealt with immediately such as making sure there are no trailing leads for people to trip over. For risks that can't be dealt with immediately you need to follow it up as soon as is practical after the session. For example, you may need to let the venue managers know that a light bulb needs to be replaced.

SEASONAL RISKS

Some risks may be related to the time of year or weather. This year the UK has had a long heatwave with temperatures soaring to record breaking highs of over 100 degrees. Combine this with the fact that air conditioning is not readily available in the majority of venues in the UK where Line dancing is held and you get the picture. The risk of people overheating,

dehydrating and so on is very real and needs to be addressed within your risk assessment. I would also include what changes I make to my teaching practice to minimise risk to class members, for example, raising awareness of drinking additional water or other appropriate drinks, re-structuring the content and pace of the class, making changes to teaching methods if required and emphasising to class members that it is okay to take plenty of rests.

UPDATING AND KEEPING YOUR RISK ASSESSMENT

Once you have completed your risk assessment before the class or event you need to be aware that new risks can arise. One of the most common ones is spillage of drinks. This needs to be included in the risk assessment so that you have a record of it happening and the action taken to reduce the risk of anyone slipping or falling on the spillage.

KEEPING YOUR RISK ASSESSMENTS

You need to keep your written risk assessments in the UK for three years for adults as a personal injury claim can be made up to three years after the event. There is no time limit for claims being brought by under 18's so it is necessary to keep these risk assessments on file until such times as no claim could be made.

TEACHING


This area of risk assessment is so often neglected and yet the potential for risk is extremely high. Line dancing is constantly evolving, becoming more complex and challenging and with that is increased risk of injury. When you consider the diversity of age ranges of Line dancers and the specific risks associated with age related safe dance practice then you will understand why I am devoting next month's column to risk assessment related to the actual teaching of Line dancing including some of the key, child protection issues for dance teachers teaching children.



Tim Matthews spoke to Naomi Hulbert, her mum Veronica, and Joanne Scorrer on their way to the World Masters in Blackpool...

f you go to the regular Sue Weston socials in Kidderminster you'll find 14-year-old Naomi Hulbert and her mum, Veronica (pic right), enjoying the mix of Intermediate-Advanced dances. They travel to events all over the country and have both been competing in Line dance competitions for a few years. Naomi has done very well thus far, winning several trophies and medals along the way. She dances in Duos with Joanne and has struck up a good friendship with her.

"I love it," Naomi told me. "And I love competing. Especially with Joanne. I'm in the Teenage Advanced division with Masters in Line now. My mum and me travel everywhere we can and I enjoy Jazz, Tap and Ballet lessons back home." Naomi attends the Bristol School of Dance and says she wants to dance professionally. She's certainly going about it the right way but the most encouraging thing is the importance she attaches to Line dance. In a competitive market it's easy for younger people to see our hobby as a poor relation but that's not what you get from Naomi.

"People who see us doing our routines love what they see and they can't believe that they're seeing Line dancing. We believe in putting forward a modern image for Line dancing, so it's important to get out there and show people what it's all about.

We've done demos for local schools and kid's clubs and they love the modern funky style of Line dance."

Naomi's friend and dance partner, eleven-year-old Joanne Scorrer, from near-by Hembury, is similarly enthusiastic. "We both like the same dances," she says, "and the same music. I don't know where to start! Favourite groups? Singers? Hmmm...they've gotta be Michael Jackson, Liberty X,

Christina Aguilera, MisTeeq, Beyonce and Celine Dion." Naomi's favourite dances are Never Gonna Leave, Scandalous, SXE, Faded, Stop It, Cowboy Up, Wild Wild West and The Beast.

Although Naomi currently attends the Churchill Community School at the foot of the Mendip Hills the family has discussed plans to move further South West, to Devon. "If we move, we'll still be going to as many events though," says Veronica. "But we're not sure what's happening at the moment."


Currently, Naomi and her mum attend Line dance socials, dance lessons and special events in an extremely busy schedule. "I want to make it as a dancer," says Naomi. 1st STEPS



After a few years on the dance floor, Stephanie Lindley and Vince Hogan decided that they needed to do things a little differently, writes Tim Matthews.

've been dancing for five years now,"
says Stephanie, whose 1st Steps club in
North West London is set to expand to
a full-time operation this September. "It
was like a competition — see who could
learn the most dances. With work every
day I just couldn't retain the three or
four new dances being taught at most
clubs and there didn't seem to be anyone offering an alternative from the rat race."

So Stephanie came to a crossroads: Give up or start something for dancers more interested in having a good time, fun and enjoyment and nothing at all to do with "keeping up." The result was 1st Steps, set up in November 2001 and now proving itself not only locally but throughout Greater London. One of the reasons why *Linedancer* got in contact with Stephanie was through recommendation by several local instructors and long-time Line dancers.

"There's something very special going on there," said one informant. "They've got this vibe about them and the classes are growing." They certainly are. From small beginnings, and Stephanie teaching Vince some steps in her living room, the club now attracts 60 dancers on a Monday night with more to follow. "I must be mad," she laughs. "More seriously, we're really going for it," Stephanie told me. "From one class to nine! We're adding another eight classes to include a mix of daytime and evening events. We're both going professional and I'm giving up my job. That's how much I believe in what we're doing."

New venues at Edgware, Northolt, Watford and Northwood are going to be made available. "Many of our regulars told us that they'd appreciate the chance of attending daytime classes as well," says Stephanie, "so we thought long and hard about things. We believed then as we do now that we have the right mix and are targeting the right area for development...Beginners."

It is fascinating to see how many clubs around the UK are starting to conclude that offering beginners classes is the way forward. "Well it's the major growth area and you have to remember why most people started Line dance in the first place," insists Stephanie. "It wasn't to be the best, or to compete either with fellow dancers or clubs but to relieve the stress of a hard day's work and to get some social fun and enjoyment." Steph and Vince firmly believe that this message has been lost. "Even when I started off in '98 there was this element of 'oh, haven't you learned the latest dance/s yet'," she says, "and although I was OK with things for a while it eventually turned out

it is. They are such a lovely bunch of people." She also mentions the support and help from her daughter, Felicity, who is a schoolteacher, and whose work has proved invaluable from the start. "Without her I don't think we'd be anywhere near where we are today," admits Stephanie. "And Vince is a vital part of this too. He has been wonderful and although he's not been

that learning all the newer, more difficult and phrased dances was more stressful than going to work!!" Stephanie feels that some instructors have a bad attitude to beginners and this is to the detriment of our hobby...

1st Steps name tells you all you need to know. "It's all about beginners," says Stephanie, "the difference being that we've proved the critics wrong. They told us that we wouldn't be able to keep beginners as beginners and that they'd want to learn more and more difficult dances as time went by. Actually, they don't. That's not what it's about. The emphasis is different here. Yes we can do more difficult dances but that's not the focus. If class members can thoroughly learn dances they can enjoy them and concentrate upon having fun."

"Every class we do starts with basic steps. Going over grapevines or coaster steps and so on. Newcomers therefore feel as if they are being looked after. This is not one of those clubs where it's beginners for the first hour then they're forgotten. This is all about beginners. You shouldn't need to feel like you need a degree to dance and there is a simple equation at the heart of Line dancing that should tell us all we need to know; that the easier the dances are, the more people get involved. Just think of all the people, like me, who felt like giving up and have given up. It's because they got lost in the stampede to get bigger, better and more tricky. We're aiming to keep it simple forever!"

It might take a few weeks to learn a new dance at 1st Steps and you may not learn a new dance every week because there is no pressure and no competitive element. The proof of the 1st Steps pudding is that intermediate and advanced dancers from around the capital drop in to classes every so often and thoroughly enjoy the friendly, fun atmosphere. "It's about encouragement. About creating the right social environment. People like our classes so much, and this is something that always surprises us, that they are apologetic if they miss a week! They come up to us and say sorry in advance!"

Stephanie and Vince insist that the success of 1st Steps is not just about them. "It's about the dancers that come week in week out," says Steph, "and they have helped us make it what dancing as long as me he just does so much for the club."

"You can never get too complacent though," Stephanie admits. "The customers call the shots and yet they're very happy with the level of Line dance we're offering. The club is two years old in November and I think we've proved that we have a successful formula here."

Safety and professionalism are vital too. "We ensure that dancers are aware of floor etiquette and safety issues relating to pacing themselves, correct footwear and so on. When they attend a class they'll be offered welcome leaflets and important introductory information. During the recent heatwave we made sure that all the dancers drunk enough liquid. We also slowed the pace too. On a more general note, we know dancers'll struggle to start with but we need to constantly support them."

Current club favourite dances include *T-Bone* Shuffle, Shania's Moment, Black Coffee and Coastin. "They're taught at beginners speed

and we have all night to get things right, if necessary. If a dancer wants us to repeat a section we'll repeat it, no question. What's the rush?" she asks, rhetorically.

The constant pressure on instructors and dancers to do more dances at a higher level has caused tens of thousands of people to leave the Line dance world. 1st Steps is starting to regain some of those people who, like Stephanie, were prepared to give things one last chance. The club is getting a lot of new recruits exactly because it has opted out of the rat race. The surprising thing is that in a mature Line dance market those clubs that are catering for beginners are the ones that are growing, whilst others simply mark time or try desperately to hold on to what they've got.

Maybe, just maybe, clubs like 1st Steps are the future of Line dance...

Tribute To Roni Ashton

of the death of Roni Ashton, who ran Line dance classes in Ormskirk, Melling and Liverpool. Her sister Carol Johnson, wrote to us with an article and photographs, which we have edited and included here

"Roni (Veronica) first started Line dancing whilst on holiday in California in 1995. She always put others first and that's how she came to use Line dance to raise money for charity. The Melling Mavericks was her first club, opened with her husband John, who acted as DJ. The Copper Cowboys was the next venture. The name came from the venue, whose name was previously the Yorkshire Copper Pipe Club. John, incidentally, is still running both clubs. Roni wanted it that

Roni started to suffer with back pains in February 2002 but just took pain killers in the hope it would go away. As Roni's pain got progressively worse and she started to lose weight we all realised that something was seriously wrong, despite the fact she tried to hide it. She kept teaching and running coach trips to Line dance socials and weekend events.

Roni was diagnosed with inoperable Roni and John with pancreatic cancer. There was Dawn and Andy at nothing the doctors could do but she their wedding in still insisted on attending a friend's wedding in Malta with 20 friends and family. She knew she faced an operation on her

return but kept the whole illness quiet for the benefit of everyone there.

As her illness got worse she spent much of her time in hospital but even there, in pain, Roni was thinking of other people, trying to help them. She was more concerned about our reactions than her own; she came to terms with her illness and, last December, still hoped to hold a charity night for Zoe's Place. Nevertheless, she was just too ill to arrange it all, so her great friend Vera Rook held an event in Gateacre, which Roni attended, despite her pain.

Roni died at home on 24th February with her family around her. Over 200 friends and family attended her funeral, many of them Line dancers from the clubs she had attended. Roni asked not for flowers but for donations to Zoe's Baby Hospice instead.

Since then, Vera has held a charity night in Roni's Vera at Zoe's Place with Caitlin honour and Joan and Janette. of the Reigate Rebels club, also held one. Both were for Zoe's. We have bought lots of things for the Hospice and Roni has a special plaque in their garden of remembrance so she can be near the babies.

Roni asked me to arrange a charity night for the Woodland Hospice (a special hospice for cancer sufferers in the grounds of Fazakerly Hospital) and this will be held on June 25th 2004 at which Magill will be appearing."

ALBUM OF THE MONTH



he Mavericks are back! The band says that they had taken a break rather than had a break up. Raul Malo had a successful solo album that yielded an international hit for Teresa and Vera with I Said I Love You. Eddie Perez has replaced guitarist Nick Cane and, during their recent flying visit to the UK, promised to be return for a full tour soon.

The album opens in style with *I Wanna Know* (148 bpm) and if this ain't a massive dance hit then I'll give up! From the outset this catchy tune will have your feet tapping. It's got a great hook and it'll have you all singing along. This track hails the return of the Mavericks at their very best.

In My Dreams (112 bpm) is a gorgeous Cha Cha that would fit to many dances. It is one of those "dreamy" songs that you float away with, and when it gets its own dance it will be a huge hit.

Shine A Light (143 bpm). A strong horn section opens this track, and Raul's vocals are superb. With a strong Cuban flavour this is a typical Mavericks song. I love it! The pace slows down for Wondering (84 bpm), which has a Rumba feel to it. By The Time (76 bpm) is a superb waltz, on which Raul's voice is simply stunning.

Would You Believe (116 bpm) is to be the first single off the album and this slightly "Poppy" number

could well be a hit. Another good dance prospect that grows on you. A Little Too Lonely (119 bpm) is awash with orchestral backing. The double bass, brushes on the snare drum and tinkling piano whisks you to the heady days in a New York apartment, Noel Coward style!

Time Goes By (74 bpm) is the ubiquitous duet with Willie Nelson. It seems you ain't nobody these days unless you have a Willie on your album! Another danceable number but with the tempo changes and phrasing it would need some clever choreography. San Jose (96 bpm) is Spanish Eyes revisited another Latin flavoured track that should be a big dance hit. Because Of You (120 bpm) is a brilliant dance track; there is a strong horn section and a powerful bass line. This one screams dance, dance, dance, dance at you...

The album closes with a stunning rendition of The Hollies' Air That I Breathe (84 bpm). The song has long since been a favourite of mine and it would definitely be another of my Desert Island Discs. Not sure whether you would dance to it but it is superb and a fine way to close a superb album.

I can only say that this is, without doubt, The Mavs best ever album. There will be several dance hits from it and one of the biggest Line dance albums of the year! Order your copy now.

SARA EVANS Restless

t has been quite a while since Sara Evans' last release, *Born To Fly*, which was a great album. I was surprised it didn't inspire more people to choreograph to it. Sara has taken time out since the last album to add to her family and to write new material for this project.

The opener, *Rocking Horse* (147 bpm), is an East Coast swing which tells the story of a tree being struck by lightning in the singer's garden and her dad carving a rocking horse from it. Nice story, nice song and certainly a good dance track. *Back Seat Of A Greyhound Bus* (107 bpm) is about that romantic notion in the States about the back seats of Greyhound buses! I must give it a try sometime! Anyway, this is a lovely Night club Two-step on which the orchestral accompaniment enriches Sara's beautiful vocals. A nice track that could well prove to be a hit.

Restless (74 bpm) is another fairly slow one with a bit of a Celtic flavour and Niagara Falls (74 bpm) is in similar vein although it has a completely different feel than the previous track. Perfect (103 bpm) picks things right up. It has good beat, clever lyrics, and Sara shows power in her voice. I really like this one and can see no reason why someone wouldn't want to write a dance to it.

Need To Be Next To You (86 bpm) is another slightly slower number, whilst To Be Happy (112 bpm) is a really good Cha with some fine harmonica playing augmented with a squeeze box. You can't fail but to love this one and you will be more than happy to dance to it. Otis Redding (90 bpm) pays homage to the legend that was Otis. "Otis Redding makes me feel good, dancing round the kitchen barefoot". It's an infectious "feel good" song and I love it!

Feel It Comin On (114 bpm) is a strong up beat number; another Cha Cha. This powerful track is ripe for choreography so what are you waiting for? I Give In (83 bpm) is a mellow song. Big Cry (74 bpm) is also a little slow but it is a very powerful song, a real belt out Soul number. With the gospel chorus it is somewhat of a diversion for Sara. Awesome! Suds In The Bucket (162 bpm) closes the album and it's a cracker! Country music at it's finest and it will surely find its way to dance floors everywhere soon!

Sara Evans seems to consistently improve. There is maturity in her new work and it just shows how hard she works at producing fine music. *Restless* is a damn fine album on which Sara stays true to her roots. A great album, buy it!

eorge Strait is a Country superstar who has achieved legendary status, having won countless awards and, having sold millions of albums worldwide. His music has been a good friend to Line dancers over the years and we have enjoyed dancing to songs like I Just Wanna Dance With You, Adilida, We Really Shouldn't Be Doing This, Meanwhile, and One Night At A Time. George has consistently turned out good albums although it has been a while since any of his songs have inspired at Line dance hit.

The first track, She Used To Say That To Me (106 bpm), was done brilliantly a few years back by Wade Hayes. This is a pleasant song with a nice steady beat and would make for a good dance track. Title track Honkytonkville (122 bpm) may excite someone to follow up Brokenheartsville with this medium paced track, which is very Country. Look Who's Back I Town (84 bpm) is a Night Club two-step and George's voice is wonderful on this "buckle polisher".

Cowboys Like Us (126 bpm) is a fast-ish waltz in the same vein as Maggie G's What If We Fly and maybe this would be a good alternative for that dance might just tempt someone to write a new one. Tell Me Something Bad About Tulsa (64 bpm) must have been written especially for George! It suits his style perfectly and those of you who like to dance at slower pace will love this song. As Far As It Goes (117 bpm) raises the tempo again and this is a really nice Country Cha Cha and another fine prospect for having a good dance written to it.

I Found Jesus On The Jailhouse Floor (103/206 bpm) is a great title for a song, superb Two-stepper and one of the strongest tracks on the album. It will surely have a dance written to it, it has got hit written all over it. Desperately (93 bpm) slows things down again, and it is another nice Cha Cha with some beautiful harmonies and its another we could find ourselves dancing to. Honk If You Honky Tonk (152 bpm) is just Yeeee Haaa! This is a good ole rednecks song, an East Coast swing and this Country rocker must surely inspire a new dance. Heaven Is Missing An Angel (110 bpm) is another beautiful Cha. The orchestral backing adds so much to this awesome track. Please someone write a dance to it!


Four Down And Twelve Across (68 bpm) is in a similar vein to George's big hit, Check Yes Or No and I can see this being a huge radio hit in the States. I am sure you will enjoy dancing to this sweet little song. The final track, My Infinite Love (88 bpm) is another Night Club Two. It is a beautiful love song, the type that George does so well. A fitting end to a fine album...

With Honkytonkville George Strait has delivered a wonderful album. I personally was a little disappointed with his last few albums but this latest release has restored my faith. George is back to his very best and, as well as there being plenty of tracks to dance to, this is also a great listening album.

He is described as being of multi-ethnic heritage. A former welder, Jeff bates is a man with a story to tell, which he does here on his debut album, *Rainbow Man*. There are many new artists who release an album out of Nashville, only to find themselves joining a long list of "also rans" soon after. Will Jeff Bates fall into that category? Let's find out.

On playing the first track, Country Enough (126 bpm), the above question is soon answered! This classic Country rocker is a bit special. "If you hear it on the radio and you don't turn it up, It ain't Country enough!" This East Coast swinger is destined straight to the dancefloor! Lovin Like That (118 bpm) is a good strong track, which like all of the songs on the album, was co written by Jeff. It has strong similarities to Kenny Chesney's She Thinks My Tractor's Sexy and it would be ideal for Psychabilly Boogle and the like.

Your Lovin Talks To Me (96 bpm) has a good steady beat and Jeff's deep vocals are a delight on this very danceable number. My Mississippi (93 bpm) reminds me a little of Sitting On The Dock Of The Bay. This is an autobiographical song about a guy who trades his '57 Chevy for a guitar, forms a

band and goes to Nashville to make it as a Country singer. Another good dance track. *Already Spent* (93 bpm) has the same bpm as the last one but is completely different. This is a high-octane rocker that should delight dancers everywhere.


There are a few Night club Two-steps on the album including *The Love Song* (65 bpm - a beautiful song that will move you) *I Wanna Make You Cry* (75 bpm), a strong and powerful love song, and *The Wings Of Mama's Prayers* (73 bpm - the title gives you an idea of what its about. *My Inlaws Are Outlaws* (124 bpm) is a rousing Country anthem that Hank Williams Jnr would have been proud of. If someone would choreograph a dance to this, you would all be singing the chorus whilst you danced. Great country music! *Long Slow Kisses* is one of those "talking" songs that does nothing for me, whilst finally the title song Rainbow Man (80 bpm) is a great song which seems to detail Jeff Bates' heritage; a nice song to dance to.

Jeff Bates has delivered a fine debut album. There are several good dance tracks and it is a good album to listen to. He is a man with a bright future and I am sure that if you give this album a try you will not be disappointed...Trust me!

I had just landed in Sweden to be the Event DJ at the Swedish Championships when Chris Higham rang me and told me the very sad news that Rod Baker of the Cochise Corral had died. I was devastated.

Rod ran Cochise Corral, latterly the Dance Factory, for around nine years. I remember when Liz and I first visited the club around seven years ago and the place was packed. Rod made us very welcome as first timers; he took us to a table and found us seats. We became close friends and he invited me to work regularly as a DI from 2001.

When it was announced recently that the Osram club would close, Rod raised a fighting fund to save the club. Rod passed away the day before he was due to go in for a heart by-pass. He was only sixty.

The funeral, on Friday 1st August, was an emotional affair. The church was packed. Many were dancers. The Osram evening social was to have been a Commonwealth Games Reunion. It was planned in January because Rod had helped provide over 500 dancers for the closing ceremony. On my return from Sweden I talked to Rod's widow, Pam, and suggested that we

present a tribute night to Rod (see Grapevine report and pics).

Rod Baker was not only a tragic loss to his devoted family and the Options Disability Group that he gave so much of himself to, but also to the Line dance world. Few have been as passionate as Rod; he loved the business and he loved the people. Pam Baker and the rest of his family have vowed to keep the club going for the memory of Rod and they have the support of the DJ team - Chris Higham, Mitch Allen, Derek Whitworth and myself, as well as the many dancers who attend the club. Rod Baker was a man with a big heart. He had a heart for caring and sharing, a heart for giving and loving. Maybe he gave just too much of his heart to others. I feel privileged and honoured to have known and worked with the man that was Rod Baker. We cannot afford to lose people like him.

Firstly, I want to add my vote of approval to the new features - the DJ Playlists and Dance Review sections, which give a wider picture of what's really popular on the scene. When I look back at my old issues of the mag I can't believe how much it has changed and improved. Of course this is driven by the fact that Line dancing has changed too...

Change is inevitable; we all accept that, well I do anyway. Yes, not all change is for the better but sometimes we have to live with it a while and let it develop before we can decide. There are many difficulties we face within our hobby and it is hard to find solutions that can be effective.

I would like to applaud those choreographers who earn their living on the circuit who choose to promote not only their own work but the work of others also. It seems to me that if all choreographers promoted only their own work we would have a watered down and weak selection of dances, because they can't all be good dances can they? Are there any top names who think they only produce quality dances all the time? Or do they sometimes think maybe I shouldn't have done that one or maybe I didn't give it my best?

My theory is, that if that is correct, then why not just stick with the one that is closest to your hearts and teach some of other peoples and maybe we would see a return of quality dances that could stay the test of time a little longer.

Yes, there are those around who teach others work and I think that is the right approach. When I ask people who attend local classes why they don't support local events with named choreographers in attendance the answer is always the same "we learn all these new dances and then we don't see half of them again". Well, ask yourself the why should that be? As a teacher, my answer is that I don't want to teach maybe four new dances from one choreographer, I want to teach a selection. It gives me a better chance of teaching a 'social hit' and that is what my classes want. To dance socially at most local clubs and not sit down unless that is their choice.

It's not a solution to all of our problems but maybe one choreographers should consider when asked to teach at a club.

What's Good In Malta.

We have appeared on various television programmes with our dancers and last year we produced our own exclusive Line dancing television programme called LINEDANCER, between January and March.

Work permits in Malta are not issued to every Tom, Dick or Harry who decides to come over to the Island to set up shop here. The person applying for a work permit to practice a profession in Malta must first be fully qualified to do so. According to enquires that we made it transpires that the British couple who have been mentioned in Disgruntled Dancer's letter do not hold any formal qualifications in any type of dance let alone line dancing. So how can a work permit be granted to such people? My advice to persons who are planning to move to Malta

Dance Floor Etiquette - A Reminder

Dance floor etiquette is all about common sense, good - will and co-operation. The best dancers are those who follow the social graces of the dance floor; they are courteous and considerate and will be welcomed wherever they dance.

Following this simple guide will help you to enjoy sharing a dance floor this new year and prevent you from inadvertently spoiling it for others.



NEVER

- Never carry food, drinks, glasses, cans or lighted cigarettes onto the dance floor.
- Never walk through a line of dancers to cross the floor always walk around or wait.
- Never stand on the floor to talk if music is playing go off the dance floor to chat.
- Never start a different dance unless there is plenty of room and you sense it is acceptable.
- Never hog floor space. If the floor is full take small steps and watch for collisions.
- Never stop in the middle of a dance to teach, as you'll be in the way. Go off the floor to teach.
- Never let your feet, knees, arms or elbows become dangerous weapons on the dance floor.
- Never show off. Variations, turbo spins, high kicks and jumps can put people off.



ALWAYS

- Always listen to the DJ. It is customary for a DJ to designate the dance and to 'count in'.
- Always encourage and support beginners. It only takes a few kind words to make a new friend.
- Always go to the front when starting off a dance. Others can then line up behind you.
- Always be gracious and apologise when caught in a 'bump' even if it was not your fault.
- Always replace any drinks you accidentally knock over and be sure you say sorry.
- Always leave the outside edge of the dance floor clear for partner and couple dancers.
- Always give way to dancers around the outside of the floor.
- Always dance with the flow. The Line of Dance (LOD) is anti-clockwise.
- Always show appreciation. Applaud live acts, instructors and DJs they work hard for you.

And finally, keep your head up, smile and enjoy yourself.
